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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 2 o'clock p. m., on Friday, June 11, 1909.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; James J. Martin, Chamberlain; Patrick F. McGowan, President, Board of Aldermen and Timothy P. Sullivan, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to a lease of water-front property between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, South Brooklyn, to the Commercial Coal Company:

June 2, 1909.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—After due consideration I am of the opinion that the interests of the City would be best served by a lease to the Commercial Coal Company of the following described platform:

Beginning at a point in the existing sheet pile bulkhead between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, South Brooklyn, distant 930 feet westerly from the west line of First avenue and 130 feet northerly from the westerly prolongation of the northerly line of Fifty-second street; running thence northerly and parallel with the west line of First avenue 100.35 feet to the westerly prolongation of the centre line of Fifty-first street.

Thence easterly along the westerly prolongation of the centre line of Fifty-first street 30 feet.

Thence southerly and again parallel with First avenue 100.35 feet; and

Thence westerly and parallel with the westerly prolongation of the centre line of Fifty-first street 30 feet to the point or place of beginning.

The lessee shall have the privilege of erecting upon said platform the necessary structures and appliances for carrying on the coal business.

The lease to be for a term of five years commencing on the date that said platform shall be completed and ready for occupancy, with privilege of renewal for a further term of five years. The rental shall be at the rate of \$1,500 per annum for the first term and for the renewal term 10 per cent. advance over the first.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by this Department.

Beginning at a point in the existing sheet pile bulkhead between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, South Brooklyn, distant 930 feet westerly from the west line of First avenue and 130 feet northerly from the westerly prolongation of the northerly line of Fifty-second street; running thence northerly and parallel with the west line of First avenue 100.35 feet to the westerly prolongation of the centre line of Fifty-first street 30 feet to the point or place of beginning.

—the lessee to have the privilege of erecting upon said platform the necessary structures and appliances for carrying on the coal business.

The lease to be for a term of five years commencing on the date that said platform shall be completed and ready for occupancy, with privilege of renewal for a further term of five years. The rental shall be at the rate of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) per annum for the first term, and for the renewal term 10 per cent. advance over the first. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries and as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks in communication dated June 2, 1909.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to a lease of the south side of the pier at the foot of West Forty-first street, Borough of Manhattan, to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey:

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—After due consideration I am of the opinion that the interests of the City would be best served by a lease to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey of the following described property:

The south side of the pier at the foot of West Forty-first street, commencing at a line in said pier about 700 feet from the outer end (being the easterly line of the property leased to E. E. Olcott) and extending inshore a distance of 95 feet, more or less, to the westerly end of the existing dumping board now used by the Consolidated Gas Company, including the use of the entire surface of the pier (opposite the 95 feet), subject, however, to all the rights of the Consolidated Gas Company by virtue of an agreement made December 9, 1903, between the said company and The City of New York, by the Commissioner of Docks, for a term commencing from the first day of the month next succeeding the date upon which said lease shall be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a rental of \$1,200 per annum, and for the renewal term, if any, 10 per cent. advance on rental for first term; and shall be co-terminous with the existing lease to E. E. Olcott of the outer 700 feet of said pier or any renewal thereof.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by this Department.

The south side of the pier at the foot of West Forty-first street, commencing at a line in said pier about 700 feet from the outer end (being the easterly line of the property leased to E. E. Olcott) and extending inshore a distance of 95 feet, more or less, to the westerly end of the existing dumping board now used by the Consolidated Gas Company, including the use of the entire surface of the pier (opposite the 95 feet), subject, however, to all the rights of the Consolidated Gas Company by virtue of an agreement made December 9, 1903, between the said company and The City of New York, by the Commissioner of Docks, for a term commencing from the first day of the month next succeeding the date upon which said lease shall be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a rental of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) per annum and for the renewal term, if any, 10 per cent. advance on rental for the first term; and shall be co-terminous with the existing lease to E. E. Olcott of the outer 700 feet of said pier or any renewal thereof.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries, and as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks in communication dated June 2, 1909.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, relative to a lease of the northerly half of the pier, foot of East Fourth street, East River, to James Shewan & Sons:

May 10, 1909.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—After due consideration I am of the opinion that the interests of the City would be best served by the granting of a lease to James Shewan & Sons of the northerly half of the pier, foot of East Fourth street, East River, commencing at the outer end of said pier and extending inshore a distance of 342.47 feet, with privilege of mooring a dry dock thereat, for a term of five (5) years, from May 1, 1909, at a rental of \$2,000 per annum, with privilege of one renewal for a further term of five (5) years at an advance of 10 per cent.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by this Department.

Under a lease dated June 6, 1899, James Shewan & Sons became the lessees of the northerly half of the pier, foot of East Fourth street, together with the bulkhead and return along the northerly side of said street, said return being about 250 feet in length, with privilege of berthing a dry dock thereat, for a term of ten years from the 1st day of May, 1899.

Under the lease, as proposed, the rental will be increased about 14 per cent., and in addition the bulkhead return, about 250 feet in length, will revert to the City for general wharfage purposes.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries, and as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks in communication dated May 10, 1909.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Department of Street Cleaning, relative to a lease of the premises at No. 872 Bergen street, Borough of Brooklyn:

SIR—I request the consent and approval of your Board, pursuant to section 541 of the Charter, for a lease from Charles E. Heney (residing at No. 438 Third street, Brooklyn) of the westerly store of No. 872 Bergen street, Borough of Brooklyn, with a portion of the cellar beneath, 20 feet by 20 feet, for the term of three years, beginning with May 1, 1909, at the annual rental of \$300, payable quarterly, the lessor to furnish sufficient toilet facilities and to put and keep the premises in good tenantable condition and repair and to pay for the water used on the premises during the term of the lease. The store is described as 12 feet by 50 feet and this leasehold is intended to take the place of the lease of premises at No. 753 Bergen street, which expired May 1, 1909.

SIR—The Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in a communication addressed to his Honor the Mayor as Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requests the consent and approval of the Commissioners, pursuant to section 541 of the Charter, to a lease from Charles E. Heney, residing at No. 438 Third street, Brooklyn, of the westerly store of No. 872 Bergen street, Borough of Brooklyn, with a portion of the cellar beneath, 20 by 20 feet, for the term of three years beginning May 1, 1909, at an annual rental of \$300, payable quarterly; the lessor to furnish sufficient toilet facilities and to put and keep the premises in good tenantable condition and repair and to pay for water used on the premises during the term of the lease.

The property desired to be leased takes the place of the premises at No. 753 Bergen street, the lease of which expired May 1, 1909, and is a small store about 9 by 50 feet, and the cellar underneath, 8 by 45 feet.

The highest price paid for stores of these dimensions in this block is \$15 a month, which is paid by the barber. The other stores rent as low as \$12, and some at \$13. The rent so paid includes the use of a coal bin in the cellar.

If the City obtains a portion of the cellar, 8 by 45 feet, and it is partitioned off, it will be worth \$5 additional a month, making a total rental value of \$20 a month.

I have been informed that the owner of the property is one James J. Kinsella, although the Commissioner desires the lease made with Charles E. Heney. I therefore assume that Mr. Heney has the property under lease from the owner and that the City is a sublessee.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning and authorize a lease from Charles E. Heney, residing at No. 438 Third street, Brooklyn, of the westerly store of No. 872 Bergen street, near Clason avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, with a portion of the cellar beneath not less than 8 by 45 feet, for the term of three years from May 1, 1909, at an annual rental of \$240, payable quarterly; the lessor to furnish sufficient toilet facilities and to put and keep the premises in good tenantable condition and repair and to pay for the water used on the premises during the term of the lease.

In the matter of Claim No. 57451 of the Globe Storage and Carpet Cleaning Company for the sum of \$500 for rent of premises Nos. 305 and 307 East Sixty-first street, Borough of Manhattan, rented to the Bureau of Elections for the months of January, February and March, 1909.

J. T. MAHONEY, Esq., Chief, Bureau of Law and Adjustment:

SIR—Under date of April 13, 1909, there was filed in this Department by the Globe Storage and Carpet Cleaning Company a claim for the sum of \$500 for the

rent of premises Nos. 305 and 307 East Sixty-first street to the Bureau of Elections for the months of January, February and March, 1909, at the rate of \$166.66 per month.

Under date of April 22, 1909, George W. Van Sycle appeared and gave the following testimony concerning this claim: He stated that he resides at premises known as No. 200 East Sixty-second street, Borough of Manhattan; that he holds the office of secretary of the claimant company, which is a corporation existing under and by virtue of the Laws of the State of New York; that as such secretary he is familiar with the details connected with this claim; that it amounts to the sum of \$500 and is for three months' rent for premises Nos. 305 and 307 East Sixty-first street; that said premises are owned by the claimant company and were rented from January 1, 1908, to December 31, 1908, to the Bureau of Elections at a yearly rental of \$2,000; that on December 31, 1908, the lease expired, but the City held over in possession until March 31, 1909, at which time the City was requested to vacate; that there was no lease in existence for the months of January, February and March, 1909, but the City had the use and it occupied said quarters all of said period, and that the rental set forth in the lease is due and owing at the sum of \$500.

Under date of April 6, 1909, Michael T. Daly, Chief Clerk of the Board of Elections, in a communication to the Comptroller dated April 6, 1909, states that the Board of Elections received a written notice to quit and surrender the premises in East Sixty-first street on April 1, 1909, and that they did surrender possession of said premises at 2:30 p. m. on March 31, 1909, at which time the property belonging to the Board was out of the building; that the key of said premises was accepted by William Wack, who was in charge of the warehouse at the time; that there was no lease for said period, as the lease had expired on December 31, 1908. Enclosed with said communication was a copy of a communication from the Globe Storage and Carpet Cleaning Company, signed A. B. Yetter, President. In this communication the company requested possession of the premises on the ninth floor of premises Nos. 305 and 307 East Sixty-first street at 12 o'clock noon on April 1, 1909.

Mortimer J. Brown, Appraiser of Real Estate in this Department, in a report dated April 21, 1909, verifies the facts set forth in the testimony of the representative of the claimant company, and states that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the meeting on April 21, 1909, adopted a resolution authorizing the lease of premises on Second avenue, which were to take the place of premises vacated by the Board of Elections, belonging to the Globe Storage and Carpet Cleaning Company of East Sixty-first street. The Appraiser recommends that this claim be submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in order that the necessary resolution be adopted authorizing the payment of the sum of \$500 from the fund of Rents, to the claimant company for the holdover period of January, February and March, 1909, at a monthly rental of \$166.66, upon being assured that the company does not intend to hold the City for one year's rent as a holdover tenant.

There was received in the Auditing Bureau of this Department on January 21, March 4 and March 31, 1909, three vouchers drawn to the order of the President of the Globe Storage and Carpet Cleaning Company in the sum of \$166.66 each for rent of premises Nos. 305 and 307 East Sixty-first street, for the months of January, February and March, 1909. Said vouchers were certified to by Michael T. Daly, Chief Clerk of the Board of Elections, together with Commissioners Dooling, Kane and Fuller. These vouchers were never audited in this Department, as there was no lease in existence for this period, and no resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorizing the payment thereof.

William J. King, an Examiner in this Department, in a report dated May 12, 1909, verifies the facts in the various communications above set forth, and recommends that after proper action by the Sinking Fund Commission, claimant be paid the sum of \$500.

In view of the foregoing, it is respectfully recommended that this report and all papers be forwarded to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the adoption of the necessary resolution authorizing the payment of the rent of premises Nos. 305 and 307 East Sixty-first street, for the months of January, February and March, 1909, during which period said premises were occupied by the Board of Elections without a lease, and it is also recommended that after the adoption of said resolution, and the audit of vouchers for the payment of this rent, that a general release be obtained from the claimant company of any and all claims it might have against The City of New York for rent of said premises by reason of holdover after the expiration of the lease of 1908.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller, No. 280 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—I have been informed that at the meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held on the 26th ult., the matter of authorizing the sale of buildings remaining at the site at the Manhattan plaza of the Manhattan Bridge, in the block bounded by the Bowery, Canal street, Chrystie street and Bayard street, was laid over for future consideration.

The sale of these buildings at public auction had already been authorized by resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, adopted on April 21, 1909. In view, however, of the recent amendment to section 1553 of the Greater New York Charter, whereby the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are empowered to sell buildings upon receipt of sealed bids therefor, and on your request, I agreed that the sale of these buildings be deferred to a date not later than June 10, 1909, in order that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund might adopt a resolution authorizing the sale of the buildings upon the receipt of sealed bids instead of at public auction.

It is very unfortunate that delay has occurred in the removal of the buildings at the bridge plaza. The entire plaza area should have been graded before this. The contractor for the construction of the bridge approaches, Mr. John C. Rodgers, is under contract obligation to do this grading. Under the terms of his contract with the City he shall complete all the work by September 1, 1909.

Bids were opened yesterday for all the paving required for the bridge and approaches, and for all the track work on the bridge. Under this proposed contract the roadway approaching the bridge from the Bowery and Canal street must be constructed.

The plans for railway equipment at the plaza are completed and it is expected to contract for some of this work before the end of the summer.

With buildings still remaining on the plaza, the City is in the dilemma of having contracted for work to be done on land not yet cleared of structures and of being ready to contract for further work on the same land.

I therefore respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the immediate sale of all the buildings remaining on land acquired for the purposes of the Manhattan Bridge and located in the block bounded by the Bowery, Canal street, Chrystie street and Bayard street, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Negative—The Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to the action of the Armory Board in accepting the bid of S. Motta for Item No. 5, furnishing and installing Observer Station in the armory of the Thirteenth Coast Artillery District, Borough of Brooklyn, in the sum of \$1,574:

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Armory Board, held June 7, 1909, the following was adopted:

"Resolved, That the bid of S. Motta, No. 201 Mott street, Borough of Manhattan, for Item No. 5, furnishing and installing Observer Station in the armory of the Thirteenth Coast Artillery District, Borough of Brooklyn, in the sum of \$1,574, be accepted, being the lowest formal bid received for said work; that the same be submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for concurrence and to the Comptroller for his approval of the sureties thereon, and when so approved, the Chairman of the Armory Board be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of the Board; that all the other bids be rejected and the Comptroller requested to return the deposits received from the unsuccessful bidders."

SIR—The Board of Education at a meeting held May 26, 1909, adopted a resolution which is hereto annexed, turning over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for such disposition as they may deem advisable the old Public School 8, situated on the northerly side of Middagh street, west of Henry street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Old Public School 8 was acquired by four separate deeds, two of which deeds, upon which the present school house now stands, were given to the City July 31, 1845, and July 8, 1847, the total consideration being for the two parcels \$4,550.93. The plot upon which the playground is situated, being 48 feet in width, was acquired March 1, 1876, in two separate deeds for the consideration of \$14,500, making a total consideration of \$19,050.93.

The Commissioner of the Department of Police in a communication dated June 4, 1909, requests that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund turn over to the Police Department the premises recently turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by the Board of Education and formerly occupied by Public School 8, for the purpose of erecting thereon a stationhouse, prison and stable for the One Hundred and Fiftieth Police Precinct, for the reason that the stationhouse now occupied by the Police Department in lower Fulton street, Brooklyn, is unfit for the use of the Department.

I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund receive from the Board of Education the premises described in the resolution, in accordance with the provisions of section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter, and in accordance with the same section, turn over to the Commissioner of the Department of Police the said old Public School 8, on Middagh street, near Henry street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the purpose of erecting thereon a stationhouse, prison and stable for the One Hundred and Fiftieth Police Precinct, the Comptroller to dispose of the old school building and contents prior to the taking of physical possession by the Police Department.

Whereas, The Police Commissioner, in a communication dated June 4, 1909, has requested the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to turn said property over to the Police Department for the purpose of erecting thereon a station house, prison and stable for the One Hundred and Fiftieth Police Precinct; and

Whereas, It is considered desirable to clear the said property of the buildings, appurtenances thereto and contents therein before the said property is turned over to the Police Department; it is therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by virtue of the powers vested in them by law, hereby authorize and order the sale at public auction or by sealed bids, at the highest marketable prices, of all the buildings, contents and appurtenances thereto upon the following terms and conditions:

The buildings and appurtenances thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay immediately cash or a certified check drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also at the time of sale give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of fifty dollars, the sum of fifty dollars shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the sidewalk and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area and down to the level of the cellar bottom, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point; also the foundation walls of all classes shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances or any part thereof within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the costs and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The petition of the North Western Dispensary in The City of New York respectfully shows to your Board:

That by chapter 441 of the Laws of 1907, a copy of which is hereto annexed, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York were authorized in their discretion and upon such terms as they may deem proper, to remit the taxes imposed for the years 1895 and 1896 on the property of the dispensary, situated on the northwesterly corner of Ninth avenue and Thirty-sixth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, occupied by its dispensary building, provided said Commissioners are satisfied that all revenues derived by said dispensary during said years, from so much of said building as was occupied by tenants or used for business purposes, were applied by it to its charitable objects in maintaining a dispensary or hospital for the gratuitous treatment of the sick poor in said city.

That the North Western Dispensary in The City of New York is a corporation duly incorporated under the laws of this State for charitable purposes, and is the owner of the real estate situated on the northwesterly corner of Ninth avenue and Thirty-sixth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, occupied by the dispensary building, and known as Nos. 469 and 471 Ninth avenue, and designated on the tax map as Lot No. 30 in Block 734, Section 3, in the Borough of Manhattan, and that the said North Western Dispensary in The City of New York has been the owner of said real estate since about the month of October, 1869.

That no officer or member of the corporation receives any compensation whatever, and that no employee receives or is entitled to receive any pecuniary profit except reasonable compensation for services in effecting the purposes of the corporation, and that the institution is supported by voluntary contributions and rents derived from stores on ground floor and a hall on the top floor, all of which rents are and always have been devoted to the purposes of the dispensary.

That the object of said dispensary is to furnish medicines and medical and surgical aid to the deserving poor without any charge whatever, and that as appears by the records of the institution 40,390 patients were treated and 84,922 prescriptions were dispensed during the year 1895, and 39,862 patients were treated and 87,228 prescriptions were dispensed during the year 1896, without any fee or charge whatever, and that all the revenues derived by the dispensary during said years 1895 and 1896 from so much of the dispensary building as was occupied by tenants or used for business purposes, were applied by the dispensary to its charitable objects in maintaining a dispensary or hospital for the gratuitous treatment of the sick poor in this city.

That the real estate of said dispensary was exempted from taxation until the year 1895, in which year and the following years, down to and including the year 1904, it was assessed for taxation.

That the officers of the dispensary were not aware that the dispensary property had been assessed for taxation, and therefore made no application for exemption, and that the fact that the dispensary property had been taxed only became known to them when in the year 1905 the dispensary property was advertised to be sold for the taxes for the years 1895 to 1901. That thereupon an application was made to the City authorities that the property of the dispensary be declared exempt from taxation and that the taxes thereon be remitted, and such proceedings were thereupon had that upon the recommendation of the Corporation Counsel all of said taxes were remitted except for the years 1895 and 1896, in regard to which years the Corporation Counsel reported that an enabling act must be passed by the Legislature, in order to vest in the City authorities the power to remit the taxes for the years 1895 and 1896.

That thereupon application was made to the Legislature to pass an enabling act, giving power to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to take such action as they might deem proper in regard to remitting the taxes on the dispensary property for the years 1895 and 1896, and as a result of such application chapter 441 of the Laws of 1907 was enacted granting the requisite authority to remit said taxes.

The property of said dispensary has been advertised to be sold on the seventh day of June, 1909, for the taxes for the years 1895 and 1896, the taxes for the year 1895 being \$577.80 and the taxes for the year 1896 being \$515.70; and your petitioner now asks that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York may take such action in carrying out the provisions of the aforesaid act of the Legislature as they may deem proper.

Chapter 441.

An Act to authorize the commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New York, in their discretion and upon such terms as they may deem proper, to remit certain taxes upon property of the northwestern dispensary in the city of New York.

Became a law June 6, 1907, with the approval of the Governor.

Passed, three-fifths being present.

Accepted by the City.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New York are hereby authorized, in their discretion and upon such terms as they may deem proper to remit the taxes imposed for the years eighteen hundred and ninety-five and eighteen hundred and ninety-six, on the property of the northwestern dispensary, situated on the northwesterly corner of Ninth avenue and Thirty-sixth street, in the borough of Manhattan in the city of New York, occupied by its dispensary building, provided said commissioners are satisfied that all revenues derived by said dispensary during said years, from so much of said building as was occupied by tenants or used for business purposes, were applied by it to its charitable objects in maintaining a dispensary or hospital for the gratuitous treatment of the sick poor in said city.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Northwestern Dispensary in The City of New York has presented to The City of New York a petition for the cancellation of the taxes for the years 1895 and 1896 on its real property, situated at the northwesterly corner of Ninth avenue and Thirty-sixth street, and known as Nos. 469 and 471 Ninth avenue, designated on the tax map as Lot No. 30, Block 734, Section 3, Borough of Manhattan. Said petition is verified by the affidavit of the President, Amos Maynard Lyon, and Treasurer, John Hardy.

It appears by said petition that the Northwestern Dispensary is a corporation duly incorporated under the laws of this State for charitable purposes, and is the owner of the real estate described in said petition, and has been the owner thereof since about the month of October, 1869; that no officer or member of the corporation receives any compensation whatever, and that no employee receives or is entitled to receive any pecuniary profit, except reasonable compensation for services in effecting the purposes of the corporation, and that the institution is supported by voluntary contributions and rents derived from stores on the ground floor and a hall on the top floor, all of which rents are and always have been devoted to the purposes of the dispensary.

It appears from the records of the Department of Taxes and Assessments that the property of the dispensary has been exempt from local taxation until the year 1895, in which year and the following years down to and including the year 1904 it was assessed for taxation. In the year 1905 proceedings were taken whereby the Comptroller, upon the recommendation of the Corporation Counsel, remitted all taxes, except for the years 1895 and 1896, in regard to which years the Corporation Counsel advised that an enabling act must be passed by the Legislature in order to vest in the City authorities the power to remit the taxes for the years 1895 and 1896.

Upon application to the Legislature such an enabling act was passed and became a law known as chapter 441, Laws of 1907, granting the requisite authority to remit said taxes.

The taxes in question are as follows: 1895, \$515.70; 1896, \$577.80.

That by chapter 441, Laws of 1907, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York are authorized, in their discretion, and upon such terms as they may deem proper, to remit the taxes imposed for the years 1895 and 1896 on the property of the dispensary, situated on the northwesterly corner of Ninth avenue and Thirty-sixth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, occupied by its dispensary building, provided said Commissioners are satisfied that all revenues derived by said dispensary during said years from so much of said building as was occupied by tenants or used for business purposes were applied by it to its charitable objects in maintaining a dispensary or hospital for the gratuitous treatment of the sick poor in this City.

Said property is again advertised to be sold under certificate No. 1047 for these taxes. As there is no doubt that all the revenues derived by said dispensary during these years have been applied by it to its charitable objects in maintaining a dispensary or hospital for the gratuitous treatment of the sick poor in The City of New York, I would recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund direct the Comptroller to cancel on the records of the City the following taxes for the years 1895, in the sum of \$515.70, and 1896, in the sum of \$577.80 on Lot No. 30, Block 734, Section 3, Borough of Manhattan, upon payment of the sum of five dollars.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, submitting for approval a proposed new plan layout for the improvement of the water-front between Gansevoort and Bloomfield streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan.

A public hearing being necessary, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907, the following resolution was offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix the hour of 11 o'clock in the forenoon, on Wednesday, June 30, 1909, in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter of the proposed new plan layout for the improvement of the water-front between Gansevoort and Bloomfield streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law, June 11, 1909, and transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller brought up the matter of the proposed lease of premises at the corner of One Hundred and Sixty-second street and St. Nicholas avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for the President of the Borough of Manhattan, and the occupation by the said President of premises at Nos. 1907 to 1911 Amsterdam avenue.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to put the matter on the calendar of the next meeting.

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From April 18 to April 24 inclusive, thirty operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, eighteen at Gouverneur Hospital, eighteen at Harlem Hospital, and twelve at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their assistants were present.

A fire drill was held at Bellevue Hospital on April 19, at Gouverneur Hospital on April 20, at Harlem Hospital on April 23, and at Fordham Hospital on April 24.

A Special Nurse for day and night duty was requested by Dr. Brown to care for a case in Ward 19. The patient was extremely ill and the Nurses were undoubtedly needed. Dr. Alexander requested a Special Nurse to care for a post operative case in Ward 15. The patient being in very poor condition and having had severe hemorrhages following the operation, the Nurse was allowed. The approval of the Board in these two cases is desired.

An error was made in notifying the Civil Service Commission of the appointing officers of this Department for non-competitive positions. In the letter sent the Civil Service Board these appointing committees were designated "Boards of Promotion." This should be changed to read "Appointing Boards." A Board of Promotion should be appointed whose duty it shall be to supervise the keeping of the efficiency records. It is recommended that this Board of Promotion consist of the General Medical Superintendent, the General Superintendent of Training Schools, and the Assistant Superintendent.

Letters have been received from the Firemen at Gouverneur Hospital stating that the conditions there as to the handling of coal are almost unbearable. They ask that coal passers be supplied and it is believed that some such assistance should be given them. There is no such grade in this Department and, as it is a Civil Service position, the decision of your Board is asked for as to whether or not these employees should be supplied, and if so, in what manner they should be supplied.

A request has been received from several members of the house staff that the tennis court be put in good condition. In order to do this the entire court must be covered with about three inches of clay, and it is estimated that this will cost about \$250. It is recommended that the expenditure of a sufficient sum to place the court in good condition be authorized.

Submitted herewith is a letter from the State Commission in Lunacy notifying us that we are entitled to charge \$25 for the care of a patient, Bertha Corowsky, who was landed under a bond by the Immigration Department that she was not to become a public charge. The bill should be rendered to the Hon. Robert W. Watchhorn, Commissioner, Ellis Island.

Submitted herewith is a bill from the Watertown Engine Company dated October 31. The bill lacks one signature, that of Mr. Jones, Supervising Engineer. Mr. Jones states that he had nothing to do with the work and cannot check up the bill. Is it the desire of the Board that this bill be put through without Mr. Jones' signature?

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the action of the General Medical Superintendent in supplying Special Nurses at the request of the Visiting Surgeons was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent, the General Superintendent of Training Schools, and the Assistant Superintendent, were appointed the Board of Promotions.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was decided to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to establish the grade of Coal Passer in the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for three incumbents, at \$2 a day, and in the meantime to ask the permission of the Civil Service Commission for the employment of three Hospital Helpers at \$30 a month and maintenance, to act as Coal Passers at Gouverneur Hospital, the wages to be paid out of the contingent fund until a transfer of funds can be made.

Office of the Department of Parks, Brooklyn and Queens, Litchfield Mansion, Prospect Park, Brooklyn, April 1, 1909.

Sir—I have the honor to submit to you herewith, in accordance with the provisions of section 1544 of the Charter, a quarterly report of the proceedings and finances of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, from January 1, 1909, to March 31, 1909, inclusive.

Statement of Work Performed by the Department of Parks of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, During the Three Months From January 1 to March 31, 1909.

Owing to the weather conditions of the first quarter of the year 1909, the work of the Department was necessarily confined to maintaining the parks and parkways in good condition and preparing for the spring planting season.

The roadways in Prospect Park, as well as those on the Ocean parkway, Eastern parkway, Shore road, Twenty-second avenue, Fort Hamilton avenue, Highland Park and Forest Park were kept in constant repair, and at the beginning of the spring season were in good condition.

Preparations for the planting of upward of twenty thousand (20,000) flowering shrubs throughout Prospect Park were made, and the work of digging the holes to receive the same was begun.

Late in the fall a contract was entered into for the delivery of five thousand (5,000) cubic yards of topsoil in Prospect Park, and the contractor has started work under his contract.

Large quantities of humus peat, wood ashes and other fertilizers purchased late in the fall were applied early in the spring, with a view to thereby stimulating plant life and give our trees and shrubbery increased vigor.

The temporary skating house in Prospect Park, which had been erected late in the fall, was removed, and the ground formerly occupied by the same was regraded and seeded. Owing to the weather conditions, there was no skating during the past season.

The work of taking out the dead wood, removing dead trees, pruning and cleaning of vegetation in Prospect Park was continued, and I am pleased to state that I consider the trees and shrubbery in this park in better condition at the present time than they have been for many years.

All the rolling stock of the Department was put in thorough repair and painted. The settees throughout the park system were collected, repaired, painted and redistributed. The steam rollers were repaired by contract, and are about ready to be put in commission.

Kings Park in Jamaica was regulated, graded and planted with shrubbery taken from the nursery in Kissena Park, during the month of March.

Greenpoint Park—Work on the grading of Greenpoint Park was continued during the quarter, and it is now in a condition to warrant the expectation that these grounds can be thrown open and used as playgrounds by Decoration Day.

The buildings in course of construction in Fulton Park, New Lots Playground and the tennis house in Prospect Park have made slow progress, owing to the changeable weather. It is hoped, however, that operations will be resumed at an early date, and they will be pushed to a speedy completion.

The golf links in Forest Park received considerable attention during the quarter. They are now in first class condition, and will be kept so throughout the season.

Small Parks.

The small parks throughout the system have received required attention. This is especially true of Bedford, Tompkins, Fort Greene parks and Saratoga square.

Bedford and Tompkins parks were thoroughly overhauled. All the old, diseased trees and shrubbery were removed, and both places entirely rejuvenated. A complete planting plan was prepared for both parks, giving the name, specie, etc., of each tree and shrub, and all important trees were supplied with appropriate labels, thus affording assistance to the students of botany and arboriculture.

In Fort Greene Park all the trees and shrubs within its boundaries, and those on the streets adjoining were thoroughly overhauled, cleaned, pruned and otherwise put in the best possible condition.

The trees and shrubs in Saratoga square, Irving square, Cooper Park and Highland Park were thoroughly pruned, and all the dead wood removed.

Particular attention was not only paid to the trees in Prospect and the other parks, but also to the trees on the City streets, which are under the control of this Department.

During the three months just closed two thousand six hundred and forty (2,640) trees were trimmed and pruned by the small force of men employed in the winter season. Everything is in readiness to start in on the work of systematically caring for the trees on the City streets during the coming spring and summer. When the season for pruning and trimming has been passed, the work of spraying the trees to prevent the encroachment of destructive insects will begin and be prosecuted with vigor.

Revenue from Parks and Parkways.

During the three months from January 1 to March 31, 1909, inclusive, the sum of five thousand one hundred and fifty-four dollars and sixty cents (\$5,154.60) was received from rents of houses, revenue from park privileges and bay window permits, which amount was turned over to the Hon. James J. Martin, City Chamberlain, for deposit to the credit of the Revenue Fund.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the New York City Interborough Railway Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 1909, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the New York City Interborough Railway Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

Whereas, On March 16, 1903, the Board of Aldermen of the City passed an ordinance entitled: "An ordinance granting to the New York City Interborough Railway Company the right or franchise to construct and operate a street surface railroad in, upon and along certain streets, avenues, parkways, highways and bridges of The City of New York"; and

Whereas, Said ordinance was, on March 31, 1903, approved by the Mayor of the City; and

Whereas, Thereafter the Company, on April 3, 1903, filed with the Comptroller of the City a written acceptance, executed March 31, 1903, of said ordinance, and of the terms, conditions and provisions thereof, and an agreement to perform and observe the same; and

Whereas, In and by said ordinance the consent of the Corporation of The City of New York was granted to the Company for the construction, maintenance and operation of the railroad of the Company upon certain enumerated streets, avenues, highways, etc., within said City, and across certain streets, avenues, highways, etc., as may be encountered in its route; and

Whereas, On May 6, 1903, the Company petitioned the Board of Railroad Commissioners of the State of New York for a certificate of public convenience and a necessity under section 59 of the Railroad Law, covering all the routes of said route "First," and also for the certificate of said Board that the conditions prescribed in said section 59 had been complied with, which petition was denied on December 21, 1903; and

Whereas, The Company subsequently applied to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for an order directing the said Board of Railroad Commissioners to issue said certificate, and on December 23, 1904, the said Appellate Division

rendered a decision directing said Board of Railroad Commissioners to grant such certificate with respect to certain of the routes described in said ordinance; and

Whereas, On January 12, 1905, said Board of Railroad Commissioners issued to the Company a certificate of public convenience and a necessity with respect to said certain of the routes described in said ordinance; and

Whereas, On June 16, 1905, the Appellate Division issued an order extending the time required to complete 24 miles of double track railway from July 1, 1905, as required by section 6 of said ordinance, to June 1, 1906, and on May 28, 1906, a similar order was given extending such time to June 1, 1907; and

Whereas, Petitions dated June 26, 1905; June 21, 1906, and March 12, 1907, were presented by the Company to the Board praying for the consent of said Board, as the local authority, to the relinquishment of part of the routes described in said ordinance, and to the substitution therefor of other routes, and also a petition dated May 18, 1906, praying for an extension of time within which to complete the double track railway as prescribed in section 6 of said ordinance; and

Whereas, A contract bearing date of June 25, 1907, was entered into between the Company and the City, giving the consent of the City to said alteration of its routes and extending the time within which to complete twenty-four miles of double track railway eighteen months from the date of the execution of said contract by the Mayor; and

Whereas, On November 12, 1908, the Company petitioned the Board for a further extension of time within which to complete its railway; and

Whereas, On December 11, 1908, a resolution was adopted by the Board which further extended the time within which to complete twenty-four miles of railway to and including June 27, 1909; and

Whereas, Under date of June 23, 1908, the Company petitioned the Board to be relieved from the obligation of making the annual payments for the use of the bridges across the Harlem River specified in section 2, fourth, of said ordinance, and also from all other payments specified in section 2, fourth, of said ordinance, excepting such sums as shall be equal to 3 per cent. of its gross annual receipts during the first five years and 5 per cent. thereafter;

The City hereby grants to the New York City Interborough Railway Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railway, with all connections, turnouts, switches, crossovers, and suitable stands necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railway, by the overhead system of electricity, or any other motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same, in, upon and along the following named streets, avenues, parkways, highways, public places, bridges and viaducts and crossing intersecting streets and highways, all situated in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, City, County and State of New York, namely:

"Second—Commencing at the Rapid Transit station, at the intersection of West One Hundred and Eighty-first street with St. Nicholas avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan; thence on and along said West One Hundred and Eighty-first street in an easterly direction to Washington Bridge; thence along and over Washington Bridge easterly to Aqueduct avenue, Borough of The Bronx; thence northeasterly on and along Aqueduct avenue to Tremont avenue; thence easterly on and along Tremont avenue as it winds and turns to the Transverse road under the Grand Boulevard and Concourse connecting said Tremont avenue; thence easterly on and along the transverse road under the Grand Boulevard and Concourse again to Tremont avenue; thence easterly on and along Tremont avenue to Webster avenue; thence northeasterly on and along Webster avenue upon the tracks of the Union Railway Company of New York City to East One Hundred and Eightieth street; thence easterly on and along said East One Hundred and Eightieth street to Southern boulevard.

"Third—Commencing at the intersection of Broadway and Muscoota street; thence easterly on and along Muscoota street to Kingsbridge road; thence on and along Kingsbridge road over the proposed viaduct or bridge crossing the railroad tracks of the New York and Putnam Railroad Company and the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and across Spuyten Duyvil Creek to and still easterly on and along Kingsbridge road as the same winds and turns to its intersection with the transverse road under the Grand Boulevard and Concourse connecting said Kingsbridge road; thence easterly on and along said transverse road again to Kingsbridge road; thence southerly and easterly on and along Kingsbridge road to its intersection with Third and Pelham avenues; thence on and along Third avenue southerly to East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street; thence south-easterly on and along East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street to Beaumont avenue; thence northeasterly on and along Beaumont avenue again to East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street; thence easterly on and along East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street to Southern

boulevard; thence southerly on and along Southern boulevard to East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street; thence southeasterly on and along East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street to Boston road; thence southerly on and along Boston road to East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street; thence easterly on and along West Farms road or East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street to and across the Eastern boulevard again to East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street; thence easterly on and along East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street to and ending at Locust Point on Long Island Sound.

"Fourth—Commencing at West One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, west of Lenox avenue, Borough of Manhattan; running thence easterly on and along said West One Hundred and Forty-fifth street to and over the One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street Bridge over the Harlem River to East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Borough of The Bronx; thence in an easterly direction on and along said East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to St. Ann's avenue; thence northerly on and along St. Ann's avenue to East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, thence easterly on and along said East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street to its intersection with Leggett avenue or Craven street; thence southerly and easterly on and along Leggett avenue or Craven street to its intersection with Dawson street; thence southeasterly on and along Leggett avenue to its intersection with Randall avenue; thence easterly on and along Randall avenue to the Bronx River.

"Fifth—Commencing at Dongan street and Jerome avenue, Borough of The Bronx; running thence easterly on and along Dongan street to Southern boulevard and Hunts Point road; thence southeasterly on and along Hunts Point road to Long Island Sound."

2. The fourth subdivision of section 2 of said ordinance shall be amended to read as follows:

"The New York City Interborough Railway Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York the following sums of money:

"During the first period of this franchise ending on September 30, 1907, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) and shall be equal to three per cent. of gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000).

"During the remainder of the original term of twenty-five years of this franchise an annual sum which shall not be less than eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500), and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500).

"In addition to the above, the Company shall pay for the use of the three bridges above described, during the first period of this franchise ending on September 30, 1907, the annual sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for each bridge.

"During the succeeding period beginning on September 30, 1907, and ending ten years from the date of this franchise, an annual sum of two thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,250) for each bridge.

"During the succeeding five years of this franchise an annual sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for each bridge.

"During the succeeding five years of this franchise an annual sum of two thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,750) for each bridge, and

"During the remaining five years of this franchise an annual sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for each bridge.

"Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year, after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railroad; provided, however, that the first payment shall only be for that proportion of the above sums as the time of the commencement of operation of any portion of the road, before September 30 next preceding, shall bear to the whole of one year. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and the provisions of the Railroad Law, as it now exists or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies shall be strictly followed. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns to The City of New York for the rights and franchise hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the grantee, its successors or assigns, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute, referring particularly to chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

3. Section 6 of said ordinance shall be amended to read as follows:

"The Company shall complete the construction and put in operation a railway upon the entire length of each of the routes hereinbefore described on or before March 24, 1912, otherwise the franchise right and privilege to construct such railway upon the routes or portions of routes not then constructed and in full operation shall cease and determine."

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—The Company covenants and agrees to abandon and relinquish, and does hereby abandon and relinquish to the City all its right and franchises to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway over the routes, or portions of routes, described in section 1 of said ordinance, approved by the Mayor on March 31, 1903, and amended by contract bearing date of June 25, 1907, but not described in section 1 of said ordinance as amended by this contract, and the Company shall, within one year from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, comply with the provisions of law in regard to the abandonment of the routes, or portions of routes, so abandoned and relinquished, and remove therefrom any and all existing tracks of the Company, otherwise this contract shall be void and of no effect.

Second—This contract shall not become effective unless within thirty (30) days from the date hereof the Company shall pay to the City all sums due pursuant to the fourth subdivision of section 2 of said ordinance, approved by the Mayor on March 31, 1903, as hereby amended.

Third—All the terms and conditions contained in the said ordinance, approved by the Mayor on March 31, 1903, as modified or amended by contract bearing date of June 25, 1907, excepting those which are herein amended or modified, shall remain unchanged, and shall apply to the routes herein described in section 1 of this contract with the same force and effect as when they applied to the routes described in said ordinance, approved March 31, 1903, as amended by said contract bearing date of June 25, 1907, and as though the routes herein described had been specifically described in said ordinance.

Sec. 3. The Company promises, covenants and agrees, on its part and behalf, to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.
