

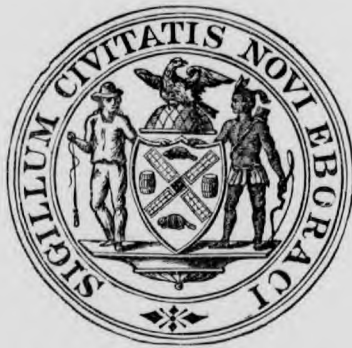

SIR—The Board of Assessors respectfully submit the accompanying schedules, "A," "B," "C" and "D," being a detailed report of their action on the various assessment lists received in this office from the Departments of Public Works and Public Parks, during the year ending December 31, 1884.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 78 Tribune Building, Wednesday, February 4, 1885, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present—The Mayor, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners James C. Spencer, William Dowd, and C. C. Baldwin.

Also, Chief Engineer Church, Executive Engineer Fteley and Consulting Engineer Davis; also, Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the stated meeting of January 28 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills included in vouchers Nos. 495 to 499; and on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the said vouchers were approved by the Commissioners, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Secretary presented the bond of William S. Wilson, as Purveyor of the Commissioners, with John H. Hall as surety, for the sum of \$2,000, as required by the resolution of the Commissioners, of October 15, 1884; which bond was approved and accepted by the Commissioners; and the President of the Commission requested to indorse such acceptance thereon, and the Secretary directed to place the bond on file in this office.

The Secretary next presented notices of the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at their meeting on the 2d instant, of the appointment of John H. Timmermann, as Auditor; William S. Wilson, as Purveyor; and Edward B. Buckley, as office boy of the Commissioners; which notices were ordered placed upon file.

The Secretary then presented a letter from Benjamin D. See, dated January 27, 1885, in relation to lands taken from him at Shaft No. 16, in the town of Yonkers, and asking that an adjustment be made with him by agreement with the Commissioners.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer, the matter was referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit.

The Chief Engineer presented a report, dated February 4, 1885, upon the request of O'Brien & Clark, and Heman Clark, in their letter to the Commissioners, dated January 23, 1885, for additional shafts on Section 9 and Section B; which report was read, and, on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the report and communication of the contractors were referred to the Committee on Construction, for conference with the Counsel to the Corporation in relation to legal questions involved, and for full investigation of the matter, and report to the Commissioners hereafter.

The Chief Engineer next presented a communication, dated February 4, 1885, in relation to the assignment to special duty in the Engineer Department of Mr. Thomas Franklin, and recommending that the duties of Mr. Franklin be extended to making examinations of a general character, relating to additional storage and other matters at the Croton river, and that in consequence of such extended service his compensation be fixed at \$2,400 per annum.

Commissioner Spencer offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the recommendation of the Chief Engineer be and the same is hereby approved, and the Chief Engineer authorized to assign Mr. Thomas Franklin to the special duty above named, at a compensation of \$2,400 per annum to date from his entrance upon the discharge of his duties under this assignment.

This resolution was adopted by a majority vote of the Commissioners—Commissioner Dowd voting in the negative.

The Commissioner of Public Works presented a letter from Fred. W. Frost, dated February 2, 1885, in relation to his application for a position in the Engineer Corps of the Commissioners; which letter was read and ordered filed with said application.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

Abstract of Proceedings for the Week ending February 7, 1885.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 4, 1885.—REGULAR MEETING—10 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Crimmins (President), Wales, and Powers.

The following communications were received:

From the Counsel to the Corporation, in relation to the powers of the Department to enforce the ordinances and prohibit cabs with advertisements and business devices painted on them from passing through the Park. Ordered filed.

From A. Newbold Morris, approving of the proposed bill for discontinuing that portion of Morris avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, adjoining Fleetwood Park. Referred to the Topographical Engineer to report upon.

From E. M. Knapp, protesting against the construction of bridges over the Harlem railroad tracks at Tremont station. Ordered filed.

From Henry Kimball, applying for permission to use the fountain near the Post-office, in City Hall Park, as a place for dispensing food, etc., to the poor. Ordered filed.

From Vincent C. King and others, recommending Hamilton C. Telle for employment as Carpenter in this Department. Ordered filed.

From Isabella Kelly, asking employment as cottage attendant. Ordered filed.

From Sarah M. Keilly, asking employment as cottage attendant. Ordered filed.

From Knut Forsberg, Draughtsman, asking for an increase of pay. Ordered filed.

From the Architect, submitting a design for the improvement of Jeannette Park, with an estimate of the cost of the proposed improvement. Laid over.

From the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a copy of preamble and resolution relative to appropriation for museums. Ordered filed.

From Clark & O'Brien, asking permission to erect a temporary storehouse on a piece of land situated on the site of the proposed suspension bridge and east of Sedgwick avenue. Referred to Commissioner Powers to report.

From Isabel T. Perry, Charlotte F. Trowbridge and others, petitioning for the opening of One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, between Union and Westchester avenues. Referred to the Topographical Engineer to report upon.

From Mrs. M. A. Heyer, H. N. Rockwell and others, asking that the map of the Twenty-third Ward be so amended and altered as to omit the opening and extending of College avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-eighth street to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street. Ordered filed.

From Hugh N. Camp, suggesting that the rock to be taken from the tunnel for the New Aqueduct in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards be broken up and used upon the roads in and around the Twenty-fourth Ward by this Department.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to reply to Mr. Camp, stating that in the judgment of this Board, with its experience in the matter of hauling and breaking stone for use on the roads in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, it would not be economical and for the best interest of the city to utilize the stone to be taken from the tunnel of the New Aqueduct, said stone not being such as is required for macadamizing, and that trap-rock stone can be furnished by contract, delivered on the ground, of the uniform size and quality required, for a much less price than it will cost to haul and break the inferior stone mentioned.

From James H. Perkins, stating that the Comptroller had refused to pay for the extra work necessitated by the reduction of the width of Trinity avenue at One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, and embodied in his contract for grading that street, and enclosing a bill for the same, amounting to \$44.32. Referred to the Auditing Committee.

From the Secretary of the Civil Service Examining Board, submitting the following names of persons eligible for appointment as parkkeepers:

From the Superintendent of Parks, reporting upon the condition of the heating apparatus at the Conservatory in Central Park. Referred to Commissioner Powers to report.

From J. H. Shaefer, Computer, asking for an increase of pay.

The salary of J. H. Shaefer, Computer, was fixed at \$1,200 per annum, to date from 4th inst.

From the Engineer of Construction:

1st. Reporting upon a communication from D. W. Moran, asking to be relieved of the penalty for overtime on his contract for grading, etc., One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, and recommending that no deduction be made from the penalty for such overtime.

On motion, the request of the contractor was denied, and said report was ordered filed.

2d. Reporting upon the petition of Patrick Garvin and others for the construction of a sewer in North Third avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-fourth and One Hundred and Sixty-fifth streets. Laid over.

3d. Reporting in relation to the foundation for the stone stairways at Morningside Park, near One Hundred and Twenty-first street, One Hundred and Sixteenth street and One Hundred and Tenth street. Laid over.

From the Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, reporting, in accordance with an order of the Board, in relation to the ownership of the Mott Haven canal and the bridge over the same at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street; also, the repairs necessary to be done to said bridge, with an estimate of the cost.

On motion of Commissioner Wales, the subject of raising the grade of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, from Mott avenue to Third avenue, was referred to the Topographical Engineer to report thereon to the Board, and the subject of the condition of the bridge over the canal at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and the repairs necessary to be made to it, was referred to Commissioner Powers to report upon.

The President laid before the Board a communication received by him from Walter Jones, agreeing to sell, for the sum of \$500, all the stone belonging to him and lying upon the Central Park in the vicinity of One Hundred and Fourth street and Fifth avenue.

On motion, the Treasurer was authorized to issue an order to Walter Jones for the purchase of the stone belonging to said Jones, now lying upon the Central Park, at the price of \$500.

The President stated that in accordance with the action of the Board at the last meeting, he had conferred with the Counsel to the Corporation in the matter of the application of the Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railway Company for permission to lay their tracks in One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, who advised that it was the duty of this Department to grant such permission, and that upon such advice he had issued a permit to said Railway Company authorizing them to proceed with the work of laying their tracks.

On motion, the action of the President was approved.

The President, to whom was referred the application of Henry Bergh, President of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, for permission to erect a drinking fountain on the Plaza at Fifth avenue and Fifty-ninth street, made a verbal report and presented a diagram showing the proposed site for the fountain.

On motion, the penalty for overtime on M. Magrath's contract for erecting skate building was remitted, and the final estimate, amounting to \$6,147.69, as submitted by the Architect, was approved and transmitted to the Finance Department for payment.

The President presented a communication from the Engineer of Construction, enclosing certificate for payment on acceptance of the work of constructing a sewer in North Third avenue and Boston road; also a bill of H. B. Kirk, amounting to \$32.12, against the contractor, and stating that the contractor had agreed to deposit a sum with the Comptroller sufficient to pay the claim of Mr. Kirk.

On motion, the certificate for payment on acceptance of the work of constructing sewer in North Third avenue and Boston road, amounting to \$6,723.53, was approved and transmitted to the Finance Department for payment, together with the bill of Mr. Kirk and the communication from the Engineer of Construction, for such action as the Comptroller may deem necessary.

The President announced that he had transmitted to the Mayor the report of the transactions of the Department for the quarter ending December 31, 1884.

The President laid before the Board a form of contract and specifications for furnishing gravel, together with a communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, acknowledging the receipt of one from this Department in relation to obtaining a supply of Roa Hook gravel at public letting, stating that he knew of no provision of law which would prevent this Department from contracting for the particular kind of gravel desired, especially in this case, the gravel bed being free to all comers at a specified price, the cost of transportation and delivery affording a basis for competition.

The President submitted a communication received by him from Louis D. Beck, agent and attorney for the owners of the Roa Hook Gravel Bank, agreeing to furnish to all persons who may desire to make proposals to this Department, double screened gravel from the Roa Hook bank, prepared in the same manner as that heretofore furnished by him, delivered on scows at his dock at Roa Hook at a uniform price to each and every person, reserving to himself the right at all times to protect himself and the bank in the matter of payments and mode of doing business.

On motion, the form of contract and specifications as presented was approved and ordered printed and advertised.

Commissioner Wales, from the committee consisting of Commissioners Wales and Powers, to whom was referred the subject of prosecuting the maintenance work in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, made a verbal report and presented an estimate prepared by the Superintendent Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the quantity of material required for macadamizing and repairing roads during the present year, and moved that contract and specifications for furnishing such material be prepared and printed, and when so printed, and approved as to form by the Counsel to the Corporation, that the Secretary be directed to insert advertisements in the CITY RECORD inviting proposals for doing the work. Adopted.

The resolution passed by the Board of Parks at a meeting held November 21, 1884, adopting, and directing the President to certify and file three similar copies of, a map entitled "Plan and Profile showing Trinity avenue, from East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street to East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York," dated New York, November 19, 1884, was rescinded.

"A Plan and Profile showing Trinity avenue, from East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street to East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York," dated New York, February 2, 1885, and signed S. F. Chalfin, Topographical Engineer, D. P. P., was adopted, and the President was designated and directed to have prepared and to certify and file three similar plans and profiles of the same, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, and chapter 457 of the Laws of 1884.
