WEDNESDAY, January 17, 1877.

The Board of Education held a stated session on Wednesday, January 17, at the Hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets, at 4 o'clock P. M.

Present—William Wood, Esq., President, and Commissioners Baker, Beardslee, Cohen, Dowd, Goulding, Halsted, Hazeltine, Kane, Traud, Vanderpoel, Vermilye, Walker, Watson, West, Wetmore, Wheeler, and Wilkins—18.

Absent—Commissioners Kelly, Place, and Schell—3.

The minutes of the preceding session were approved.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the School Trustees of the several wards:

From the Twelfth, nominating a Principal for new Primary School No. 38, corner of Avenue A and One Hundred and Eighteenth street. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Twelfth Ward, nominating Mr. Hubert A. Daly for music teacher in Evening School No. 43. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Seventeenth Ward, relative to inefficiency of one of the teachers. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Twenty-second Ward, asking for the purchase of a house and lot adjoining Grammar School No. 28. Referred to the Committee on Sites and New Schools.

From the Trustees of the Twenty-third Ward, for leave of absence for Miss Annie E. Rae, Primary Department, Grammar School No. 6. Referred to the Committee on Teachers, with power.

From the Twenty-third Ward, asking for an appropriation for extra work on building for Primary Department, Grammar School No. 6. Referred to the Finance Committee.

The President laid before the Board the annual report of the Inspectors of the Fourth District. Printed in the minutes, and referred to the Committee on Buildings and School Furniture.

From W. S. Ward, relative to visitation of the New York Aquarium by the pupils of the Public Schools. Referred to the Committee on Course of Study and School Books.

From E. J. Beckwith, relative to geological specimens for the Normal College. Referred to the Committee on Normal College.

From Miss Carrie V. Franklin, Principal of Primary Department, Grammar School No. 12, relative to certain irregularities. Referred to the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications.

From George W. Cooper, asking that Redpath's History of the United States be added to the list of supplies. Referred to the Committee on Course of Study and School Books.

From A. G. Barnes & Co., asking that Steele's Zoology be added to the list of supplies. Referred to the Committee on Course of Study and School Books.

From W. I. Pooley, asking that Goodrich's Histories of Greece and Rome be added to the list of supplies.

Reports from Standing Committee were presented as follows:

By Commissioner Goulding, from the Committee on School Furniture, to authorize proposals for furnishing new Primary School No. 38. Adopted.

Commissioner Hazeltine, from the Committee on Evening Schools, presented a report suspending the session of Evening School No. 63. Adopted.

Commissioner West presented a report from the Committee on By-laws, Elections and Qualifications, adverse to proposition to establish School Savings Banks in the public school. Adopted.
