## Report of the Chief Engineer.

Hon. CALVIN TOMKINS, Commissioner of Docks:

Sir—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge and supervision for the quarter ending September 30, 1910.

## North River.

Battery Landing, North River—The landings in this locality have been maintained during the quarter, and a fence has been erected.

Pier "A," North River—This pier, upon which are located the executive offices of the Department, has been maintained and kept in repair from time to time as required during the quarter, and fender piles have been placed at the pier. The boat landing, situated in the vicinity of the pier, with the float inside, has been maintained and kept in repair.

Cedar St. Section, North River—During the quarter the Department force has been engaged in repairing the planking on the marginal street at this section.

Liberty St. Section, North River—At this section of the waterfront the Central Railroad Co. of New Jersey has made extensive improvements, which included the construction of a ferry terminal building with the necessary ferry structures. This work was done under an action of the Commissioner of Docks, dated December 10, 1902, B. O. 919, and was completed on the 2d of December, 1909. The completion of the ferry structure did away with the necessity for the use of the outer end of Pier (new) 11 for ferry purposes. This pier was partially constructed prior to its use for the ferry, and upon the removal of the ferry work was resumed toward the completion of the outer end of the pier, and is in progress. This pier was originally begun on the 23d of September, 1904, but the work was stopped while the construction of the ferry premises was in operation. This work has been resumed and the Department force has been engaged during the quarter in the construction of the outer end of the pier.

Along the marginal street between Albany and Liberty sts. the work of laying a granite pavement has been in progress under Contract No. 1186, Class 2. This work was completed on the 13th of September, 1910.

Cortlandt St. Section, South, North River—The Pennsylvania Railroad Co. has begun the work of improving the waterfront, in accordance with the new plan, beginning at the northerly line of Liberty st. and extending northerly 203.03 feet. This work is being done under a permit from and under the supervision of this Department. Under the proper authorization the Department force has been engaged during the quarter in fabricating, shipping and setting concrete blocks in connection with the construction of the bulkhead wall at this section. Work was begun April 16, 1910, and completed August 25, 1910.

Pier 17, North River—The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Co. during the quarter installed a new heating plant on this pier, under permit from this Department.

Pier 34, North River (Canal St.)—Repairs are being made to the unleased portion of this pier, and the work is still in progress. This pier is being extended out to the pierhead line, and the Lehigh Valley Railroad Co. have erected a shed on the pier.

Pier 39, North River (W. Houston St.)—During the quarter the Department force has been engaged in making repairs to shed on south side of this pier, the cost of which is to be collected from the International Mercantile Marine Co.

Pier 42, North River (Morton St.)—The vacation of this pier by the French Line steamers moving to one of the piers in the Chelsea Section enabled the Department to make extensive alterations and repairs to this pier, and a Contract, No. 1199, was awarded during a prior quarter for removing and reconstructing the existing pier and extending the pier. Work was begun by the contractor on March 13, 1910, and the work is still in progress. The lessees of the pier have erected on the reconstructed pier a new shed.

Piers 48, 49 and 50, North River—During the quarter the grade at the entrances to these piers at 11th, Bank and Bethune sts. and to the adjacent bulkhead shed has been raised by the force of the Department.

Gansevoort Market Piers, North River—A new plan for the improvement of the waterfront in the vicinity of Gansevoort Market was adopted by the Commissioner of Docks on the 11th of June, 1909, and was approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 30th of June of the same year. This plan provides for the construction of three piers between Piers 52 and 53, North River, in the vicinity of the New West Washington Market; these piers to be known as Gansevoort Market Pier South, Gansevoort Market Pier Middle, and Gansevoort Market Pier North. Work was begun during a prior quarter on the most northerly of these piers and has been in progress. Work has also been in progress during the quarter on the middle pier.

Pier 53, North River—The construction of a platform has been in progress along the entire length of the southerly side of Pier 53, at Bloomfield st., North River, and on the southerly side of this platform another platform, 25 feet wide by 93 feet long, is being constructed, beginning at a point 90 feet offshore from the inner end of the pier. These platforms are to afford necessary accommodation to the Fire Department in connection with the berthing of fireboat at the outer end of the southerly side of the pier.

Chelsea Section, North River—The work on this section has been entirely completed, and during the quarter the pavement on the marginal street between W. 12th and W. 22d sts. has been taken up and relaid to grade where necessary, and sundry small repairs have been made to the sheds along the section.

Twenty-eighth St., North River—Repairs have been made to the pier at this street by the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Co., and a pile platform and shed have been erected by the same company.

Pier 30th St., North River—Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department. Work was begun on the 8th of September, 1910, and is still in progress.

Between 30th and 33d Sts., North River—Granite pavement is being laid in this locality under Contract No. 1186, Class 3. The work was begun on the 7th of September, 1910, and is still in progress.

Pier 39th St., North River—The work of repairing this pier by the force of the Department has been completed. The work was originally begun September 30, 1909, and finished on the 4th of August, 1910, under B. O. 7516. Subsequently another Bureau Order was issued, and repairs are in progress under this new Order No. 8714.

Pier 40th St., North River—During the quarter the Department force has been engaged in extending this pier out to the existing pierhead line and in driving foundation piles at the pier. This work was originally begun September 14, 1909, and is still in progress.

West 42d St. Section, North River—During the quarter the Department force has been engaged in repairing the planking and sheathing on the approach to the ferry at the foot of W. 42d st.

Pier 44th St., North River—The approach to this pier is being repaired from time to time. Work was originally begun June 10, 1907, and is still in progress.

Pier 45th St., North River—Necessary repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department. Work was begun May 11, 1910, and is still in progress.



Pier 48th St., North River—Repairs to this pier are being made by the force of the Department. Work was begun September 13, 1910, and is still in progress.

Pier 50th St., North River—Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department. Work was originally begun January 22, 1909, and is still in progress.

Pier 51st St., North River—Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department. Work was originally begun April 12, 1910, and is still in progress.

Pier 52d St., North River—Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department. Work was begun September 19, 1910, and is still in progress.

Pier 54th St., North River—Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department. Work was originally begun January 24, 1910, and is still in progress.

Pier 57th St., North River—Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department. Work was originally begun January 26, 1910, and is still in progress.

Pier 80th St., North River—The sheathing on this pier is being repaired by the force of the Department. Work was originally begun March 16, 1910, and is still in progress.

Ninety-seventh St., North River—A platform is being built to provide accommodation for mooring the naval battleship "Granite State," and the pier at the foot of 97th st. has been repaired by the force of the Department.

Ninety-eighth St., North River—A float has been placed at this street for the use of the U. S. Atlantic Fleet.

Ninety-ninth St., North River—On the request of the President of the Borough of Manhattan clusters of piles have been driven at the foot of this street to accommodate a floating bath.

One Hundred and Tenth St., North River—Platform which was placed at this locality was removed by the force of the Department.

Pier 129th St., North River—Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department. The work is in progress.

One Hundred and Thirty-first St., North River—A contract, No. 1225, has been prepared and let for building a new steel freight shed with appurtenances on the pier and adjacent bulkhead at the foot of this street. Work was begun on September 30, 1910.

Pier 132nd st., North River—This pier is being extended out to the pierhead line by the force of the Department. Work was begun March 17, 1910, and is still in progress. The approach to the inner end of this pier has been repaired.

Pier 133d St., North River—This pier is being extended out to the pierhead line by the force of the Department. Work was begun May 20, 1910, and is still in progress.

One Hundred and Thirty-fourth St., North River—A contract, No. 1220, has been prepared and let for preparing for and extending the pier at the foot of West 134th st., known as Pier No. 124, but the work has not yet been begun thereunder.

Carmansville Section, North River—On the section of the waterfront between 153d and 158th sts., North River, improvements have been in progress under action of the Commissioner of Docks, dated May 14, 1907, authorizing the same.

During the quarter the Department force has been engaged in maintaining the rip-rap wall. Earth filling has been received and placed in rear of that portion of the wall built.

One Hundred and Fifty-seventh St., North River—The construction of a pier 60 by 200 feet has been in progress by the force of the Department at this street. This pier was begun on the 7th of June, 1909, and is still in progress. A float has been placed at the foot of 157th st. for the use of the U. S. Atlantic Fleet.

Pier 158th St., North River—Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department. Work was begun April 19, 1910, and is still in progress.

Man-of-War Landings, North River—The Department force has repaired and maintained the Man-of-War Landings along the North River as required from time to time during the quarter.

Marginal Street, North River—The granite pavement along the North River has been taken up and relaid to grade where necessary by the force of the Department.

Marginal Street, between 22d and 23d Sts., North River—The Marginal street at this locality has been paved under Contract No. 1200. The work was begun April 9th, 1910, and finished September 30, 1910.

#### East River.

Whitehall Terminal, East River—The work at this section will be found described further on in the report under the heading of "Ferries."

Pier 5, East River—Repairs are being made to this pier by the force of the Department under B. O. 8731. Work was begun August 16, 1910, and is in progress.

James Slip Section, East River—The authorization for this section is action of the Commissioner of Docks, dated April 30, 1907, B. O. 5191. This section extends from the easterly side of Oliver st., or Pier 25, East River, westerly along the bulkhead line to the center line of Pier (old) 31, a distance of about 326 feet. During the quarter some work on the bulkhead wall has been done. Earth filling has been deposited in rear of the bulkhead wall.

Oliver St. Pier, East River—A contract, No. 1147, has been awarded and the work has been begun for constructing a new pier at the foot of Oliver st., and building a new bulkhead platform westerly from said pier between James Slip and Oliver st., East River, within the lines of the James Slip Section.

Foundations have been prepared for reception of two 36-inch salt water mains across the marginal street area at the foot of Oliver st., East River, openings for which were left in the bulkhead wall, being done for the Department of Water Supply, Gas & Electricity.

Jefferson Section, East River—The authorization for this section is resolution of the Board of Docks passed February 23, 1900, also action of the Commissioner of Docks, dated March 28, 1908, B. O. 6049. This section extends from the northerly side of Rutgers Slip to the southerly side of Montgomery st., a distance of 1,237 feet. During the quarter work has been in progress on the bulkhead wall proper.

Montgomery Section, East River—The Commissioner of Docks on the 20th of January, 1909, under B. O. 7028, directed the supervision of the construction of a bulkhead wall by the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Co., between Montgomery st. and Gouverneur Slip, East River, a distance of about 472 linear feet. This work includes the construction of three piers, Nos. 39, 40 and 41. This work was begun by the railroad company on the 25th of March, 1909, and is still in progress. Steel sheds are in course of erection on Piers 39 and 40 by the above company.

Roosevelt Street Ferry, East River—The City having a short time previous taken possession of the old Roosevelt Street Ferry, a contract, No. 1221, was prepared and let for the work of reconstructing the ferry. Work was begun under the contract on the 25th of May, 1910, and is still in progress. In addition to the work being done under contract, No. 1221, repairs have been made to the bridges and platforms by the force of the Department.

Market St., East River—A contract, No. 1217, Class 2, has been prepared for repairing and painting the building on the recreation pier at the foot of Market st., East River, but the contract has not yet been let.

Corlears Section, East River—The authorization for this section is action of the Commissioner of the 23rd of December, 1909, B. O. 8029, which provides for the construction of the improvement under the New Plan between Jackson and Gouverneur sts., East River, the work to extend from a point at the easterly side of proposed Pier 41 to the easterly side of Pier (old) 54, East River, a distance of 759.94 feet.

During the quarter, work on the bulkhead wall proper at this section has been in progress. Vertical piles have been driven, regulated and staylathed. Rip-rap has been deposited, and concrete in bags has been placed. Granite has been set, and a relieving platform has been built in rear of the wall. Earth filling has been deposited in rear of that portion of the wall built.

Pier 5th St., East River—The Department force has made repairs to the unleased portion of this pier. Work begun May 31, 1910, and finished July 26, 1910.

East 23rd St. Ferry, East River—The City having a short time previous taken possession of the old 23rd st. Ferry, a contract, No. 1219, was prepared and let for the work of reconstructing the ferry. Work was begun under the contract on the 25th of May, 1910, and finished September 23, 1910.

Twenty-fourth St., East River—A contract, No. 1217, Class 1, has been prepared for repairing and painting the building on the recreation pier at the foot of E. 24th st., East River, but the contract has not yet been let.

New Bellevue Section, East River—The officials of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals being desirous of extending the grounds of the Bellevue Hospital between 26th and 28th sts., East River, by reason of the extensive improvements proposed to the hospital buildings in that vicinity, the bulkhead wall is being built along the new bulkhead line as modified by the Secretary of War, September 16, 1903, with the further modification extending the bulkhead line across the foot of 29th st. Work on this section of the bulkhead wall has been in progress during the quarter under B. O. 4981. Backing logs have been placed and fastened.

Yorkville Section, East River—The authorization for this section is action of the Commissioner of Docks of October 10, 1904, B. O. 2757. Work on this section has been in progress during the quarter. Between 65th and 66th and 66th and 67th sts. stone has been tubbed and mud pumped from foundation area. Rip-rap has been deposited in rear of the wall. Concrete in bags has been placed. Base blocks have been set, and chain holes in blocks have been filled with concrete in bags. Granite has been set in the wall and backed up with concrete backing. Twenty pieces of coping have been set, and mooring posts have been placed. Earth filling was deposited in rear of the wall. Between 64th and 65th sts. a temporary platform has been built south of the wall. Between 72nd and 73rd sts. stone was tubbed up and mud, sand and gravel were pumped off foundation. Concrete in bags was placed. Base blocks were set, and chain holes in blocks were filled with concrete in bags. Granite was set in the wall and backed up with concrete backing.

Blackwell Section, East River—The work at this section is being done under action of the Commissioner of Docks of October 10, 1904, B. O. 2756. Between 77th and 79th sts. pavement was relaid on the marginal street, and at 79th st. a crib was framed and fastened on the north end of the wall.

Ninety-fifth St., East River—The pier at this street is being reconstructed by the force of the Department under B. O. 7823, and a concrete deck is being placed on the pier.

Between 109th and 110th Sts., East River—Paving stone and railroad tracks along the marginal street in this vicinity were removed.

#### Harlem River.

Two Hundred and First and 215th Sts., Harlem River—The proposition of improving the waterfront in this locality has been considered during the quarter, and studies for a New Plan have been submitted for adoption by the Commissioner of Docks and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. Two different plans in duplicate with technical description for the improvement of the waterfront in this locality have been submitted. One of these plans contemplates the establishing of a marginal street along the whole stretch of the waterfront between W. 201st and 215th sts., 50 feet in width, except where included within the street lines, and along the northerly side of W. 207th st., where it is made 34 feet in width. This plan also establishes piers at the foot of W. 204th, 205th, 208th, 209th and 210th sts. The other New Plan contemplates the establishing of a bulkhead line only without provisions for a marginal street, and the establishing of piers at the foot of West 204th 205th, 208th and 215th sts., inclusive.

W. 210th St. to Fordham Road—Two 36-inch gas mains are being placed and crib bulkhead built at this locality by the Consolidated Gas Co. under permit from this Department. Work was begun April 1, 1910, and is in progress.

#### Borough of The Bronx.

W. 231st St., North River—Three small cribs have been constructed at this locality by the Hudson Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun May 15, 1910, and finished August 7, 1910.

Ferncliff Place, Between 150th and 151st Sts.—Two frame buildings have been constructed at this locality by the American Mahogany Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun March 1, 1910, and finished September 14, 1910.

Third to 4th Sts., Westchester Creek—Filling is being placed at this locality 100 feet inshore from the bulkhead by G. J. Kuhne under permit from this Department.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of The Bronx has been supervised and a general supervision of the waterfront made.

#### Work Done at the Various Islands in the East River.

Blackwells Island—The coal dock in front of the City Hospital at this island has been repaired by the force of the Department for the Department of Public Charities, and the storehouse dock has been repaired by the Department force for the same Department. The coal and ash dock on the easterly side of the island, in front of the Home for the Aged and Infirm, and the City Hospital dock have been repaired by the force of the Department for the Department of Public Charities. The workhouse dock at this island has been repaired for the Department of Correction.

Randalls Island, East River—The dock at this island has been repaired by the force of the Department for the Department of Public Charities.

#### Borough of Brooklyn.

Whale Creek Section, Brooklyn—In that section of the Borough of Brooklyn adjacent to Newtown Creek, near Greenpoint avenue, proceedings have been instituted and the necessary property has been acquired to secure pier room which exists only on Whale Creek, an arm of Newtown Creek. Near the mouth of Whale Creek the property acquired will not only enable the City to build over 1,000 feet of bulkhead wall with the adjacent marginal street, but also two piers. Dredging for this improvement was done under Contract No. 1025, same being completed on the 10th of January, 1910. Another contract, No. 1027, has been awarded for preparing for and building a new concrete bulkhead wall at the mouth of Whale Creek, and about 80 per cent of the work done. A contract, No. 1192, has been prepared and let for preparing for and building the exterior pier, with appurtenances, at the mouth of Whale Creek, Newtown Creek, and work under the contract was begun on the 23d of September, 1910.

N. 2d St., Brooklyn—A contract, No. 1217, Class 4, has been prepared for repairing and painting the building on the recreation pier at this location, but work under the contract has not yet been begun.

Between 28th and 64th Sts., South Brooklyn—A plan has been submitted and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund establishing new lines for bulkheads and piers, with marginal street, wharf or place, extending from 28th to 64th sts., South Brooklyn. Plans and studies are in progress for the dock improvement of this waterfront.

Gowanus Section, South Brooklyn—The work at this section is being done under authorization of the Commissioner of Docks of September 21, 1908, B. O. 6647. This section extends from the northerly side of 28th st. to the southerly side of 36th st., South Brooklyn, a distance of 2,142.82 feet, more or less. There have been completed up to date 1,198 linear feet of the bulkhead wall on the top course of granite under the coping, leaving a balance to be completed of 619 feet. During the quarter filling has been placed along the marginal street between 28th and 32d sts. and between 32d and 36th sts. A 30-inch tile sewer has been placed between 31st st. pier and 2d ave. by the Bush Terminal Co. The approach to the 31st st. pier has been paved.

Thirtieth St., South Brooklyn—A contract, No. 1209, was prepared during a prior quarter for building a new pier at the foot of 30th st., South Brooklyn, to be known as the 30th st. pier, but the contract has not yet been let.

Pier 31st St., South Brooklyn—The work of building a new pier between 31st and 32d sts., South Brooklyn, to be known as the 31st st. pier, was completed under Contract No. 1095 on the 22d of April, 1910, and a new steel freight shed is being erected thereon under Contract No. 1196.

Pier 22d St., South Brooklyn—The work of building a new pier at the foot of 33d st., South Brooklyn, to be known as the 33d st. pier, has been completed under Contract No. 1202.

36th St., South Brooklyn—The work of extending the bulkhead at the Market site along the northerly side of 36th st. by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn has been completed.

36th and 38th Sts., South Brooklyn—A contract, No. 1205, was prepared during a prior quarter for dredging between these two streets in the vicinity of the 8th Ward Market, Borough of Brooklyn, but the contract has not yet been let.

Greenpoint Avenue, Brooklyn—Pier at this locality is being reconstructed by the Interboro Ferry Co. under permit from this Department. Work was begun May 10, 1910, and is in progress.

N. 1st St., Brooklyn—Pier at this locality is being rebuilt by the New York, New Haven & Hartford R. R. Co. under permit from this Department. Work was begun August 9, 1910, and is in progress.

Clinton Ave. Extension, Brooklyn—Dumping Board at this locality has been removed by the Borough Con. Co. under permit from this Department. The dumping boards of the Department of Street Cleaning and the Borough Development Co. at this locality have also been removed.

Pier 1, Wallabout, Brooklyn—A dumping board has been constructed at this locality by the Borough Development Co. under permit from this Department. Work was begun July 13, 1910, and finished August 27, 1910.

Hallack, Columbia and Otsego Sts., Brooklyn—Filling has been placed at this locality by the estate of W. H. Beard under permit from this Department. Work was begun May 5, 1909, and finished May 5, 1910.

Fifth St. Basin, Brooklyn—Coal pocket and trestle are being constructed at this locality by Miss Carrie Wood under permit from this Department. Work was begun June 15, 1910, and is in progress.



Ninth St., Gowanus, Brooklyn—Steel shed has been constructed at this locality by the Cranford Co. under permit from this Department. Work was begun May 25, 1910, and finished July 30, 1910.

W. 22d-23d Sts., Coney Island Creek—Sheet pile bulkhead has been constructed and filling placed at this locality by the Neptune Ice Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun June 10, 1909, and finished September 25, 1910.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Brooklyn has been supervised and a general supervision of the waterfront made.

#### Borough of Queens.

Luyster Creek, Berriens Island—Pile platform and dyke have been constructed at this locality by the Astoria Light & Power Co. under permit from this Department. Work was begun December 15, 1908, and finished July 5, 1910.

Berriens Island and Lawrence Point, Queens—Bulkhead has been constructed at this locality by the Astoria Light & Power Co. under permit from this Department. Work was begun March 15, 1909, and finished July 5, 1910.

Mott Ave., Far Rockaway, Queens—Dredging and filling have been done at this locality by J. P. Donovan under permit from this Department. Work was begun May 1, 1910, and finished September 1, 1910.

Wavcrest, Norton's Creek, Jamaica Bay—Filling is being placed at this locality by Norton & Dickerson under permit from this Department.

Arverne, Amstell, Queens—Filling is being placed at this locality by the Summer-ville Realty Co. under permit from this Department.

Orienta and Pelham Ave., Jamaica Bay—Bulkhead has been constructed at this locality by the Belle Harbor Yacht Club under permit from this Department. Work was begun April 1, 1910, and finished May 7, 1910.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Queens has been supervised and a general supervision of the waterfront made.

A number of permits have been granted to occupy land and to erect structures thereon at Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens.

Jamaica Bay, Queens—Studies for the development of the waterfront within the limits of Jamaica Bay have been in progress during the quarter.

#### Borough of Richmond.

A description of the work being done for the ferry terminals in this Borough will be found later on under the heading of "Ferries."

At St. George, coal pier No. 2, near the foot of St. Nicholas st., is being reconstructed and the pier extended out to the pierhead line by the Baltimore & Ohio R. R. Co. under permit from this Department. Work was begun July 28, 1910, and is in progress.

At Stapleton, a sheet pile bulkhead about 430 feet east of Font st. and north of Water st. is being constructed by Thomas and Henry K. S. Williams under permit from this Department. Work was begun October 23, 1909, and is still in progress. An overflow storm water sewer is being constructed at the foot of Water st., Stapleton, by the President of the Borough of Richmond, under permit. Work begun May 10, 1910, and is in progress. A sewer is being constructed under the pier at Canal st., Stapleton, by the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Richmond, under permit. Work was begun March 25, 1910, and is in progress. A sewer is being constructed through the concrete wall near the foot of Water st., Stapleton, by the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Richmond, under permit. Work was begun June 5, 1910, and is in progress.

At Clifton, a sewer outlet is being constructed at the foot of Maple ave. by the President of the Borough of Richmond under permit. Work was begun January 10, 1910, and is in progress.

At Rosebank, a bungalow has been erected on the pile structure at the south side of Ives pl. by Elizabeth R. Jenkins under permit. Work was begun March 4, 1910, and finished July 16, 1910.

At Tottenville, a canal boat has been placed at the foot of Johnson ave., piles driven in front of same, runway erected outshore thereof, and earth filling is being deposited in rear of said boat by Hubbard R. Yetman under permit. Work was begun December 22, 1904, and is in progress.

At West New Brighton, filling is being placed near the foot of Columbia st. by William S. Van Clief under permit. Work was begun June 1, 1908, and is in progress. A pier has been constructed between Bement and Davis aves. by Eberhard Faber under permit. Work was begun June 21, 1910, and finished September 3, 1910.

At Port Richmond, a retaining structure has been built and filling is being placed in rear of same from time to time in the vicinity of Bay and Simonson aves. by Edward White under permit. Work was originally begun March 6, 1900, and is in progress.

At Mariners Harbor, ashes are being dumped for the purpose of filling in on their property in the vicinity of Hausman ave. by the Standard Varnish Works under permit. Work was begun March 12, 1908, and is in progress. A boathouse is being constructed opposite South ave., Mariners Harbor, by William M. Haugwout under permit. Work was begun December 21, 1908, and is in progress.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Richmond has been supervised and a general supervision of the waterfront made.

Pavement on Marginal Street, North, East and Harlem Rivers—The granite pavement along the North, East and Harlem Rivers has been repaired from time to time, and the asphalt pavement where taken up to repair gas pipe by the Consolidated Gas Co. has been relaid. Repairs have been made to the asphalt pavement on the North and East Rivers during the quarter under Contract No. 1229, Classes 1 and 2.

Old Material Storage Basin, Nott Ave., Queens—Old material has been rafted and cared for. Piles were driven in rack, and platform was constructed at north end of Basin.

Pile Basin, Shermans Creek, Harlem River—The Pile Basin at Shermans Creek, Harlem River, has been maintained and cared for.

Timber Basin, 75th St., North River—At the Timber Basin, timber has been received under Department orders and contracts, cared for and issued as required.

Department Yards at W. 57th and E. 24th Sts.—At the Department Yards, the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of materials and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. At the W. 57th St. Yard, a concrete building has been in course of construction since April 26, 1907, for use as a blacksmith shop, power house, etc. This structure is provided with a reinforced concrete coal pocket. The Department stores removed from the old building to suitable places were subsequently stored in the new storehouse. The work of furnishing and erecting appliances, etc., to complete the electric installation at the Department Yards at W. 57th st. and E. 24th st. has been in progress under Contract No. 1195.

Floating Property—All of the Floating Property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter and repaired where necessary.

Dredging—All the dredging has been supervised whether done by the Department or by private parties.

Surveying Party—All the necessary lines, levels, grades, soundings, surveys and examinations have been made and given. Work done by private parties has been supervised, automatic tide gauges have been attended to, and the daily and weekly reports have been made. The records of the anerometer and weather vane, etc., have been compiled. An extensive survey of the water fronts of Brooklyn, Queens, The Bronx and Richmond is in progress.

Recreation Structures—The recreation structures have been maintained during the quarter and the necessary repairs made from time to time. Contracts have been prepared for repairing and painting the buildings on the recreation piers, but the same have not yet been let.

Public Baths—The Department has prepared the berths for the floating baths for the season of 1910, and the placing of the public baths has been supervised.

High Pressure Water Mains—The Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity has installed a high pressure water main within the marginal street area along the Chelsea Section between W. 14th and W. 21st sts., North River. This work was begun in August, 1909, and finished in July, 1910.

#### Ferries.

Staten Island Ferry—The New Staten Island Ferry, operating between the foot of Whitehall st., Manhattan, and the foot of South st., St. George, Borough of Richmond, with the Whitehall Terminal at the Manhattan end and the St. George Terminal at the Staten Island end, was started in operation by the City on October, 25, 1905.

St. George Terminal—"I" beams have been substituted at the St. George Terminal in place of timber under the concrete floor under the boilers of the heating plant for protection against fire. Work was begun December 9, 1909, and finished August 2, 1910.

A wall has been built so as to connect with the approach built by the Richmond Borough authorities to the Staten Island Ferry Terminal. This wall is of concrete construction surmounted by a concrete parapet, and is filled in with the ashes from the ferryboats. Work was begun March 25, 1909, and finished August 8, 1910.

A Contract, No. 1213, was prepared and let for constructing railings, gates and stairway in the ferry house at St. George, S. I., and the work has been in progress during the quarter.

Stapleton Terminal—The proposition for establishing a Municipal Ferry to Stapleton was consummated on the 27th day of May, 1909, by preparations made for the running of ferryboats from that point to Whitehall st., Manhattan. Plans and Contract No. 1182 have been prepared for the construction of new ferryboats for service on this ferry, but the contract has not been let. A contract is also in course of preparation for constructing a new ferry terminal at this locality.

Port Richmond Terminal—The proposition for extending the Municipal Ferry from Manhattan by an additional terminal at Port Richmond has been under consideration during the quarter.

#### South Brooklyn Ferry.

Thirty-ninth St. Ferry, South Brooklyn, Manhattan Terminal—On November 1, 1906, the City came into possession of the property of the New York and South Brooklyn Ferry and Steam Transportation Co., operating a ferry between Whitehall st., Manhattan, and 39th st., South Brooklyn, and since that time the City has been operating the ferry as a Municipal Ferry.

A Contract, No. 1216, has been prepared and let for constructing offices and appurtenances, toilets, etc., on the third floor of the 39th St. Ferry House, Manhattan Terminal, and the work will shortly be begun thereunder.

Thirty-ninth St. Ferry, South Brooklyn Terminal—Preliminary studies have been prepared for a ferry house at 39th st., South Brooklyn.

Draughtsmen—In the office of the Chief Engineer, the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the water front, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examination of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general routine work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounts to 6,190 linear feet. Wharfage room destroyed by the City in making way for new improvements amounts to 1,080 linear feet. The area of the City's piers has been increased by 257,119 square feet. New wharfage room made by private parties under permit from this Department amounts to 2,965 linear feet, and the wharfage room destroyed by private parties amounts to 2,570 linear feet. 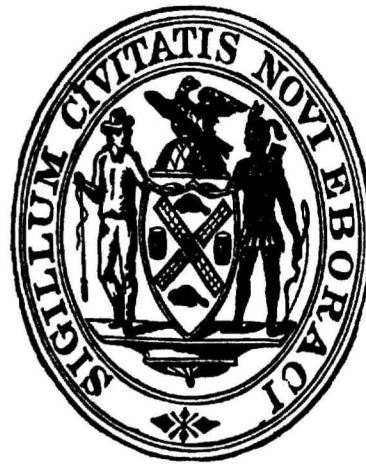

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to the Conron Bros. Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by Conron Bros. Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to Conron Bros. Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as

to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

#### Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 19 , by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and Conron Bros. Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree, as follows: Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate certain conduits with the necessary branches and extensions therefrom, leading directly into private property, for the sole purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, provided that no conduit be of a greater outside diameter than twelve (12) inches, including insulation or other covering; the same to be constructed and operated only beneath the surface of such of the streets, avenues and highways situate within the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, as are included within the district bounded and described as follows:

On the north by the centre line of West 134th street, west of the centre line of 12th avenue, and the centre line of West 132d street, east of the centre line of 12th avenue; on the west by the easterly line of the marginal street, wharf or place, as adopted by the Commissioner of Docks February 27, 1907, approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 3, 1907, and laid down on the map of the Department of Docks and Ferries; on the south by the centre line of West 129th street, west of the centre line of 12th avenue, as extended to the centre line of West 129th street, and the centre line of West 130th street, east of said centre line of 12th avenue as extended; on the east by the centre line of 12th avenue, from the centre line of West 134th street to the centre line of West 132d street, the centre line of Broadway from the centre line of West 132d street to the centre line of West 130th street, and the line which would be formed by the extension of the centre line of 12th avenue from the centre line of West 130th street to the centre line of West 129th street. Said district being more particularly shown by red lines on a map, entitled:

"Map showing district applied for by Conron Bros. Company to accompany petition dated May 25, 1910, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York."

—signed by Joseph Conron, President, a copy of which is hereto annexed and made a part of this contract.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said conduits shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of ten (10) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the renewal shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted, the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of six hundred and fifty dollars (\$650) in cash within one (1) month after the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), and which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250).

During the second term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350).

During the third term of five years, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five hundred dollars (\$500), and which shall be equal

to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500).

The gross receipts mentioned above shall be the total receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers.

(c) An annual payment of twenty-five cents (\$0.25) for each linear foot of conduit constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway, excepting, however, such conduits as are constructed within the vault space or vault spaces of any building or buildings used or occupied exclusively by the Company for the purpose of its business.

An annual payment of two dollars (\$2) for each manhole constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on February 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to December 31, next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and December 31 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before February 1 in each year for the year ending December 31 next preceding.

(d) Before any rights hereby conferred are exercised by the Company and within one (1) month from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the Company shall pay to the City the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750); said amount being due the City by reason of the unauthorized occupation of the streets by the Company or its predecessors.

And all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for the payment of such charges or payments for franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the streets and avenues mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant any individual, firm or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, in the same streets and avenues, or within the district hereinbefore described.

Fifth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the conduits and appurtenances of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its conduits and appurtenances constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Eighth—All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said conduit line, connections, manholes and other appurtenances, and the mode of protection of all subsurface construction under the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Ninth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the conduits of the Company, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Tenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly, by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the conduits and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Eleventh—The Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced, all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for the repairing of the conduit line and its appurtenances.

Twelfth—The Company shall bear the expense of inspection which may be required by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of all work of construction.

Thirteenth—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes to be contained within the conduits hereby authorized whenever required by and under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The conditions of such test shall be as follows:

(a) If the test be made in the foundry where the pipes are manufactured, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of three hundred (300) pounds per square inch.

(b) If the test be made in the field, of pipes in use or ready for use, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of two hundred (200) pounds per square inch.

A certificate showing that such a test has been made without injury to the pipes shall be executed by an officer of the Company, and indorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and filed with the Board.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not charge consumers more than the following rates:

(a) Consumers making monthly contracts: Four (4) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of not over 500 cubic feet.

Two (2) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of over 500 cubic feet, but less than 1,500 cubic feet.

One (1) cent per month per cubic foot for boxes of 1,500 cubic feet and over.

(b) Consumers making yearly contracts: Fifteen (15) cents per year per cubic foot of box.

These rates to apply to boxes located not above the first floor of any building.

During the term of this contract, the Board shall have absolute power to regulate the maximum rates, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Fifteenth—The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person, firm or corporation whose premises are located within the district hereinbefore described shall extend its conduits to such premises and furnish to said applicant refrigeration at the rates herein prescribed or at such rates as may be hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided. 11. Number of feet of conduit now laid.
12. The total amount expended for same.
13. Amount, kind and capacity of machinery now in use and required for operation.
14. The total amount expended for same.
15. Quantity of refrigeration produced during the year and the average price received for same.
16. Quantity used in Company's own warehouses.
17. Quantity furnished to outside consumers.
18. Number and location of warehouses occupied by the Company, exclusively or in part, and the extent of such occupation by the Company.
19. Number of outside consumers supplied.
20. Amounts paid by Company for damages to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
21. Total expenses of operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract, and on or before February 1 in each year shall make a verified report to the Comptroller of The City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending December 31 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain the number of feet of conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twentieth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the conduits constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or a certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
