

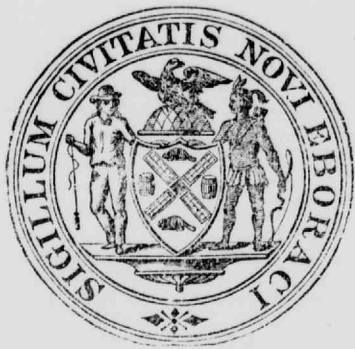

### To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held August 4, 1877, an application by the Finance Committee of the Woman's Hospital, for an appropriation from the Excise Fund, of \$7,000, for furnishing and repairing "Pavilions," was referred to the Comptroller, and he now respectfully reports that, in company with the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, he has made a personal examination of that Institution, and believes that it is one which is extremely useful to the poor of this city, and worthy of support.
