



### APPROVED PAPERS.

*Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending June 8, 1878.*

Resolved, That the vacant lot on the northwest corner of Madison avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, extending twenty feet westerly on One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street by half the block front on Madison avenue, be fenced in, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, May 21, 1878.  
Approved by the Mayor, June 3, 1878.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Max Goldsmith to place a post and ornamental clock near the curb-stone in front of No. 30 Bowery, provided the post does not exceed the dimensions prescribed for ornamental lamp-posts, the work to be done at his own expense; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That Croton mains be laid in One Hundred and Forty-second street, between Third and Willis avenues, according to annexed petition, as provided in section 2, chapter 477, Laws of 1875.

Approved by the Mayor, June 3, 1878.

Whereas, The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company have applied to the Supreme Court for the appointment of commissioners to take, for the purposes of said railroad, all the land between Sixty-fifth and Seventy-second streets west of their present railroad track, and also all the land included within the streets following: Sixty-fifth, Sixty-sixth, Sixty-seventh, Sixty-eighth, Sixty-ninth, Seventieth, and Seventy-first, and the south half of Seventy-second street, and Twelfth and Thirteenth avenues; and

Whereas, The said streets are the property of the Corporation of the City of New York, and have been laid out and opened or dedicated as public streets or avenues of said city, and should be kept open forever for the use of the inhabitants of said city as thoroughfares and means of communication with the Hudson river and intersecting streets and avenues; and

Whereas, No notice of said application has been given to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonality of the City of New York, or to any of its Departments charged with the protection and care of said streets and avenues;

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation of the City of New York and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be directed to take such action in the said matter as will protect the interests of the city and preserve for the use of the public the said streets and avenues.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, May 21, 1878.  
Approved by the Mayor, June 3, 1878.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to notify the several elevated railway companies to replace the pavements in the several streets and avenues (which were displaced in the erection of the foundations for the columns of such railways) to the regular grade of such streets and avenues, in as good condition as previous to the erection of such foundations, and to the satisfaction of the said Commissioner of Public Works; and in the event of a neglect or refusal on the part of such railway companies, or either of them, to comply with the directions so to be given, for a period longer than thirty days, then the said Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized to replace such pavements, and restore the surface of said streets and avenues as nearly as possible to the condition in which they existed previous to the erection of such foundations, paying therefor from the appropriation for "Repairs and Renewal of Pavements," and to sue for and recover from such railway company or companies the full cost of the work; and the Counsel to the Corporation is hereby authorized and directed to appear for and in behalf of the City of New York as counsel in any and every case of suit by the Commissioner of Public Works to recover back to the city treasury the amount so expended in replacing the pavements and restoring the grade of such streets and avenues.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, May 21, 1878.  
Approved by the Mayor, June 3, 1878.

Resolved, That Third avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, between Harlem river and One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, and also so much of the streets crossing or intersecting said portion of said avenue as may be necessary to preserve and facilitate approach to said avenue by said streets, be regulated and graded in accordance with the grade established by the Commissioners appointed by chapter 841 of the Laws of 1868, as said grade has been altered and amended by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, under authority of chapters 329 and 604 of the Laws of 1874; that the pavement, curb and gutter stones, bridge or crossing stones, and the flag-stones of the said walk now laid on said portion of said avenue be taken up and preserved; the said work to be done under the direction of the Department of Public Parks, and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Approved by the Mayor, June 4, 1878.

Resolved, That Henry Wehle be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds, in place of Simon Sultan, resigned.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments be and they are hereby requested to report to this Board, at their earliest convenience, the amount of land appropriated to the uses of the Brooklyn Bridge in the City of New York, the last assessed value thereof, and the amount of money that will be lost to the corporation annually, in taxes upon the land so appropriated, with a diagram showing the exact location, dimensions, and assessed value of each separate piece or parcel of land, and description of buildings so taken or appropriated.

### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held May 29, 1878.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held May 22, 1878, read and approved.

An application was received from Jarrett and Palmer for permission to place a bin on Pier, new 1, North river, for receiving coal for the use of the steamer "Plymouth Rock"; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the application of Jarrett and Palmer for permission to place a coal bin on Pier, new 1, North river, in order to provide for a supply of coal for the steamer "Plymouth Rock," berthed at said pier, be and is hereby denied.

An application was received from Mary Cummings for permission to place a small float for the letting of boats between Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets, North river; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Mary Cummings be and is hereby informed that this Department has no objection to her placing a small float for the letting of small boats at the shore between Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets, North river, reserving the right, however, to cause said float to be removed at any time it may seem desirable so to do.

A communication was received from the Mutual Benefit Ice Company, advising that the Company were unable to take possession of the berth at pier at Forty-sixth street, North river, under the permission granted on the third instant, consequent upon the premises being in charge of the contractor for repairs; and, being read,

On motion it was

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board on the third instant, whereby a berth was assigned to the Mutual Benefit Ice Company on the south side of the pier at Forty-sixth street, North river, at a rent of \$75 per month, commencing May 1, instant, be and is hereby amended so that the rent shall commence from June 1 instead of May 1, the repairs being made to said pier by this Department having prevented the occupation thereof by said Company.

An application was received from Thomas I. Madge for consent to the assignment of the lease for the bulkhead between piers 18 and 19, East river; and, being read,

On motion it was

Resolved, That the consent of this Board be and is hereby given to Thomas I. Madge to assign to John E. Stow the lease of the bulkhead between piers 18 and 19, East river, purchased by him at public sale held April 15, 1878, provided the said lessee shall execute said lease when prepared and ready for signature, and provide sureties thereto acceptable to this Board.

An application was received from T. & A. Walsh for permission to drive piles necessary in repairing ferry premises at James slip, East river; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to T. & A. Walsh to drive some piles in order to repair and strengthen the ferry building at the James slip ferry, East river, provided no piles are so driven outside of the lines of the structure as at present existing; the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

An application was received from John D. Tracy for permission to erect a dumping-board at the bulkhead adjacent to the northerly side of Bank street, North river; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the application of John D. Tracy for permission to erect on the bulkhead north of the foot of Bank street, North river, leased by him, a dumping-board, be and the same is hereby denied.

An application was received from John D. Tracy for permission to remove the office now located on the bulkhead adjacent to the westerly side of Pier 12, East river, to the bulkhead adjacent to the northerly side of Bank street, North river; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That John D. Tracy be and is hereby informed that this Department will not grant permission for the removal by him of the office now on the bulkhead south of Pier 12, East river, said office being the property of the city and under the jurisdiction of this Board.

An application was received from Thos. O'Rourke, lessee of westerly half of Pier 21, East river, for permission to erect at the inner end of said pier a gate for the protection of property landed thereat; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Thomas O'Rourke, lessee of westerly half of Pier 21, East river, be and is hereby informed that this Department has no objection to the erection by him of a gate across the inner end of the pier, in order to afford better protection against thieves, for the cargoes of fruit landed thereat, and provided it shall not obstruct the free use of the pier for commercial purposes; this Department reserving the right to cause said gate to be removed at any time it may deem expedient.

A communication was received from James McClenahan, lessee of pier at Fortieth street, North river, advising that the dredging recently done at said premises had not secured a depth of ten feet at mean low water for a distance of fifty feet on either side of the pier; and being read and the Engineer-in-Chief reporting that although over 7,500 cubic yards of mud had been removed, the quantity was insufficient to obtain 10 feet depth at all points.

On motion, the communication was laid on the table, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine the said premises and report the quantity of mud required to be excavated to secure a depth of ten feet, and the estimated cost of doing the work, including the expense already incurred by dredging thereat.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief relative to the erection of a platform south of Sixty-third street, East river, under permission to Ehreureich Brothers, on April 24, 1878, and advising that about 1,900 square feet of land under water had been filled in and reclaimed and a retaining wall built; and, being read, was

On motion, laid on the table; and the Secretary directed to request the said Ehreureich Brothers to attend the next meeting of the Board.

An application was received from the Manhattan Beach Railroad Company for permission to erect a shed at the outer end of the pier at Twenty-third street, East river, for the protection of passengers; and, being read, was

On motion, laid on the table, and the Secretary directed to request the Captain of the Port to advise this Board whether the said pier has been heretofore, and prior to May 6, 1875, used for the landing and discharging of sailing vessels regularly employed in foreign commerce, and having a draft of more than 18 feet of water, as required under chapter 249, Laws of 1875.

The following communications were received, read, and, on motion placed on file, action being taken where deemed necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Department of Public Works—Notices that two Free Floating Baths had been located for the season, one at pier at Thirty-seventh street, East river, and one at pier between One Hundred and Thirtieth and One Hundred and Fourteenth streets, Harlem river, and requesting that fender floats be placed around the said baths. Engineer-in-Chief directed to do such work as may be necessary to afford secure berths for the baths.

From Engineer-in-Chief—

1. Report as to repairs being required to certain piers on the North and East rivers. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make necessary repairs to bulkhead south of Pier, old 54, and at Fourteenth street, and to piers at Thirtieth, Twenty-fourth, Twenty-fifth, Twenty-sixth, Forty-seventh, Fifty-first, Fifty-seventh, and One Hundred and Thirty-first streets, North river, and to Piers 6, 23, 43, 61, and at Thirty-seventh, Thirty-eighth, and Fifty-third streets, East river, in conformity with said report, but the work at any one place not to exceed, in cost, \$1,000.

2. Report of work performed during week ending May 25, 1878.

3. Report as to repairs needed to the northerly half of Pier 62, East river, and that the work of making such repairs had been completed.

4. Relative to the lighting of piers at Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth streets, North river, being requested by the Department of Public Works. Engineer-in-Chief directed to do such portion of the work of erecting the lamps as may belong to this Department, and to have the same properly placed and protected.

Mr. Withers, being present on behalf of the Nassau Ferry Company, was heard at length in relation to the plans proposed for the improvement of ferry premises at foot of Houston street, East river.

The Board here went into executive session.

A communication was received from S. L. Merchant and Company, offering to furnish to the Department 1,000 barrels "Great Float" Portland cement, at \$2.54 per barrel, "to arrive;" and, being read, was

On motion, referred to the Engineer-in-Chief as to the advisability of purchasing said cement.

A communication was received from the Engineer-in-Chief relative to the proposed change in the width and location of Pier, new 40, North river; and, being read,

On motion, the following preamble and resolution was unanimously adopted, to wit:

Whereas, In proceeding with the work of constructing the permanent improvement of the water
