Number of Inspections of Pavements Restored Over All Openings.

All permits issued to private corporations and plumbers to open the pavements require them to have the pavements restored and maintained for two years in good condition at their own expense. Therefore pavements restored over openings are each inspected three times each year for two years. The number of these inspections this quarter was 6,849, and the number of defective pavements found was 182, of which 98 have been repaired.

Hon. JAMES G. COLLINS, Superintendent of Highways:

Dear Sir—I respectfully submit the following statement of the financial condition of the Division of Roads, accompanied with an accounting of the work performed and materials used during the quarter ending March 31, 1902.

The work of this Division consists of the maintenance of 20.72 miles of macadam and gravel roads and 22.39 miles of dirt roads in the Borough of Manhattan. This includes the repairing of washouts and repaving gutters to insure proper drainage.

An examination of this report will show that a great amount of the work of this Bureau cannot well be tabulated, yet calls for a considerable expenditure on the part of the City, such as the removal of snow and ice from sidewalks and certain streets; also the repair of washouts, which have been limited almost wholly to Boulevard Lafayette, Fort Washington avenue and Marble Hill, requiring for their repair 326 loads of stone and 1,451 loads of earth, obtained free of cost to the City.

I have also caused to be added to my report a complete list of the streets under my care at the present time.

Dear Sir—In compliance with your instructions I hand you herewith a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Sewers for the quarter ending March 31, 1902.

3,887 linear feet of sewer and 9 basins connecting therewith have been built, making the total length of the sewerage system of this borough at the present time 2,627,755 linear feet (497.68 miles), with 5,975 receiving basins.

In the schedule accompanying this report you will find a detailed statement showing the status of the several contracts under charge of this Bureau.

Two sewer contracts have been completed, viz.:

Sewers in Nagle and Tenth avenues, between Academy and Two Hundred and Seventh streets, with branches in Two Hundred and Second, Two Hundred and Third, Two Hundred and Fourth and Hawthorne streets.

Sewer in Pine street, between South and Front streets.

There are now in progress 17 contracts for new sewers, as follows:

Hon. GEORGE LIVINGSTON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending March 31, 1902:

Criminal Court Building.

The usual orders were renewed for cleaning glass in windows and doors; inspection and insurance of elevators, and plumbers' supplies for use of employees. The usual supplies for cleaning purposes have been furnished. Engine and cylinder oil, electrical and engine supplies, such as cotton waste, boiler compound, etc., were furnished for use of the engineer. A marble slab back of urinal was taken down, plumbing repaired and slab reset. Also plastering in toilet room on third floor was repaired and floor concreted. The concrete floor in toilet room on fourth floor was repaired.

To remedy the heating system on the Franklin street side of above building, coil was removed from condenser, and all coils found leaking were replaced. All necessary pipes, nipples, fittings, etc., were furnished.

Reporters' Room.

Plastering on side walls and ceiling was repaired.

The Elevators.

Two hundred and fifty pounds of Whitmore's Elevator Cable Dressing was furnished for use of the elevators.

No. 1. Cut-off ropes were renewed to weights; cut-off chain repaired; new cut-off gear and shaft complete furnished and put in place.

No. 2. Cut-off ropes renewed to weights and ropes shortened.

No. 4. Traveling sheave repaired and elevator pistons and valves packed complete.

No. 5. New automatic cut-off gear furnished and put in place. Operating rope repaired.

District Attorney's Office.

Necessary fixtures for electric lighting furnished and put up. An electric call bell system was installed complete.

Extensive painting has been done in the offices occupied by the District Attorney (portions shellacked), painted and decorated. The side walls, ceiling and walls of stairway were also prepared, painted and decorated, using best quality cold water paint throughout. Radiators were bronzed and the woodwork varnished.

Five Kinsman desk fixtures, 57 Warren desk fixtures, 3 8-light clusters complete and 8 5-light clusters complete, together with drop lights, including wiring, etc., furnished and installed in the various offices occupied by the District Attorney. There was also installed an electric call bell system, consisting of 2 40-drop annunciators, 2 3-drop annunciators, 1 6-drop annunciator connecting various offices of the District Attorney with the Detective and Stenographic Bureau, each desk equipped with return calls, together with batteries, push buttons, wiring, etc.

Court of General Sessions.

Judge Foster's room—Two window shades hung on Hartshorn spring rollers, made of opaque shade cloth, furnished and put up.

Part 2—One window shade hung on Hartshorn spring rollers, made of opaque shade cloth, furnished and put up.

Part 3. Two window shades hung on Hartshorn spring rollers, made of opaque shade cloth, furnished and put up.

County Court House.

The usual orders for a supply of steam for heating, cleaning glass in the windows and doors, and the inspection and insurance of elevators were rendered.

Cleaning supplies, including soap powder, polish, disinfectant and five gallons of kerosene oil, cotton waste and one barrel of machinery oil were furnished.

Main ropes on the north elevator were adjusted, and clamps furnished and put on the weights.

Orders were rendered for the removal of old and worn parts of Welsbach lights, and replaced with new parts during the months of February and January, 1902.

Telephone Room—Two window shades made of opaque shade cloth hung on Hartshorn spring rollers were furnished and put up.

Supreme Court.

Two window shades made of opaque shade cloth hung on Hartshorn spring rollers were furnished and put up, and one tin spring roller furnished for broken shade.

Naturalization Bureau—One new tin spring roller was furnished for broken shade.

County Clerk's Office—One window shade, made of best shade cloth, together with necessary fixtures, etc., furnished and put up. An old railing in the above office was taken down, altered and reset.

City Hall.

The customary order for a supply of steam was rendered. Cleaning supplies were issued when necessary. An order for cleaning glass in the windows and doors of the above building was issued.

One 6 by 10 and one 8 by 12-foot United States flag, made of the best quality standard bunting, were furnished and delivered.

One 12-inch ventilator, furnished and put in place on roof of the above building.

The ice on leaders extending from roof to sewer pipe was removed. Grate and brick set in No. 11 range in janitor's apartments of the above building. Two Pullman automatic ventilators complete put in place.

The electric bell and lighting system was overhauled and put in complete working order.

Iron bars were made and set to secure platform at entrance.

116¾ yards Brussels carpet for room 9, adjoining room and passageway, and in room 8, 23¾ yards velvet strip carpet; one Wilton rug and 808-9 yards of inlaid linoleum furnished and laid.

Four window shades hung on Hartshorn spring rollers furnished and put up.

The following painting work, etc., was done in the hall leading to the offices President of the Borough of Manhattan: Ceilings were cleaned off, also cornices and grill work, and the same kalsomined and tinted. Walls prepared and painted three coats of best quality white lead paint ground in linseed oil. All cracks and joints puttied up; woodwork cleaned down and painted two coats best quality paint.

Mayor's Office.

Two flags of special design with city coat of arms, stars, etc., worked in, made of United States bunting, one 3 by 5 and one 8 by 10. The plastering on side walls around basin was repaired.

Aldermanic Chamber.

One 12-light combination chandelier, with all necessary connections, installed in the office of the President of the Board.

Spots on the walls and woodwork of the above Chamber were touched up, all loose paint scraped off, and the walls and woodwork redecorated to match the old work.

About 54 feet of 3-inch iron railing made of ¾ No. 14 flat iron twisted; 2¼-inch mesh, with polished brass top rail, together with four gates, spring hinges, locks, etc., and all finished in gold bronze furnished and erected in above Chamber.

In the office of the President of the Board the walls, ceilings and woodwork were washed off, ceiling kalsomined and decorated, and the walls and woodwork painted as directed. The hardwood partition and articles of furniture were cleaned off, bleached where necessary and varnished.

President of the Borough of Manhattan.

One copy Compilation of Maps of Greater New York showing political dimensions, furnished.

The following carpentering work, etc., was performed in accordance with plans on file in this Bureau. Four sections of partition about 7 feet 6 inches high, three bronzed balls on top, with seven mahogany doors, together with one sectional mahogany railing with two gates and three mahogany balls on top, and one pair of doors of the same material furnished and erected. Telephone box was also removed, picture lowered and gas fixtures raised. All of the above work painted four coats of paint, and the necessary glazing, hardware, etc., needed in connection with the above work furnished.

All joints and cracks in the above office were puttied, cleaned off and painted two coats of best white lead and oil paint, woodwork below also done, except new partitions and doors.

Iron railing in above office taken down, altered and reset; top rail repolished. Two iron railings with gate made of three-eighths inch No. 14 flat iron twisted scrolled, two-inch mesh, with brass hand rails, together with necessary springs, hinges, locks, etc., furnished, and all finished in gold bronze.

The plastering on side walls of private hallway of above office was repaired.

Eleven window shades made of opaque shade cloth hung on Hartshorn spring rollers furnished and put up.

One safe was removed from room 1808, Park Row Building, to the above office in City Hall, safe opened, combination changed, and the same relettered. Also one Shannon file case, one newspaper rack, one revolving book case, one typewriter desk, one table and five chairs removed from room 1911, Park Row Building, to above office in the City Hall.

One autograph stamp, fac-simile of signature, two dating stamps, one annotated copy of Greater New York Charter; one copy of Revised Ordinances 1901, one card filing case, four-drawer, No. 644, Style A, rodless cabinet and lock, 300 cards, four sets of No. 80 blank guides, two roll-top desks two revolving desk chairs, one New York City and one Brooklyn directory furnished.

Orders were issued for one switchboard set of telephone instruments, consisting of three trunk lines connected with exchange, with four exchange stations connecting various offices with switchboard; one desk extension connected with switchboard, and the use of automobile at such times as it may be required and ordered.

City Clerk's Office.

In the Custodian's room of the above office the ceiling was cleaned off, shellacked, prepared and tinted, using best quality cold water paint. The walls were also cleaned off, prepared and painted three coats best quality white lead and linseed oil, color as directed.

Reporters' Room.

The doors in the above office were taken down, repaired and rehung, and repairs made to closet. Repairs were made to the plastering on the side walls and ceiling. An iron railing was erected in the above room from old material taken from store room of this Bureau; repolished top rail and all finished in gold bronze.

Ceilings in rooms 8 and 9 cleaned off, shellacked, prepared, tinted and decorated. best quality cold water paint used; walls also cleaned off, prepared, decorated and painted three coats best quality white lead and linseed oil, color as directed. Woodwork cleaned off all joints puttied and painted two coats. Record cases cleaned and painted.

About 65 yards of inlaid linoleums furnished and laid.

Three window shades hung on Hartshorn spring rollers made of best shade cloth, together with tops furnished and put up.

Brown Stone Building.

The usual order for the maintenance and inspection of elevators was renewed. Also order for cleaning windows in the above building; cleaning, Engineer's supplies, and 100 pounds of cable dressing furnished. Sixteen screw eyes made and same tapped into window casing on the second floor of above building.

One galvanized iron smokestack about 9 feet high with revolving chimney top furnished and put up on roof.

Locks on elevator gates were repaired and spring put on railing in basement.

Hall of Records.

The usual cleaning supplies were furnished. Orders were issued for cleaning the glass in the windows and doors of the above building, and old and worn parts of Welsbach lights replaced with new parts. Three Backus Patent Heaters, oak; two No. 5 and one No. 6, furnished for use of building.

Damaged tin on roof of above building cut out and replaced with new tin, best quality, painted bottom and top.

One new 18-inch heater pipe, about 12 feet long, set up, register repaired and flue cleaned.

The call-bell system in the office of the Register was entirely overhauled and repaired, and a call-bell system, with four annunciators, together with necessary push-buttons, etc., installed. Old railing in the office of the Register was altered and set up, wood top rail repolished and refinished in gold bronze.

Harlem Courthouse.

The usual cleaning and engineers' supplies were furnished. The usual orders were issued for the insurance and inspection of elevators, cleaning glass in the windows and doors and defective parts of Welsbach lights replaced with new parts; 100 pounds of cable dressing furnished, one cast-iron dead-plate furnished and set in firebox, hand rope of elevator renewed and other repairs that were necessary were performed. All open seams of copper roof over jail in the above court house were soldered up.

West Fifty-fourth Street Courthouse.

The usual cleaning and engineers' supplies, including one hundred pounds of cable dressing, boiler compound, oil, etc., were furnished. The customary orders for the inspection and insurance of elevators and cleaning the glass in the windows and doors of the above building were issued.

The leaks in the copper and brick roof were repaired; also the five-inch galvanized iron leader was taken down, repaired and replaced and painted. A new leader head was furnished and placed on same.

The entrance doors on the Fifty-third and Fifty-fourth street sides of the above building were taken down, repaired and properly rehung. The three locks on the above-mentioned doors were repaired, also lock on elevator gate repaired, new springs, swivels, spindles, etc., furnished.

The plastering on the side walls and ceiling in the court room office, toilets and hallways was repaired as directed.

First District Courthouse.

Usual cleaning supplies furnished. Thirteen wire window guards made of 1½ inch diamond No. 10 wire, ¾-inch channel frames capped around, together with necessary hinges, padlocks, etc., made, put up and painted complete.

Defective tin on main roof of above building cut out and same replaced with new tin of best quality, painted bottom and top; leaders repaired, also gutters and roof painted.

Range and flue cleaned, and one set of bricks set.

Orders were issued to clean the glass in windows and doors of the above building.

Second District Courthouse.

The customary cleaning supplies were furnished. Defective tin on roof of the above building cut out, and same replaced with new, painted bottom and top, valleys and leaders repaired, and one new skylight put up complete.

Third District Courthouse.

The usual janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished. The usual orders were issued for cleaning the glass in windows and doors of above building.

Tile radiators were relaid, and backs of same were bricked up. All damaged tin on the roof of the above building was cut out and replaced with new tin of the best quality, painted bottom and top.

Seventh District Courthouse.

The usual janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished. The usual orders for cleaning the glass in windows and doors were issued, also old and worn parts of Welsbach lights were removed and replaced with new parts.

The Markets.

Fulton—One barrel of Pasteur Lotion Disinfectant Fluid furnished. Defective tin on roof of the above market cut out and replaced with tin of best quality, painted bottom and top, at the following stands: Nos. 4, 5, 6, 8 on Fulton street side, also at Clark's and Ottman's stands. Old and worn parts of Welsbach lights removed and replaced with new parts.

Centre—Defective tin cut out from roof of above market and replaced with new tin of best quality, painted two coats. Old and worn parts of Welsbach lights replaced with new parts.

Washington—Roof and flashings of skylights over stands Nos. 52 and 289 repaired. New cap placed on ventilator at stands Nos. 101, 113, 155, 199 and 205. The damaged tin on roofs was cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality, painted bottom and top.

Clinton—Old and worn parts of Welsbach lights replaced with new parts.

West Washington—The steel rolling shutters at Nos. 51 Loew avenue, 59 and 61 Loew avenue, 60, 62 and 64 Bloomfield street, and 52 Hewitt avenue were repaired, scraped and painted. Defective tin on roof of above market was cut out and replaced with tin of best quality, painted bottom and top. Gutters repaired and all open seams soldered up over the following stands: Nos. 44, 46 and 48 Thompson avenue, 50 and 51 Thompson avenue, 2 Lawton avenue, 12 Thirteenth avenue, and 43 and 45 Grace avenue.

Jefferson—Old and worn parts of Welsbach lights replaced with new parts.

Catharine—Defective tin on roof of the above market cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality; leaders repaired and collar placed around smokestack.

Tompkins—Old and worn parts of Welsbach lights replaced with new parts.

Municipal Courts.

Fourth District—The usual order for cleaning glass in the windows and doors of the above building was issued. The customary cleaning supplies furnished. An order for the necessary supply of steam was also given.

Fifth District—The usual orders for cleaning glass in the windows and doors of the above building were issued, and the usual cleaning supplies were furnished.

Sixth District—The usual cleaning supplies furnished. The customary order for cleaning the glass in the windows and doors of the above building were rendered. An order for the necessary supply of steam was also issued.

Eighth District—The order for cleaning the glass in windows and doors was issued.

City Magistrates' Court.

Third District—Orders for cleaning glass in the windows and doors were renewed. The usual cleaning supplies were furnished.

Finance Department.

File cases were removed from Room 10, Stewart Building, to cellar in County Courthouse. Also books, records, etc., removed from Room 10 to Room 20 in basement.

City Paymaster's Office.

Take down, disconnect, replace and connect wires as directed; also six Warren electric desk fixtures and seven additional drop-light fixtures furnished.

Oak closet similar to those at present in use in the above office furnished and erected; also steps and platforms erected for safes. Partitions in the City Hall, Borough of Brooklyn, removed to above office in the Borough of Manhattan. Partitions taken down, reconstructed, and material similar in quality and design to that now in use put in, with sliding doors, sash, closets, etc., also put in.

Two steam radiators disconnected, floor space filled in with two iron plates 18 by 4 by 3-16 laid in blue cement, and same reconstructed.

Six holes filled in with round iron plates laid in cement, also open space at vault lights filled in with blue cement; wire guards altered in front partition, and two additional guards furnished as directed.

Sheriff's Office.

Necessary repairs were made to electric lights as directed, and eight additional fixtures furnished. Complete electric call bell system installed in the above office.

County Jail.

The usual cleaning supplies were furnished. Three iron gates made of 1-inch square iron frame, filled in with 3/4-inch by 3-7-inch flat iron, riveted, together with locks and hinges furnished and put in place on the balconies of the above jail.

Three wire lining guards, each 3 feet by 5 feet, made of one-half inch mesh heavy galvanized cloth, furnished and put up in place in air shaft. Bars cut out in air shaft, and two gates made and inserted with hinges and padlocks.

Ericsson engine cleaned and repaired. Walls and ceilings in the above jail in the apartments of the Warden cleaned off; ceilings tinted; walls of dining room, bedrooms, closets, etc., painted two coats best quality paint. Walls and ceilings of office papered; woodwork painted, grained and varnished, and radiators bronzed.

Board of Examiners.

One safe, outside measurements 72 by 53 1/2 by 32 1/2 inches, inside measurements 50 by 40 by 18 inches, weight about 5,200 pounds, interior arranged according to sketch; two door mats, No. 160; two polished oak office tables with drawers; two quartered oak desks; one quartered oak flat top desk; one oak typewriter desk; three quartered oak chairs; nine oak chairs, No. 31; twelve oak chairs, No. 28; three Wilton carpets; six enameled and japanned self righting cuspidors; Session Laws 1901; Greater New York Charter (Thompson); three copies of Building Laws; three copies of Tenement House Laws; two Smyrna rugs, 9 by 12 feet, as selected; one letter press and stand; steel coat, hat and umbrella stand; one quartered oak table, 4 by 8 feet, with drawers on both sides; two architect's boxwood scales, 2 feet long; one boxwood rule, 2 feet long; one Fairbank's letter scale; two paper cutters; three gross safety matches; one nickel plated bell; one water cooler and stand; three match stands, all of best quality, as selected; one dozen brass cuspidors; one oak roll top desk, and three high back office chairs furnished.

One set of telephone instruments, connected with exchange, and one extension station connected with station in above office, furnished and installed.

Snow Department (Department Street Cleaning), Chambers and Centre Streets.

Ice removed at leaders extending from roof to sewer pipes.

Offices Commissioner Public Works.

One bronze screen partition with two hand holes, 12 1/2 by 11 inches; also partition, together with gate, sockets, braces, etc., furnished and erected, all furnished in gold bronze.

One bookcase, hung left hand side; one quartered oak counter with drawers, bookrack, sliding doors, 51 1/2 inches long by 2 feet 6 inches wide by 3 feet 2 inches high; one quartered oak counter with drawers and adjustable shelves and sliding doors, 6 feet long by 2 feet wide by 3 feet 2 inches high.

One bookkeeper's desk as selected, one bookcase as selected, one dozen 18-inch rubber cuspidor mats, one Bissell carpet sweeper as selected, 47 yards Brussels carpet and 51 1/2 yards velvet carpet furnished and laid, together with sockets and pins; 104 yards linoleum laid in cashier's office, with 18 yards inlaid linoleum.

Copies of the following papers were delivered daily: Herald, Tribune, Press, Journal, Commercial, Evening Sun, Evening Telegram, New York Times, Evening World, Evening Post, Mail and Express, Evening Journal and Brooklyn Eagle.

One 9-foot double bookkeeper's desk, with pedestals, having drawers and book space similar to the desk now in use; one copy of Ash's Greater New York Charter, one dozen typewriting ribbons, one copy Real Estate Record and Guide during year

1902, necessary copies of bills and legislative documents during the session of the Legislature of 1902 for use of the above office, 12 stamps, 2 pads, one copy of Revised Ordinances 1901, one compilation of maps of Greater New York showing political divisions, a supply of rubber stamps and one 3 foot 6 inch Japanese screen furnished.

Bronzed partition rail between two columns approaching office put up complete; also iron railing between columns taken down, altered and reset, all finished in gold bronze.

Seven closets in above offices painted two coats best quality paint; all joints puttied, grained and varnished. Closets taken down and removed from sixteenth and set up on eighteenth floor. Iron railing in room 1836 taken down.

Electric call bell system repaired and one additional connection installed, together with necessary push buttons, etc.

One safe removed from the fourth floor of the Department of Buildings to the Offices of the Commissioner of Public Works.

BUREAU OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

One compilation of maps of Greater New York showing political divisions, and supply of rubber stamps were furnished. An order for use of horse and carriage was given; coal and wood for heating, etc., and brooms, mops, soap, pails, brushes, dusters, etc., for cleaning were furnished for use of the various public buildings, courts and offices in care of this Bureau. Repairs not otherwise specifically referred to were made to the carpentering, painting, plastering, steam fitting, gas fitting, mason work, plumbing, electric work, iron work, glazing, etc., cabinet work, tin work, cleaning and laying carpets, etc., and for the use of the mechanics in the employ of this Bureau, supply of lumber, hardware, paints, varnishes, hair felt, canvas, etc., were furnished.

Free Floating Baths.

The baths are still stored in winter quarters, and such repairs as could be made by employees at this season, were made. A supply of coal and wood were furnished; eight pairs of rubber boots, and two gallons of Tarr's copper paint.

Policies of insurance on the fifteen floating baths were issued insuring them against loss by fire.

Rivington Street Bath.

Orders for use of telephone instruments connected with exchange, cleaning glass in all the windows and doors of above building; necessary supply of electric current and illuminating gas for lighting were issued.

Cleaning and engineers' supplies; one garden hose; 3 pairs of knee rubber boots, size 8 1/2; 3 dozen circular gratings; 50 feet of 3/4-inch wire bound hose, together with necessary couplings, etc., complete, and supply of coal for heating purposes furnished.

Public Comfort Stations.

Orders for necessary supply of steam and cleaning glass in windows and doors were issued.

In concluding this quarterly report, I desire to call attention to the great volume of labor and amount of expense unexpectedly entailed on this Bureau during the first quarter of this year, caused by the combination of the several departments, and consequent removal made necessary; the establishment of new bureaus and offices, with the necessary fitting up, reconstruction of partitions, readjusting old offices, painting, carpenter work, etc., incumbent thereto, particularly in the City Hall and Criminal Court Building, and I may add that the manner in which the above mentioned work was performed has caused general appreciation and the voluntary commendation of the officials under whose observation the repairs were made, reflecting, I am pleased to say, great credit on this Bureau.
