### POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Report for the Quarter ending September 30, 1900.

POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor, New York City:

SIR—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 376, Laws of 1897, the Police Board of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and Force for the three months ending September 30, 1900.

#### REPORT.

On the 30th day of September, 1900, the number of the force, of all grades, including persons on probation (31), was 7,474.

#### SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof, will be found in schedule annexed marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 17,325 days. Sick time paid, 8,162½ days; sick time unpaid, 8,162½ days; total days' time of the force was 680,315 days; per cent. of sick to full time, 2.55; for preceding quarter, 2.76; amount paid for sick time, \$29,434.20; a decrease of \$2,501.75 over that paid for preceding quarter.

#### ARRESTS.

The total number of persons arrested by the Police Force during the quarter was: Male, 27,689; females, 7,122. Total, 34,811. Number arrested for principal felonies, 2,689; number discharged without trial, 723; number acquitted, 362; number convicted, 372; number sent to other authorities, 43; number died, 11; number pending, 1,178.

#### LOST CHILDREN (see Schedule "B").

Males, 559; females, 320. Total, 879. Restored to parents or guardians, 830; other dispositions, 49. Of this number there were disposed of from Central Office 546.

Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in Felony Report and General Report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the General Report is made up from the Daily Returns from the Station-houses and the Felony Report is made from the Quarterly Returns. An offense charged in the Station-house at the time the arrest is made is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, February 27, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice. ## REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT FOR GUN HILL ROAD, BRONX.

The hearing was opened in the matter of the petition for the reduction of assessment for the widening and extending of Gun Hill road, from Jerome avenue to the Bronx river. The following petition was placed on file:

BEFORE THE BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

In the Matter

of

Acquiring title to Gun Hill road, from Jerome avenue to the Bronx river.

To the Honorable Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York:

The undersigned, owners of property assessed in the above-entitled proceeding, respectfully request your Honorable Board to direct that one-half of the cost and expense of the proceeding be made a general charge against The City of New York as a matter of general public benefit.

Your petitioners respectfully show that said Gun Hill road has been for upwards of a century a thoroughfare about fifty feet in width, extending from the Old Albany Post road, above Kingsbridge, to the Bronx river, and thence across the Bronx river to the Old Boston Post road to Pelham, and that said road was widened by the Department of Public Parks to the width of one hundred feet, between Jerome and Webster avenues, in this proceeding.

That said street of about fifty feet in width was sufficient for all local needs, and that the widening of the said street was done solely for public and general benefit, and for the purpose of creating a general thoroughfare between the easterly and westerly sides of the annexed districts of The City of New York.

Wherefore your petitioners pray that one-half of the cost of said widening may be made a public charge upon The City of New York for general benefit to said city.

Mr. Charles B. Gabriels, representing the Dodge Estate; Mr. Truman H. Baldwin, Mr. A. L. Payne, representing McCarty & Baldwin, attorneys for property-owners, and Mr. Bluxell appeared in support of the petition.

Mr. Walter Large, Chairman of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, was present.

Mr. Large, in his statement, said that the amount of the assessment in the above proceeding was about \$75,000. That the proceeding was for the widening of Gun Hill road as it previously existed, and laying out an extension to said street 100 feet in width.

In answer to a question by the Deputy Comptroller, Mr. Large stated that only nominal awards had been made for land included in the old Gun Hill road and that substantial awards had been made for the portion newly laid out, including the extension, and that the awards for the extension amounted to about \$10,000.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan moved that the City bear 50 per cent. of the cost of the widening.

The Commissioner of Bridges moved to amend the resolution so that the City would bear one-third of the cost.

The amendment was lost by the following vote:

Affirmative—Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies and Commissioner of Bridges—3.

Negative—Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Commissioner of Sewers and President of the Board—5.

Action was then taken on the original motion, which was lost by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioner of Street Cleaning and Commissioner of Sewers—2.

Negative—Comptroller, Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Commissioner of Bridges and President of the Board—6.

The Comptroller then offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That so much of the resolution relating to the opening of Gun Hill road, from Jerome avenue to the Bronx river, adopted by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement on the 3d day of January, 1896, as provides "that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby," is hereby amended so as to read, "that sixty per cent. of the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby and forty per cent. shall be borne and paid by The City of New York."

Affirmative—Comptroller, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Commissioner of Sewers, Commissioner of Bridges and President of the Board—6.

Negative—Commissioner of Water Supply and Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies—2.

## REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT FOR LONGWOOD AVENUE, BRONX.

Hearing was opened in the petition for a reduction of the assessment for the opening of Longwood avenue, from Westchester avenue to the Southern Boulevard, in the Borough of The Bronx.

After hearing Judge Hall, in support of the petition, and Mr. Ely, of the Commission of Estimate and Assessment, in the above proceedings, the Commissioner of Bridges moved that the City bear 40 per cent. of the cost and expense.

The Deputy Comptroller moved to amend so that the City would bear 20 per cent. of the cost.

In support of his amendment, the Deputy Comptroller said: "In the Gun Hill road matter, which we have just considered, the proceedings were for the widening of an existing street, except for a short distance, where a new street was opened. I believe that it is a fair proposition, in proceedings which are substantially widening proceedings, and where only nominal awards are made for land within the lines of a long-used street, that the City should bear half of the expense of the widening, but where a new street is opened I think that the City should only be called upon to bear one-half of the cost of opening in excess of 60 feet in width."

The amendment was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Comptroller, Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Street Cleaning and Commissioner of Bridges—4.

Negative—Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Sewers and President of the Board—3.

The following resolution was thereupon adopted:

Resolved, That so much of the resolution relating to the opening of Longwood avenue, from Westchester avenue to the Southern Boulevard, adopted by the Board of Street Opening and Improvements on the 18th day of August, 1893, as provides "that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby," is hereby amended so as to read "that eighty per cent. of the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, and twenty per cent. shall be borne and paid by The City of New York."

Affirmative—Comptroller, Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Street Cleaning and Commissioner of Bridges—4.

Negative—Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Sewer, and President of the Board—3.

## OPENING ELEVENTH AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

SIR—On June 28, 1899, a resolution initiating proceedings for the opening of Eleventh avenue, from Fifteenth street to Terrace place, in the Borough of Brooklyn was adopted by the Board of Public Improvements, stating that there are buildings on the land.

Again, on August 2, 1899, the same resolution was adopted, with the exception that the statement was made that there are no buildings on the land. Although this second resolution was adopted, I find no record that the first resolution was rescinded.

An examination has shown that the first resolution was correct in stating that there are buildings on the land. As the matter now stands there are two conflicting resolutions on record.

The rule map for opening Eleventh avenue was forwarded February 17, 1900, and the draft damage map was requested May 22, 1900.

Not knowing according to which resolution the Corporation Counsel made application for the appointment of commissioners, I wish to recommend that this letter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for examination in order to straighten out the conflicting resolutions.

DEAR SIR—I duly received your letter of 8th instant, inclosing preamble and resolution submitted by the Deputy Comptroller at the meeting of the 6th instant of the Board of Public Improvements, requesting the Secretary of the Interior to direct that the Hydrographic Branch of the United States Geological Survey extend its investigations for determining the water supply of the United States to the various streams within or adjacent to the State of New York.

In reply, I desire to say that the result of such investigation would be of great value in determining proper sources for necessary additions to the City's water supply.

I approve the suggestion of the Chief Engineer of this Department that there be added to the resolution "that the topographic and hydrographic maps of the State of New York, from the border lines of Connecticut, Massachusetts and Vermont, to longitude 75 west, be completed as soon as practicable."

This would expedite preliminary surveys, calculation of drainage areas and other work necessary to arrive at correct knowledge required in determining the most suitable and available sources of supply.

The Comptroller presented the following report and accompanying resolution relative to the redemption of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, maturing July 1, 1901:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII, of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to

redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of The City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

## CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

## ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
