The Board finds that on the charge of intoxica-tion, the accused is not guilty, but it finds that on Jannary 9, 1888, the accused, while on duty, did, in violation of the rules, enter and remain for some time in a place where liquor was sold, and that or January 10, 1888, at 2.28 A. M., at the fire at No. 116 Gansevoort street, he failed to properly and promptly report his arrival to the Chief of Battalion m command. In view of the long and ment-orions service of the accused, as well as of his admission in his testimony of his error, the Board is unwilling to deal severely with him and therefore decides that he be reprimanded by the President.
