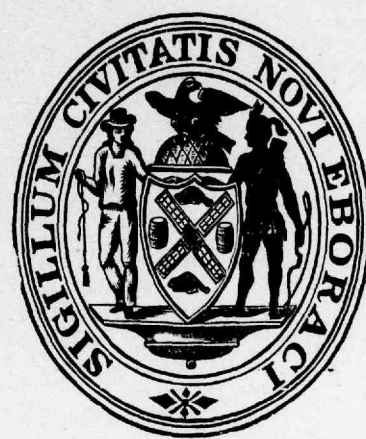

Beginning at the intersection of a line midway between Hegeman avenue and Lott avenue with the easterly line of East Ninety-eighth street, and running easterly along the said line midway between Hegeman avenue and Lott avenue, and the prolongation thereof, to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Hegeman avenue and New Lots avenue, through that portion of their length east of Louisiana avenue; thence easterly along the line last described midway between Hegeman and New Lots avenues to the intersection with a line midway between Vermont street and Wyona street; thence southwardly along a line midway between Vermont street and Wyona street to the intersection with a line midway between Hegeman avenue and Vienna avenue; thence westerly along the line last described midway between Hegeman and Vienna avenues to the intersection with the easterly side of East Ninety-eighth street; thence westerly at right angles to the line of East Ninety-eighth street to a point midway between East Ninety-eighth street and Rockaway parkway; thence northwardly and midway between East Ninety-eighth street and Rockaway parkway to the intersection with a line drawn at right angles to the line of East Ninety-eighth street and passing through the point described as the point or place of beginning; thence easterly to the point or place of beginning.

Fourth—That the abstracts of said estimate of damage and of said assessment for benefit, together with the damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by the Commissioners of Estimate and by the Commissioner of Assessment in making the same, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings in the Law Department of The City of New York, No. 166 Montague street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in said City, there to remain until the 21st day of February, 1914.

Fifth—That, provided there be no objections filed to either of said abstracts, the reports as to awards and as to assessments for benefit herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof, to be held in the County Court House in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 20th day of March, 1914, at the opening of the Court on that day.

Sixth—In case, however, objections are filed to the foregoing abstracts of estimate and assessment, or to either of them, the motion to confirm the reports as to awards and as to assessments shall stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified in the notice provided in such cases to be given in relation to filing the final reports, pursuant to sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.
