Minutes of Meeting of Art Commission, Held at its Office, Room 21, City Hall, on Tuesday, October 10, 1905, at 4 o'clock p. m.

Present—President de Forest, presiding; Commissioners Healy, Farragut, Beckwith, Proctor, Cook and Hon. Michael J. Kennedy, Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, in respect to the designs for the Prison Ship Martyrs Monument.

On communications from Commissioners Bigelow and Crimmins, explaining their absence, they were excused.

The Committee on Prison Ship Martyrs Monument presented the following report upon designs (of a new work of art) submitted by the Prison Ship Martyrs Monument Association:

"At the meeting of the Art Commission on August 8, your Committee recommended that the designs before the Commission at that time 'be disapproved for the reason that the location submitted is not the best available site in that locality,' and this recommendation was unanimously adopted by the Commission.

"A new submission has now been made which provides for a monument of the same design as originally submitted, but for a new location at the intersection of the centre lines of Willoughby street and Willoughby avenue, and of the flight of steps forming the approach, which has been modified somewhat to provide for a more gradual ascent. This change meets the views expressed by the Commission, and your

Committee begs to recommend, therefore, that the designs and the proposed location be approved."

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

The Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Armory Board:

Dear Sir—The Committee on Armories beg to report that at a meeting held Tuesday, October 3, 1905, the subjects referred to it were considered as follows:

The application of Clinton & Russell, architects for the new Seventy-first Regiment Armory, recommending the omission of the covering to pipes and the rising lines and branches concealed in the walls and floors, without additional expense. The Committee recommend that the application be granted.

The application for payment to the Fleischmann Realty and Construction Company, covering carpenter work which was found to be not in accord with the specifications, was considered, and the Committee recommend that \$5,000 be withheld from said payment on account of such omission and change.

The application of Clinton & Russell, architects for the new Seventy-first Regiment Armory, to substitute red quarry tile for terrazzo in the main vestibule, was then considered. A communication from the architects, of date September 29, 1905, was received, highly recommending this substitution, and exhibiting a sample thereof to the Committee. The Committee recommend that the change be authorized without additional expense to the Armory Board.

The application of Kennedy & Son, contractors, for Squadron "C" armory, requesting a change in their contract relative to the roof, was again considered. Their appearance with counsel on September 28, 1905, is here noted.

Mr. Pilcher, of the architects for the building, appeared before the Committee.

Brigadier-General Smith, of the Committee, reported having made a personal examination of the sample roofs named in the specifications.

The Committee point to the Twelfth Regiment Armory roof and that part of the Eighth Regiment Armory roof on the Administration Building, which was in place at the date of the contract of Messrs. Kennedy & Son, as being the roofs intended to be described by the specifications, and such as will be approved by the Armory Board.

The Committee recommend that no change in the contract be made, and that the architects be directed to notify the contractors to proceed immediately and rapidly with the roof referred to, in order that the same may be in place before inclement weather.

Colonel Thurston, recently assigned to the command of the Twenty-second Regiment, N. G., N. Y., appeared before the Committee, and recommended extensive repairs to the armory of that organization, which the Committee promised to consider.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
