April 26. Consolidated Gas Company—

To dredge in front of the bulkheads between West Forty-fourth and West Forty-fifth and between West Forty-fifth and West Forty-sixth streets, North river, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

To repair its water-front property in the Borough of Brooklyn, from time to time, as required, within existing lines, and to dredge in the various slips in front thereof, at least twenty-four hours' notice to be given prior to the commencement of any work, and all work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, the permit to terminate December 31, 1904.

April 28. New York Telephone Company—

To erect an iron upright on the bulkhead adjoining the northerly side of Twenty-third street, East river, for the purpose of supplying telephone connection to the New York Yacht Club's house, foot of said street, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, the upright to remain only during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

The following permits were revoked:

April 23. Sound View Land and Improvement Company—

For the construction of a bulkhead-wall along the bulkhead-line in front of its property on the easterly side of the Bronx river, opposite Hunt's Point, the Engineer-in-Chief having reported on Secretary's Order No. 20303 that the company does not intend to avail itself of the permit granted August 13, 1900.

April 23. Montauk Steamboat Company—
For the extension of Pier 13, East river, the Engineer-in-Chief having reported on Bureau Order No. 1955, that the company does not now desire to avail itself of the permit granted December 4, 1903.

April 23. Catskill and New York Steamboat Company—
For the occupation of a berth on the north side of the West Fiftieth Street Pier, the Superintendent of Docks having reported that the company discontinued the use of the berth on April 23, 1904.

April 26. Chris. Emille—
For the occupation of space at One Hundred and Thirty-second street and Park avenue, Harlem river, to take effect May 1, 1904, he having advised the Department that he will not require the premises after that date.

April 26. William Marshall—
For berthing steam yacht "Atlantic" on the north side of the West Fiftieth Street Pier, he having stated that he does not now require the berth.

On April 28, 1904, the Commissioner appointed James J. F. Gavigan as Architect for the preparation of plans and specifications for a new ferry terminal house at the foot of Whitehall street at the Manhattan terminal of the Staten Island Ferry, the plans and specifications to contemplate an expenditure not to exceed \$100,000, and compensation to be at the regular rate as designated by the American Institute of Architects.

Requesting to be advised as to when the Department proposes to proceed with the work of improvement of the water front between One Hundred and Twentieth and One Hundred and Twenty-third streets, Harlem river. Notified April 28, 1904, that the matter of improvement at the section referred to will be given attention at the earliest possible time.

1st. Report for the week ending April 25, 1904, regarding progress and completion of work under his supervision. Filed.

2d. Submitting list of old material and recommending that same be sold. Thomas Bowe, auctioneer, authorized April 26, 1904, to sell same at public auction.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
