MAYOR DE BLASIO ADDS NEW WEEKEND OUTDOOR DINING LOCATIONS TO NATION-LEADING OPEN STREETS PROGRAM

NEW YORK—Mayor de Blasio today announced six more locations for weekend outdoor dining options as part of a City initiative that combines the Open Streets and Open Restaurants programs. The initiative, "Open Streets: Restaurants," expands restaurant seating options onto car-free streets for select corridors throughout the weekends. Restaurants on these corridors are allowed to go farther away from the curb than other Open Restaurants participants, while the rest of the street remains open for pedestrian traffic and emergency vehicles only.

Today's announcement brings the citywide total to 81 participating streets. Most of the new locations will begin weekend closures the evening Friday, August 28th. More than 9,900 restaurants are now participating in the City's Open Restaurants program.

"We're continuing to reimagine our urban landscape and give small businesses more chance than ever to recoup their losses from COVID-19," said Mayor de Blasio. "Restaurants and diners alike have loved this program from the beginning, and we're proud to expand it even further."

"With weekend diners enjoying eating outdoors along some of their favorite commercial corridors, 'Open Streets: Restaurants' has already effectively redefined New York City street space – and along with Open Restaurants, has put thousands of New Yorkers back to work," said **DOT Commissioner Polly Trottenberg**. "Today we are excited to announce even more outdoor dining locations coming around the City — from Harlem to Boerum Hill, and Astoria. We thank Mayor de Blasio, our sister agencies as well as the local BIDs and organizations for working with us to make outdoor dining safe and enjoyable for thousands of New Yorkers."

The hours of operation for this new expanded seating option for most restaurants will be from 5 p.m. to 11 p.m. on Friday nights, and noon to 11 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. Some hours will vary by location.

"I'm happy to see more and more streets being placed in the Open Streets: Restaurants program. This is not just about expanding small businesses' capacity, it's about prioritizing safety and transportation innovation. I look forward to monitoring each block's success alongside operators, neighbors, and community board partners," said **Council Member Carlina Rivera**.

"We never imagined we'd be able to build an outdoor dining space on 29th street. The last month of being able to serve our guests in our 70 seat outdoor garden has been incredible. Now with Open Streets, we're beyond excited to have the opportunity to expand our seating to accommodate more of our guests through the fall," said **John Meadow, President, LDV Hospitality.**
