The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, Madison Avenue and Twenty-sixth Street, New York, November 30, 1906.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk, City Hall, New York:

Dear Sir—In order that this Society may be in a position to afford some protection to horses from the slippery streets of winter, we respectfully beg that the Board of Aldermen will pass a resolution authorizing the Society to place receptacles for sand on the sidewalk at the curb line at the localities indicated on the enclosed list. You will observe that the localities are contiguous to hills or dangerous grades, where, by reason of the smooth pavement, horses find it difficult to obtain a foothold and are in danger of slipping, falling and receiving painful or fatal injuries. The storms and cold of winter render these spots almost impassable, and it is with a view to giving the horses some relief from this menace and evil that the Society will undertake, with the approval of the Board of Aldermen, to establish stations where sand will always be available for the purpose of scattering on the pavement to render safe footing for the horses.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Commissioner's Office, Nos. 13 to 21 Park Row, City of New York, November 30, 1906.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, Clerk of the Board of Aldermen:

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Aldermen held November 20, there was introduced by Alderman Linde an ordinance, No. 1295, being an ordinance to amend an ordinance known as the "Building Code." The adoption of same would greatly complicate and conflict with the rules and regulations of this Department and other ordinances, and it is my opinion that under section 523 of the amended Greater New York Charter it is the duty of the Commissioner of this Department to submit from time to time for the consideration of the Board of Aldermen such proposed ordinances in regard to electrical wires and appliances to be placed in buildings in this City. The Department has at several times introduced such rules and regulations governing electrical wires, appliances and apparatus, to be adopted by the Board of Aldermen into ordinances, but the Department has no record that any subsequent action of the Board gave effect to these rules.

I wish that you would lay this matter before the Committee on Buildings and ask that no further steps be taken toward its adoption. You will readily appreciate the complications that will follow the adoption of an electrical code with a number of requirements therein which are in conflict with the code or rules and regulations adopted by this Department.

Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—On or about February 6, 1906, a resolution was passed by the Board of Aldermen directing the Committee on Street Cleaning to investigate the Street Cleaning Department. To enable said Committee to make such investigation, the Board of Aldermen passed a resolution appropriating \$25,000 for the necessary expenses thereto, which said sum the Board of Estimate and Apportionment reduced to \$10,000. Thereafter, an additional sum of \$6,600 was allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the further necessary expenses made in said investigation.

It appears, according to the record of your Board, that after a conference with his Honor, the Mayor, the Committee in charge consulted my predecessor with regard to the matter of counsel, and was advised by him that the Committee had no power under the Charter to retain counsel other than the Corporation Counsel, but that he would appoint as Special Counsel such member of the bar as might be nominated by the Committee. The Committee in charge thereupon nominated Mr. William M. Ivins as counsel, and on or about April 4, 1906, in accordance with such nomination, my predecessor appointed Mr. Ivins Special Counsel to the Corporation, for the purposes of this investigation. Mr. Ivins was assisted by his partner, Mr. Robert Louis Hoguet, and Mr. Julius Henry Cohen.

Mr. Ivins reports to me that the investigation is now closed, and has presented to me a bill for \$12,500, which to my mind is a just and reasonable compensation for the services rendered therein by himself and his assistants.

I recommend, therefore, that this bill of Mr. Ivins be paid by the City with the proceeds of the issue of Special Revenue Bonds, under subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter, following the same procedure as in the case of the other expenses of this investigation.

I accordingly request that your Board pass the annexed resolution to provide a means for the payment of Mr. Ivins' bill.

Ivins, in full of his bill for services rendered in the aforesaid investigation.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

Hon. P. F. McGOWAN, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan:

Dear Sir—On August 16, 1905, this Department entered into a contract with Michael J. Dady for remodelling and extending the Massapequa Pumping Station, amounting to \$327,850. When the specifications governing this contract were prepared it was considered that it would not be necessary to leave sheeting in the trench, except under unusual conditions, and therefore the estimate furnished by the Chief Engineer of the Department called for a total amount of 10,000 feet, board measurement.

The vitrified pipe which forms the infiltration gallery constructed in conjunction with this contract has been found to be cracking at several points. While this cracking has not immediately endangered the gallery, it would indicate, nevertheless, that the soil upon which the pipes rest is not sufficiently solid, and extra support is required, and to prevent further settlement the contractor was directed to place sheeting in the trench.

The condition of the gallery, which showed signs of collapsing at Massapequa and Wantagh, L. I., it was thought might extend to other places, and the Engineer concluded that for the best interests of the City and to preserve this important construction, which has been the means of obtaining a large supply of water, it would be advisable to keep the sheeting in the entire length of trench, together with the rangers and braces. The amount of lumber required will be, approximately, 1,300,000 feet, board measurement, or about 130 times the amount originally provided for in the contract.

The price paid for the lumber at the time of awarding the contract was \$40 per thousand. A large portion of the lumber has been placed by the contractor and the remainder is on the ground, and is now being placed in position as fast as possible.

This contract provides that with the written approval of the Commissioner of this Department, it may be increased 5 per cent. This increase, however, will not cover the amount which will be required to reimburse the contractor for the extra lumber, and I hereby make application to your Board, under and pursuant to section 39 of the Revised Greater New York Charter, for permission to increase contract beyond the five per cent. allowed to an amount of \$50,800, this sum of money to pro-

vide for the 1,270,000 feet of lumber which will be set when the entire work on the infiltration galleries has been completed, in addition to the amount called for in the original estimate of the Engineer.

REPORTS:

Mr. John P. Dunn, the Assistant Corporation Counsel, in charge of the Bureau of Street Openings, appeared in behalf of this resolution. The Corporation Counsel had previously communicated with the Chairman of the Committee, expressing his entire approval of the resolution and his willingness to appear before the Committee if an explanation was desired from him. Resolution 1308 amends 1267 by adding one Topographical Draughtsman at \$1,650, making two incumbents in that grade, both of which will be new appointments. Besides these new positions resolution 1267 provides for two new Junior Assistants at \$1,200, and two Messengers at \$900, otherwise the resolution provides for increases of salary to present incumbents. Mr. Dunn himself has occupied this position for thirteen years at a salary of \$6,000, and the increase of \$1,500 puts him on a par with the assistant in the main office, who is in charge of the other branch of condemnation proceedings. The next three assistants are given increases of \$500 each, after several years' work at present salaries. The \$3,500 grade is provided for the assistant in charge of the Queens office, who has received \$2,500 for eleven years; the work of his office has in the last few years grown to great proportions. The remaining increases are smaller in amount, except in the case of the Chief Computer of Assessments, who receives an increase of \$600. Mr. Dunn urged that in some cases the increases were small rewards for good work done, and in others were necessary to prevent some of the younger men from going out into the employ of lawyers making a specialty of condemnation proceedings. He urged that the new places enumerated above are necessary to handle the increased work of the office. Mr. Dunn is conscious of the defects and difficulties and the causes of public complaint in reference to the City's condemnation proceedings, and he has displayed a conscientious desire to remedy existing evils. He was chiefly responsible for the legislation of 1906, which is intended to initiate reforms in this matter. The practice under the new laws is about to receive a thorough trial, and the Committee believes that Mr. Dunn and his subordinates should be encouraged in the effort to bring about better conditions. The Corporation Counsel has taken a public stand upon this matter and has expressed his determination to compel Street Opening Commissioners to do their work promptly and to earn their fees. The resolution in its present form is the result of his scrutiny and reduction of the salary items as originally suggested to him.

The Committee is informed that due provision for these salaries has been made in the Budget as approved by this Board. The Committee recommends the adoption of the following resolution, which is resolution 1267, as amended by resolution 1308.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, which was requested on May 15, 1906 (Minutes, page 453), to draft an ordinance to require heads of various City departments to have department initials on automobiles under their jurisdiction, respectfully

REPORTS:

Your Committee has given this matter careful consideration and is sensible of the necessity which requires the enactment of an ordinance governing the subject.

The use by any person of an automobile belonging to the City for any purpose other than in the transaction of City business is an unlawful use of City property, and should be absolutely prohibited.

As a means towards correcting this abuse such motor cars should be so marked with the names of the respective City departments by which they are used as to be readily recognized and distinguished.

Your Committee is of opinion that the character of such cars required for official use and the price to be paid therefor, may properly be left to the Committees of the Board, to which the matter of their purchase may be presented.

Your Committee therefore recommends the adoption of the following ordinance:

(SUBSTITUTE.)

AN ORDINANCE providing for the marking of automobiles, motor cars and motor trucks belonging to the City with the names of the departments by which they are used.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Every automobile, motor car and motor truck belonging to the City shall have painted on the outside of the body thereof, in conspicuous lettering, the name of the City department by which the same is used, and such name shall at all times be openly displayed so as to be readily distinguished.

Sec. 2. Any person using an automobile, motor car or motor truck belonging to the City, upon which the name of the City department shall not be displayed, as provided in the foregoing section, shall be liable to a penalty of fifty dollars for each occasion upon which the same shall be so used.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

(ORIGINAL.)

Whereas, This Board has expressed itself in favor of all Department automobiles bearing the initials of their respective Departments; that such automobiles be of American make and not to cost more than four thousand dollars (\$4,000); therefore be it

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom was referred on September 19, 1906 (Minutes, page 752), the annexed resolution in favor of the establishment of postal savings banks in the United States of America, respectfully

REPORTS:

Your Committee has given this subject careful consideration, being wholly in sympathy with the spirit which prompts action by which the savings of wage earners throughout the country may be assured absolute protection.

It is asserted and with good reason, founded upon experience in other countries, that postal savings banks have proven effective in this respect, and that economy and thrift among the people have been promoted by their establishment.

The system involves the creation of a central depository, as a part of the Post Office Department, for the receipt and payment through the branch post offices of small savings, upon which interest at a rate to be fixed shall be allowed to the depositors, the security of such savings being guaranteed by the National Government.

Your Committee realizes that the importance of the subject demands serious thought and wise action, and with that view recommends the adoption of the following substitute resolution:

(SUBSTITUTE.)

Whereas, The institution of postal savings banks is now being earnestly agitated as a means of ensuring security to the savings of wage earners throughout the country, while affording them a certain return upon their earnings; and

Whereas, Economy and thrift among the people should be encouraged by inspiring confidence that the result of their labor will receive absolute protection and a fair return; therefore

Resolved, That the Congress of the United States be respectfully urged through its appropriate committees, to make thorough investigation as to the wisdom and practicability of establishing postal savings banks in this country, with a view to the early enactment of laws which will best carry such purpose into effect; further

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the Honorable Postmaster-General of the United States, and to the Honorable Chairman of the Committee on the Post Office and Post Roads of the House of Representatives.

(ORIGINAL.)

Whereas, Repeated failures of savings banks involving the small savings of wage earners and others have demonstrated the necessity of a system by which such savings can be made absolutely secure; and

Whereas, This question has been solved in other countries by the institution of postal savings banks which have proven to be effective in encouraging thrift and economy among the people; therefore be it

Resolved, That we favor the establishment of postal savings banks in the United States, and urge upon Congress the speedy enactment of the necessary laws for that purpose.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom was referred on October 23, 1906 (Minutes, page 483), the annexed ordinance in relation to bootblack licenses, respectfully

REPORTS:

Your Committee is of opinion that the subject matter of the resolution is already sufficiently covered by existing City ordinances, and that it is not advisable to modify their provisions.

The proper enforcement of the present laws and ordinances will obviate many of the difficulties of which complaint is made.

Aldermen Dowling and O'Neill were heard in opposition to the resolution, and Mr. Tony Bastone, representing certain bootblack organizations, appeared in its support.

A striking effect of the enactment of an ordinance as proposed would be still further to concentrate the bootblack business under the control of a few individuals, and to eliminate boys as independent wage earners in this industry.

The purpose for which the privilege of maintaining bootblack stands was originally given, namely, as a means of livelihood for those who personally polish shoes, does not seem to be wholly served even under present conditions; and opportunities for further restrictions should not be given.

The resolution does not command itself to the favorable consideration of your Committee, and it therefore recommends that it be not adopted.

Resolved, That an annual license be required, in order to be permitted to do business as a bootblack, which license shall be issued on application of the bootblack, and shall be renewed each year, and that a license fee of \$5 be paid for each year for each chair; that bootblack peddlers shall be required to take out licenses under the peddlers' ordinance; that no bootblack shall be permitted to operate his trade in any public park unless he shall have taken out a license similar to that required of bootblacks having their stands within stoop lines.

6. Signs and Showbills.

Sec. 260. Signs, showbills and showboards may be placed on the fronts of buildings, with the consent of the owner thereof, and shall be securely fastened, and shall not project more than one foot from the house wall, except that signs may be hung or attached at right angles to any building and extend not to exceed six (3) feet therefrom in the space between the second floor (the ground floor being considered the first floor) and a point 8 feet in the clear above the level of the sidewalk in front of such building. Signs may be attached to the sides of stoops, but not to extend above the railing or beyond the stoop-line of any stoop. No sign, showbill or showboard shall be placed, hung or maintained except as in this section prescribed, under penalty of \$10 for each offense, and a further penalty of \$10 for each day or part of a day the same shall continue.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

In addition to the general powers given by law, the corporation was authorized to prescribe the manner in which the railroad should be used, and by what force the carriages to be used thereon may be propelled.

Second—That thereafter it constructed a steam surface railroad upon a right of way which it acquired by purchase or condemnation proceedings, portions of which line were included within the limits of what is now Atlantic avenue.

Third—By chapter 178 of the Laws of 1834 the Long Island Railroad Company was organized and empowered to construct a railroad from Greenport to a point on the waters adjacent to Brooklyn, "with such appendages as may be deemed necessary for the convenient use of the same," with power to prescribe the manner in which its road shall be used, and by what force the carriages to be used thereon may be propelled.

Fourth—By chapter 94 of the Laws of 1836 the Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company was authorized to lease its railroad from Brooklyn to Jamaica to the Long Island Railroad Company, and it was provided that the use of the said Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad, under such lease, should be taken as a performance of the obligations on the part of the Long Island Railroad Company to construct its road from Greenport to Brooklyn.

Fifth—This lease was made of all the corporate rights and franchises of the said Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company, and has been extended from time to time, and now has seventy (70) years to run. The Long Island Railroad Company under it and under its own charter has been for many years operating a double-track steam railroad over the right of way formerly of the Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company, situated in the centre of what is now Atlantic avenue, from the junction of Atlantic and Flatbush avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn to Jamaica and points eastward thereof.

Sixth—The Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company was foreclosed and its property conveyed to the Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company of Brooklyn, and said Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company of Brooklyn was, on or about January 26, 1899, merged with the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, and the Nassau Electric Railroad Company is now possessed of all its property and franchises.

From Ralph avenue the tracks were to descend to the grade of Atlantic avenue, at a point between Ralph and Howard avenues. From there they were to be operated in an open cut to the west side of Cooper place. From there they were to be placed below the surface of the street to a point near the east side of Stone avenue. From there the right of way should be through an open cut to a point near the westerly side of Jardine place, where it should coincide with the grade of Atlantic avenue. From there eastward it should be operated on a surface grade to near the easterly side of Snediker avenue. At this point the tracks were to be elevated, passing over Williams avenue at a height of eight feet, and over Alabama avenue at a height of twelve feet, and from the easterly side of Alabama avenue the tracks should be operated over an elevated structure to a point near Linwood avenue. From there they should descend to the grade of Atlantic avenue, near Atkins avenue, and from that point eastward should be operated on the existing grade.

Eighth—Said act also provided that when completed the Long Island Railroad Company, as lessee of the Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company of Brooklyn, was authorized and directed to run its trains "over such improvement and the road of such railroad as constructed and authorized by law," and no cars of other companies, without permission of the said the Long Island Railroad Company, shall be run thereon or thereunder.

Ninth—By chapter 497 of the Laws of 1897 it is provided that whenever any right of way, grade or tracks of any steam railroad in any street, in any city of the first class, are required by law to be changed or altered by elevating or depressing the same for the purpose of discontinuing the use of steam power upon the surface of said highway or street, such alteration or change of grade shall not be deemed to curtail or affect any right which such company, or its lessees or assigns, may have to maintain and operate a surface passenger railroad within the limits of the right of way so depressed or ele-

vated, and over or under the railroad tracks so depressed or elevated, with all turnouts, sidings or tracks necessary to secure the continuous connection of portions of such surface railroad. In the event that any such turnouts, sidings or tracks shall extend beyond the lines of the right of way of such railroad corporation whose tracks have been so depressed or elevated in or upon any of the streets or highways aforesaid, such turnouts, sidings or tracks so extending beyond the lines of such right of way shall only be constructed upon condition that the consent of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded, and the consent also of the local authorities having the control of that portion of such street or highway upon which it is proposed to construct such turnout, siding or tracks, shall be first obtained. No such railroad shall be operated by steam locomotives, and shall not be used except for passenger traffic.

Tenth—That the change of grade provided in and by the aforesaid acts for the improvement of Atlantic avenue has been duly made, such portions of the aforesaid track required by said act to be depressed below the surface of the street have been so depressed, and such portions as were required to be elevated have been elevated, that the connections between the same have been constructed, and the trains of the Long Island Railroad Company are now being operated thereon by electricity.

Eleventh—That the tracks for an electrical railroad have been laid upon the aforesaid right of way of the said railroad, over or under the said improvement, with the exception of the following portions thereof, viz:

1. From the westerly side of Bedford avenue to a point midway between Nostrand avenue and New York avenue.

2. From a point opposite Columbus place to a point near Louis place.

3. From a point opposite Olive place to a point nearly opposite Alabama avenue, with the exception of the portion of the south side of Atlantic avenue, between Snediker and Georgia avenues, occupied by the tracks of the Brooklyn and Rockaway Beach Railroad Company, over which the Long Island Railroad Company has the right to operate.

At these points, where either the cuts are located (being the portions of said right of way by which the trains from the depressed subway reach the surface), or the inclined portion of the elevated structure extends from the grade of the avenue to a place where there is sufficient headroom for the cars to pass thereunder. At these points the existence of these obstacles make it impossible to operate a continuous railroad upon the surface of said right of way.

Twelfth—That in order to secure a continuous connection and operation of said surface railroad, it is necessary that a turnout or siding, consisting of a single track on each side of said right of way, should be constructed in the various portions of Atlantic avenue lying between the points aforesaid, and also that the same should be connected with the tracks of the street surface railroads intersecting the same. That such sidings and connections have been duly located, and that the portions of the streets proposed to be occupied thereby are, and the general line of the improvement is designated on the blue print hereto annexed, marked "A," Drawing No. R-4. Maps showing each one of such sidings in detail are also hereto annexed, marked "B," "C," "D," "E," and "F," show the location of the poles carrying the electric wires.

Thirteenth—That your petitioners are advised and believe that under the statutes aforesaid, and under the provisions of law relative to the subject, your petitioners are authorized to construct said turnouts and sidings and to operate an electric railroad over the same in connection with the line constructed upon the surface of the aforesaid right of way as aforesaid, upon obtaining the consent of the local authorities of The City of New York, and the consent of the majority of the owners of the property abutting on said sidings, or, in lieu of the latter, the consent of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court.

Fourteenth—That your petitioners have used diligent efforts to obtain the consent of the majority of said abutting owners, but have been unable so to do, and are now about to apply to the Appellate Division for its consent in lieu thereof.

Fifteenth—That the portions of Atlantic avenue over which the petitioners desire to obtain the consent of the City to operate is only a very small portion of the entire route of the proposed railroad, the remainder being upon the property of your petitioners.

That this proposed railroad will be a trolley railroad of the most modern character, and its construction and operation will be great public convenience, and will, as your petitioners are informed and believe, largely enhance the value of the property abutting on Atlantic avenue and of that in the vicinity. That your petitioners believe that a rental of one hundred dollars (\$100) a year for a franchise to operate each of four turnouts, or the aggregate annual rent of four hundred dollars (\$400) (which represents a capitalization of four per centum of \$10,000), would be a reasonable rent to pay for such privileges, and your petitioners hereby offer to pay the same to the City for its consent to such construction.

Wherefore, your petitioners respectfully pray that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will grant to the Nassau Electric Railroad Company and the Long Island Railroad Company, as lessee of the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, the consent of The City of New York for the construction of a double track electrical railroad to be laid on the surface of Atlantic avenue in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, one track thereof to be laid on each side of said avenue in the portions thereof adjoining the places where the right of way of the Long Island Railroad Company above mentioned is obstructed by the elevated and depressed tracks, to wit:

1. Leaving the said right of way at a point forty (40) feet westerly from the westerly side of Bedford avenue, and thence running with a single track on each side of the line of the said right of way and the inner rail of said tracks to be about four (4) feet distant therefrom, to a point about one hundred and fifty (150) feet easterly from the easterly line of Nostrand avenue, and thence curving inward, intersecting the said right of way and connecting with the tracks thereon.

2. Leaving the said right of way at a point about opposite the easterly line (if extended) of Columbus place, and running with a single track on each side of the line of the said right of way and the inner rail of said tracks to be about opposite to the easterly side of Cooper place (if extended), and thence curving inward, intersecting the said right of way, and connecting with the tracks thereon.

3. Leaving the said right of way at a point approximately at the centre of Stone avenue, or Eastern Parkway Extension, and running with a single track on each side of the line of the said right of way, to a point about opposite the easterly curb line of Alabama avenue (excepting the portion of the southern side of Atlantic avenue between Snediker and Alabama avenues, occupied by the existing tracks of the Brooklyn and Rockaway Beach Railroad Company, over which the

Long Island Railroad Company has the right to operate); thence curving inward into the said right of way and connecting with the tracks laid thereon.

4. Together with the right to erect and maintain the necessary poles, wires and appurtenances, the poles supporting the wires by which said cars are to be operated to be placed as far as practicable within the limits of the right of way aforesaid.
