

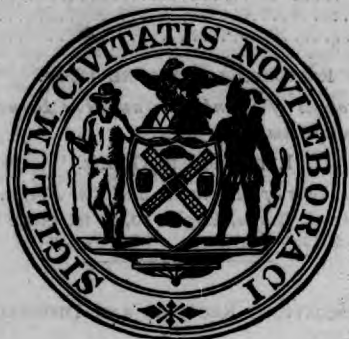

COMMUNICATIONS RECEIVED AND DISPOSED OF.

From the Chief of Department—

1. Respecting the complaint of the Edison Electric Illuminating Company that one of their poles at Thirty-seventh street and Madison avenue was knocked down by an apparatus of the Department, and reporting that there is no fund to pay for the expense of replacing the same. Company notified.

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, March 2, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—The full Board.  
The minutes of the regular meeting held February 23, and of the special meeting held February 28, 1900, were approved.

A representative of the City Island Board of Trade appeared and requested to be advised as to what compensation would be charged the steamer "Idiewild" for the privilege of landing at the new dock if constructed at the southerly end of City Island. He was informed that the application for permission to land at the proposed dock must be made by the owner of the steamer.  
Everett P. Wheeler appeared on behalf of the East Side House Settlement and protested against the establishment of a dump for the Department of Street Cleaning at the foot of East Seventy-fifth street on account of the improvements made and to be made thereat in connection with said East Side House Settlement.

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Murphy, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative, the action of the Board of February 9, 1900, setting aside the premises at the foot of East Seventy-fifth street for the location of a dump, was rescinded, the bulkhead at the foot of East Seventy-third street set aside for such purposes, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare a suitable foundation for a double dumping-board for the Department of Street Cleaning at the latter location by repairing the present crib-bulkhead thereat.

The communication from the Brooklyn Wharf and Warehouse Company requesting that this Department join with said company in doing the work of dredging made necessary on account of the sewers emptying into the slips at the foot of Joralemon and Degraw streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to whether this Department is under any obligation to do the dredging required.

The communication from the Department of Street Cleaning in relation to the protest of the Kings County Electric Light and Power Company against the extension of the dump at the foot of Gold street, Borough of Brooklyn, was referred to the President.

The communication from G. E. P. Howard, attorney, offering, on behalf of George H. Penman, to convey to the City his two-thirds interest in Pier, old 36, East river, together with the bulkhead easterly thereof and the existing structures in front of said bulkhead, for the sum of \$400,000, was referred to the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer.

The application of John A. Bouker, requesting permission to repair and rebuild the dumping-board and crib between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, East river, was referred to the Treasurer.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 19662, submitting the cost of constructing a launch hoist and float stage and of driving fender piles at Riker's Island, amounting to \$1,079.60, was referred to the Treasurer for collection from the Department of Correction.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York and Boston Dyewood Company, to repair its bulkhead and pier at the foot of Greene street, Greenpoint, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be kept within existing lines.  
Brooklyn Sanitary Company, to dredge in front of its bulkhead at the foot of Sixth street, South Brooklyn.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Pennsylvania Railroad Company, to make general repairs during the ensuing six months to Pier, old 1, south side of Pier, old 2, Pier, old 4, Pier, old 5, Pier, old 16, and to the Cortlandt street station, on the North river; it being understood that at least twenty-four hours notice shall be given the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department before the commencement of any such repairs.

American Air Power Company, to extend its water-pipe a distance of fifty feet further out-shore under the Pier at the foot of Twenty-fourth street, North river, the consent of the lessee of said pier to be first obtained and filed in this Department.

Charles W. Cooper, to build a crib-bulkhead on his property, between Worth and Harsell streets, Long Island City, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted, as amended.

Frederick Semken, to construct a solid crib on his property, at Bensonhurst, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted.

Edward F. Keegan, to construct a pier on his property, at the foot of Cliff street, Southfield, in the Borough of Richmond, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted.

William J. Quinlan, to construct a crib-bulkhead on his property, at Port Richmond, Staten Island, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving forms of Contract No. 677, for dredging on the North river, north of West Thirty-fourth street, and No. 678, for building a new pier at the foot of Coenties slip, East river, to be known as Pier, new 5.

2d. Advising that the clause heretofore inserted in contracts specifying that a rate of wages in accordance with the Labor Law shall be paid by the contractor to persons employed by him under the contract complies with the statute and should not be modified or changed.

From the Comptroller—Approving sureties on Contracts No. 675, for furnishing cement, and No. 677, for dredging on the North river, north of West Thirty-fourth street.

From H. L. Herbert & Co.—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted February 16, 1900, agreeing to lease to them the outer 580 feet of the southerly side of the Pier foot of East Twentieth street, East river, together with 120 feet of the bulkhead southerly thereof, together with the privilege of laying tracks on said pier and across the marginal street thereat, at an annual rental of \$875. Secretary directed to request the Corporation Counsel to prepare the necessary form of lease.

From E. Ellery Anderson—Requesting a lease of the new Pier at the foot of Thirty-sixth street, East river. Application denied, and the Secretary directed to state that it is the intention of the Board to keep said pier open for general commerce.

From Candee & Smith—Requesting that dredging be done by this Department in front of the bulkhead between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order the necessary dredging thereat.

From the Gas Engine and Power Company and Charles L. Seabury & Co., Consolidated—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 651.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of building new tug under Contract No. 651, Gas Engine and Power Company and Charles L. Seabury & Co., Consolidated, contractors, be and hereby is extended to and including February 14, 1900, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From William G. Triest—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 631.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of building the recreation structure on the pier foot of North Second street, Borough of Brooklyn, under Contract No. 631, W. G. Triest, contractor, be and hereby is extended to and including March 15, 1900, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From H. L. Spearin—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 661.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of building a pier at the foot of Fordham road, Harlem river, under Contract No. 661, Henry L. Spearin, contractor, be and is hereby extended to and including March 5, 1900, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract be filed in this Department.

From the President—In relation to the report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 19839, as to the application of the Department of Bridges for the setting aside of certain property on the East river for the location of towers and anchorages of the proposed East River Bridge No. 3, and recommending that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to approve of the plan as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief for a change in lines of Piers, new 29, new 30 and new 31, on the East river, made necessary in view of the proposed construction of such towers and anchorages.

On motion, the recommendation of the President and the plan showing the change in lines of said piers were approved, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and hereby are requested to approve the change in the locations of Piers, new 29, new 30 and new 31, East river, on the plan laid out and adopted by the Board of Docks December 30, 1898, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund February 3, 1899.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that the permit granted John A. Bouker December 23, 1898, to maintain, during the pleasure of the Board, a dumping-board on the bulkhead between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, East river, be revoked, to take effect March 5, 1900. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the present lease of the Pier foot of Eighteenth street, East river, be canceled, and that a new lease be granted the Carroll Box and Lumber Company of the portion of said pier easterly of the proposed new bulkhead-wall thereat, for a term of five years, at an annual rental of \$2,400, with the privilege of laying tracks on said pier and across the marginal street thereat.

On motion, the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, In and by an indenture dated the 25th day of January, 1895, by and between The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York by the Board of Docks, parties of the first part, and the Carroll Box and Lumber Company, party of the second part, all and singular, the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due for the use and occupation, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, of all that certain public wharf property situated on the East river, in the City and County of New York, and known and described as "the Pier foot of East Eighteenth street, together with the right to enter upon said wharf property for the purpose of said lease, and to collect said wharfage," was granted to the said party of the second part; and

Whereas, In said lease it is provided, among other things, that the said party of the second part shall have the privilege of a renewal for the further term of five years; and

Whereas, In the prosecution of the work under the new plan it has become necessary for this Department to take possession of the inner portion of said pier; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That said lease, dated January 25, 1895, be and is hereby canceled and annulled, to take effect May 1, 1900.

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power vested in this Board, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let to the Carroll Box and Lumber Company, all and singular, the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due, for the use and occupation by vessels of more than five tons burden, of the Pier foot of Eighteenth street, East river, easterly of the new bulkhead-wall, for a term of five years from May 1, 1900; rental to be paid therefor at the rate of two thousand four hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department.

The lessee shall have the privilege of laying tracks on said pier and across the marginal wharf, street or place, in accordance with plans to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; the work to be done under his direction and supervision.

It is understood and agreed that these preambles and resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the terms hereof are accepted by said company within ten days after the receipt of a copy thereof by said company, and that said company shall also agree to execute a lease containing the covenants and conditions at present embodied in leases of wharf property in this Department.

From Commissioner Meyer—Recommending that a lease of Pier, new 1, at the Wallabout basin, Borough of Brooklyn, be granted the Consolidated Ice Company for a term of ten years, with the privilege of two renewals of ten years each; the rental for the first term to be \$5,500 per annum; for the second term, \$6,000 per annum, and for the third term, \$6,500 per annum. Said recommendation was not approved, Commissioners Cram and Murphy voting in the negative.

The action of the Secretary in transmitting the same, with requisitions for the amount, to the Finance Department for payment approved.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the Old Colony Steamboat Company that this Department will enter into possession of Pier 40, East river, on April 1, 1900, in accordance with resolution adopted August 2, 1894, for the purpose of building a new pier in that vicinity, in conformity with the new plan adopted by this Department and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the improvement of the water-front thereat.

On motion, the permit granted the Old Colony Steamboat Company August 30, 1894, to maintain a platform on land under water on the westerly side of Pier 40, East river, was revoked, to take effect March 30, 1900.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, that permission be and the same hereby is granted the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, all that certain land covered with water, situated on the East river, in the City and County of New York, and known and described as follows, to wit:

Beginning at a point on the westerly side of Pier, new 36, East river, distant northerly about 82 feet from the established bulkhead-line, thence westerly 130 feet to the easterly side of Pier, old 45, as widened (in 1888), at a point northerly about 80 feet from the established bulkhead-line, thence northerly 49.62 feet along the easterly side of Pier, old 45, East river, as widened (in 1888), to the face of the crib-bulkhead between Piers, old 45 and new 36, East river, thence easterly along the face of said crib-bulkhead about 128½ feet to the westerly side of Pier, new 36, East river, thence southerly along the westerly side of Pier, new 36, East river, 50.8 feet to the point or place of beginning; also

Beginning at the intersection of the easterly side line of Pier, old 45, East river, with the face of the crib-bulkhead, and from thence along the easterly side of said pier southerly about 385 feet to a point 22 feet inshore from the outer end of same, thence northerly 384.16 feet to the face of the crib-bulkhead between Piers, old 45 and new 36, East river, at a point about 10 feet easterly from the easterly side of Pier, old 45, East river, thence westerly along the face of said crib bulkhead about 10 feet to the point or place of beginning.

The rental for the property first above described shall be one thousand, six hundred and two and seventy-five one hundredths (\$1,602.75) dollars per annum, and for the property second above described, seven hundred and fourteen (\$714) dollars per annum, payable monthly at the end of each month to the Treasurer of this Department, commencing March 1, 1900.

It being understood and agreed that the above resolution be subject to the terms, covenants and conditions of the indentures dated June 1, 1890, and February 1, 1889, respectively, between The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, acting by and through the Department of Docks of said city, and Jabez A. Bostwick of the City and County of New York.

The Secretary reported that the pay-roll for the week ending February 23, 1900, amounting to \$13,566.03, and the pay-roll for the month of February, 1900, amounting to \$17,644.37, had been approved, audited and transmitted to the Department of Finance for payment.

The Board went into executive session at 3.10 P. M.

#### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, March 9, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held March 2, 1900, were approved.

The matter of the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of Pier 36, East river, and the removal of the extension to said pier, was tabled, pending the report of Commissioner Meyer as to the offer of the Penniman Estate for the sale of said property.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

From the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company—Requesting permission to land the steamers "Grand Republic" and "General Slocum" at the Battery Wharf, and at the outer end of Pier, new 43, North river, during the season of 1900.

From the Myers Excursion and Navigation Company—Requesting permission to land the steamer "Tolchester" at the outer end of Pier, new 43, North river, on Sundays, from June 3 to September 2, 1900, inclusive.

From J. B. & J. M. Cornell—Stating that it is their intention to avail themselves of the privilege of a renewal lease of the bulkhead between Piers, new 56 and 57, North river.

From O'Brien Brothers—Requesting berth for scows at the bulkhead between Ninety-eighth and Ninety-ninth streets, North river.

From Farrell & Hopper—Requesting a five years' lease of the southerly half of the bulkhead at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, North river.

From John Hinchliffe—Requesting a ten years' lease of the land under water at the foot of Red lane, Midland Beach, Staten Island, with the privilege of erecting a platform at the foot of said lane.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the compensation in each case to be fixed by the Treasurer:

Al. Foster, to land the steamer "Angler" at the Battery Wharf during the season of 1900.

Loewer Steamboat Company, to land the steamer "Dolphin" at the Battery Wharf during the season of 1900.

Stegman & Halpin, to land the Midland Beach Excursion Company's steamers at the Battery Wharf during the season of 1900.

Citizens' Steamboat Company, to berth the steamer "Holmdel" at the outer end, southerly side of Pier, old 42, North river, and to berth the steamer "Magenta" at the north side of the Pier foot of Bloomfield street, North river, during the season of 1900.

Clifton Boat Club, to drive six piles for retaining float at the club-house, at Clifton, Staten Island.

From the Comptroller—Advising that his certificate has been indorsed upon Contracts No. 674, for furnishing piles, and No. 676, for building Pier, new 32, East river, and that same are now valid contracts.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Transmitting notice of application to be made by Theobald Englehardt and Joseph Wagner for a grant of land under water at the foot of Bayside avenue, Jamaica bay.

2d. Transmitting bills of costs in proceedings for the acquisition of 125 feet of bulkhead between Watts and Canal streets, North river. Chief Clerk directed to draw the necessary requisitions therefor.

3d. Advising that a clause should be inserted in Contract No. 673, for furnishing granite stones for bulkhead or river wall, awarded to Antonio Rizzolo, embodying the provisions of chapter 567 of the Laws of 1899. Commissioners authorized to execute the contract in its amended form.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—

1st. Requesting that dredging be done in the slip under the dumping-board at the foot of Thirty-eighth street, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order the necessary dredging thereat.

2d. Submitting plan for a dumping-board to be erected on the north side of the Pier foot of One Hundred and Tenth street, Harlem river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Department of Street Cleaning to place a single dumping-board on the northerly side of the Pier foot of East One Hundred and Tenth street, in accordance with plans submitted, which are hereby approved, the same to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From W. G. Triest—Transmitting consent of sureties to the extension of time granted to and including March 15, 1900, for the completion of the work of building the recreation structure on the Pier foot of North Second street, Borough of Brooklyn, under Contract No. 631.

Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland and the American Surety Company of New York, sureties—Consenting to the extension of time to and including February 14, 1900, granted the Gas Engine and Power Company and Charles L. Seabury & Co., Consolidated, for the completion of the new tug, under Contract No. 651.

From the American Air Power Company—Transmitting consent of Henderson Brothers to the extension of its pipe fifty feet offshore under the Pier foot of Twenty-fourth street, North river.

From the Edison Electric Illuminating Company of New York—Requesting that this Department proceed with the construction of the pier and the bulkhead-wall between East Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth streets, East river, and that said company be granted a lease of such pier and bulkhead for a term of ten years, with options of four renewal terms of ten years each, with the privilege of maintaining coal-handling and ash-removing structures thereon and of placing intake and discharge pipes for condensing purposes thereat, and of filling in with ashes in the rear of the bulkhead-wall.

From F. J. W. Bursch—Requesting permission to erect extensions to the salt-storage warehouse at Hamilton avenue and Smith street, Gowanus canal, Borough of Brooklyn. Application denied, the proposed structures not being in accordance with the requirements of law.

From the President—

1st. Reporting that the Department of Street Cleaning has already extended the dump at the foot of Gold street, Borough of Brooklyn.

2d. Recommending that the Engineer-in-Chief be directed to proceed with the extension of Pier, new 41, North river, pending negotiations with the lessees of said pier.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to enter upon Pier, new 41, North river, and extend said pier out to the new pierhead-line of 1897, in accordance with the provisions contained in the lease of said pier, and that all the work pertaining thereto be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided in section 821 of the Greater New York Charter, and that it be done by the force of this Department by day's work, except so much of the labor as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the material, tools and implements necessary for the above-mentioned work not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract; the compensation to be charged the lessee for the use of said extension to be five per cent. per annum on the cost thereof.

3d. Recommending that the Pier at the foot of Thirty-fifth street, North river, be extended out to the established pierhead-line.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to extend the Pier at the foot of West Thirty-fifth street out to the new pierhead-line of 1897, and that all the work pertaining thereto be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 821 of the Greater New York Charter, and that it be done by the force of this Department by day's work, except so much of the labor as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the material, tools and implements necessary for the above-mentioned work not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Reporting that he has arranged with William Bayne, Charles Neumeyer, John A. Boswald, Maurice Z. Hanau, David H. Braham, Felix S. McAuliffe, Thomas F. Usher, Thomas F. Shannon, Eugene A. Johnson and William L. Bowron for the furnishing of brass military bands on the recreation piers during the season of 1900; the compensation to be paid at the rate of \$21 per week for each man and \$42 per week for the leader; the number to be employed to be fourteen men and a leader on each of the Piers at the foot of East Third, East One Hundred and Twelfth and West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth streets, Borough of Manhattan, and at the foot of North Second street, Borough of Brooklyn, and nineteen men and a leader on the Piers foot of East Twenty-fourth, West Fiftieth and Christopher streets, North river, Borough of Manhattan. Action approved.

2d. Recommending that permission be granted John A. Bouker to repair the dumping-board between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, East river, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the privilege granted Joseph Morgan to use and occupy the premises at the foot of Depot place, High Bridge, be revoked, to take effect March 12, 1900, and that permission be granted James Biggart & Co. to use and occupy same during the pleasure of the Board, commencing March 13, 1900, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$50 per annum, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Reporting his inability to collect from the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company accrued wharfage for landing at the Battery Wharf and at the outer end of Pier, new 43, North river, amounting to \$1,931.60, and the unpaid balance of the cost of extending the Pier at the foot of West Twentieth street, amounting to \$2,093.22, and recommending that the claims be sent to the Corporation Counsel for collection. Recommendation adopted.

From Commissioner Meyer—Recommending that a ten years' lease of Pier, new 1, in the Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, be granted the Consolidated Ice Company, commencing April 1, 1900, at an annual rental of \$5,500.

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Meyer and Murphy, the President not voting, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let to the Consolidated Ice Company, all and singular, the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, for the use and occupation by vessels of more than five tons burden, of Pier 1, Wallabout Basin, for a term of ten years from April 1, 1900, rental to be paid therefor at the rate of five thousand five hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this department; it being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Consolidated Ice Company shall file in this Department, within ten days after receipt of a copy hereof, its written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution.
