Kearny, Commissioner, Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, by letter dated March 4, 1901, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requests that "The appropriation for 'Supplies and Repairs, Borough of Queens,' 1900, being insufficient to meet the unexpected excess of returned amounts on orders, I beg to request that you will cause to be transferred to said appropriation the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500) from the appropriation of 'Lamps and Lighting, Borough of Queens,' 1900, there being an unexpended balance of about six thousand dollars (\$6,000) of the latter appropriation that will not be required for lighting purposes for the year 1900."

In reply, I would report, that on examination of the account in this office of the appropriation for 1900, "Supplies and Repairs, Borough of Queens," I find the following :

As described by Edward A. Miller, Chief Engineer of the Department of Parks, boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, the proposed widening of Fifty-ninth street, between Fifth and Eighth avenues, will consist of the paving with asphalt the roadway from north railroad track to new curb, which new curb is set back fifteen feet, making the width between north rail and curb nineteen feet, instead of four feet as at present; furnishing and setting entire new curb (six-inch), laying asphalt walks from curb to wall (except spaces for trees), and furnishing and planting new trees, etc.

I consider this a much-needed improvement. Widening the roadway fifteen feet on the north side will give great facilities for traffic on the street, and taking this much from the sidewalk leaves a clear space of nineteen feet for walk, and six feet for trees—quite sufficient for the purposes required.

This widening will make the roadway sixty feet wide instead of forty-five feet, as at present.

The Engineer's estimate of the work has been carefully made; as the greater portion of the work will be done by contract at public letting, the cost may be more or less than the estimate.

I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly approve the plans submitted, and authorize the issue of Corporate Stock, pursuant to section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of \$45,000, to provide the means necessary for the work, as requested by the Commissioner.

Resolved, That the two similar surveys, maps or plans of the lands and premises situate in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, required for the construction of said piers as above described, made by the Commissioner of Bridges, be certified by the Chairman of this Board, and that the Secretary of this Board be and he hereby is directed to file said surveys, maps or plans as follows: One in the office of this Board and one in the office of the Register of the County of New York, as required by law, and that the two similar surveys, maps or plans of the lands and premises situate on Blackwell's Island, in The City of New York, required for the construction of said piers as above described, made by the Commissioner of Bridges, be certified by the Chairman of this Board, and that the Secretary of this Board be and he hereby is directed to file said surveys, maps or plans as follows: One in the office of this Board and one in the office of the County Clerk of Queens County, as required by law, and that the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is authorized and requested to take such proceedings as may be necessary or proper for the acquisition of title to said land and premises for said purpose, as hereinbefore provided.

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements, deeming it for the public interest that the title to the land and premises described in the foregoing resolution and all interests therein should be acquired by The City of New York at a fixed or specified time, does hereby direct that at a date four months after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate who may be appointed by the Supreme Court in proceedings to acquire title to said lands and premises, the title to the said lands and premises and all interests therein shall vest in The City of New York.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 284 of the Laws of 1900, be and is hereby requested to take such action as may be proper in the premises, that proceedings may be instituted to acquire title to said lands and premises.

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing resolutions be transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, together with a statement of the assessed value of the plots of land within which are inclosed the parts selected by this Board, the total area and the area of the parts selected.

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Public Improvements held March 6, 1901, resolutions were adopted requesting the Corporation Counsel to take the necessary proceedings, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to acquire title to certain lands in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Queens, which lands are necessary for the construction of piers for Bridge No. 4, connecting said boroughs, and determined that at a date four months after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate, who may be appointed by the Supreme Court, title to the said lands and premises shall vest in the City.

On December 5, 1899, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized, subject to the approval of the Municipal Assembly, Corporate Stock in the sum of \$1,000,000, "for the purpose of providing means for constructing necessary foundations for piers for the bridge over the East river, between the boroughs of Manhattan and Queens, according to the plans approved by the Board of Public Improvements at its meeting held November 29, 1899, and for other necessary expenses connected with the construction of said bridge."

On January 8, 1900, an ordinance authorizing the issue of Corporate Stock in the above sum was approved.

On November 15, 1900, an ordinance was approved authorizing the construction of a bridge between the boroughs of Manhattan and Queens, known as Bridge No. 4.

On February 23, 1901, plans of the said bridge were approved by the Secretary of War.

The Commissioner of Bridges, in a communication under date of March 19, 1901, states that it is estimated that the \$1,000,000 authorized will be sufficient to pay for the construction of the six piers of this bridge, and that it would be necessary that a further amount be authorized to pay for the awards under the proposed condemnation proceedings.

The approach to Bridge No. 4 on Manhattan Island is to be located between Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth streets and Second avenue on the river front, and the greater part of the land within these limits will be needed for such approach. Two piers will rest upon Blackwell's Island, and the approach in the Borough of Queens will extend from the water-front to the intersection of Hunter avenue and Academy street at Jane street, and will require a strip of land 160 feet in width and about 4,000 feet in length, or four-fifths of a mile.

At the present time it is necessary to acquire land for the construction of the six piers, located as follows:

Manhattan Island.

1. Anchor Pier—A plot 206.5 feet by 200.83 feet, in the block between First avenue and Avenue A.
2. Main Pier—The entire block between Avenue A and the pierhead-line.

Borough of Queens.

1. Anchor Pier—A plot 100 feet by 200 feet, on the easterly side of Vernon avenue, south of Rogers street.
2. Main Pier and Anchor Span—A plot between the westerly side of Vernon avenue and the pierhead-line, varying in width from 160 feet to about 190 feet.

On Blackwell's Island a plot varying in width from 160 feet to 180 feet across the Island, upon which will be constructed two piers. This latter property, being real estate belonging to the corporation, can be acquired for bridge purposes for a nominal sum.

An apportionment of the assessed valuation of the land to be acquired, as above, is \$253,235. I am of the opinion that the land proposed to be taken at this time is necessary for the building of the bridge, and I would recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings as requested.

In order to provide for the payment of the awards in such proceedings, I would recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize an issue of bonds to the amount of \$550,000, all of which is respectfully submitted.

Minutes of Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 207 Stewart Building, on Friday, March 22, 1901, at 11 o'clock A. M.

Present—Commissioners Ryan (President), Ten Eyck, Power and Windolph. The minutes of stated meeting of March 12, 1901, were read and approved. GENTLEMEN—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in

the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII. of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.
