Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Mrs. Margaret Higgins to keep a stand on the edge of the sidewalk in front of No. 3 Nassau street, provided the same shall not be an obstruction to the free use of said sidewalk; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 3, 1878.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, September 16, 1878, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to Frank McGovern, a discharged and disabled soldier, to erect and keep a fruit and cake stand in front of No. 620 West Twenty-third street, provided the same shall not constitute an encroachment or obstruction upon the street or sidewalk, he having obtained the consent of the owner and occupant of the premises in front of which the stand is to be erected, such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held September 21, 1878.

Present—Hon. Smith Ely, Jr., Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Patrick Keenan, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the resolution of the Common Council in relation to a site for a United States Barge Office, reported the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby fix the consideration to be paid for the triangular piece of land, being that portion of the ground commonly known as the Battery, lying westwardly of and adjoining the lands now belonging to the United States, and between such lands and the slip or basin in the said Battery, known as the New Whitehall Boat Slip, at the sum of four thousand (\$4,000) dollars; and do hereby authorize a deed of conveyance to be executed and delivered to the United States of America at such amount.

The Comptroller stated that he had considered the complaints, relative to the condition of the premises No. 49 Leonard street, and recommended that the said premises be sold at public auction, subject to the lease, to H. Charles Siller. He also reported in relation to the premises Nos. 9 and 11 Franklin street, and the house and lot northeast corner of Third avenue and Eighty-fifth street, and recommended that the same be sold at public auction; whereupon the following resolution, submitted by the Comptroller, was, on motion, adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the premises Nos. 9 and 11 Franklin street, the lot and house on northeast corner of Third avenue and Eighty-fifth street, and No. 49 Leonard street, with the building thereon, now leased to H. Charles Siller until December 1, 1879, at an annual rent of \$800, be sold at public auction on the 23d day of October, 1878, and that the Comptroller be authorized to make the necessary arrangements for said sale.

[BOARD OF EXAMINERS.]

TUESDAY, September 17, 1878.

At a meeting of the Board of Examiners, held at the office of Superintendent of Buildings, No. 2 Fourth avenue, on Tuesday, the 17th of September, 1878, at 3 o'clock P. M., in pursuance of the call of the Superintendent of Buildings. There being present thereat, Superintendent Walter W. Adams, Henry Dudley, Esq., Edwin Dobbs, John Banta, and James M. McLean, Esq., Superintendent W. W. Adams presiding.

The minutes of the previous meeting having been read for the information of the Board, the Chairman submitted the hereinafter named petitions and applications for the action of the Board, to wit:

Petition of Joseph M. Dunn, architect for Geo. C. Phelan (owner), for permission in the erection of two brick buildings, to be occupied as stores and tenements, at Nos. 79 and 80 Tenth avenue, to so far vary from the provisions of the Building Law, as to permit of the construction of the gable wall on northeast corner of Tenth avenue and Thirty-sixth street (street line) of the thickness of 16 inches on the first story thereof, and but (12) twelve inches in thickness on the second, third, and fourth stories of same, in conformity with New Building Plans No. 499, filed August 2, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of D. & J. Jardine, architects, on behalf of Andrew Fowler, owner, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law (in the erection of five brick and brown stone front, first-class dwellings, each four stories, 20 x 55, on northwest corner of Fourth avenue and Sixty-seventh street) as to permit the bearing wall on line of street to be constructed but twelve (12) inches instead of sixteen (16) inches in thickness, in conformity with the Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 525, filed August 16, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Application of the New York and Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company, by E. S. Bowen, General Superintendent, for permission to retain the temporary sheds already erected, and which are constructed of wood, on bulkheads between Piers 32 and 33, North river, and that the same, being for temporary use, may be exempted from the provisions of the law so far as relates to the same being covered with iron. Special application 410, filed July 31, 1878. Petition, upon motion, tabled.

Petition of Robert Mook, architect, on behalf of F. A. Kurshedd, owner, for permission, in the erection of a five-story brick store, 25 x 85 and 74 feet in height, on the lot No. 119 Spring street, north side, twenty-five feet east of Greene street, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the erection of the store in conformity with the application, plans and specifications submitted and filed August 22, 1878, numbered 533 New Building Plans; and also petitioning that the front of said building, above the first story of same, may be exempted from the operation of the provisions of the Building Law relative to providing iron shutters to all openings above the first story thereof. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of J. H. Kelly for permission in the erection of five three-story and basement brick dwellings (each 20 x 40 x 45 feet in height), on lots at southwest corner of One Hundred and Eleventh street and Madison avenue, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the gable end wall (on line of street), on southwesterly corner of One Hundred and Eleventh street and Madison avenue, to be constructed but twelve (12) inches in thickness in conformity with new building plans and specifications, No. 543, filed August 28, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Application of New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Co., for permission to erect on the pier at the foot of Sixty-fourth street, North river (occupied by said company), a two-story wooden shed, sided with corrugated galvanized iron, said shed to be 98 feet in width, 424 feet in depth, and 34 feet 8 inches in height, and to be occupied as a warehouse for the storage of freight. Special application No. 434, filed August 26, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of E. N. Dickerson, owner, by James Hamel, builder, for permission in the alteration of the four-story brick building at No. 62 East Thirty-fourth street, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the said building to be altered in conformity with alteration plans and specifications No. 856, filed August 24, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of J. W. Dimmick, owner, by John H. Whitenack, builder, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the building No. 33 Wooster street to be altered in conformity with the plans and specifications for altered buildings No. 814, relative thereto, filed August 10, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of William Campbell, owner, by Samuel Lowden, builder, for permission in the alteration proposed to factory building on north side Forty-first street, 100 feet west of Tenth avenue, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit of the proposed alterations thereto, in conformity with the plans and specifications for alterations to buildings No. 864, filed August 28, 1878. Petition denied, so far as relates to the proposed thickness of wall. And granted only so far as relates to the taking down of the present building, and the use of iron girders.

Petition of Benjamin Richardson, for permission to erect a frame structure on the south side of One Hundred and Twelfth street, between First and Second avenues, in conformity with Special Application No. (401), filed September 17, 1878. Petition, upon motion, denied.

Petition of J. E. Doying, for permission in the erection of ten four-story and basement brick and brown stone private dwellings on west side of Madison avenue, running from Sixty-second to Sixty-third street, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law, as to permit the bearing walls thereof on the lines of Sixty-second Sixty-third streets to be constructed but twelve (12) inches in thickness, from the top of basement to the roof beams, in conformity with detailed statement of specifications for New Buildings No. 588, filed September 7, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of William Noble, for permission in the erection of six four-story and basement brick private dwellings, each 16 feet 8 inches by 50 feet, and 55 feet in height on premises at southwest corner of Fifty-sixth street and Fourth avenue, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit of the construction of the bearing wall, on line of Fourth avenue but twelve (12) inches in thickness, instead of sixteen (16) inches in thickness, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 560, filed September 2, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, by F. S. Curtis, engineer thereof, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law, as to permit the said company to erect at foot of Sixty-third street, North river, a wooden structure 70 feet wide, 325 feet deep, 5 stories or about 130 feet in height, for use as a grain elevator, for the receiving and storage of grain. Said structure to be wholly covered with corrugated iron and slate, in conformity with the Specifications and Plans for the erection of New Buildings, filed September 3, 1878, No. 548. Said building being proposed to be built upon premises owned by said company, and details of construction to be submitted. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of William S. Livingston, owner, by Messrs. West & Anderson, architects, for permission in the erection of eight three story brick buildings on the premises at south east corner Second avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-second street, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the bearing wall thereof on line of street to be constructed but twelve (12) instead of sixteen (16), inches in thickness, in conformity with Specifications and Plans for New Buildings, No. 545, filed August 31, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of William Noble, owner, by Charles Baxter, architect, for permission in the erection of six first class brick and brown stone front dwellings, each four story and basement, on the north side of Fifty-fifth street and northwest corner of Fourth avenue, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to allow and permit the bearing wall of same on line of street (Fourth avenue), to be constructed but (12) instead of sixteen (16) inches in thickness, in conformity with Plans and Specifications for New Buildings, No. 575, filed September 16, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Charles Baxter, architect, on behalf of James E. Ray, for permission in the erection of six two story and basement brick, second class dwellings on south side of Sixty-ninth street, 175 feet west of First avenue, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the party walls of the said buildings to be constructed but eight inches in thickness, in conformity with the Plans and Specifications for New Buildings, No. 577, filed September 16, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Upon motion, the action of the Board, and the vote taken at Board meeting of July 23, 1878, denying the petition of Charles Baxter for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit of the construction of the bearing wall (of the seven buildings proposed to be erected on west side of Second avenue, from southwest corner of Seventy-sixth street to within twenty-five feet of Seventy-fifth street) but twelve inches in thickness over and above the second tier of beams thereof, in conformity with Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 440, filed June 25, 1878, was reconsidered, and, upon motion, the petition was granted.

Petition of B. F. Knowlton, for permission in the erection of a two-story brick dwelling on south side of Sixty-eighth street, 113 feet east of First avenue, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the walls of same to be constructed but eight inches in thickness, as provided in Plans for New Buildings No. 456, filed July 10, 1878, and which petition was denied by Board of Examiners at the Board meeting of July 23, 1878, was resubmitted to the Board and the vote taken thereon at meeting of July 23, 1878; upon motion, reconsidered, and the prayer of the petitioner, upon motion, granted.

Upon motion, the action of the Board and vote taken at Board meeting held July 23, 1878, denying the petition of Peter Scanlon, for permission to vary the provisions of the Building Law in the proposed erection of a store and dwelling on premises No. 345 East Seventy-seventh street, so far as to permit the side walls through to be constructed only eight inches in thickness, as and in conformity with Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 479, filed July 22, 1878, was, upon motion, reconsidered, and the petition, upon motion, granted.

There being no further business before the Board, the minutes of the meeting were read and approved. And the Board, upon motion, adjourned, subject to the call of the Superintendent of Buildings.

Resolutions.

Resolved, That a collection-box be placed at the entrance to Bellevue Hospital and ferry house, foot of Twenty-sixth street, for the purpose of receiving donations for the sufferers in the yellow fever districts. Adopted.

Resolved, That the paying of a stated sum per week for the boarding of physicians at Bellevue Hospital be discontinued, and the Warden is directed to furnish the required supplies for the table, at the lowest possible rate, and keep and render accounts of his expenditures weekly to the Board; the expenditure in no case to exceed \$7 per week. Adopted. Ayes—Commissioners Cox and Bailey.

By Commissioner Brennan—I vote No, on the ground that the Physicians are better cared for while the table is under the direct charge of the Warden or head of the institution, and he held responsible; also, from reports made by the Bookkeeper that great dissatisfaction prevails at Insane Asylum, Blackwell's Island, on the new principle, although the cost is more than \$7 per week.

Resolved, That Warden Dunphy be and is hereby directed to assume charge of the erection of the Pavilions at Hart's Island, to make all requisitions, and to report, at frequent intervals, the progress of the work. Adopted.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be directed to make application to the Honorable Board of Apportionment for the transfer of unexpended balances of one thousand dollars, to complete the Insane Pavilion to be located on Bellevue Hospital grounds. Adopted.

Resolved, That the attention of Police Magistrates be called to the fact, the insane people, vagrants and other paupers are brought to this city from other counties and States and taken before them by agents employed by said counties and States for commitment to the institutions of this Department, thereby becoming a charge to this city, and that they be requested to ascertain from such parties where the parties are brought from, before they are finally committed; also a change in our system in relation to the same class of people sent to this city from other States. Adopted.

Resolved, That Dr. Jackson, Medical Inspector, be transferred to the charge of New Pavilions for Insane on Hart's Island, together with the patients at present located on that Island. He to be known as Resident Physician of Branch Insane Asylum, Hart's Island, at a salary of \$1,000 per annum. Said appointment to take effect on completion of new pavilions. Adopted.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,912, as follows, viz.: 5 public buildings, 765 tenement-houses, 139 private dwellings, 73 other dwellings, 21 manufactories and workshops, 22 stores and warehouses, 50 stables, 1 garbage dump, 48 slaughter-houses, 2 soap manufactories, 9 fat-rendering establishments, 1 fertilizing works, 17 manure dumps, 1 lime kiln, 1 wool house, 29 sunken and vacant lots, 4 public sewers, 1 pier, 2 breweries, 1 head cleaning establishment, 1 rag house, 73 yards, courts, and areas, 99 cellars and basements, 85 waste pipes and drains, 241 privies and water-closets, 105 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 5 cesspools, 4 smoky chimneys, 2 piggeries, 28 other nuisances, together with 75 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The total number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 876.

During the past week 220 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 95 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

111 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 24 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 23 houses, 23 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Corps have disinfected 2,423 privies, 3,309 yards, courts, and areas, 228 cellars and basements, 254 garbage boxes, and 89¼ miles of street gutters.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending Saturday, September 14, 458 deaths were reported as having occurred in this city; this is a decrease of 72 as compared with the number reported during the preceding week, and is 35 less than the number reported for the corresponding week of 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending September 7, was 518, which is 73 below the average number of deaths for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.80 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,086,013.

The principal decrease in the mortality was from diarrhoeal diseases and of children under five years of age. Compared with the preceding week, there was a decrease in the former of 28 and in

the latter of 24. There was also a decrease of 2 deaths from scarlatina, 8 from diphtheria, 2 from whooping cough, 3 from erysipelas, 4 from typhoid fever, 2 from cerebro-spinal fever, 1 from alcoholism, 10 from cancer, 6 from bronchitis, 6 from diseases of the heart, 3 from aneurism, 19 from diseases of the brain and nervous system, 3 from enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 5 from Bright's disease and nephritis, 2 from from cyanosis and atelectasis, 3 from suicide and 1 from drowning; croup increased 1, malarial fevers 2, puerperal diseases 3, inanition 2, phthisis pulmonalis 7, pneumonia 1, marasmus and scrofula 4, hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis 6, cirrhosis and hepatitis 1, and premature and preterm births 9.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 63 were in institutions, 253 in tenement-houses, 130 in houses containing 3 families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 4 were on the basement floor, 98 on the first, 120 on the second, 105 on the third, 42 on the fourth, 10 on the fifth. 457 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 1 non-resident. 48 were stated to be single, 108 married, 45 widowed, and the condition of 257 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 457 deaths and still-births, or 91.22 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 12; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 215; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 48; Greenwood (undenominational), 33; Lutheran (undenominational), 70; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20; Evergreen (undenominational), 26; Woodlawn (undenominational), 8; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 6; Union (Methodist Protestant), 7; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 8; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 1; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 1; Washington (undenominational), 2.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending September 7, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 10; Second, 1; Third, 4; Fourth, 8; Fifth, 7; Sixth, 12; Seventh, 25; Eighth, 16; Ninth, 20; Tenth, 21; Eleventh, 29; Twelfth, 39; Thirteenth, 16; Fourteenth, 13; Fifteenth, 9; Sixteenth, 23; Seventeenth, 38; Eighteenth, 29; Nineteenth, 88; Twentieth, 30; Twenty-first, 25; Twenty-second, 39; Twenty-third, 14; Twenty-fourth, 2.

The mean temperature for the week ending September 14, was 69.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.944, the mean humidity, 81, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,093, and the amount of rain-fall for the week was .07 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

During the week ending September 14, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 458 burial permits for city deaths, 33 for bodies in transit, and 43 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 458 deaths, 131 marriages, 499 births, 43 still-births, 33 applications for transit permits, and 45 returns from coroners. There were 33 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 6 transcripts of birth record, 3 of marriage, and 33 of death were issued from this Bureau.
