

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BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK, MAYOR'S OFFICE—CITY HALL,
THURSDAY, December 30, 1886—1 o'clock p. m.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.: William R. Grace, the Mayor; Edward V. Loew, the Comptroller; Robert B. Nooney, the President of the Board of Aldermen; Michael Coleman, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held December 29, 1886, were read and approved.

On motion, the Board proceeded to the consideration of the Final Estimate for the year 1887.

Henry Schmitt, Commissioner of Education, appeared before the Board and made a statement relative to the salaries of the Teachers in the Training Department, Normal College.

The estimate for the Department of Public Parks was taken up for consideration.

M. D. C. Borden and John D. Crimmins, Commissioners of Public Parks, appeared before the Board and made statements in explanation thereof.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments presented a statement relative

thereto. Which was received, read and ordered on file.

The Comptroller moved that the sum of \$300,000 be allowed for Labor, Maintenance, Supplies, Construction and Repairs—Department of Public Parks.

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved to amend by substituting the sum of \$325,000

for the purposes.

Which was lost by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller and President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

Negative—The Mayor and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The question was then taken on the original motion.

Which was adopted by the following vote:
Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessts-3.

The President of the Board of Aldermen declined to vote.

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$175,000 be allowed for Salaries of Police-Department

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved to amend by substituting the sum of \$185,000

Which was agreed to.

On motion, the Board took a recess until 6 o'clock P. M.

The Board reassembled at 7.15 o'clock P. M.

Present-All the members.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

GENTLEMEN—Herewith I present a statement of unexpended balances of appropriations of the several departments and offices made to them for the year 1885 and previous years, after allowing sufficient to satisfy all known claims payable therefrom, which have been reported by the several departments, and which are on file in the Finance Department, the said balances of appropriations

departments, and which are on file in the Finance Department, the said balances of appropriations aggregating the sum of \$547,678.41.

Section 207 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 provides that such unexpended balances shall be transferred annually by the Comptroller to the General Fund to be applied to the reduction of taxation, with the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment is therefore respectfully requested to approve of the transfer of said amount of unexpended balances of appropriations for the year 1885 and previous years, to be applied to the reduction of taxation in the year 1887, for which purpose I submit a resolution.

And moved to deduct from the Final Estimate the sum of \$2,500,000 as the amount of estimated revenues of the General Fund not otherwise specifically appropriated by law.

Which was adopted by the following vote:
Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller presented the following reasons for overruling the objections and suggestions made by the Board of Aldermen in respect to certain items in the Provisional Estimate:

Whereas, The Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, at a special meeting thereof, held in the chamber of said Board, in the City Hall, in said city, on Tuesday, the twenty-third day of November, 1886, made certain rectifications of and objections to the Provisional Estimate for the year 1887, which were presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on Friday, November 26, 1886; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have duly considered said rectifications of and objections to the Provisional Estimate for 1887, which were made by the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in making the Final Estimate for the year 1887, at a meeting held December 30, 1886, have duly considered the rectifications of and objections to said Provisional Estimate for 1887, made by the Board of Aldermen, and have approved of some of said rectifications and overruled others; therefore

Resolved, That the reasons for the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as

Resolved, That the reasons for the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as provided by said section 189 of the Consolidation Act, in overruling the objections or suggestions made by the Board of Aldermen in respect to certain items in the said Provisional Estimate are as

COMMON COUNCIL.

" 'Clerks—Salaries,' amend by reducing sum for engrossing old manuscript records from \$6,000 to

\$4,000."
The reduction in this item is concurred in.

"Increase Amount for Salaries in Clerk's Office from \$20,000 to \$21,000."

The increase in this item is overruled, for the reason that it is considered unnecessary.

The appropriation for the Common Council is modified, however, by adding \$600 for three items, \$200 each.

LAW DEPARTMENT.

" Bureau of Corporation Attorney—Salaries for Clerks, Messengers and Janitor,' increase from \$7,150 to \$7,800."

The increase in this item is concurred in.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

"'Free Floating Baths,' increase from \$30,000 to \$60,000."

The increase in this item is overruled, for the reason that such additional expense is not considered necessary.

''Repairing and Renewal of Pipes, Stop-cocks, etc.,' fix at the sum of \$190,000, including Navarro Water-meters, \$5,000, and add \$50,000 for other purposes mentioned in said item, increasing the appropriation to \$240,000.''

The increase of \$50,000 in this item is overruled as not required in the interests of the City, but the appropriation for it is modified by adding \$10,000, making the amount \$200,000.

"'Sewers—Repairing and Cleaning,' increase from \$141,500 to \$200,000."

The increase in this item is overruled as not required for the purpose, in the judgment of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

"Strike out first item of appropriation for 'Police Fund—For Salaries of Commissioners,, etc.,' to 'Salaries of Doormen,' \$3,957,027.06, and insert the original estimate of the Police Department, pages 164 and 165 of the printed pamphlet containing Departmental Estimates, increasing thereby the amount to \$4,157,027.06."

The increase in this item is overruled for the reason that the amount asked for in Departmental Estimate is much in excess of necessary expenditures for the support of the Police Department, and upon further consideration, the appropriation for salaries of Patrolmen is reduced \$50,000, making a total of \$3,907,027.06 for "Police Fund—Salaries of Commissioners, Superintendent, Inspectors, Surgeons, Captains, Sergeants, Patrolmen and Doormen," which is considered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to be sufficient for the purpose.

"Patrol-wagon Service (established in pursuance of chapter 596, Laws of 1886)-

 "Fifteen wagons, horses and harness, at \$1,100 each.

This item is overruled for the reason that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does not consider it expedient to add this appendage to the Police Department at the present time,

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

"Increase from \$1,050,000 to \$1,200,000."

The increase in this item is overruled for the reason that the amount appropriated in the Provisional Estimate is deemed ample for the purpose.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

"Add New Houses for Engine and Hook and Ladder Companies Engine Companies Nos. 2, 14,

24, 35 and 54, \$100,000."

This additional item is overruled as an expense that may be postponed, which it is not expedient to incur at this time, but the appropriation "For New Buildings, etc.," is modified by increasing the amount \$17,000, for rebuilding house for Engine Company No. 54.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

"Item for enforcement of the act entitled 'An Act to secure children the benefits of an elementary education,' increase from \$12,000 to \$15,000."

The increase in this item is overruled for the reason that the amount appropriated is deemed sufficient "For Salaries of Truant Agents."

MISCELLANEOUS PURPOSES.

" Sheriff and County Jail,' substitute Departmental for Provisional Estimate, increasing the sum from \$63,216.62 to \$93,216.62."

The increase in this item is overruled for the reason that it is not considered necessary, under

the provisions of the law.

"'The Register,' substitute Departmental for Provisional Estimate, increase from \$100,000 to \$125,000."

The increase in this item is overruled for the reason that the original sum is considered sufficient

for the purposes of the appropriation.

" Election Expenses—Clerks, Board of County Canvassers,' \$2,000, increase to \$3,000, including \$1,000 for special election of delegates to Constitutional Convention."

The increase in this item is overruled for the reason that a special appropriation for such elec-

tion is not required. "' For Preservation of Public Records,' add to Surrogate's Office by increasing from \$6,000 to \$8,400."

The increase in this item is concurred in.

"Insert for Celebration of Fourth of July, 1887 (Independence Day), by the City Authorities, \$5,000."
This additional item is overruled, for the reason that an expenditure for this purpose by the City

Authorities is not deemed necessary.

JUDICIARY.

" Salaries—County Clerk's Office,' increase from \$42,000 to \$42,500."

This item is modified by increasing it from \$42,000 to \$43,200, including \$4,000 for salaries of Deputies, Law Clerks, etc., instead of \$3,000 in Provisional Estimate.

Which were adopted by the following vote:
Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered the following preamble and resolution and Final Estimate for the support of the City Government for the year 1887:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have considered the objections to, and rectifications of, the Provisional Estimate made by said Board on the 30th day of October, 1886, of

the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-seven (1887), in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county which becomes due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; and also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks payable from taxation issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882; also the amount to be raised by tax, annually, which, with the accumulations of interest thereon, will be sufficient to redeem the stocks and bonds issued as provided by section 11 of the Amendment of the Constitution of the State of New York, adopted in 1884; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, which objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, made by the Board of Aldermen on the 23d day of November, were transmitted by the Clerk of said Board, under date of November 24, 1886, and presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 26, 1886; therefore

Resolved, That after such consideration of the said objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment do hereby make this a

of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit: for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-seven (1887), in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which becomes due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks payable from taxation issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882; also the amount to be raised by tax, annually, which, with the accumulations of interest thereon, will be sufficient to redeem the stocks and bonds issued as provided by section 11 of the Amendment of the Constitution of the State of New York, adopted in 1884; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York in said year, as follows:
