

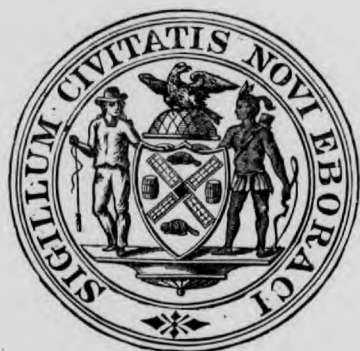

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 9, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,535.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 546.

During the past week 181 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 64 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 6 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 2 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks, 87 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 76 visits were made, and 34 disinfections and 12 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 8.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,904, of which 1,065 were primary and 839 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 6,845 pounds of meat and 300 pounds of fish, and 3,500 pounds of vegetables.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 19, the number of arrests made was 2, and the fines imposed was \$300.

The certificates of 622 births, 56 still-births, 213 marriages, and 633 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 9, 1886. This shows an increase of 28 births, and a decrease of 9 still-births, 67 marriages and 44 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885 there was an increase of 107 births, and 80 deaths, and a decrease of 3 still-births, and 133 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from cerebro-spinal fever decreased 5; malarial fevers, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 22; alcoholism, 1; bronchitis, 8; heart diseases, 7; marasmus, tabes, mesenterica and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 8; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 10; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and preterm births, 4; drowning, 3; while the deaths from measles increased 2; scarlatina, 2; diphtheria, 2; whooping cough, 1; puerperal diseases, 3; inanition, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 18; pneumonia, 7; aneurism, 1; convulsions, 2; suicide, 4. The number of deaths from croup, typhoid fever, cirrhosis and hepatitis, and surgical operations was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 180 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 233 under two years; 274 under five years; and 28 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 45 less than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 43.29 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 119 were in institutions, 377 in tenement-houses, 123 in houses containing three families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 10 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 113 on the first, 179 on the second, 108 on the third, 66 on the fourth, 32 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 619 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 14 non-residents; 77 were stated to be single, 166 married, 64 widowed, and the condition of 326 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 633; still-births, 56; bodies in transit, 13; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 73 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 622 births; 213 marriages; 56 still-births; 633 deaths; 13 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 101 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 7 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 83 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 9, 1886, was 56.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.085, the mean humidity was 69, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 647, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company to erect and construct a temporary platform in front of the bulkhead between West Twenty-second and West Twenty-third streets, North river, with a float-bridge for landing cars attached thereto, in accordance with a plan for the same submitted to this Board by C. W. Buchholz, Engineer of said company and dated 19th October, 1886, all of the said work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; provided that the said New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company agree to pay, as compensation for the use of the land under water covered by said structures, platform and float-bridge at the rate of twenty-five cents per square foot per annum during the existence of said structures, platform and float-bridge, the same to be paid quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department.
And it is also specially provided and understood that this permit is for temporary platform and float-bridge only, and that it is revocable at any time by the Board governing the Department of Docks.

And further provided that this permit shall not take effect until the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company have filed a written agreement satisfactory as to form with the Board governing the Department of Docks, to the effect that they will, at any time within twenty days from receiving written notice from the Board of Docks so to do, remove any or all structures of every kind that may be built and erected under this permit, and restore the premises to the same condition that they are in at date hereof, and further, that this permit shall not take effect until there shall be filed in this Department the written consent of the lessee of the Pier at the foot of West Twenty-second street, North river, to the building and erection of said structures.
