In reply therein I would say that the section of the charter of the City of Brooklyn, to which you refer in your first question, has been passed upon and its provisions construed by the Court of Appeals in Strong vs. City of Brooklyn (for N. V., T). The language of the opinion of the Court in that case states so clearly and proceedly the meaning and scope of that section that I can make no batter answer to your questions than to quote such part of that opinion as covers the meaning included is it as a follows?

 ""Seventh—An act of the legislature, passed in 1862 (Laws of 1862, chapter 63, p. 182, s. 41), provided that 'all streets and avenues in said city, which have been or may be thrown out to public use, and have been or may be med as such for five years continuously, shall be deened public streets and avenues,' and the city and its officers were given 'juristicition and power in respect thereto, the same as if such streets and avenues have been or shall be opened by proceedings had for that outputs.'

The statement of facts by the general error is, that there was not a throwing out of the land to public use, nor any deficiation of st. We think that a correct interpretation of dus art respures that there should be an intention on the part of the owner that his bands should become perma-mently subject to the public use for a street, before he can be said to have thrown them out there is, in the parview of the status. We think, further, that the intention must he avinced by some affirmatrive act of bis, and that merely permitting his hand to lie open, anfenced against intrusion, are without claim musc of a sight to private exclusive possession, will one be taken for such an acc. It is to be observed that the law does not say that all laods which shall be thrown out to public use; it anys all streets and wenues. At the time when thrown out and for the term of five years continuous use, the premase must be in the strape and for the purpose of streets. Third—It is necessary that the street or avenue should be thrown out to public use to its full, roper width. A simple way for the passage of vehicles would not be throwing out to public use street within the densition of the Court. proper width.

DRAM SIR—The communication of President Grout of May 13 nsks for a report on the grad-ing of lot on the west side of Central avenue, 24 feet north of Saydam street, known as Lot No. 32, Block 48, Twenty-seventh Ward Map. This lot is now occupied by a frame building, with brick foundation. The level of the yard at the front of the building, which is about 20 feet back from the building-line, is 2 feet 2 inches bigher than the curb ; while the back yard is 3 feet 2 inches ligher than the curb. I do not believe that it is proper or necessary to take any action toward digging down this lot, which has a dwelling on it. The ordinances of the City of Brooklyn provide for the main-taining of the grade of yards above the established grade, if the owner will maintain a retaining-wall such as may be necessary to protect his neighbor. This is a question which ought to be settled between the two property-owners, and I do not see that the City is called upon to take any action. action.
