Sewer in Laurel avenue from Gordon street to the property of the Mariners' Family Society, in Sewerage District No. 3-B, in the Second and Fourth Wards, with objection of George W. Vanderbilt et al., filed by William A. Shortt, attorney; Chas. Rosenberg et al., filed by Phillips, Mahoney & Wagner, attorneys; M. Widdecombe et al., filed by J. A. Flannery, attorney; J. Detjens, and John J. O'Rourke, barrier bear. having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of September 11, 1911. Mr. Shortt, attorney, and Mr. Flannery, attorney, by representative, were heard in opposition to the assessment. On motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors for further consideration, and for such equitable adjustment, if any, as may be necessary, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

## Borough of Brooklyn.

PAVING AVENUE J.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving Avenue J, between Coney Island avenue and Ocean avenue, with objections of M. A. Higgins et al., filed by H. G. Blumementhal, attorneys; Linden Hill Cemetery et al., filed by Chas. Oechler, attorney; Philip Mohr et al., filed by A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys; Leonard Koch et al., filed by August F. Beyer, attorney; Mrs. C. Phillipi, Mrs. C. Alferman, Alferman Bros., Wyckoff Heights Taxpayers' Association, Ridgewood Heights Taxpayers' Association, and Miller & Bretzfelder, also copy of testimony taken in the matter, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of September 18, 1911. Mr. Beyer, attorney; Wm. Hearter, representing Coombs & Wilson, attorneys; Chas. Oechler, attorney by representative, and Greene, Hurd & Stowell, attorneys by representative, were heard in opposition to the assessment. Mr. Goldenhurst, president of the Ridgewood Heights Taxpayers' Association, appeared and spoke in favor of the assessment. On motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors with directions to reduce the amount of the assessment on Lots 1, 148 and 117 in Block 2981, and known by the assessment numbers 1, 2 and 3, 15 per cent, pro rata and confirm the assessment as so reduced, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, June 7, 1911.

Present: President James Creelman and Alexander Keogh. The President, Mr. James Creelman, presided.


