OF THE

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES DURING THE WEEK ENDING MARCH 3, 1904.

Actions taken March 3, 1904, unless otherwise noted.

The following permits were granted:

February 26. John A. Hadert—To open asphalt pavement for the purpose of repairing the sewer at the foot of West Thirtieth street, North river, the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company, having agreed to relay the pavement disturbed; the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, at the cost of the permittee.

February 26. A. Jacobs—To furnish refreshments on the recreation pier foot of East One Hundred and Twelfth street, Harlem river, during the season of 1904, compensation to be at the rate of \$25 for the season, payable in advance to the Cashier.

February 27. Thomas W. Huston—To open asphalt pavement for the purpose of repairing water main at the foot of West Fiftieth street, North river, the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company, having agreed to relay the pavement disturbed; the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, at the cost of the permittee.

February 29. Thomas H. Lidford—To erect a steel mast and boom with receiving hopper for the purpose of operating a coal hoisting plant at a point about 75 feet south of Union street, Gowanus Canal, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted and under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

March 1. John J. Reilly—To open asphalt pavement for the purpose of repairing leak in water main at the approach to Pier 68, North river, foot of West Twenty-eighth street, the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company, having agreed to relay the pavement disturbed; the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, at the cost of the permittee.

March 1. B. Campbell & Co.—To unload two scow loads of manure at the bulkhead between Ninety-first and Ninety-second streets, East river; compensation to be charged at the rate of \$5 per day for each boat, payable to the Dockmaster.

March 2. New York Edison Company—To dredge in front of ash-dump between Thirty-ninth and Fortieth streets, East river, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

March 2. Tartar Chemical Company—To construct an extension to their storehouse at Ninth street, Gowanus Canal, Borough of Brooklyn; the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief and in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

March 2. New York Horse Manure Transportation Company—To make general repairs from time to time as may be required, to the pier at the foot of West Forty-fifth street, North river, the work to be kept within existing lines and to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, to whom at least 24 hours' notice shall be given prior to the commencement of any repairs; this permit to terminate July 1, 1904, unless sooner revoked.

The following permits were revoked:

February 29. Stephen Ransom—For repairing water pipe at the approach to Pier, new 46, North river, Ransom having reported that he does not now need the permit.

Benjamin A. Dare—For the erection of cellar dirt dumping appliances on the West Thirty-ninth street Pier, North river, the Auditor having reported that rental for the privilege has been paid, and that Dare did not occupy the premises.

The following communications were received, action being taken thereon as noted:

From the Comptroller—

1st. Stating that on February 24, 1904, his certificate was attached to Contract No. 827 for cement. Filed.

2d. Approving the Aetna Indemnity Company and the American Bonding Company of Baltimore, as sureties on the estimate of G. B. Spearin for building a new pier at the foot of West Twenty-first street, North river, under Contract No. 835. Filed.

3d. Approving sureties on the estimate of William H. Jenks for building a pier at the foot of Thirtieth street, East river, under Contract No. 832. Filed.

4th. Submitting substitution of the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company as surety in the place of J. Kenny, Jr., and H. J. Rolf, on the estimate of Bernard Rolf, for reconstructing and extending the pier at the foot of Forty-sixth street, East river, under Contract No. 833. Substitution approved March 1, 1904.

5th. Stating that a claim has been filed by Thomas Kelly for the sum of \$150 to reimburse him for expenses incurred in connection with the suit brought against him by Mrs. Theresa A. S. Sheridan for material dumped at her dumping board, between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets, North river, and requesting information relative to said claim. Information furnished February 26, 1904.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving form of lease of pier at Whitestone Landing, in the Borough of Queens, to Elmer E. Keeler. Keeler notified February 26, 1904, to execute lease.

2d. Approving lease of platform in rear of approach to Pier 47, North river, with ice bridge privilege thereon to Edwin Huerstel. Huerstel notified February 26, 1904, to execute lease.

3d. Approving form of lease of the southerly half of the pier at the foot of Eighth street, East river, to Willard Hawes & Co. Said firm notified February 26, 1904, to execute lease.

4th. Approving blank form, with form of advertisement, of Contract No. 836, for anthracite coal. Contract ordered advertised February 26, 1904.

5th. Approving blank form, with form of advertisement, of Contract No. 837, for soft coal. Contract ordered advertised February 29, 1904.

6th. Acknowledging receipt of request of the Department for the temporary suspension of further action in connection with the proceedings for the acquisition of property between Forty-first and Forty-second streets, North river. Filed.

7th. Stating that by an interlocutory judgment rendered in the suit brought by Charles Huestin Hastings and others, the City is restrained from maintaining floats and boat houses over land under water between the projected streets from One Hundred and Fifty-first to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth streets, Harlem river; that the plaintiffs are awarded possession of the platform constructed by the Department at the foot of Seventh avenue, Harlem river, unless the City elects to occupy the bulkhead and to pay the permanent value of such rights to the private owners; and stating that if the Department desires to elect to retain the property rights at the foot of Seventh avenue, Harlem river, it must be done with the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. Commissioners of the Sinking Fund requested March 2, 1904, to approve the proposed acquisition of the property rights at the foot of Seventh avenue, Harlem river.

From the Solicitor to the Collector of the Port of New York—

Stating that application for relief from penalty for violation of the regulations in navigating the tug "Richmond" on an expired certificate of inspection, must be made to the Secretary of the Department of Commerce and Labor. Application made to the Secretary of said Department March 1, 1904.

From the New York Butchers Dressed Meat Company—

Requesting a lease of 150 feet at the inner end of the north side of the pier at the foot of West Thirty-ninth street, North river, for a term of ten years from March 1, 1904, with the privilege of a renewal term for ten years. Lease offered March 2, 1904, for a term of ten years at a rental of \$1,575 per annum with the privilege of a renewal term of ten years at an advance rental of 10 per cent. per annum over the rental for the first term.

From Willis A. Winne—

Requesting permission to erect and maintain an ice bridge, scales and weigh office on the bulkhead, between Charles and Perry streets, North river. Denied March 2, 1904.

From the United Electric Light and Power Company—

Requesting the privilege of furnishing electric light on the recreation pier foot of West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, during the season of 1904. Authorized March 1, 1904, to furnish light on the pier during the season of 1904.

From Charles E. Miller—

Requesting permission to occupy upland space 100 by 100 feet in dimensions at the foot of Seventy-ninth street, North river. Denied March 1, 1904.

From Sobel & Kean—

Stating that it is their intention to erect apartment houses on the upland owned by them between Third and Houston streets, East river, within the lines of the proposed marginal street thereat, and asking whether the City intends to acquire the premises. Notified March 1, 1904, that the Department favors the acquisition by the City of the land within the lines of the marginal street if an advantageous deal can be made.

From the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen—

Complaining of the storage of trucks in rear of the bulkhead north of Market street, East river, where their floating church is located. On March 2, 1904, the order for the assignment of a Watchman at the locality to prevent the blocking of the entrance to the church was rescinded and the Society was referred to the Police Department for relief from the conditions complained of.

From the New York Harbor Line Board—Giving notice of hearing to be held by them upon the application of this Department for the establishment of harbor lines in Eastchester creek, in the Borough of The Bronx. Filed, the Engineer-in-Chief reporting that the Department was represented at the hearing.

From Frank Walling, attorney for George B. Stott—Stating that the brick contained on the barge "Frederick Bass," which sank in the slip on the northerly side of the pier at the foot of Ninety-seventh street, North river, on December 4, 1903, was consigned by the Champlain Brick Company to W. H. Barnes without the knowledge of George B. Stott, the owner of the boat; that the boat sank through the negligence of the consignee's agent, and that the owner of the boat therefore refuses to raise the same. The Engineer-in-Chief also returned Bureau Order No. 1976, directing him to supervise the removal of the boat and cargo, and states that every effort was made to have the owners or consignee raise and remove the boat and cargo, but that there is no likelihood of their complying with the orders of the Department, and recommending that no further action be taken in the matter as navigation thereat is not obstructed at present. Filed.

From Nellie Mosbacher—Notice of application to be made to the Commissioners of the Land Office for a grant of land under water in front of uplands owned by her at the easterly half of the block between Gaston avenue and Meredith avenue, at Arverne, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens. Corporation Counsel notified that notice was served on the Department March 3, 1904.

From Walter Dunn—Requesting that the Department remove the two piles now located at the foot of Gansevoort street, North river, in order that he may berth his oyster barge thereat, and asking that one pile be driven after the barge is placed in position. Engineer-in-Chief directed to do the necessary work March 3, 1904.

From Bernard Rolf—

Requesting a lease of the land under water and upland, between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Forty-ninth streets, North river. Application denied.

From the Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting with regard to the progress and completion of work done under his supervision during the week ending February 27, 1904. Filed.

2d. Reporting that the work of furnishing and delivering sawed yellow pine timber under Contract No. 826 was commenced by Charles S. Hirsch & Co., contractors, on February 23, 1904. Filed.

3d. Submitting proposed modification of the bulkhead and pierhead lines between East Fifty-ninth and East Sixty-sixth streets, on the East river, the modification being intended to permit the construction of the exterior street between Sixty-fourth and Eighty-first streets, East river, in accordance with the plans heretofore adopted by the Department and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and recommending that the Secretary of War be requested to approve such modification. Secretary of War so requested March 1, 1904.

4th. Recommending the sale at public auction of all the buildings remaining on the blocks between Little West Twelfth and Bloomfield streets, North river, and

between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, North river, together with certain machinery located in building on the former block. Peter F. Meyer authorized March 2, 1904, to sell the buildings and machinery at public auction and all occupants notified to vacate the premises and to remove all of their personal property from the buildings before the date of sale.

5th. Recommending that he be given an order to maintain the boat landing on the southerly side of Pier "A," North river, during the season of 1904. Order issued February 29, 1904.

6th. Reporting that the Department of Street Cleaning require additional dredging in front of a dumping platform erected at Riker's Island to the extent of about 3,000 cubic yards; that the said Department agrees to pay the cost of the dredging, and recommending that he be given an order to have the dredging done and to report the cost for collection. Order issued as per report February 29, 1904.

7th. Reporting that the canal boat "Thomas McNally," loaded with coal, sank in the slip on the northerly side of the pier foot of West Seventeenth street, North river, and recommending that the Hughes Transportation Line, owners of the boat, be directed to remove same at once. Order issued as per recommendation February 26, 1904.

8th. Reporting that the approach leading to Pier, new 38, East river, has now been completed, and that the rental for the pier should begin February 29, 1904. The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, lessees, notified that rental will begin on that date.

9th. Reporting that the canal boat "Rosa M. Vielee," loaded with coal, sank in front of the bulkhead at the foot of Seventh street, Unionport, Westchester creek, Borough of The Bronx, and recommending that Franklin J. Vielee, owner of the boat, and the Bronx Company, consignee of the cargo, be directed to remove same at once. Order issued as per recommendation March 2, 1904.

10th. Reporting damage to iron rolling shutter at the entrance to the inshore end of Pier, new 33, East river, by a truck owned by J. Mullen, and recommending that said Mullen be directed to make the necessary repairs at once. Order issued as per recommendation March 3, 1904.

11th. Reporting that on June 3, 1903, an order was issued to the Kings County Penitentiary for brushes to be delivered within ninety days; that deliveries were made but that the brushes were returned, the same being unsatisfactory; that the material has now been secured under a new Department Order, and recommending that Department Order No. 21090 to the Kings County Penitentiary be canceled. Order canceled as per report March 3, 1904.

12th. Submitting map and technical description showing proposed extension of the pierhead line between Canal street and Thirtieth street, on the North river, which would permit the construction of piers 900 feet long, sufficient to meet the present commercial requirements, and recommending that the Secretary of War be requested to approve such extension. Secretary of War so requested March 3, 1904.

13th. Reporting that a quantity of piles owned by Naughton & Co. are stored in the slip between Fifty-sixth and Fifty-seventh streets, North river, obstructing the entrance to the bulkhead thereat, and recommending that said Naughton & Co. be directed to clear the slip as quickly as possible. Order issued March 3, 1904.

From the Engineer-in-Chief and Superintendent of Docks:

1st. Reporting damage to Pier, new 12, East river, and to the shed thereon and to the ferry rack on the easterly side of the said pier, and recommending that the War Department, lessees of the pier, and the Union Ferry Company, occupants of the structures, be directed to make the necessary repairs thereto. Orders issued as per recommendations February 26, 1904.

2d. Reporting the sinking of the canal boat "W. McEwen," loaded with coal, in the slip on the southerly side of the pier foot of Canal street, North river, and recommending that Thomas Featherson, owner of the boat, be directed to remove same at once. Order issued as per recommendations February 26, 1904.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported that the following work had been superintended under Bureau Orders:

No. 1977, superintended dredging ordered under Contract No. 768 under and in front of the dumping boards on the south side of the pier at One Hundred and Tenth street, Harlem river, for the Department of Street Cleaning.

No. 2057, superintended dredging ordered under Contract No. 768, in the slip between Piers 61 and 62, East river, for James Shewan & Sons.

No. 1825, opening of pavement in front of Pier "A," North river, by the Empire City Subway Company, no charges for inspection or supervision having been incurred by the Department in connection with the work.

No. 1893, erection of a sheet pile bulkhead and two jetties about 170 feet long projecting into the Atlantic Ocean, in the vicinity of West Eighth street, Coney Island, Borough of Brooklyn, by W. R. Reynolds.

No. 1917, driving of fender piles at Pier old 32, East river, and at the bulkhead between Piers old 32 and 33, East river, by the Long Island Railroad Company.

No. 2025, repairs to the fencing on the sides of Piers 45, 46 and 50, East river, by the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company.

No. 1842, enclosing of a portion of the upper deck of the recreation structure on the pier foot of Twenty-fourth street, East river, by W. B. Franklin, Commander United States Steamship "New Hampshire" in order to permit the use of same as a drill room.

No. 2066, driving of fender piles on the westerly side of Pier No. 3, by the New York & South Brooklyn Ferry Company.

No. 1280, erection of four automatic barrel and sack elevators with the necessary appurtenances, on the pier foot of Fifty-ninth street, North river, by the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company.

No. 1600, repairs to pier at the foot of Forty-fifth street, North river, by the New York Horse Manure Company.

No. 2061, opening of pavement in front of the Floating Church of the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen, opposite No. 225 South street, by the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company, no charge having been incurred by the Department for inspection or supervision in connection with the work.

No. 1887, erection of a steel tower by Michael F. Burns, to replace the wooden coal pocket which formerly existed on the bulkhead between Delancey and Rivington streets, East river.

No. 1414, removal of the old buildings between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, North river, and the erection in the place thereof of a corrugated iron building by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company.

Gallaudet and Dr. Alexander Rae, the experts who rated the papers in the examination for Police Surgeon, be and they are hereby respectfully requested to meet the Municipal Civil Service Commissioners at the office of the Commission, No. 61 Elm street, on Wednesday, February 17, 1904, at 2:30 P. M., for the purpose of conferring with the Commissioners in relation to said examination.

The Commission then adjourned to meet on Wednesday, February 17, 1904, at 2:30 P. M.
