#### INVITATION TO CONTRACTORS.

Part of the White Plains Road Rapid Transit Railroad.

THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION FOR THE FIRST DISTRICT (hereinafter referred to as the "Commission") hereby invites proposals to construct Section No. 1 of Route 18, a part of the White Plains Road Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within The City of New York between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows:

Section No. 1.
