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APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending Jan. 23, 1886.

Resolved, That water-mains be laid in One Hundred and Third street, from Ninth to Tenth avenue, pursuant to section 356 of the New York City Consolidation Act.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, January 11, 1886.
Approved by the Mayor, January 18, 1886.

Resolved, That Monday, the 8th day of February, 1886, at 12 o'clock, M., and the chamber of the Board of Aldermen, be and hereby are designated as the time and place when and where the application of the Southern Boulevard Railroad Company to the Common Council of the City of New York, for its consent and permission for the construction, maintenance and operation of the street surface railroad described in the petition of said company for such consent, will be first considered; and that public notice be given by the Clerk of this Board, by publishing the same for fourteen days, exclusive of Sundays, in two newspapers published in this city, to be designated therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884; such advertising to be at the expense of the petitioner.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, January 19, 1886.
Approved by the Mayor, January 20, 1886, and the "Sun" and "Daily News" were designated as such papers.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a special meeting of the Board of Docks, held January 19, 1886.
Present—The full Board.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, recommending that the time for the completion of the repairs to hull of tug "Manhattan," under Contract No. 226 A, be extended to January 18, 1886, was received, read, and ordered to be placed on file, and the recommendation adopted.

The President stated that he had caused the following notice to be served upon Wm. Livingstone:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS, }
NOS. 117 AND 119 DUANE STREET, }
NEW YORK, January 16, 1886.

WILLIAM LIVINGSTONE, Esq.:

SIR—You are hereby informed that the Department of Docks propose to remove you from the position of Searcher of Water Grants in the Department of Docks, now occupied by you, and that the cause of the proposed removal is as follows:

That during the month of August, 1885, or thereabouts, you fraudulently and unlawfully, and without any knowledge on the part of this Department, or any of the Commissioners thereof, entered into an agreement with a law firm in the City of New York, Messrs. Bright, Scribner & Robinson, or one of the members thereof, whereby you agreed to furnish certain information from and out of the Department of Docks, to the detriment and injury of the said Department, and of the Corporation of the City of New York, of which you were a servant, in consideration of the sum of \$200 at that time paid, or to be paid to you, and a further contingent fee of \$300 to be paid to you in the event that the certain suit then pending between the estate of George Law and others against the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, defendants, and in favor of the plaintiffs in said action, all of which you knew to be in violation of the law, to the injury and detriment of the Corporation of the City of New York, of which you were at that time an employee, and in violation of the rules and orders of the Department of Docks, wherein you were employed. You are also further notified that you will be allowed an opportunity of making an explanation of the aforesaid cause or causes of your proposed removal to the said Board of Docks, on Tuesday, the 19th day of January instant, at 2 o'clock, P. M., at the office of the said Department, No. 119 Duane street, New York City.

The President then stated he had received the following communication from Mr. Livingstone, which was received, read, and ordered to be placed on file, and the Secretary directed to enter the same in full on the minutes.

Hon. JOSEPH KOCH, President Department of Docks:

DEAR SIR—I am in receipt of your letter of the 16th inst., by which you inform me that the Department of Docks propose to remove me from the position of Searcher of Water Grants, and in which you state as the cause of my proposed removal, that in August last I fraudulently and unlawfully entered into an agreement to "furnish certain information from and out of the Department of Docks, to the detriment and injury of said Department, and of the Corporation of the City of New York," in matter of the suit to which you refer. I deny that I made any fraudulent or unlawful agreement whatever; I deny that I furnished any information whatever, from or out of the Department of Docks, to the detriment or injury of the said Department or of the Corporation of the City of New York. I deny that I furnished information of any kind from or out of the Department of Docks. The only information which I did supply was derived from the public laws of the State. I furnished no copy or extract of any record, nor of any map, letter, book or paper of any kind or description belonging to or in possession of the Department of Docks, or of any officer or agent thereof, nor did I make use of any time or service of mine which by virtue of my employment was the property of the City or the Department of Docks. My study at night of the public laws of the State has furnished me with knowledge and information not acquired in the course of my public duties, which is not the property of the Department of Docks, but is exclusively my own property, as I believe; and my time outside of the hours of official duty I believe likewise to be my own. What I did in the matter to which you refer was only that which I considered any private citizen might lawfully do. I prepared at home, and after office hours, a statement giving my personal views of the effect of the laws bearing upon the suit in question. I did nothing more, and all which I did do could have been done by the attorneys who employed me without any assistance of mine, the only effect of the statement which I prepared being to save them possibly some labor which otherwise they would have had to do themselves. Prior to the commencement of the suit I investigated the facts of the case, and made a report to the Department, of which a copy was furnished to the attorneys for the defendant—not by me, but by Commissioners Laimbeer and Vanderpoel, then respectively the President and Treasurer of the Department, who also directed the Engineer-in-Chief to furnish a copy of the Department's map of the premises in question to the defendant's attorneys on their request,

which was done. I had nothing to do with furnishing the map and papers so obtained by the defendants. I have already made to yourself and to Commissioner Stark orally the same explanation in substance which I now here respectfully submit in writing.

I also herewith tender my resignation of the position of Searcher of Water Grants in the Department of Docks, which I trust may be immediately accepted.

On motion, laid on the table to await action as stated, to wit:

From Department of Street Cleaning—Requesting dredging at various dumping-boards on the North and East rivers. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Carpenter & Pettengill, and others—Protesting against the exclusive use of the wharf at Fifteenth street, North river, by Marcellus & Patrick, in the constant keeping of boats for the re-ailing of coal. Referred to the Dock Superintendent and Dock Master Patrick J. Brady to examine and report.

From John M. Smith, Dock Master:

1st. In reference to the application of Brown & Fleming for permission to locate a dumping-board at the foot of Bogart street, North river, and recommending that the dump be moored to the pier, and the run to the dump be made from the bulkhead. Referred to the President.

2d. In reference to the application of J. V. Jordan for permission to berth the steamboat "James T. Brett" on the south side of Pier, old 42, North river, and reporting that the said steamboat can be berthed thereat if the Fort Lee boats land on the end of the Pier in the morning. Dock Master John M. Smith to be directed to make such arrangements as he can with the Fort Lee Ferry Company respecting the making of landings on the end of the pier, and report the same to the Board.

From James J. Kelso, Collector of City Revenue and Inspector of Markets—Requesting permission to dump snow taken from Washington and West Washington Market from the Pier foot of Vesey street, North river. Referred to the President.

From Henry Hildburgh, agent—In reference to renewal of insurance on derrick "City of New York." Referred to the Treasurer.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Requesting the services of an additional draughtsman. Referred to executive session.

From Peter Ciancimini & Brother—Requesting a reduction in the rate of wharfage charged for dump located at Seventieth street, East river. Referred to the President, with power.

From Sarah Lynch—Requesting permission to build a crib bulkhead on the Harlem river, extending from the north side of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street to the south side of One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street. Referred to the President, and the Secretary directed to request the party to submit to the President the title to said property before action can be taken on her application.

From Simon Stevens, attorney Morgan's Louisiana, Texas Railroad & Steamship Company, lessees of eighty-seven feet six inches of bulkhead on North river, south of North Moore street, and fifty feet north of said street—Desiring to be informed if the Department propose to commence the work of permanent improvement on that part of the water front immediately on the expiration of the leases, and if not, they desire to renew said leases on the several terms and conditions for one year from May 1, 1887.

From Old Colony Steamboat Company—Requesting permission to place a platform from the corner of the one now in use by them to Pier, old 28, North river, and also requesting permission to erect a shed over the same. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report, and the President directed to request Messrs. Borden & Lovell, agents of the said company, to appear before the Board on Friday, January 22, 1886, at 12 o'clock, M.

2d. Reporting that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company are dumping slag filling on the westerly side of their tracks, commencing about two hundred and fifty feet south of High Bridge, and extending southerly for about a distance of four hundred feet. Referred to the President.

3d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5044, in reference to the application of the Manhattan Railway Company, for permission to build foundation piers on the east and west side of the bulkhead at Second avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, Harlem river. Referred to executive session.

4th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5043, in reference to the application of the New York Steam Heating Company for permission to erect a bulkhead between One Hundred and Fifteenth and One Hundred and Sixteenth streets, Harlem river. Referred to executive session.

The following communications were received, read and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary as stated, to wit:

From Police Department—Acknowledging the receipt of notice respecting the withdrawal of bulkhead north of Pier, new 1, North river, from the list of places for dumping snow and ice.

From George J. Eltz—Requesting permission to erect hoisting rigging on Piers at Thirty-fifth, Forty-sixth, Forty-seventh and Fifty-fifth streets, North river. Application denied, and the President directed to advise Mr. Eltz that he must designate the pier on which he desires to erect rigging, as permits cannot be granted for more than one pier at any one time.

From Clayton Greenlee—Requesting permission to use the north half of Pier, old 34, North river, for berthing vessels and for loading and discharging freight and passengers. Application denied.

From Samuel Fleck and others—Requesting that a permit be granted to them for the purpose of keeping, dressing and killing fowl within a building located along the water front and known as Pier 35½, East River. Application denied.

From Counsel to the Corporation—In reference to the claims of Edward G. Ames and George W. Nicholson, respectively, for unpaid salaries, and giving his opinion that they are entitled to be paid their salary from the date of their removal in August last down to the dates of their subsequent removals on November 28 and December 31, 1885, respectively, and that amount only, with interest on the amount of salary for each month as it became due and payable, and also stating that the costs should be paid to the attorneys, as the amount was fixed by the Court after a hearing in respect thereto. The Secretary directed to have the same recorded in the Book of Opinions, and have claims ready to be audited on the next audit day.

From Matthew Murphy—Requesting appointment as Engineer of tug "Manhattan," when she is placed in commission.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting the assignment of employees to special duty other than that to which they were appointed.

2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending January 16, 1886.

3d. Reporting that repairs are required to Pier 40, East river, and the shed thereon. The President directed to notify the lessees of the said pier to commence to make the repairs required thereat within ten days, under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, or the penalty for violation of the rules will be imposed.

4th. Reporting that he had re-examined the bulkhead extending one hundred and twenty feet north of Thirtieth street, North river, and found it to be in dangerous condition, and should be rebuilt from low water up. The President to be directed to notify the alleged owners to proceed immediately with the rebuilding of the said bulkhead, as heretofore ordered.

5th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5046, in reference to the offer of L. Hirsch to sell certain oak plank to the Department, and stating that he has no use for it at present. The President directed to notify Mr. Hirsch to that effect.

6th. Reporting that one of the spring fender-piles on the south side of Pier, new 43, North river, about two hundred feet from the outer end, is loose, and requires to be refastened. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to refasten said pile.

7th. Reporting that he had suspended acting Watchman Edmund Sheridan for being inattentive while on duty on the night of Saturday, the 16th instant, and recommending that he be not again assigned to duty as acting Watchman for a period of ten days. The action of the Engineer-in-Chief approved, and his recommendation adopted.

From Joseph L. Liscomb, Dock Superintendent—Reporting that Wm. Keating, of No. 432 West Fifty-sixth street, used horse on January 5, 1886, on Pier foot of Fifty-fifth street, North river, without using a platform for the protection of the said premises. Penalty of \$5 imposed upon Mr. Keating for violation of Rule 7, and the President directed to notify him to call and pay the said

amount to the Treasurer of this Department within five days, or the claim will be sent to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection.

From John M. Smith, Dock Master :

1st. Recommending that the backing-log on Pier, old 54, North river, be refastened and a new piece placed where needed.

2d. Reporting that there is a dangerous hole in the approach to Pier foot of West Thirteenth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to do the said work was approved.

From Patrick J. Brady, Dock Master—Reporting that the barge "Rapid Transit," owned by D. C. Newell & Son, of Nineteenth street and Eleventh avenue, sunk at the bulkhead between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, North river. The action of the President in notifying the owners to remove the said barge was approved.

From Abram Duryee, Dock Master :

1st. Reporting that there are several piles and fenders broken at Pier foot of Ninety-sixth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and repair if necessary, was approved.

2d. Reporting that five piles and fenders at the end of Pier at Seventy-ninth street, North river, have been broken by floating ice. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and repair if necessary, was approved.

3d. Reporting that the Dock Master's office on bulkhead at Seventy-ninth street, North river, was damaged by fire. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair, approved.

4th. Reporting that the wrecking company employed to remove the scow-derrick "Jerry" have placed blocks of stone upon the bulkhead. The action of the President in directing the wrecking company to remove the said stones was approved.

From Chas. P. Blake, Dock Master :

1st. Reporting that the sheathing on Pier at Twenty-eighth street, East river, is in a dangerous condition. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

2d. Reporting that there is a hole in the Pier foot of Thirty-seventh street, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair was approved.

From Eugene McCarthy, Dock Master :

1st. Reporting that James E. Grannis, of No. 46 Cliff street, has disposed of the dumping-board located on the bulkhead north of Pier 60, East river, to Brown & Fleming, and has not paid the wharfage for the week ending January 16, 1886. The President directed to notify the Dock Master to collect the amount due from Mr. Grannis.

2d. Reporting that the canal boat "B. McReynolds," that was sunk at Pier 62, East river, has been raised and towed away.

The Auditing Committee presented an audit of one claim, amounting to the sum of \$5,257, which was accepted and adopted, and the Secretary directed to enter the same in full on the minutes, as follows :

Liscomb, the Dock Superintendent, to whom was referred the application of Peck, Martin & Co., requesting permission to retain the tally-house located on the bulkhead between Ninety-fifth and Ninety-sixth streets, North river, reported thereon, and recommended that said application be granted.
