

The 659 deaths represent a death-rate of 18.64 against 19.50 for the previous week, and 22.23 for the corresponding week of 1891.

The decrease of 30 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 7 in the deaths from typhoid fever, of 10 from diarrhoeal diseases, of 9 from cancer, of 9 from phthisis, and of 14 from diseases of the digestive organs, partly offset by an increase of 6 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 4 from pneumonia, and of 5 from Bright's disease.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards, from scarlet fever in the Eleventh and two deaths from measles were in the Sixth and Twenty-second Wards.
