The Board of Commissioners met this day.  
Present—President Joseph L. Perley, in the chair, and Commissioners Roswell D. Hatch and Vincent C. King.

The President submitted the affidavit of the Clerk of the City Record, relative to publication of advertisement, inviting proposals for painting telegraph poles, and the form of contract approved by Counsel to the Corporation, which were filed.

The Board of Commissioners convened this day.

Present—President Joseph L. Perley, in the chair, and Commissioners Roswell D. Hatch and Vincent C. King.

The following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The necessities of the Department require the employment of additional men for service at fires; and

Whereas, The appropriation of this Department for the current year does not warrant the appointment of firemen at the rate of \$1,200 per annum, exceeding the number now provided for; therefore be it

Resolved, That as many men be appointed by this Board for service at fires, at an annual compensation of \$800, to be known and designated as Privates, as may, in the judgment and discretion of this Board, be practicable and necessary; and, further be it

Resolved, That all vacancies occurring in the grade of Fireman, which, in the judgment of this Board should be filled by appointment, shall be so filled by appointment from among the Privates appointed hereunder, who may, upon examination by the examining Board, be found competent and qualified therefor; and, further be it

Resolved, That all persons appointed under the provisions of these resolutions be required to execute an agreement to the following effect:

First—That they will perform the duties devolving upon them, and conform to the rules, regulations and orders of the Board of Commissioners, and the directions of the Officers of the Department.

Second—That they seek and accept appointment as privates, with full knowledge of the salary, privileges and duties appertaining to the same, and with the full understanding that such appointment as privates, is entirely distinct and different from an appointment to the position of Fireman in the Department.

Third—That they will not at any time seek or ask for, claim or demand, any increase of compensation for service rendered as such privates.

WEDNESDAY, January 17, 1877.

The Board of Education held a stated session on Wednesday, January 17, at the Hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets, at 4 o'clock P. M.

Present—William Wood, Esq., President, and Commissioners Baker, Beardslee, Cohen, Dowd, Goulding, Halsted, Hazeltine, Kane, Traud, Vanderpoel, Vermilye, Walker, Watson, West, Wetmore, Wheeler, and Wilkins—18.

Absent—Commissioners Kelly, Place, and Schell—3.

The minutes of the preceding session were approved.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the School Trustees of the several wards:

From the Twelfth, nominating a Principal for new Primary School No. 38, corner of Avenue A and One Hundred and Eighteenth street. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Twelfth Ward, nominating Mr. Hubert A. Daly for music teacher in Evening School No. 43. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Seventeenth Ward, relative to inefficiency of one of the teachers. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Twenty-second Ward, asking for the purchase of a house and lot adjoining Grammar School No. 28. Referred to the Committee on Sites and New Schools.

From the Trustees of the Twenty-third Ward, for leave of absence for Miss Annie E. Rae, Primary Department, Grammar School No. 6. Referred to the Committee on Teachers, with power.

From Miss Carrie V. Franklin, Principal of Primary Department, Grammar School No. 12, relative to certain irregularities. Referred to the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications.

From George W. Cooper, asking that Redpath's History of the United States be added to the list of supplies. Referred to the Committee on Course of Study and School Books.

From A. G. Barnes & Co., asking that Steele's Zoology be added to the list of supplies. Referred to the Committee on Course of Study and School Books.

From W. I. Pooley, asking that Goodrich's Histories of Greece and Rome be added to the list of supplies.
