



PETITIONS.

By Alderman Grant—

Petition of property-owners on Eleventh avenue, from Seventy-second to One Hundred and Seventh street, in relation to width of sidewalks and lines of curb and gutter stones, as follows :

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York :

The undersigned, owners of property fronting upon and adjacent to Eleventh avenue, between Seventy-second and One Hundred and Eighth streets, respectfully request that you will ordain that the sidewalks of said avenue on each side be made of the width of thirty feet, and the lines of curb and gutter be fixed accordingly. The following reasons, among others, may be stated why this should now be done :

The avenue has not yet been regulated and graded, and such action will not, therefore, interfere with any existing improvements.

The avenue is laid out of the width of one hundred feet. Its situation between Riverside avenue and the Boulevard, and generally of a grade above both, naturally adapts it for the purposes of residence and precludes its use as a business avenue. There is no necessity, therefore, for a wide carriageway, and such roadway would be a disadvantage and detriment, entailing large and unnecessary expense for its improvement, paving, watering, constant repair, etc.

As an avenue, by its situation adapted, and by owners intended, principally for purposes of residence, the great public advantage and benefit of wide sidewalks are apparent. By planting shade trees, and otherwise, they may be made pleasant and convenient promenades or walks, and owners, in building upon it, induced or encouraged to erect structures in cost and design in harmony with the improved plan of the avenue.

Petition to change grade of Tenth avenue, from One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street to One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York :

We, the undersigned, owners of such of the lots of land shown on annexed map, marked A, as are set opposite our respective names, together comprising at least two-thirds of the land in lineal feet fronting on each side of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth and one Hundred and Thirty-eighth streets, and of the Tenth avenue, opposite to and adjoining that portion of those streets and avenue hereinafter stated, do hereby petition you to order and direct the grade of Tenth avenue, from the centre line of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street to the centre line of One Hundred and Thirty-

ninth street, to be altered and changed in conformity with the proposed change shown on map "B," hereto annexed, on which the present grade line is drawn in red, and the grade line drawn in blue shows such proposed grade. And your petitioner will ever pray.

Petition of the Broadway Surface Railway Company, with letter as follows :
To the Common Council of the City of New York :

The petition of the Broadway Surface Railroad Company respectfully shows that your petitioner is a corporation duly organized and incorporated under and pursuant to the act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled "An act to provide for the construction, extension, maintenance and operation of street surface railroads and branches thereof in cities, towns and villages," passed May 6, 1884, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating a street surface railroad for public use in the conveyance of persons and property in cars for compensation in the City of New York, and that the said railroad is proposed to be constructed, maintained and operated upon and along the surface of the following streets, avenues and highways in the City of New York, viz.: Commencing at the southerly end of Broadway near the Battery, and running thence with double tracks through and along Broadway and across Fourteenth street to and along Union Square to a point at or near the intersection of Fifteenth street and West Union Square, there to connect with the now existing tracks in Union Square or Broadway which run through Union Square, Broadway and Seventh avenue to Central Park or Fifty-ninth street, and the railroad for the construction of which this company has been formed is likewise intended to connect at its southerly end with the existing railroad tracks in Whitehall street, State street and Battery place, in such manner as that by agreements between the owners of the respective tracks, passengers may be carried from South Ferry to the Central Park over a continuous railroad route without change of cars and for a single fare of five cents for the transportation of each passenger over the whole or any portion of said route.

The railroad proposed to be constructed and operated by your petitioner is intended to be operated by horse-power, and to be run in connection with The Broadway and Seventh avenue Railroad above Fifteenth street, and an agreement has been actually made and entered into between your petitioner and said The Broadway and Seventh Avenue Railroad Company, pursuant to which your petitioner will be entitled to run its cars over the tracks of said The Broadway and Seventh Avenue Railroad Company from Fifteenth street to the Central Park.

And your petitioner further shows that pursuant to the provisions of the said act, it is necessary that the consent of the Common Council of the City of New York be obtained by your petitioner to enable your petitioner to construct, maintain, operate and use the railroad for the construction, maintenance and operation of which your petitioner was incorporated as aforesaid.

Your petitioner therefore prays, and hereby makes application to the Common Council of the City of New York, for its consent and permission to construct, maintain, operate and use a street surface railroad for public use in the conveyance of persons and property in cars upon and along the surface of the following streets, avenues and highways in the City of New York, viz.: Commencing at the southerly end of Broadway near the Battery and running thence through and along Broadway and across Fourteenth street, to and along Union Square to a point at or near the intersection of Fifteenth street and West Union Square, there to connect with the now existing railroad tracks aforesaid in Union Square or Broadway, together with the necessary connections, switches, sidings, turnouts, turntables and suitable stands for the convenient working of said road.

And your petitioner will ever pray.

NEW YORK, October 3, 1884.

To the Common Council of the City of New York :

GENTLEMEN—Simultaneously with the delivery to you of this communication, the petition of The Broadway Surface Railroad Company will be presented to your Honorable Body, praying that the consent of the Common Council of the City of New York may be granted to the said company for the construction of its proposed railroad on Broadway, from the southerly end thereof to the intersection of Fifteenth street and Union Square, there to connect with the existing railroad of The Broadway and Seventh Avenue Railroad Company, so that passengers may be carried from the Battery to Central Park, without change of cars and for a single fare of five cents. An agreement to the above effect has been already made and is now existing between said two companies.

If the petition of The Broadway Surface Railroad Company for the consent of the Common Council to the construction of its proposed road shall be granted, the said company has arranged for permission to connect its tracks with the existing railroad tracks in Whitehall street, State street and Battery place, so that passengers may be carried directly from South Ferry to Central Park for five cents.

It is intended to operate the proposed road by horse-power only, but the company will not be slow to adopt any improved motor which may be hereafter invented, other than cable, suitable for the purposes of a surface street railway, which may be approved and authorized by the local authorities and property-owners, as provided in section 12 of the act, chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884. It is to be distinctly understood that our present application is for your consent to the construction and use of a horse railroad, which we believe to be the only motive power yet discovered suitable for the purposes of a railroad in a thoroughfare like Broadway, having a proper regard for the safety of human life.

This second petition of The Broadway Surface Railroad Company is presented to your Honorable Body, and application is now again made to you for your consent to the construction and operation of the proposed road, in order that the whole subject may be considered anew, and that any citizen or property owners having objections to offer may have a full opportunity of being heard. And in

order that the public shall understand that this company does not desire the franchise in question except upon such equitable terms and conditions as shall be just to the public and fair to itself, I am authorized to say, on behalf of The Broadway Surface Railroad Company, that it will bind itself to construct its proposed railroad after the most approved plan for the construction of city railroads, and will abide by the provisions of the Act, chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, including the payment of the percentage of its gross receipts, which by the eighth section of said act, is required to be paid into the city treasury, and the onerous provisions relating to paving of streets which are contained in the ninth section, and will likewise abide by and obey the regulations and ordinances which the local authorities are authorized to make and adopt pursuant to the provisions of the said ninth section.

And in addition to all the conditions in said Act contained, our company is willing to submit to the payment into the city treasury of such compensation for use of the street as shall be just to the public and fair to the company, remembering always that no other company has or can offer the same or equal accommodation to the public as does this company, when, at large expense to itself in securing the right to run upon the existing tracks above Fifteenth street, it extends to the public a ride of five miles or thereabouts for five cents, while the rival companies contending for the like privileges on Broadway must of necessity discharge their passengers at Union Square instead of Central Park.

Moreover, our proposed road will involve in the construction thereof an inconsiderable period of time and but trifling inconvenience to the public, while the construction of a cable road must of necessity require probably at least a year, to say nothing of the injury and loss to be occasioned by disturbance of the sewers, water-mains, gas-pipes, etc., beneath the surface of the streets, and the sickness and death of citizens liable to be occasioned by the upturning of the soil saturated with the sewerage of a century.

Resolved, That Wednesday, the 29th day of October, 1884, at 11 o'clock A. M., and the Chamber of the Board of Aldermen be and are hereby designated as the time and place when and where the application of The Broadway Surface Railroad Company to the Common Council of the City of New York for its consent and permission for the construction, maintenance and operation of the street surface railroad proposed to be constructed by said company, as mentioned in its petition for such consent, dated October 3, 1884, will first be considered and that public notice be given by the Clerk of this Board by publishing the same daily for fourteen days, in two papers published in this city, to be designated therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, said publishing to be at the expense of the petitioner.

Alderman O'Connor moved to add the following additional resolution as an amendment:

Resolved, That the action taken by this Board on the 30th day of August last relating to the Broadway Surface Railroad be and the same hereby is rescinded and repealed.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the negative.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with the resolution of Alderman McLoughlin.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Alderman Grant—

Resolved, That the roadway of Sixty-sixth street, from Tenth avenue to the Boulevard, be paved with granite-block pavement, and that crosswalks be laid at the intersecting avenues where required, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Streets.

By the same—

Resolved, That an improved drinking-fountain, for man and beast, be placed at northwest corner of Sixty-fifth street and First avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By Alderman O'Neil—

Whereas, the proceedings of the various meetings of the Board of Education are frequently interrupted by the noise resulting from the passage of heavy vehicles over the pavement in Elm street; and

Whereas, A smooth and comparatively noiseless pavement in this street would greatly facilitate the transaction of public business; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized to pave with a wooden or asphalt pavement that portion of the roadway of Elm street, beginning at the crosswalk at the northerly side of Grand and extending northerly therefrom for a distance of one hundred and fifty feet; the work to be done under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Which was referred to the Committee on Street Pavements.

By Alderman McLoughlin—

Resolved, That the Alexander B. Smith Association be and is hereby permitted to swing a banner across Eighth avenue, opposite No. 205; said permission to continue only until November 11, 1884.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Reilly—

Resolved, That the vacant lot on northwest corner of Lexington avenue and Eighty-seventh street, being one hundred and two feet on Lexington avenue, by five feet one inch on Eighty-seventh street, be fenced in, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

By Alderman Grant—

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps lighted in One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, from Eighth avenue to Avenue St. Nicholas, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By the same—

Resolved, That the sidewalk on the north side of Seventy-ninth street, from Ninth to Tenth avenue, be flagged four feet wide, where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

By Alderman Sayles—

Resolved, That the sidewalks of Madison avenue, east side, between Seventy-ninth and Eightieth street, be regulated and graded so as to lay an additional course of flagging four feet wide, and that said additional course be laid between the above-described limits, where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Streets.

By Alderman O'Neil—

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby requested to include among the streets to be repaved next year, under the provisions of chapter 476, Laws of 1875, Eighteenth street, from Fourth avenue to Broadway.

Which was referred to the Committee on Streets.

By Alderman Grant—

Resolved, That Croton-mains be laid in One Hundredth street, from Tenth avenue to the Riverside Drive, as provided in chapter 381, Laws of 1879.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By the same—

Resolved, That, pursuant to the statute in such case made and provided, the Hebrew Benevolent and Orphan Asylum Society of the City of New York be and are hereby permitted and authorized, at all times hereafter, to sublet or lease the whole or any part of the several lots of land situated in the City of New York, heretofore conveyed to said society by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, by conveyances recorded, respectively, in the Office of the Register of the City and County of New York, in Liber 833 of Conveyances, page 233, and in Liber 916 of Conveyances, page 232, anything in any of the said conveyances contained to the contrary notwithstanding; and said society may thereupon devote the rents, issues and profits arising therefrom to the maintenance and support of such society, and of the orphans, half-orphans and indigent children under its charge; and provided that such lots and improvements thereon if used for any other purpose than a Hebrew Benevolent and Orphan Asylum shall not be exempted from taxation, and all resolutions heretofore passed conflicting herewith are hereby repealed.

Which was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Alderman Grant here gave notice that Committee on Finance would meet for the consideration of the foregoing subject, on Friday next, the 10th inst., at 1 o'clock P. M.

By Alderman Finck—

Resolved, That the ordinance approved September 15, 1884, entitled "An ordinance requiring owners of express wagons in the City of New York to give bonds for the safe and prompt delivery of all articles entrusted to them for that purpose," be and is hereby amended by striking out from the first line in section 1, the words "an express wagon" and inserting in lieu thereof, the words "one or more express wagons," so that said section when so amended, shall read as follows:

Section 1. Every owner of one or more express wagons, residing or doing business as an expressman in the City of New York, whether non-licensed, or who may hereafter be licensed as an expressman, shall give a bond in the penal sum of two hundred dollars, with two good and sufficient sureties, who shall be owners of real estate in this city, and shall be competent to justify, as real estate owners, in double the amount of the sum mentioned above, over and above their just debts and liabilities, conditioned for the safe and prompt delivery of all goods, wares or merchandise, and every other article or thing which shall be entrusted to the owner or driver of any and every such express wagon for delivery at any place within the corporate limits of the City of New York.

Alderman O'Neil moved to amend by reducing the amount of the security to one hundred dollars.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative on a division called by Alderman O'Neil, as follows:

Affirmative—Aldermen Cleary, Dempsey, Farley, Jaehne, Kenney, McCabe, McLoughlin, McQuade, O'Neil, Reilly, Sayles, Sheils, and Wendel—14.

Negative—Aldermen Finck, Fullgraft, Miller, and Rothman—4.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution as amended. Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Grant—

Resolved, That Croton-mains be laid in Seventy-first street, from Eleventh avenue to the Boulevard, as provided in chapter 381, Laws of 1879.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By the same—

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps lighted in Seventy-first street, from the Eleventh avenue to the Boulevard, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Which was referred to the Committee on Lamps and Gas.

By the same—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Peter McFague to erect a watering-trough in front of his premises on the west side of Eighth avenue between seventieth and seventy-first streets in substitution of a drinking-hydrant which is now located at this place and which will remain the property of the city, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By the same—

Resolved, That the vacant lots in One Hundred and Thirty-first street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, be fenced in where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By the same—

Resolved, That the north side of Sixty-eighth street, from the west curb of Eleventh avenue to about one hundred and twenty-five feet westerly, be regulated and graded so as to lay an additional course of flagging four feet wide, and that said additional course be laid where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Streets.

By Alderman Jaehne—

Resolved, That the resolution approved September 19, 1884, requiring the Corporation Attorney to give ten days' notice before commencing suit for violation of any of the corporation ordinances, except those relating to the removal of snow and ice, be and the same is hereby annulled, rescinded and repealed.

Alderman Jaehne moved that the resolution be laid over.

Alderman Waite moved to refer to the Committee on Law.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with the motion to refer.

Which was decided in the affirmative, on a division called by Alderman Pearson, as follows:

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Dempsey, Farley, Fullgraft, Grant, Kenney, Miller, McCabe, McLoughlin, O'Connor, Pearson, Reilly, Rothman, Sayles, and Waite—15.

Negative—Aldermen Cleary, Jaehne, McQuade, O'Neil, and Wendel—5.

And, on motion of Alderman Jaehne, the Committee was instructed to report at the next regular meeting of the Board.

By Alderman Duffy—

Resolved, That Croton-mains be laid in One Hundred and Thirteenth street, from Fourth avenue to Madison avenue, as provided in chapter 381, Laws of 1879.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By the same—

Resolved, That Croton-mains be laid in One Hundred and Second street, from Fourth avenue to Lexington avenue, as provided in chapter 381, Laws of 1879.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By Alderman Grant—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to T. H. Lee to lay a crosswalk of two courses of blue stone across Sixth avenue, from opposite No. 363 to No. 364, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By the same—

Resolved, That Croton water-mains be laid in Ninety-ninth street, from the Boulevard to West End avenue, as provided in chapter 381, Laws of 1879.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By the same—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Thirty-third street, from Eighth avenue to St. Nicholas avenue, be regulated and graded, curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By Alderman Reilly—

Resolved, That an improved iron fountain (for man and beast) be placed on the southwest corner of Third avenue and Eighty-ninth street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By Alderman Duffy—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Seventieth (170) street, from Tenth avenue to Ridge road, be regulated and graded, curb and gutter stones set and reset, and the sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By Alderman Reilly—

REPORTS RESUMED.

(G. O. 416.)

The Committee on Railroads, to whom was referred by your Honorable Body a resolution offered by Alderman O'Connor, on the 23d day of June, 1884, in words following:

"Resolved, That the consent of this Board to any application under the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, for the consent to the construction, maintenance, use, operation or extension of a street surface railroad upon any street, road, avenue or highway, shall, in accordance with section 7 of said Act, direct and provide for the sale at public auction of the franchise, subject to all the provisions of said chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, to so construct, maintain, use, operate or extend such street surface railway."

—do respectfully report as follows:

Your Committee have duly considered said resolution, and are unanimously of the opinion that it ought not to be adopted, for the following among other reasons:

First—It is unwise and impracticable to establish an inflexible rule to govern the action of the Board in all cases.

Second—It is entirely impracticable to adopt this resolution, because the said act applies not only to new railroads but to extensions of existing roads, and in respect to such extensions an auction sale could not be had for the obvious reason that there could be no competition. And it is also to be observed that, under the law, the local authorities can give their consent only to a company making formal application in the manner prescribed in the fourth section, and where there is only one applicant an auction sale would be futile.

Third—Various applications are now pending before the Board for the construction of new roads, and for the extension of existing roads, some to be operated by horse-power and others proposed to be operated by cable power or other mechanical means, and it would not be practicable to advertise a sale at auction, since the bidders in case of different motors proposed to be used in the same street, would not be bidding for the same thing. Moreover, if there are two applicants pro-

posing to operate their road by different motors, an auction sale would involve the surrender by the Common Council of its own judgment respecting the motor which should be employed on a particular route. Furthermore, the mechanical motors supposed to be applicable to street railroads, such as cable traction, electric motor and compressed air machines, are severally patented inventions, and if the Common Council should in any case approve the selection of any one of such patent motors for use on any route, the patent would prevent competition for a railroad on such route.

Fourth—The said act, in our opinion, was designed not to prevent but to facilitate the construction of street railroads; and while this Board has no right to dispose of an actual railroad franchise in any case, but can only give the consent of the city, which would be inoperative without the consent of property owners, or of Commissioners appointed by the Court, being subsequently obtained, no responsible person would be willing to bid any considerable sum for the mere consent of the city in any particular case, without a guarantee that the consent of the property owners could likewise be obtained.

CIVIL SERVICE, CITY OF NEW YORK, }
September 30, 1884. }

To the Board of Aldermen :

In compliance with the request contained in the Comptroller's letter of August 25, 1884, I have the honor to submit herewith a statement of the necessary expenses of the Municipal Service Boards for the year 1885.

I am requested by the Advisory Board to say that for clerk hire and other assistance the following charges will be necessary : An assistant, \$1,000 ; a person who shall be clerk and stenographer, \$1,000, and a messenger, \$500.

It will be necessary, besides this expenditure, to hold in reserve the sum of \$1,000, to provide against any increase in clerical work of the office for which the assistance above indicated may not be sufficient.

\$2,500 is needed to cover the expenditure for experts, including that for the expert provided for by Regulation 21.

\$1,000 should be provided for the incidental expenses of the office.

Offices must be provided and a sum of money should be set apart for that purpose and for furniture. \$3,000 would be needed for the outlay for the first year : \$2,000 for rent and \$1,000 for furniture.

This exhausts the sum of \$10,000 specified in the Regulations.

It has been thought best to adopt a fixed sum for the compensation of the Advisory Board, rather than a per diem allowance, as the number of their meetings must necessarily rest very much in their discretion, and these meetings should be as frequent as is necessary for the proper transaction of the business.

The salary of the Secretary and Executive Officer has been fixed at \$4,000 in view of the importance and responsibility of the position, and the fact that it requires the entire time of the person appointed to the exclusion of all other business.

With regard to the outlay for the pay of the Examining Boards, the gross sum fixed upon must be arbitrary. It is impossible to say how many examinations will be required or how many persons will be examined.

Ten dollars a session would be a fair rate of pay for the members of these boards, and a further fee of ten dollars for the examination of papers after the close of the session. This additional fee, however, should not be given for the examination of papers for nurses, orderlies, attendants, helpers, etc.

In pursuance of the provisions of section 189 of "The New York City Consolidation Act of 1882," I transmit herewith the Departmental Estimate for the Department of Finance of the amount of expenditures required by and for said Department in the year 1885 (specifying in detail the objects and purposes thereof), and including a statement of the salaries of all officers, clerks, employees, and subordinates employed in its several bureaus and offices, together with the temporary clerks employed in the Bureau for the Collection of Taxes during a portion of the year.

Statements are also furnished of the amounts required for the payment of Interest on the City Debt for the year 1885, payable from taxation, including Interest on Stocks and Bonds issued by the Towns of Morrisania and West Farms, annexed from Westchester County; also statements of the amount of Stocks and Bonds of the City and County of New York and of the Annexed Territory falling due in 1885, payable from taxation and assessments, or from the Sinking Fund, under the provisions of sections 172, 173, 176, 177, and 178 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

Under section 191 of said act the amount to be appropriated and included in the Annual Estimate, and to be raised by tax to meet the payment of any bonds and stocks falling due in the next following calendar year, is to be determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, upon a certificate of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund setting forth the amount of accumulations and estimated revenues of the "Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," which may be applied to the redemption of said bonds and stocks falling due in 1885, over and above the amount of bonds and stocks for the redemption of which said Sinking Fund is primarily pledged.

Bonds and stocks originally payable from taxation and from assessments for local improvements and the City Treasury, amounting to \$6,193,257.45, become due and payable in 1885, the redemption of which can be fully provided for by the surplus revenues of the Sinking Fund, as the Commissioners and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may hereafter determine to be most advantageous for the interest of the city.

Statements are also presented of bonds and stocks issued since June 3, 1878, and prior to September 1, 1884, payable from taxation, and of other bonds and stocks to be issued, as estimated, during the present year, by authority of existing statutes, for the redemption of which installments are to be raised by tax in 1885, as provided by section 192 of said Consolidation Act; also a statement of rents payable in 1885, on leases to the city of Public Offices, Civil and Police Courts, etc.; on leases of Police Station-houses, and on leases of Armories and Drill-rooms; also estimates of miscellaneous expenses payable in 1885 for Judgments, Real Estate, Wages of Armories, Janitors and Engineers for Armories, etc.

The State Board of Equalization of Taxes has fixed the aggregate valuation of the property upon which the State Tax shall be assessed in the City and County of New York, in the year 1885, at the sum of \$1,390,596,803, which is an increase of \$82,914,942 over the amount of valuations for last year, upon which amount a State tax of \$3,580,786.77, must be levied in 1885, as appears by a communication from the State Comptroller.

The rooms in the New Court-house Building now occupied by the Finance Department are required for the accommodation of the Supreme Court, and it will be necessary for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to consider the amount to be appropriated for the rent of offices for that Department.

My experience and observation as Comptroller in the Finance Department, during the present year, convince me of the need of a larger appropriation to conduct the business of the Department advantageously for the public interest, by the employment of more clerical force and a just increase of the salaries of some of the employees. I therefore recommend that an increase of the appropriation to the Finance Department for these purposes in 1885 be taken into consideration by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and on this account I have included the sum of \$12,000 in the Departmental Estimate.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.
