To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN-I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my supervision for the quarter ending October 31, 1888.

NORTH RIVER.

Pier "A."

Various small repairs were made to the building and to the boiler-room and its appurtenances.

The exterior of the building was painted and the leaders were repaired by Hugh Nesbitt, under a Treasurer's order therefor.

Battery Boat-landing.

The iron railing was set and the silt basins and drains were cleaned out.

Barclay Street Ferry-Secretary's Orders Nos. 6563 and 8123.

The iron ferry building on the ferry platform at the foot of Barclay street was completed and the temporary shed thereon was extended by the Hoboken Land and Improvement Company.

Chambers Street Section—Resolutions of the Board, November 24, 1887, and November 21, 1878. The repairs to the Section Office were completed and a connection to it was made with the

Croton water-main.

The new-made land between Piers, new 20 and new 21, was drained from time to time.

OUTLET SEWER-PIER, NEW 21, N. R.

Secretary's Order No. 7094.

The Department of Public Works has been at work during the quarter on the construction of a permanent connecting sewer across the new-made land between the marginal sewer in West street and the sewer-box under Pier, new 21.

Franklin Street Section-Resolution of the Board, October 6, 1887.

BULKHEAD WALL.

Stone Filling—50 cubic yards of small cobbles and 125 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were delivered and placed for the wall under Treasurer's orders therefor.

Piling and Woodwork—About 200 square feet of 4-inch spruce deck-planking were placed on the transverse caps.

PIER, NEW 24, N. R.

Resolution of the Board, October 6, 1887.

18,162 cubic yards of mud and 2,000 cubic yards of crib-work were excavated and removed and disposed of from the half slip adjoining the south side of the new pier, under Treasurer's orders

Contract No. 263.

The new pier was completed in accordance with the contract therefor on October 8, 1888, and it is now in use.

General Charges to Section.

TEMPORARY APPROACH TO PIER, NEW 24, N.R.

A temporary approach was built from the inshore end of Pier, old 35, North river, to Pier, new 24, and it has been maintained in good order.

REMOVAL OF OLD WORK.

A portion of the timber-work of the old bulkhead and bulkhead-platform in rear of the new wall was removed and the old material was taken care of.

TEMPORARY SEWER-BOX.

The temporary sewer-box at the foot of Franklin street was repaired and a small temporary box was built along the face of the old bulkhead to intersect some private drains and to connect with the Franklin street sewer-box.

FILLING IN REAR OF WALL.

9,552 loads of earth filling were received on tickets and 162 loads were received free, and all were placed in rear of the bulkhead wall. Total number of loads received to date and for the year—11,412 loads on tickets, and 162 loads free.

North Moore Street Section-Resolution of the Board, April 28, 1880.

BULKHEAD WALL.

Stone Filling—1,819 cubic yards of small cobbles and 2,917 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were delivered and placed on the wall foundation, under Treasurer's orders therefor. A temporary bulkhead of 2-inch plank was placed in the south end of the piling to hold the cobbles in place.

Piling and Woodwork—135 vertical piles and 40 bracing piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; 49 foundation piles for the concrete blocks were cut off by the sawing machine and they were located by the divers by wire screens. The two rear rows of the vertical piles were cut off by hand and the remainder of the platform piles were cut off by the sawing machine; 3 binding frames were made and were sunk and keyed to place with the aid of the divers. The bracing piles were cut off by the hand machine; 312 linear feet of longitudinal caps and 23 transverse caps were put in place; the outer ends of the transverse caps were chocked upon the wall and key pieces were put in; about 567 square feet of 4-inch spruce deck plank were placed on the caps.

Masonry—6 concrete blocks were loaded and set by the derrick "City of New York"; mattresses of cement mortar were placed on the piles for the concrete blocks to bear on; sand, broken stone and cement were loaded for the work; the chain grooves between the blocks were filled with concrete in bags; 93 pieces of granite were set and were backed up with 282 batches of concrete.

PIER, NEW 25, N. R.

Resolution of the Board, April 28, 1880.

3,857 cubic yards of mud and 5,104 cubic yards of crib-work were excavated and removed from the site of the new pier, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

Contract No. 267.

The work of building the new pier by Joseph H. Cofrode, contractor, was begun September 12 and is now in progress.

General Charges to Section.

REMOVAL OF OLD WORK.

A portion of the old bulkhead platform was removed and taken care of.

TEMPORARY SEWER-BOX.

The work of building a temporary sewer-box in extension of the sewer at the foot of North Moore street was begun.

TEMPORARY APPROACH TO PIER, NEW 25, N. R.

A temporary approach to the new pier has been begun.

TEMPORARY MOORINGS.

5 old piles were driven as temporary moorings for the use of floating property engaged on the work.

FILLING IN REAR OF THE WALL.

895 loads of earth filling were received on tickets and were placed in rear of the wall.

Beach Street Section.

Resolution of the Board, July 16, 1879.

GENERAL CHARGES TO SECTION.

Filling in Rear of Wall.

4,032 loads of earth filling were received on tickets and were deposited in rear of the wall. Total to date—9,344 loads on tickets, 24,435 loads free and 1,175 loads from the Street Cleaning Department, of which 4,238 loads on tickets have been received to date for the year.

BULKHEAD IN FRONT OF AND ADJOINING PIER, NEW 26, N. R.

Secretary's Order No. 7930.

The erection of an iron shed on the bulkhead between Piers, new 26 and new 27, and in front of Pier, new 26, by the lessees, has been in progress during the quarter.

ecretary's Order No. 8369.

Temporary plank roadways leading to Pier, new 26, and to the bulkhead shed northerly thereof, have been begun by the lessees.

BULKHEAD BETWEEN PIERS, NEW 27 AND NEW 28, N. R.

Secretary's Order No. 5951.

A portion of the new-made land is being paved temporarily by the lessees of the bulkhead in

PIER, NEW 35, N. R.

Secretary's Order No. 7784.

The work of building a suspended passenger walk within the shed on the pier, begun by the lessees in May, has been finished.

Charlton Street Section.

PIER, NEW 37, N. R.

Secretary's Order No. 7511.

The erection of a shed on the new pier by the lessees, begun in March, has been completed.

Secretary's Order No. 8158.

Elevated platforms have been put up by the lessees at the outer end of the shed on the pier.

BULKHEAD BETWEEN PIERS, NEW 36 AND NEW 38.

Secretary's Order No. 5530.

An iron shed on the bulkhead, extending from the centre of the slip between Piers, new 36 and new 37, to the centre of the slip between Piers, new 37 and new 38, begun by the lessees on September 13, 1886, was finished on October 6, 1888.

PIER, NEW 38, N. R.

Secretary's Order No. 8202.

A silt-basin, with connection with the marginal sewer on the new-made land, was put in opposite Pier, new 38, under Treasurer'r orders therefor, and the joints in the replaced pavement were filled with gravel and coal tar by Department labor.

PIER, NEW 41, N. R.

Secretary's Order No. 8201.

A silt-basin, with connection with the marginal sewer on the new-made land, was put in opposie Pier, new 41, under Treasurer's orders therefor, and the joints in the replaced pavement were filled in with gravel and coal tar by Department labor.

PIER, NEW 43, N. R.

Secretary's Order No. 8159.

An upper deck to the shed on Pier, new 43, is under construction by the lessees.

SPRING TO WEST ELEVENTH STREET.

Resolution of the Board, June 2, 1886.

The silt-basins on the new-made land from Spring street to West Eleventh street were cleaned out at various times during the quarter.

PIER AT WEST TWELFTH STREET, N. R.

Contract No. 279.

The work of removing the old dumping-board and building a new pier on its site, with the necessary dredging, was begun on September 24, by Moses Engle, contractor, and is now in progress.

West Twenty-third Street Section, South End-Resolution of the Board, November 5, 1880.

PIER, NEW 54, N.R.

Temporary Approach.

The roadway leading to the pier was repaired.

BULKHEAD BETWEEN PIERS NEW 54, AND NEW 55, N.R.

Mounds of earth on the bulkhead were removed and placed as earth filling in rear of the wall.

PIER, NEW 56, N. R.

Temporary Approach.

The approach was repaired and resheathed with second-hand material, and new backing logs were put on.

West Twenty-third Street Section, North End.

TIMBER BASIN.

An account of timber in the basin was taken.

West Thirty-first Street Section-Resolutions of the Board, August 8 and September 19, 1883.

PIER, NEW 61, N.R.

Secretary's Order No. 7228.

The railroad tracks to the pier across the new-made land, begun by the lessees in November, 1887, although in use, have not yet been finished.

Secretary's Order No. 6891.

Bumper frames were placed on outer end of the pier by the lessees.

FILLING IN REAR OF WALL.

30 loads of earth filling on tickets and 367 loads of filling from the Street Cleaning Department were received and deposited in rear of the bulkhead wall upon land under water belonging to the city. Total to date—40,533 loads on tickets, 1,364 loads free, and 5,887 loads from the Departthe city. Total to date-ment of Street Cleaning.

West Thirty-second Street Section-Resolution of the Board, October 22, 1885.

BULKHEAD WALL.

Dredging—9,988 cubic yards of material were excavated and removed from the site of the wall, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

therefor October 30, 1888.

Stone Filling—2,449 cubic yards of small cobbles and 5,108 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were delivered and placed on the wall foundation, under Treasurer's orders therefor. In addition to the above, 231 cubic yards of street cobbles, received under Treasurer's orders therefor. In addition to the above, 231 cubic yards of street cobbles, received under Treasurer's orders therefor. In addition to the above, 231 cubic yards of street, were towed to the premises and were deposited on the wall foundation as rip-rap, by Department labor. The dumping-board was also repaired to a small extent to put in condition for the loading of these cobbles. 270 cubic yards of small cobbles, previously stored on the bulkhead-wall south of Pier, new 61, were transferred and deposited on the wall foundation by Department labor. A bulkhead to hold the small cobbles in place temporarily was put in at the present north end of the section.

Piling and Woodwork—284 vertical piles and 48 bracing-piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; 48 foundation piles for the concrete blocks were cut off by the sawing machine, and the high grade vertical piles were cut off by hand. The bracing piles were cut off by hand machine. The foundation piles were located by the divers by means of wire screens. 4 binding frames were made, sunk and keyed in place by aid of divers. 168 linear feet of longitudinal caps and 24 transverse caps were cut off to meet the granite, were chocked to the top of the concrete blocks and keys were put on top of the caps. 849 square feet of 4-inch deck-plank were placed on the transverse caps.

Masonry—4 concrete foundation blocks were loaded and set by the derrick "City of New York," mattresses were prepared and sunk on the heads of the foundation piles for the concrete blocks to bear upon, and the chain grooves between the blocks were filled with concrete in bags. 97 pieces of granite were set and were backed up with 265 batches of concrete. Joints in the granite were pointed. Sand, stone and cement were loaded upon scows for this section.

PIER, NEW 62, N. R.

Resolution of the Board, March 16, 1887.

A platform was built by the force of the Department across the track put at the outer end of the pier. Secretary's Order No. 7174.

The shed on Pier, new 62, North river, begun by the lessees April 26, 1888, was finished September 29, 1888, and is now in use.

PIER, NEW 63, N. R.

Resolution of the Board, March 16, 1887.

19,159 cubic yards of material were excavated and removed from the half slips adjoining the site of the proposed new pier, under Treasurer's orders therefor. Total to date 19,159 cubic yards. Contract No. 285.

The removal of the old pier to make room for Pier, new 63, was begun by the contractor GENERAL CHARGES TO SECTION.

Removal of Old Work. A portion of the old pier at the foot of West Thirty-third street was removed to make room for the bulkhead wall and the material was taken care of.

.... Filling in Rear of Wall.

4,530 loads of earth filling on tickets and 2,855 loads of filling from the Street Cleaning Department were received and placed in rear of the bulkhead wall upon land under water belonging to the city. Totals for the year to date, 5,477 loads on tickets and 6,119 loads from Street Cleaning city. Totals Department.

New-made Land-Secretary's Order No. 8353. Gas-pipes were laid across the new-made land to Piers, new 61 and new 62, North river, by the lessees of said piers.

TEMPORARY APPROACH TO NEW PIER AT THE FOOT OF WEST THIRTY-SEVENTH STREET, N.R.

Resolution of the Board, June 25, 1887.

The approach was completed by putting in a few planks at its inner end.

NEW PIER AND TEMPORARY APPROACH AT THE FOOT OF WEST THIRTY-EIGHTH STREET.

Contract No. 264

The work of building a new pier 500 feet long by 60 feet wide, on the established lines, with a temporary approach thereto, and of repairing the existing crib-bulkhead at the foot of West Thirty-eighth street, by Richard Cronin, Contractor, was finished on September 11, 1888, and the premises are now in use.

DREDGING.

Resolution of the Board, June 16, 1887.

25,359 cubic yards of material were excavated and removed from the slips on each side of the new pier under Treasurer's orders therefor.

NEW PIER AND TEMPORARY APPROACH AT THE FOOT OF WEST FORTY-SEVENTH STREET, N. R. Resolution of the Board, April 9, 1888.

New Pier and Approach.

A new pier 500 feet long by 60 feet wide, on the established lines, with a temporary approach thereto, is under construction by the force of the Department. The work was begun on May 21, 1888, and is now nearly completed.

The inner about 250 feet in length of the approach has been in use for wharfage since September 25, 1888.

Dredging.

36,124 cubic yards of mud and 3,710 cubic yards of crib-work were excavated and removed from the site of the new pier and its temporary approach, and from the half slips on each side, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

West Fifty-second Street Section, South End-Resolution of the Board, October 6, 1887. BULKHEAD WALL.

Dredging—3,297 cubic yards of material were excavated and removed from the site of the wall under Treasurer's orders therefor. The mud, sand and gravel which could not be reached by dredging were removed to clean rock over the area to be occupied by the wall south of West Fifty-first street with a water-jet and steam-pump on a hired machine, assisted by Department divers.

Masonry—Levels were taken over the area cleaned for the wall, and guide frames for placing the concrete were set by the aid of divers. A foundation for the concrete blocks was made by placing concrete in bags on the rock bottom to the required heights by the divers, and the surface of this foundation was evened up with mass concrete placed by buckets. 354½ batches of concrete in bags and 34 batches of mass concrete were used for these purposes. 12 concrete foundation blocks, aggregating a little over 72 linear feet of wall, were loaded and set by the derrick "City of New York" upon the foundation prepared as above described. The chain grooves between these blocks were filled with concrete in bags. 70 pieces of granite were set, and were backed up with 106 batches of concrete. Joints in the granite were pointed. Cement, sand and broken stone were loaded on scows at West Fifty-seventh street yard from time to time, as required for use on this section. this section.

NEW PIER AT THE FOOT OF WEST FIFTY-FIRST STREET, N. R.

Resolution of the Board, April 9, 1888.

Dredging.

17,228 cubic yards of material have been excavated and removed from the half slips on each side of the new pier, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

718 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were furnished and placed, under Treasurer's orders therefor, on the site of the inner 100 feet in length of the new pier, to secure good holding ground for the piles of the pier. Construction of Pier-Contract No. 272.

The work of building a new pier 500 feet long and 60 feet wide on the established lines, and springing from the new bulkhead wall, was finished on October 11, 1888, by Richard Cronin, contractor, and the premises are now in use for wharfage.

GENERAL CHARGES TO SECTION.

Removal of Old Work.

A portion of the old crib-bulkhead at the foot of West Fifty-first street was removed, to make room for the filling. Building Cribwork.

A crib-bulkhead of round logs, and filled with rip-rap stone, furnished under Treasurer's orders therefor, was built in rear of the wall to retain the earth filling on the north line of West Fifty-first street.

Filling in Rear of Wall.

65 loads of earth filling on tickets and 851 loads of earth filling free were received and placed in rear of the new bulkhead wall at the foot of West Fifty-first street.

Temporary Approach to New Pier at West Fifty-first Street, N. R.

A temporary plank approach was made of second-hand material over the crib-bulkhead along the northerly side of the pier, to afford access to the pier.

West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

YELLOW PINE TIMBER.

Contract No. 259.

Vellow pine timber has been received during the quarter under Contract No. 259, and it has been inspected, stored and cared for by the force of the Department. A portion of this timber, as required from time to time, has been turned over for use in the new piers at West Fifty-first and West Forty-seventh streets, and for Pier, new 25, North river.

Crib-bulkhead from South Side of West Seventy-fifth Street to the Existing Crib-bulkhead at West Seventy-seventh Street, N. R.—Contract No. 276.

The work of building this new crib-bulkhead has been carried on actively during the quarter by the contractor and it is now approaching completion.

ew Crib-bulkhead from Centre Line of West One Hundred and Thirty-third Street to Centre Line of West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth Street, N. R.—Secretary's Orders Nos. 7098 and 7713.

The work of building a crib-bulkhead and coal pockets at these premises has been carried on during the quarter by Theodore F. Tone, alleged owner of the premises, under permit of the Board.

New Crib-bulkhead at West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth Street, N. R. - Contract No. 260.

The work of building a new crib-bulkhead at these premises and of filling in rear of the same has been carried on by the contractor during the quarter and the work is now nearly completed.

EAST RIVER.

Ferry Premises foot of Whitehall Street, E. R. - Secretary's Order No. 8254.

Extensive alterations and improvements of the ferry premises at and adjoining Pier 1, East river, at foot of Whitehall street, were begun on September 13, 1888, by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Co., lessees, under permit of the Board. The work is now in progress.

Pier, new 6, E. R. - Secretary's Order No. 8166.

The driving of test-piles to determine the nature of the river bottom over the site of the proposed Pier, new 6, at the site of Pier, old 7, at foot of Coenties Slip, was begun October 12 and is now in progress.

Pier, new 29, E. R-Resolution of the Board, September 8, 1887.

The examination of the river bottom by the divers on each side of the new pier, and of its temporary approach, was continued and finished. Old stumps of piles, old logs and other obstructions were removed and taken care of by the force of the Department.

Pier, new 36, E. R.-Resolution of the Board, May 11, 1888.

DREDGING.

1,495 cubic yards of cribwork were excavated and removed from the site of the new pier, under source's orders therefor. Treasurer

TEST-PILES.

6 test-piles were driven by the force of the Department to determine the character of the river bottom before driving piles for the pier over some of the crib sites.

Construction of the New Pier-Contract No. 273.

The work of building a new pier, on the established lines, with a temporary approach thereto, at the foot of Jefferson street, East river, in place of Pier, old 46, East river, and of repairing the existing crib-bulkhead thereat, was continued during the quarter by the contractor and is now in

Pier 60, E. R.-Contract No. 271.

The work of building a new pier in place of Pier, old 60, East river, at the foot of Rivington street, and of repairing the crib-bulkhead thereat, was finished by the contractor on September 18, 1888, and the premises are now in full use for wharfage.

. Pier 61, E. R. - Secretary's Order No. 8153.

pier and crib-bulkhead westerly thereof has been made, preparatory to making form of contract and specifications for a new pier in place of Pier 61, East river, and for repairing the crib-bulkhead westerly thereof.

New Pier at East Thirty-eighth Street, E. R. - Contract No. 281.

The work of preparing for and building a new pier in place of the old pier at the foot of East Thirty-eighth street, and of repairing the crib-bulkhead thereat, was begun by the contractor therefor on October 29 and it is now in progress.

Dumping-pier at East Forty-sixth Street, E. R.—Contract No. 271.

The work of building a new high level dumping-pier at the foot of East Forty-sixth street, and of repairing the crib-bulkhead thereat, was finished by the contractor therefor on August 7, 1888, and the premises are now in full use, the southerly side by the Department of Street Cleaning and the northerly side and outer end for wharfage.

Dumping-board at East Forty-eighth Street, E. R.—Secretary's Order No. 8116.

The temporary dumping-board built by the force of this Department at these premises for the use of the Street Cleaning Department, during the construction of the new dumping-pier at East Forty-sixth street, was removed August 15 to 20, 1888.

Foundation for a Dumping-board at foot of East Seventieth Street, E. R.—Secretary's Order No. 8077.

Test-piles were driven to ascertain the nature of the river bottom preparatory to making form of contract and specifications for a foundation for a dumping-board at these premises for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning.

Dumping-board at East One Hundred and Ninth Street, Harlem River—Secretary's Order No. 8116.

A temporary dumping-board, consisting in the main of the material removed from the dumping-board at East Forty-sixth street, was erected by the force of this Department on the pier at the foot of East One Hundred and Ninth street for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning. It was begun August 21 and was finished September 8, 1888, and it is now in use by the Street Cleaning Department.

New Crib-bulkhead between East One Hundred and Fourteenth and One Hundred and Fifteenth Streets, Harlem River—Resolution of the Board, January 13, 1888.

The work of filling in rear of this bulkhead was continued during the quarter and is now in progress. 4,496 wagon loads and 4,005 cart loads of clean material have been received free and put in place during the quarter. A temporary sewer-box, extending from an outlet under the new crib-bulkhead, has been built about on the centre line of East One Hundred and Fifteenth street to about original high-water mark, to enable the owners of a private drain originally discharging there to connect therewith. It was begun August 2 and was finished October 6, and the owners of the private drain have made the connection.

Bulkhead at the foot of East One Hundred and Fifteenth Street-Secretary's Order No. 8198.

A landing stage was built in front of these premises by the force of this Department for the use of the steam launches of the Department of Charities and Correction. Begun September 19 and finished September 27, 1888.

Randall's Island, E. R.—Secretary's Order No. 8210.

A landing stage was built on the south side of the passenger pier on this Island by the force of this Department for the use of the steam launches of the Department of Charities and Correction. Begun October 4 and finished October 15, 1888.

New Crib-bulkhead at the foot of East One Hundred and Nineteenth Street, Harlem River-Contract No. 277.

The work of building a new crib-bulkhead, on the established bulkhead line, across the foot of this street, and of filling in its rear, was finished by the contractor on September 27, 1888.

New Pier at the foot of East One Hundred and Nineteenth Street, Harlem River-Contract No. 280.

The work of building a new pier 40 feet wide and 109 feet long, on the established lines, was begun on October 9 by the contractor therefor and it is now in progress.

New Crib-bulkhead at foot of Lincoln Avenue, Harlem River—Secretary's Order No. 7986.

Test-piles have been driven to ascertain the nature of the river bottom, preparatory to making form of contract and specifications for a crib-bulkhead across said avenue.

Mott Haven Canal.

Secretary's Order No. 8068.

A new bulkhead platform, about 100 feet long, was built on the east side of the canal by Robert J. Gray, under permit of the Board. Finished September 12, 1888.

Secretary's Order No. 8066.

A new bulkhead platform 25 feet long was built on the east side of the canal by Robert Hall, under permit of the Board. Begun August 1 and finished September 12, 1888.

Secretary's Order No. 8067.

A new bulkhead platform, about 75 feet long, was built on the west side of the canal by W.G. Lathrop, under permit of the Board. Begun August 13 and finished September 12, 1888.

Bulkhead Wall, One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street and Long Island Sound—Secretary's Order No. 8175.

The work of building a masonry bulkhead, about 234 feet long, south of One Hundred and rty-eighth street, on Long Island Sound, was begun, under permit of the Board, on September 12, 1888, by the De la Vergne Refrigerating Company, the alleged owners of the premises, and is now in progress.

Crib-bulkhead at One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, Harlem River-Secretary's Order No. 74250

The work of building a crib-bulkhead, with available water front of about 1,500 feet, with its outer faces on the established bulkhead line, has been continued, under permit of the Board, during the quarter, by the alleged owners of the premises, and is now in progress.

Crib-bulkhead between One Hundred and Fifty-ninth and One Hundred and Sixty-first Street, H. R.—Secretary's Order No. 7460.

The work of building a crib-bulkhead on piles at the above premises, and on the established lines of 1887, begun by the lessees on March 29, 1888, was finished October 13, 1888, and is now ready to receive filling in its rear.

Cromwell's Creek, H. R .- Secretary's Order No. 8182.

The work of building a platform on piles at One Hundred and Sixty-first street, by James W. Colwell, under permit of the Board, was begun Oetober 22, 1888, and is now in progress.

Department Yards.

WEST FIFTY-SEVENTH STREET YARD.

The blacksmith has done iron work as required for the different sections of construction work, for floating property and for work of general repairs. Concrete moulds and cores were made and set up from time to time as required for making wall foundation blocks. 23 foundation blocks were made, containing 750 cubic yards of concrete. 2,550 barrels of Portland cement were received under Treasurer's orders therefor and were stored for Department use after tests were made. Broken stone for concrete and sand were received from time to time and stored at the Yard for construction use. A test was made, under Secretary's Order No. 8261, of one barrel of the "Globe" brand of Portland cement, and the results were recorded. The Yard has been maintained in good order.

EAST SEVENTEENTH STREET YARD

Granite has been received at the Yard, under Contract No. 268, and has been stored for use. The Contractors, under Contracts Nos. 265 and 268, have had stone-cutters at work in the Yard during the quarter correcting defects in the cutting of stone offered for acceptance by them.

Granite has been transferred as required during the quarter for use on the various sections of bulkhead-wall construction. The Yard has been maintained in good order.

The floating property of the Department consists of the following: 100-ton derrick "City of New York."

Tug "Manhattan"—The tug has done all the towing required by the Department, except when it was undergoing repairs and inspection, and on one occasion when assistance was needed in towing the 100-ton derrick in a high wind, when the towing needed was done by the tugs of Victor Vierow, under Treasurer's orders therefor. Various repairs have been made to the hull and

machinery.

The 100-ton derrick "City of New York," has handled various pieces of floating property for repairs at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, and at other places, taking them out of and replacing them in the water, as required; has handled granite at East Seventeenth Street Yard and at West Fifty-second Street Section; has set granite in bulkhead wall at West Thirty-second Street Section; and has loaded and set 29 concrete foundation blocks at various sections of bulkhead wall construc-

tion, as required.

The crew and force of the Department have made repairs to the hull, tower and machinery.

10-ton derrick—This derrick has been in use during the quarter in handling granite for and in setting granite in various sections of bulkhead-wall construction. Necessary repairs were made to

in setting granite in various sections of bulkhead-wall construction. Necessary repairs were made to its machinery.

Dredges Nos. 3 and 4 remain in the possession of the Union Dredging Company.

Boring Machine "Woodcock"—This machine has been used as a divers' scow from time to time during the quarter. The machinery has been cleaned and kept in repair.

Pile-driver No. 1—Is now at work and is in good order. The damage done to it by the Schooner "Wm. Roe" was repaired and reported under Secretary's Order No. 8171.

Pile-driver No. 2—Has been at work as required from time to time and is now employed setting granite, with a boom attachment. Repairs have been made to its house and machinery.

Pile-driver No. 3—Has had a new set of 50 feet vertical ways placed on it, has been at work during the quarter and is in good condition. Repairs were made to its scow and machinery.

Pile-driver No. 5 (fitted up as a pile-cutter)—Has been engaged from time to time as required in cutting off piles under water on various sections of bulkhead wall construction and is now laid up. The machinery has been repaired.

Pile-driver No. 6—Has been at work during the quarter on construction and is now at work. The force of the Department repaired its machinery.

Pile-driver No. 7—Has been at work as required from time to time during the quarter on General Repairs Account and is now so employed.

Pile-driver No. 8 (fitted up with batter ways)—Has been at work as required on construction and is now laid up. The force of the Department repaired its machinery.

Pile-driver No. 9—Has been at work during the quarter on the construction of the new pier at West Forty-seventh street, North river, and it is now so engaged. The force of the Department made some additions to its outfit and repaired the machinery.

Pile-driver No. 10—Has been brought to the yard and is now under repairs there. The force of the Department are repairing its scow, ways, machinery, etc.

Pile-driver No. 10—rias been brought to the yard and is now under repairs there. The force of the Department are repairing its scow, ways, machinery, etc.

Pile-driver No. 11—Has been at work during the quarter on construction and is now so employed. Some small repairs have been made to its machinery by the force of the Department.

Divers' Scow "G"—Has been used as required during the quarter and is now in use.

Small Divers' Scow—Is now laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard and is too decayed to use on the work as a divers' scow. It has been used during the quarter for the storage of tools, lines, etc., at North Moore Street Section and at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

New Divers' Scow "A"—A new diving scow, 34 feet long, 17 feet wide, and 3 feet 6 inches deep, has been built by the force of the Department, under resolution of the Board, August 21, 1888, and Secretary's Order No. 8174. It was begun August 29, 1888, and was launched October 26, 1888, and it is now nearly ready for use.

Scow "B"—Is now in use and has been from time to time as required. It is in good order.

Scow "C"—Is now in use and has been from time to time as required. It is now in fair order.

Scow "C"—Is now in use and has been from time to time as required. It is now in good order.

Scow "E"—Has been in use from time to time as required until October 26, when it was docked at the West Fifty-seventh Street Yard by the 100-ton derrick, and it is now under repairs.

Scow "F" (fitted up with 10 pockets for carrying coal)—Has transported coal during the quarter as required. It is in fair order.

Scow "H"—Is now in use and has been from time to time as required. It is in first-class condition.

Scow "J"-Is now in use and has been from time to time as required. It is in first-class

condition.

Scow "K"—This scow, the last of the three ordered to be built by the force of the Department by resolution of the Board of December 8, 1888, is 70 feet long, 30 feet wide and 7 feet 6 inches deep. It was begun in March, 1888, was launched September 25, 1888, and was finished October 13, 1888, since which time it has been in use as required. It is now in first-class condition.

Scow "Jim"—Is now laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, and is used for storage of timber, etc. It is too old and weak for general use.

Scow "Willie"—Is now laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, and is unfit for any service except the storage of light material in small quantities.

Small Boats—The new 15 feet yawl, No. 21, was finished.

Repaired and painted yawls, sounding boats and skiffs, as required.

Pile-driver Ways—The old pile-driver ways, stored at East Seventeenth Street Yard, were broken up, as they were too rotten for repairs or future use. condition.

Construction Work.

A section office, 10 feet wide, 12 feet long and 10 feet 6 inches ports, has been made during the quarter at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard by the force of floating property, and has been sent to West Fifty-second Street Section.

Various small pieces of work have been done at the Yard for general use of floating property, etc., such as marking various lots of old material for sale at public auction, lettering sign-boards for Dock Masters' offices, and danger sign for Pier 55, East river; and the force of floating property has been employed in filing saws, spinning oakum, heating pitch, pumping-out scows, and in general care of floating property laid up in the Yard.

OFFICES.

The steam-heating boiler and pipes have been overhauled by the force of the Department and have been put in good condition for winter.

EAST SEVENTEENTH STREET YARD.

Hoisting Engine—The machinery and falls of the hoisting engine have been overhauled and repaired by Department labor.

Materials and Supplies.

Various materals and supplies for the use of floating property have been received and expended in part, and the remainder has been stored for future use as required.

Surveying Party.

The Surveying Party has given all the lines and levels required for the various work of the Department, and the various levels over the wall and earth filling have been taken as usual.

Fifteen surveys have been made on the North river water front, 10 on that of the East river, and 12 on the Harlem river; of which 4 on the North river, 3 on the East river, and seven on the Harlem river were in connection with work done by private parties under permit of the Board; and plots of the greater part of them have been made for the records of the Department.

The surveys made during the previous quarter and not plotted at its expiration have been plotted and recorded during this quarter.

16,022 disc soundings, to ascertain the depth of water, have been taken in realize and

plotted and recorded during this quarter.

16,022 disc soundings, to ascertain the depth of water, have been taken in 59 slips, and 2,303 rod soundings, to ascertain the depth of soft mud, have been taken in 20 slips, by the Surveying and Sounding Parties, of which 11,018 disc soundings, in 35 slips, and 1,044 rod soundings, in 10 slips, were on the North river, and 5,004 disc soundings, in 24 slips, and 1,259 rod soundings, in 10 slips, were on the East and Harlem rivers. Of the above 4,361 disc soundings, in 16 slips, 1,623 rod soundings, in 14 slips, were for construction, and 11,661 disc soundings, in 43 slips, and 680 rod soundings, in 6 slips, were for general repairs and examinations, being soundings before and after dreading.

dredging.

Most of these soundings have been reduced, plotted and placed on file.

The automatic tide-gauges have been attended to.

The greater part of the dredging done by the Department of Docks and all the dumping of the material dredged, has been done under the supervision of the Surveyor.

The dredging done by lessees, owners and others, by order of or under permit of the Board of Docks, has been supervised by the Surveyor.

The 779 deaths represent a death-rate of 26.17, as against 22.99 for the previous week, and 24.21 for the corresponding week of 1887.

The increase of 95 in the number of deaths was mainly due to an increase of 25 deaths from diphtheria, of 6 from malarial fevers, 7 from measles, 18 from scarlatina, 6 from heart diseases, 9 from

pneumonia, and 15 from Bright's disease; there was a decrease of 3 in the deaths from typhoid fever, 8 from whooping cough, 10 from meningitis and encephalitis and 5 from croup.

The increase of diphtheria was most marked in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, that of scarlatina in the Seventh, Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, and of measles in the Twenty-second Ward.

has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course
of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care
at a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is immediately made to the Health Department of the City of
New York of every person infected with a contagious
disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such
person or persons so infected are properly isolated and
kept separate from other persons and other patients.

Resolved, That section 18 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 18. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

Meters will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them. The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BAKERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathtub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:
HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged
six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

Hotels and Boarding Houses shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an

Liquor and Lager Beer Saloons shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for

annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER and ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum each. WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from he ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Eugineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." *

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

Rate Without Meters.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent, per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).
Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.
All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waster of mater.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per-

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs o norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures. No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths land urmals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a vi-lation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises responsible for the amount of water or wasted.

Notice is therefore tiven to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.

GRANTS OF LANDS UNDER WATER.

THE OWNERS OF LANDS IN THE CITY OF
New York, which were formerly under water, and
which were granted by the City of New York, are notified that nearly all of the grants of such lands containcovenants, on the part of the grantees, and their successors and assigns, to maintain and keep in repair the
adjacent streets. The condition of many of these streets
is such as to make it necessary that they should be repaired and repaved, and that the obligation resting upon
the present owners of adjacent lots to do this work should
now be enforced. Many of such owners have requested
that such covenants be commuted, and wholly released,
upon the payment by them of a certain sum per lot.
The matter will shortly be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their consideration, and
the adjustment of the basis of commutation, and application for releases should therefore be made at once.
