SIR-Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 376, Laws of 1897, the Police Board of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and Force for the three months ending September 30,

REPORT.

On the 30th day of September, 1900, the number of the force, of all grades, including persons on probation (31), was 7,474.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof, will be found in schedule annexed marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 17,325 days. Sick time paid, 8,162½ days; sick time unpaid, 8,162½ days; total days' time of the force was 680,315 days; per cent. of sick to full time, 2.55; for preceding quarter, 2.76; amount paid for sick time, \$29,434.20; a decrease of \$2,501.75 over that paid for preceding quarter.

The total number of persons arrested by the Police Force during the quarter was: Male, 27,689; females, 7,122. Total, 34,811. Number arrested for principal felonies, 2,689; number discharged without trial, 723; number acquitted, 362; number convicted, 372; number sent to other authorities, 43; number died, 11; number pending, 1,178.

LOST CHILDREN (see Schedule "B").

Males, 559; females, 320. Total, 879. Restored to parents or guardians, 830; other dispositions, 49. Of this number there were disposed of from Central Office 546. Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention

Note.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in Felony Report and General Report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the General Report is made up from the Daily Returns from the Station-houses and the Felony Report is made from the Quarterly Returns. An offense charged in the Station-house at the time the arrest is made is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

Not knowing according to which resolution the Corporation Counsel made application for the appointment of commissioners, I wish to recommend that this letter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for examination in order to straighten out the conflicting resolutions.

Gentlemin—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debtrestrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII. of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to

redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said
