REPORTS OF BUREAUS TO ACCOMPANY REPORT OF PRESIDENT OF BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN, PRINTED IN "CITY RECORD" OF SEPTEMBER 19, 1902, MARKED DOCUMENTS "A" TO "J"

Hon. JACOB A. CANTOR, President, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—In accordance with section 1544 of the Charter, I submit the following report of the operations of this Department for the quarter ended March 31, 1902:

Contracts and specifications have been prepared for paving and repaving streets and for regulating and grading roadways, and a number of contracts for these im-

and for regulating and grading roadways, and a number of contracts for these improvements will be entered into at an early date.

Work has been in progress under the contracts for regulating and grading One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, from Amsterdam avenue to Kingsbridge road; Audubon avenue, from One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street to Fort George avenue, and extension of Riverside Drive. The quantities of work done on these streets are: 5,870 cubic yards earth excavated, 11,829 cubic yards rock excavated, 1,900 cubic yards of filling furnished, 1,105 linear feet curbstones set, 4,400 square feet flagging laid, 328 cubic yards brick work laid, 51 feet timber used, 100 square yards of block pavement relaid and 116 linear feet pipe laid.

The repair gangs took up and relaid about 28,749 square yards of stone pavement. There are 412. 30 miles of paved streets in the Borough of Manhattan, the mileage of the different kinds of pavement being as follows: Specification granite, 139.04; square granite, 8.25; specification trap, 39.94; Belgian trap, 18.61; sheet asphalt, 168.61; block asphalt, 14.36; cobblestone, 1.10; Karri wood, .08; macadam, 22.31.

Permits were issued as follows: 44 to construct vaults, 44 to repair vaults, 36 to place boilers on streets, 75 to place tar kettles on streets, 5 to place guy posts and 5 to repair pavements at expense of applicants.

The fees received for vault space amounted to \$32,577.30.

The report of the Engineer of Subsurface Structures shows that 4,314 linear feet of new electric main conduits were laid and 2,593 linear feet of service pipes for

electricity.

Eighteen hundred and twenty permits were issued to make repairs to electric, gas, steam and water pipes, and 463 permits to make service connections for electricity, gas, steam and water. Ninety-two emergency permits were issued to the Consolidated Gas Company and nine to the New York Edison Company to repair dangerous leaks durnig hours when public offices are closed. Five hundred and fifty-one openings were made in pavements to lay and repair electric services and 16 to lay and overhaul electric mains; 4,214 openings were made to lay and repair gas services, and 124 openings to lay and repair steam services. Two hundred and twenty-nine openings were made by City Department to lay and overhaul water pipes, and 42 openings to lay and overhaul sewer pipes, while plumbers made 244 openings to lay and repair water-service pipes and 92 openings to lay and repair sewer connections. In addition to these openings, 560 were made to construct and repair surface railroads. repair surface railroads.

There are 20.72 miles of macadam and gravel roads, and 22.39 miles of dirt or unpaved roads in the upper section of the City. These roads have been maintained in fair condition during the quarter. Most of the washouts which have had to be repaired occurred on the Boulevard Lafayette, Fort Washington avenue, and Marble Hill. In repairing these washouts 326 loads of stone and 1,451 loads of earth were used. This material was obtained free of cost to the City.

During the quarter 3,887 linear feet of sewers and nine receiving basins connecting therewith were constructed, making the total length of the sewerage system in the Borough of Manhattan 497.68 miles, with 5,975 receiving basins.

Work has been finished under the contracts for sewers in Nagle and Tenth avenues, between Academy and Two Hundred and Seventh streets, with branches in Two Hundred and Second, Two Hundred and Third, Two Hundred and Fourth and Hawthorne streets, and for sewer in Pine street, between South and Front streets.

Work is now in progress under seventeen contracts for sewers.

The regular force of mechanics and laborers cleaned 87,644 linear feet of sewer, relieved 10,432 linear feet of sewer, cleaned 2,918 receiving basins, relieved 20 receiving basins, cleaned 32 manholes, constructed 30 new manholes, reset 32 manhole heads, placed 125 new manhole covers, 21 basin covers and eight basin hoods. The other items of work done were 884 cubic feet of brick work built, 17 square feet of flagging relaid, 286 square yards of pavement relaid, 676 cubic feet of earth excavated and refilled, and 8,475 cartloads of dirt removed.

The Bureau of Incumbrances received and attended to 1,051 complaints of obstructions, made 520 seizures and removals of obstructions, issued 821 permits to place building material on streets. 126 permits to cross sidewalks with horses and

structions, made 520 seizures and removals of obstructions, issued 821 permits to place building material on streets, 126 permits to cross sidewalks with horses and carts, and 66 permits to erect temporary sheds over sidewalks.

Twelve notices were issued to repair defective vault covers, 79 dead and dangerous trees, posts and stumps were removed, and 143 loads of dirt, stone and

rubbish were removed.

The report of the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices states in detail the repairs made to public buildings and offices, and the large expenditure necessarily incurred in making alterations to accommodate the new departments provided for by the Charter.

The attendance at the Rivington Street Bath was 74,942 males and 31,111 females, making a total of 106,053.

Dear Sir—I respectfully submit the following statement of the financial condition of the Division of Roads, accompanied with an accounting of the work performed and materials used during the quarter ending March 31, 1902.

The work of this Division consists of the maintenance of 20.72 miles of macadam and gravel roads and 22.39 miles of dirt roads in the Borough of Manhattan. This includes the repairing of washouts and repaving gutters to insure proper drainage.

An examination of this report will show that a great amount of the work of this Bureau cannot well be tabulated, yet calls for a considerable expenditure on the part of the City, such as the removal of snow and ice from sidewalks and certain streets; also the repair of washouts, which have been limited almost wholly to Boulevard Lafayette, Fort Washington avenue and Marble Hill, requiring for their repair 326 loads of stone and 1,451 loads of earth, obtained free of cost to the City.

I have also caused to be added to my report a complete list of the streets under my care at the present time.

Hon. GEORGE LIVINGSTON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending March 31, 1902:

### Criminal Court Building.

The usual orders were renewed for cleaning glass in windows and doors; inspection and insurance of elevators, and plumbers' supplies for use of employees. The usual supplies for cleaning purposes have been furnished. Engine and cylinder oil, electrical and engine supplies, such as cotton waste, boiler compound, etc., were furnished for use of the engineer. A marble slab back of urinal was taken down, plumbing repaired and slab reset. Also plastering in toilet room on third floor was repaired and floor concreted. The concrete floor in toilet room on fourth floor was repaired. was repaired.

To remedy the heating system on the Franklin street side of above building, coil was removed from condenser, and all coils found leaking were replaced. All necessary pipes, nipples, fittings, etc., were furnished.

### Reporters' Room.

Plastering on side walls and ceiling was repaired.

### The Elevators.

Two hundred and fifty pounds of Whitmore's Elevator Cable Dressing was fur nished for use of the elevators.

The electric bell and lighting system was overhauled and put in complete working order.

Iron bars were made and set to secure platform at entrance.

11634 yards brussels carpet for room 9, adjoining room and passageway, and in room 8, 233% yards velvet strip carpet; one Wilton rug and 808-9 yards of inlaid linoleum furnished and laid.

Four window shades hung on Hartshorn spring rollers furnished and put up.

The following painting work, etc., was done in the hall leading to the offices

About 54 feet of 3-inch iron railing made of % No. 14 flat iron twisted; 2%-inch mesh, with polished brass top rail, together with four gates, spring hinges, locks, etc., and all finished in gold bronze furnished and erected in above Chamber.

In the office of the President of the Board the walls, ceilings and woodwork were washed off, ceiling kalsomined and decorated, and the walls and woodwork painted as directed. The hardwood partition and articles of furniture were cleaned off, bleached where necessary and varnished.

### President of the Borough of Manhattan.

The following carpentering work, etc., was performed in accordance with plans on file in this Bureau. ### Reporters' Room.

The doors in the above office were taken down, repaired and rehung, and repairs made to closet. Repairs were made to the plastering on the side walls and ceiling. In concluding this quarterly report, I desire to call attention to the great volume of labor and amount of expense unexpectedly entailed on this Bureau during the first quarter of this year, caused by the combination of the several departments, and consequent removal made necessary; the establishment of new bureaus and offices, with the necessary fitting up, reconstruction of partitions, readjusting old offices, painting, carpenter work, etc., incumbent thereto, particularly in the City Hall and Criminal Court Building, and I may add that the manner in which the above mentioned work was performed has caused general approbation and the voluntary commendation of the officials under whose observation the repairs were made, reflecting, I am pleased to say, great credit on this Bureau.

All advertising required to be done for the City, except as in this act otherwise specially provided, and all notices required by law or ordinance to be published in corporation papers, shall be inserted at the public expense only in the CITY RECORD, and the publication of such matters or notices. . . . . The Comptroller shall cause a continuous series of the CITY RECORD to be bound as completed, quarterly, and to be deposited with his certificate thereon in the office of the Register of Deeds of the County of New York in the County Clerk's office of said County, and in the office of the City Clerk, and copies of the contents of any part of the same, certified by such Register, County Clerk, or City Clerk, shall be received in judicial proceedings as prima facie evidence of the truth of the contents thereof.—§ 1526.
