Present—Chairman William R. Willcox, Commissioners Edward M. Bassett, Milo R. Maltbie, John E. Eustis.

(1) On motion the minutes of the Commission for Friday, May 22, 1908, as printed in the CITY RECORD for May 28, 1908, were amended by inserting an item after item No. 28 approving the final bill of William M. Ivins, Esq., special counsel in the matter of Order No. 6 for Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars, for payment, and as so corrected the minutes were approved.

On motion the record of the proceedings of the Commission for May 25 and 26, 1908, as printed in the CITY RECORD for June 2, 1908, was approved.

(2) O-367 The Secretary presented a communication from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company by William Greenough, Attorney, under date of May 29th, containing a notification to the effect that said Company accepts and will obey the terms of Order No. 512 in the matter of the complaint of Henry G. Kost with respect to smoke nuisance at the Harlem River Freight yard. The communication was ordered filed.

(3) 1077 RAPID TRANSIT ACT—SALE OF PROPERTY.

The Secretary presented a communication dated May 28th, 1908, from N. Taylor Phillips, Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting a certified copy of the following resolution adopted by them on May 27th, 1908:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby decline to authorize or approve the sale of any buildings upon property acquired for Rapid Transit purposes, at the request of the Public Service Commission whenever the application contains a request that the proceeds of such sale be turned over to the Public Service Commission.

The Secretary also presented a communication, dated June 1, 1908, from the Counsel to the Commission, transmitting the following proposed form of reply thereto, which was approved by the Commission:

June 1, 1908.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York:

SIR—On behalf of the Public Service Commission for the First District, I beg to acknowledge receipt of certified copy of resolution, adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund May 27, 1908, as follows:

“Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby decline to authorize or approve the sale of any buildings upon property acquired for Rapid Transit purposes, at the request of the Public Service Commission whenever the application contains a request that the proceeds of such sale be turned over to the Public Service Commission.”

There seems to be some misapprehension on the part of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund with respect to the position of the Public Service Commission on the proper disposition of the proceeds of sale of buildings or other property no longer necessary for rapid transit purposes. This Commission has not requested that the proceeds of any such sale “be turned over” to it. The provision in the resolution heretofore submitted to the effect that the proceeds of sale be applied “either to the purchase of other property necessary for rapid transit purposes or shall be applied in all respects as the payments of rental to be made by the contractor as provided in this Act” was pursuant to Section 39 of the Rapid Transit Act, as amended by Chapter 587, Laws of 1901 and Chapter 564, Laws of 1904. While under that Act, as amended, the proceeds of sale are to be applied *under the direction* of this Commission as successor of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, the proceeds of sale are of course not to be handled by this Commission but by the city authorities. The only desire of the Commission is to have the buildings, which now are an encumbrance, removed as speedily as possible and the proceeds applied according to law.

If the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have any doubt as to the force and application of Section 39 of the Rapid Transit Act, it is respectfully suggested that the advice of the Corporation Counsel be taken on the subject before a final decision is made that would unnecessarily delay the progress of public improvements and add to the expense thereof.

(5) O-545 REHEARING ORDER (No. 545).

On motion by Commissioner Eustis, a Rehearing Order (No. 545) was adopted directing a rehearing on June 8, 1908, at 3:30 o'clock P. M. in the matter of Final Order No. 494 with respect to additions to the 92nd Street station on the Second Avenue Elevated Road of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company.

The Chair designated Commissioner Eustis to conduct the hearing.

(6) O-546 EXTENSION ORDER (No. 546).

On motion by Commissioner Eustis an Extension Order (No. 546) was adopted extending to June 12th 1908 the time of the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company to answer Order No. 521 calling for information with regard to the compliance by said Company with the covenants and agreements contained in the contract entered into with the City of New York on May 31, 1906.

(7) O-547 OPINION AND ORDER.

Commissioner Maltbie presented the following opinion in the matter of the complaint of M. Burr Wright against the Forty-second Street, Manhattanville and St. Nicholas Avenue Railroad Company and Frederick W. Whitridge its Receiver, with respect to the unsanitary condition of cars upon the Forty-second Street crosstown line:

This case arose from a complaint made by Assemblyman Wright, that the cars operated upon the 42nd Street line were filthy and unsanitary. The complaint was forwarded to the Receiver and a reply received, which was not considered satisfactory by the complainant. Accordingly an order for a hearing was adopted by the Commission upon May 15. A hearing was held upon May 22 and an adjourned hearing upon May 29.

The evidence presented by the Inspectors of the Commission, who were directed to report upon the conditions which existed immediately after the complaint was filed (April 24), and a few days ago (May 26), indicated that the complaint was entirely justified. Upon April 24 there was not a single car out of the twenty-three then being operated, which was not dirty or filthy in some respect, and many of them were filthy and unsanitary throughout.

After the complaint was forwarded to the Receiver, a marked improvement in the condition of the cars became noticeable, and the Receiver stated to the Commission in a communication that he had discharged one of the foremen for neglect of duty.

At the time of the second inspection—May 26—all of the cars were in better condition than formerly, but some of them were still partially dirty. The inspector who made this investigation testified that it would be possible to put them in a clean and satisfactory condition with little labor and practically no expense. All of the cars are soon to be replaced by open cars and the Commission has already issued an Order requiring the Receiver to overhaul and repair all of the cars upon this line. The open cars will, therefore, be in good condition when they are put in use, and the closed cars by early fall.

I have directed, therefore, that an Order be prepared directing the Receiver to thoroughly clean all of the closed cars which are used during the summer, the other cars having been covered by previous orders.

FINAL ORDER (No. 547).

Thereupon, on motion of Commissioner Maltbie, duly seconded, a Final Order (No. 547) was adopted directing:

(1) that all closed cars operated by said company and by said Receiver on said line shall be placed in a clean and sanitary condition by or before the 8th day of June, 1908, and shall be continued in that condition from that time until the 20th day of September, 1908.

(2) that this order shall take effect on the 8th day of June, 1908, and shall continue in force until the 20th day of September, 1908, unless earlier modified or abrogated by the Commission.


