Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Held in Room 16, City Hall, Thursday, December 11, 1913.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

The Mayor, Hon. Ardolph L. Kline, presided.

PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT MATTERS.

Public Hearing on the Proposed Extension of the Area of Assessment in the Proceeding for Acquiring Title to the Lands Required for the Widening of Canal Street, at Its Easterly Junction with the Bowery, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 1).

(At the meeting of the Board on September 25, 1913, a hearing on the recom-

mendations of the Chief Engineer was fixed for October 23, 1913, and the request of the petitioners for a reapportionment of the cost of the proceeding was referred to a Committee consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn. This Committee was discharged on October 2, 1913, and the matter referred to a new Committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Richmond.)

(At the meeting of the Board on December 4, 1913, the hearing in this matter was continued for one week; December 11, 1913.)

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been

duly advertised. Mr. Robert M. Flaherty appeared and requested that the matter be laid over until January, 1914, and Mr. Michael J. Mulqueen appeared and requested that

action be deferred for one week. Mr. Truman H. Baldwin appeared in opposition to further delay in the matter,

On motion of the President of the Borough of Manhattan the hearing was again continued for one week (December 18, 1913).

Authorizing the Corporation Counsel to Proceed with the Matter of Acquiring Title to East 12th Street, from Avenue H to Avenue T; East 13th Street, from Avenue H to Avenue T, and from Gravesend Neck Road to Neptune Avenue; East 14th Street, from Avenue D to Foster Avenue; from Avenue H to Kings Highway, and from Avenue V to Gravesend Neck Road; East 15th Street, from Avenue H to Kings Highway, and from Avenue V to Emmons Avenue, Excluding from Each Street the Lands Occupied by the Long Island Railroad, and Also from East 13th Street and East 15th Street the Land Occupied by the Tracks of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, Borough of Brooklyn (Cal. No. 2).

(At the meeting of the Board on December 4, 1913, a resolution was adopted fixing December 24, 1913, as the date for a hearing on a proposed map change affecting certain of these streets, and the request of the Borough President for the advance-

ment of the proceeding was laid over for one week.)

The President of the Borough of Brooklyn offered the following Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York on October 24, 1912, adopted a resolution requesting the Corporation Counsel to suspend action in the proceeding instituted by said Board on February 28, 1908, for acquiring title to East 12th street, from Avenue H to Avenue T; East 13th street, from Avenue H to Avenue T, and from Gravesend Neck road to Neptune avenue; East 14th street, from Avenue D to Foster avenue, from Avenue H to Kings highway and from Avenue V to Gravesend Neck road; East 15th street, from Avenue H to Kings highway and from Avenue V to Emmons avenue, excluding from each street the land occupied by the tracks of the Long Island Railroad; and also from East 13th street and East 15th street the land occupied by the tracks of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, Borough of Brooklyn, which proceeding was amended on October 17, 1912, so as to relate to the lines of East 13th street, between Avenue Y and Avenue Z as shown upon a map or plan adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment November 16, 1911, and approved by the Mayor November 28, 1911, and also by excluding that portion of East 15th street, between Sheepshead Bay road and Voorhies avenue; and

Whereas, A change in the City map is proposed which will affect East 15th

street, between Elm avenue and Locust avenue; be it

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is requested to advance the proceeding for acquiring title to the foregoing streets, except in so far as it affects East 15th street, between Elm avenue and Locust avenue.

Which was adopted by the following vote

Affirmative-The Mayor, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond-16.

Vesting Title to Damage Parcel No. 11, Required for the Opening of Olmstead Avenue, from Protectory Avenue to the Bulkhead Line of Pugsleys Creek, Borough of The Bronx (Cal. No. 3).

(A proceeding for acquiring title to Olmstead avenue, from West Farms road to Pugsleys Creek; Odell street (Jackson street), from Unionport road to Purdy street, and Purdy street (Washington street), from Westchester avenue to West Farms road, Borough of The Bronx, was authorized by tesolutions adopted by the Board on March 26, 1909, and March 21, 1912.)

(At the meeting of the Board held on November 26, 1913, this matter was laid over for one week, and on December 4 it was again laid over for one week.)

On motion of the President of the Borough of The Bronx the matter was again laid over for one week (December 18, 1913).

Application for an Extension of Time in Which to Comply with the Order Directing the Relocation of Tracks of the New York Railways Company on Central Park

West, Between 59th Street and 110th Street, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 4) (At the meeting of the Board held on December 4, 1913, this matter was laid over for one week.) Mr. Henry J. Smith, representing the New York Railways Company, appeared

and requested that the matter be adjourned for two weeks.

Messrs. Joseph Caccavajo and D. S. Harde appeared in opposition to the pro-

posed improvement. The President of the Borough of Manhattan offered the following:

Whereas, By resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on August 28, 1913, the New York Railways Company was directed to relocate its tracks on Central Park West, between 59th and 110th streets, Borough of Manhattan, and to physically commence the work within ninety days, and to have it fully executed within six months from the date of the adoption of the resolution, and

Whereas, Under date of November 25, 1913, the President of the New York Railways Company requested an extension of time, until April 26, 1914, within which to notify the Board whether or not the Company would accept the order embodied in Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby denies the amount as the limit. Respectfully,

request of the President of the New York Railways Company for an extension of time, and requests the Corporation Counsel to take the necessary steps to compel the Company to relocate its tracks in accordance with the resolution adopted by the Board on August 28, 1913.

Petition for Reduction in the Width of Lurting Avenue, Between West Farms Road and the Property of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, Borough of The Bronx (Cal. No. 5).

The Secretary presented the following communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx:

City of New York, President of the Borough of The Bronx, Office of the President, December 8, 1913.

Mr. Joseph Haag, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

ir-At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on July 31, 1913, the petition of property owners requesting that the width of Lurting avenue, between West Farms road and the property of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, Borough of The Bronx, be fixed at fifty feet, was referred back to me.

I have examined the property personally and have heard all the arguments in favor of lessening the width and considered all the objections to it. Lurting avenue from Walker avenue to the New Haven Railroad tracks, a distance of one and onehalf blocks, is at present physically opened and used as a fifty-foot street. A foot

bridge is proposed to carry this street over the railroad tracks.

If the present traffic on Lurting avenue was the only thing to be considered, a width of fifty feet would be sufficient. It is necessary, however, in street planning to provide for the future. The final map of the district has been laid out and approved with Lurting avenue between the limits named as a street of sixty feet in width. The cost of widening the street will be considerable because there is a substantial building on the corner of Lurting and Walker avenues, which will be a total destruction.

In a few years the developments about Westchester square, in the neighborhood of this street, will make lots too valuable for the present improvements on the street. This will require that the present houses be torn down and new ones erected. The new improvements, to be adequate for the neighborhood, will require a street sixty feet in width. I think, therefore, it would be doing no favor ultimately to the owners on this street if the street were reduced in width to fifty feet.

However, it is desirable, if possible, to save the owners from heavy expenses at present. Whether this can be done or not depends upon the owners themselves. recommend, therefore, that the petition of the property owners to reduce the width to fifty feet be denied, unless all the owners on the street and persons holding mortgages thereon, enter into a covenant with one another and with the City (such covenant to run with the land), that they will not erect any improvements on their respective properties within five feet of the street lines on each side of the street. This would leave the street fifty feet in width as it is at present, and prevent any buildings being erected nearer the center of the street than if it were sixty feet in width. When the time comes that it is necessary to acquire the extra five feet on each side, this can be done with no more expense than would be incurred at the present time. Yours very truly,

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York: Gentlemen-Your petitioners, owners of property assessed for benefit in the above

entitled proceeding respectfully state as follows:

That supplemental to the petition heretofore presented by your petitioners to your Honorable Board, which petition recited the history of this proceeding and showed the great injustice of placing the assessment locally, now desire to state that they believe that under chapter 26 of the Laws of 1909, entitled "An act in relation to cities constituting chapter 21 of the consolidated Laws as amended" and known as the "Home Rule Bill," your honorable Board has the power to assess the entire cost of this widening upon the Borough of Richmond, they therefore respectfully ask that you direct that such cost be assumed by said Borough. Increasing the Limitation for the Borough of Queens for Completed Local Improvements not Returned to the Board of Assessors (No. 7)

The Secretary presented the following communication from the President of the Borough of Queens The City of New York. Office of the President of the Borough of Queens, Long

Island City, December 11, 1913. Honorable Ardolph L. Kline, Mayor, and Chairman, Board of Estimate and Appor-

tionment, City of New York: Sir-By resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment five hundred

housand dollars was allowed the Borough of Queens, at quarterly periods, for an excess of final work returned, for which on the same date assessment lists had not as yet been returned. On account of the increased quantity of work, especially upon new sewers, that

now being undertaken by the Borough, over and above what was being done at the time the above limit was fixed, it is practically impossible to keep within this limit at all times and particularly during the summer months when construction is at its highest point and when the available office force for this particular purpose is obviously at its lowest point. With large contracts, amounting to two hundred thousand to two hundred and

fifty thousand dollars, the work of completing the assessment lists, even though everything possible has been done prior to the date of turning in the final certificate, is still so great as to require even months in some cases.

This condition is partly due to the nature of the work and partly to the fact that the maps of the Tax Office are constantly changing. As an illustration, at this time maps are being prepared in our Sewer Bureau for a contract that cannot be completed before next June, and we know very well that changes will be made so that the

final comparison must be made just prior to the turning in of the list. Besides the work in preparing the lists is the final accounting, which cannot be definitely determined until the close of the month when the payrolls are put through these divisions, so that it may be definitely known that there are no more charges to be brought in. Frequently also there are differences between the books of the Finance Department and the books of the Sewer Bureau, which require a comparison of all charges in order to find the reason for the differences, a matter which takes considerable time. There are other reasons which could be mentioned, particularly the fact that the assessment maps cannot be completed until the final survey has been turned in and plotted thereon, showing the locations and amounts of the

different items and quantities assessable to the various parcels. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has recently given final authorization for work to be done in a single contract at a cost exceeding \$1,100,000, most of which work will have to be performed and a final certificate turned in before the assess-

ment maps can be prepared. In view of these conditions, which cannot be set aside or overcome, I consider that in the case of this Borough the excess of final work returned should be raised the resolution of August 28, 1913, directing the Company to relocate its tracks, be it to a figure of not less than \$1,000,000, and urgently request that the Board fix this

(d) Designating the New York Press and the Brooklyn Standard Union as the two daily newspapers in which the form of contract and notice of hearing thereon, modifying contract dated July 10, 1912, granting a franchise to the Manhattan Bridge Three-Cent Line by changing the line of its route in the Borough of Brooklyn, shall be published prior to the hearing on December 24, 1913.

(e) Granting the Long Island Railroad Company permission to construct, maintain and use a spur track across and on the surface of Johnson avenue east of Varick avenue, Borough of Brooklyn. (Approved December 2, 1913.)

Sir—The Lebanon Hospital Association has presented a petition dated November 12, 1913, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for permission to construct, maintain and use a two-inch steam pipe under and across Cauldwell avenue, connecting the hospital on the easterly side of the avenue with the Nurses' Training School opposite on the westerly side for the purpose of supplying the last-mentioned building with heat from the main boiler of the hospital. The pipe is located at a point on the easterly building line of Cauldwell Avenue 310.23 feet north of Westchester Avenue and on the westerly building line 330.09 feet north of the same

At the meeting of the Board held November 26, 1913, the petition was referred to

the Bureau of Franchises for investigation and report.

Copies of the petition with accompanying plan were forwarded to the President of the Borough of The Bronx and to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, with a request that examinations be made by the various bureaus of their departments having jurisdistion with a view to ascertaining if there are any objec-tions to the proposed pipe or any particular conditions necessary to be incorporated in the form of consent heretofore used by the Board for similar privileges. The hospital representative having stated that there was immediate and urgent necessity for the pipe, he was advised by this office to take the matter up with the Borough President and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity with a view to obtaining emergency permits for the installation of the pipe pending action by the Board on the petition; such permits to be issued only under a stipulation that the consent of the Board would be granted and accepted by the hospital; otherwise the pipe to be removed by the hospital.

The hospital obtained a permit from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity on November 21, 1913, and commenced the installation of the pipe on November 24 and completed the work on November 26, without, however, obtaining a permit from the office of the Borough President. The Borough President called attention to this neglect, and the hospital represented that the failure to obtain such permit was due to a misapprehension of the necessities of the situation. In a communication dated December 1, 1913, the Borough President has stated that there are no objections to the granting of the requested consent, and it would therefore appear that the hospital has made satisfactory explanation of its failure to obtain an emergency permit. Under date of November 28, 1913,, the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity has advised me that there are no objections to the pipe.

The customary examination by this Bureau disclosed no objections to the project and as the administrative departments of the City have reported favorably, I can see no good reason why the requested permission should not be given should the Board see fit to do so. In such case I would suggest that consent be granted only during the pleasure of the Board, but in no case to extend beyond a period of ten or changes in all structures required by the construction or removal of the same. (10) years from November 24, 1913, the date upon which the work of installing the

pipe was begun and revocable upon sixty (60) days' notice. In accordance with the procedure of the Board in all similar cases of consents to charitable, religious and benevolent institutions, it is suggested that the customary requirement for a security deposit be waived and that the compensation be fixed at the nominal sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25) per annum.



1. This consent shall continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and shall be revocable upon sixty (60) days' notice in writing to the grantee, but in no case shall it extend beyond a term of ten (10) years from November 24, 1913, and thereupon all rights of the grantee in said street by virtue of this consent shall cease and determine.

2. The grantee shall pay into the Treasury of The City of New York, as compensation for the privilege hereby granted the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) per annum. Such payments shall be made in advance on November 1 of each year, provided, however, that the first payment shall be made within sixty (60) days of the approval of this consent by the Mayor, and shall be only such proportion of the annual charge as the time between the approval of this consent by the Mayor and November 1 following bears to a whole year.

Upon the removal of the grantee from either of the premises to be connected by the structure, or upon the revocation or termination by limitation of this consent, the grantee shall cause the structure hereby authorized to be removed and all of said street affected by this permission to be restored to its proper and original condition, if required so to do by The City of New York or its duly authorized representatives, and the entire cost of such work shall be borne by the said grantee. If the structure eby authorized shall not be required to be rethe property of The City of New York.

4. This consent is for the exclusive use of the grantee and shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto. or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person, firm or corporation whatsoever, either by the acts of the grantee or by operation of law, without the consent in writing of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

5. The grantee shall pay the entire cost of all work, labor and material in con-

nection with the structure hereby authorized, and particularly-(a) Its construction, maintenance and removal.

(b) The protection of all structures which shall in any way be disturbed

by its construction or removal. (c) All changes in sewers or other subsurface structures necessitated by its construction or removal, including the laying or relaying of pipes, conduits, sewers or other structures.

(d) The replacing or restoring of the pavement in said street which may be disturbed during its construction or removal.

(e) Each and every item of the increased cost of the installation of any future structures or repairs or alterations to any existing or future structures caused by its presence in the street.

(f) The inspection of all work during its construction or removal as herein provided, which may be required by the President of the Borough and the Com-

missioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

6. Before the construction or removal shall be begun, the grantee shall obtain permits to do the work from the President of the Borough and from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The grantee shall perform all the duties which may be imposed by those officials as conditions of such permits, provided such conditions are not inconsistent with the provisions of this consent. The grantee shall submit to those officials working plans which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of the structure hereby authorized and the mode of protection

Upon the completion of the work, the grantee shall furnish to the President of the Borough a plan of such character as he may direct, showing accurately and distinctly the location, size and type of construction and complete dimensions of the structure erected or installed under this consent; also the location and dimensions of all substructures encountered during the progress of the work. The depth below the street surface of the new structure and of the substructures encountered must be shown; also their location with reference to the nearest curb line and the nearest curb-line intersection.

7. The grantee shall allow to The City of New York a right of way through, under or above any part of the structure hereby authorized for any and all structures which are now or may be hereafter placed by The City of New Yor' /in said street.

If at any time it shall become necessary to replace or alter structure in said street, the City shall have the right to break through or remo or any portion of the structure hereby authorized and the grantee shall pay of file City the expense incurred by such removal.

8. The structure hereby authorized and any fixtures laid therein shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of the proper authorities of The City of New York. It shall be open at all times to the inspection of all the authorities who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York.

9. This consent is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of

abutting property or others may have ir and to said street.

10. Said grantee shall be liable for all damages to persons or property, including

operation or maintenance of the structure hereby authorized, and it is a condition of this consent that The City of New York assumes no liability to either person or prop-

11. This consent is granted on the further and express condition that all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may hereafter be adopted, shall be strictly com-

12. Said grantee shall give notice, in writing, to the President of the Borough and to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of its intention to begin the work hereby authorized at least forty-eight hours before such work commences. The grantee shall also give to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment notice, in writing, of the date on which the work is commenced and also the date on which the same is completed, not later than ten (10) days after such dates.

13. This consent shall be null and void unless said grantee shall duly execute an instrument in writing, wherein said grantee shall accept this consent and shall promise, covenant and agree to conform to, abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this consent fixed and contained and file said instrument with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York within thirty (30) days after the approval of this consent by the Mayor; provided, however, that such time may be extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

And said grantee shall promise, covenant and agree in said instrument to hold The City of New York harmless from all damages to persons or property which may result from the construction, use, maintenance or operation of the structure hereby

authorized Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative-The Mayor, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Queens, and the Acting President of the Borough of

Central Brewing Company of New York (Cal. No. 14).

In the matter of the consent granted the Central Brewing Company of New York to install, maintain and use a twelve-inch cast iron pipe under and across Exterior Street north of East 68th Street, Borough of Manhattan, to connect with a size under the marginal street and through the hulkhead into the East River pipe under the marginal street and through the bulkhead into the East River, for the purpose of conveying salt water to the plant of the grantee.

This consent was granted by resolution adopted by this Board October 16, 1913,

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City Hall, Manhattan Borough, New York

Gentlemen—I represent the owner of premises 3460 and 3462 Bailey Avenue, in the Borough of the Bronx, City of New York. The premises above mentioned are new buildings and the owner has eight tenants prepared to move in on or before December 1, 1913, but they will be unable to do so unless gas is installed on or before that date. The owner expects to have other tenants prepared to go into said premises on or before that date, but the tenants will be unable to occupy the premises without gas, as I understand the cooking is to be done on gas ranges. I have further been informed that owing to some dispute over the franchise between the Bureau of Gas and Electricity and the Westchester Lighting Company of Yonkers, that permits will not be issued for the installation of gas without a special resolution from the Board of Estimate. I therefore make application for a temporary permit pending the settlement of this franchise dispute so that gas may be installed in said premises without further delay, as it can be readily seen that the owner of said premises will suffer great damage if not permitted to install gas in said premises at once. It is respectfully requested that said temporary permit be authorized by the Board with as little delay as possible. Very truly yours,

Hon. Ardolph L. Kline, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Sir-Joseph Rosenzweig, Esq., Attorney for the owner of the premises situated at 3460 and 3462 Bailey avenue in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, in a communication dated November 24, 1913, states that the premises referred to are new buildings which have been completed and that the owner has obtained tenants who have agreed to move in on or before December 1, 1913. He therefore makes application that the Board authorize the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to allow the Westchester Lighting Company, which operates in this territory and which the Corporation Counsel has ruled to be operating without a franchise, to lay the necessary extensions of its mains in order to connect with and to supply gas to these buildings.

After the Corporation Counsel had ruled upon the lack of franchise of the Westchester Lighting Company, it on October 16 was called upon by the Board to submit an application for a proper franchise on or before November 28 and to advise as to its intentions on or before November 14, but at the meeting held November 20 an extension of time to November 28 was granted to the Company to communicate its conclusions as to what it proposed to do. Neither the information thus asked for nor the application required was filed by the Company on that date, but a further extension of time to December 18 to comply with the resolution of October 16 was granted by the Board at its meeting held Thursday, December 4.

In view of this situation and so as not to unduly inconvenience the people resident

in three cases authorizing the Company to make connections with and to supply gas to the Montefiore Home, the New Woodlawn Heights Methodist Episcopal Church and the Church Extension Committee of the Presbytery of New York for the new church building at the northwest corner of 240th street and Martha avenue.

In view of the precedent thus established, and pending the determination of the franchise proceedings, it is recommended that in order not to inconvenience the occupants of these buildings, the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be authorized to grant a temporary revocable permit to the Westchester Lighting Company, allowing it to extend its mains for this purpose.

A form of resolution for this purpose similar to that heretofore used is submitted herewith.

Resolved, That pending the final outcome of the present situation with respect to the Westchester Lighting Company, the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be and they are hereby authorized to grant a temporary revocable permit to the said Westchester Lighting Company, authorizing it to construct such gas mains as may be necessary for the purpose of connecting its existing gas mains with the buildings situated at 3460 and 3462 Bailey avenue, Borough of The Bronx, upon condition, however, that before any such permit is granted, the Westchester Lighting Company enter into a stipulation in a form approved by the Corporation Counsel, binding it to remove such mains in the event of the failure on the part of the said Company to apply to this Board and obtain a proper franchise authorizing it to conduct its operations in the said portion of the Borough of The Bronx, and containing such other conditions and requirements as to the Corporation Counsel may appear proper and necessary; provided, however, that this resolution is upon the express condition that no other connections shall be made by the said Westchester Lighting Company pending the final outcome of the present franchise proceedings.

Which was adopted by the following vote: Affirmative-The Mayor, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brook-

Department of Finance-Establishment of Grade of Position of Appraiser of Real

Gentlemen-Request is hereby made that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommend to the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, that a salary for the position of Appraiser of Real Estate in the Department of Finance be fixed at \$6,000 per annum.

During the previous administration and for five months of the present administration there were two Appraisers of Real Estate with annual salaries of \$4,000 each. The present incumbent was appointed February 16, 1910, with salary as at present,

namely, \$4,000, and since June 30, 1910, he has been the only Appraiser. He has performed all the duties, which formerly were divided between the two positions, in a most competent and highly satisfactory manner, and this request is presented with the view of making the salary of the position commensurate with the value of his services.

General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation-Transfer to (Cal. No. 20). The Secretary presented the following:

Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, December 2, 1913. To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York:

Gentlemen-I herewith submit for your consideration a resolution providing for the transfer to the general fund for the reduction of taxation of the cash balance in the account known as "Water Meter Fund, No. 1."

An examination and audit of this fund has been made by representatives of the

Division of Expert Accounting of the Department of Finance, and a report thereon dated November 25, 1913, is attached hereto and made a part of this communication. The findings set forth in said report may be briefly stated as follows: Prior to 1880, pursuant to legislative enactments, funds were provided by appropri-

ations and the issue of revenue bonds to the extent of \$47,555.94 for the purpose of advancing the expenses of installing water meters, such advances to be assessed upon the premises wherein said meters were installed.

By reason of errors and inadequate or improper methods of bookkeping, the status of this fund, after it had been operated for a few years, became so much obscured that a fresh start was made. Further funds were provided from time to time by No. 18 of the proposed White Plains Road Rapid Transit Railroad, extending from issue of revenue bonds and a new fund account was opened, known as "Water Meter White Plains road, in the Borough of The Bronx, 285 feet north of the centre line of Fund. No. 2." which has taken care of all transactions of this nature since, and the ast 241st street, current collections of assessments for advances have been sufficient for several years past to meet the expenditures without further issue of revenue bonds.

Through liquidation since 1880 and by correction of errors discovered in making the audit previously referred to, Water Meter Fund, No. 1, has been adjusted, and

shows a free and unencumbered cash balance of \$46,576.53. As this balance is not required for water meter purposes—the balance in Water Meter Fund, No. 2, being now sufficient for such purposes-it becomes available for transfer to general fund, pursuant to section 237 of the Greater New York Charter,

and I therefore recommend that this be done. WM. A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller. Respectfully,

In connection therewith I report as follows:

That part of section 1542 appropriate to the present request reads as follows: "It shall be lawful, however, for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in its discretion, and upon the certificate of the District Attorney of any such County that the public interest demand for the proper conduct of a criminal action of exceptional difficulty that an additional appropriation be made for that purpose, to make such appropriation and to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to provide the necessary means therefor."

The District Attorney states that the first result of his investigation in connection with the matter of campaign contributions has been the indictment on November 14, 1913, of Everett Fowler for extortion. He further says that the requested appropriation is to be used in the prosecution of said Fowler and for the conduct of other similar criminal cases which may arise out of the investigation. The District

attorney estimates that he will require \$10,000 for the investigation and proper conduct of these cases and also states that they are of exceptional difficulty.

On February 4, 1910, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment (minutes, page 418) appropriated \$25,000 in special revenue bonds to the District Attorney, pursuant to the provisions of section 1542, for "the proper conduct of investigations, and the prosecution of criminal actions which may result from certain investigations into the conduct of persons connected with the traffic in women for immoral purposes in the City and County of New York."

The company upon requesting a permit for the work was given a permit for a roadway of 35 feet in width, which was contrary to the terms of the contract, which called for a width of 45 feet. The contractor, therefore, could not proceed in accordance with the terms and conditions

On May 22, 1913, after a number of conferences between the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Eon Engineering and Contracting Company, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, upon the recommendation of the Comptroller, adopted a resolution directing the President of the Borough of Queens to pave the roadway of Myrtle avenue for a width of 35 feet. On May 22, 1913, the President of the Borough notified the Eon Engineering and Contracting Company that it was not the intention of the City to proceed further with

this work, and he declared the contract cancelled. The Eon Engineering and Contracting Company filed a claim with the Comptroller for certain expenditures on account of the contract and for 10 per cent, prospective profits. This class of apparatus was at that time largely, in fact wholly, in an experimental stage, and for that reason the original specifications were changed and modified from time to time in the hope that a serviceable piece of apparatus might be procured.

The steamer, aside from the motive power, will meet the requirements of this Department in every particular, there being no fault whatever to be found with the

Respectfully,

Since the delivery of this converted steamer, a new two-wheel front drive tractor has been perfected which is a proven success. Plans have been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionmenet for fifty-four pieces of fire apparatus permitting this type of tractor.

The Nott Fire Engine Company have offered to remove the present tractor from the converted steamer and attach a modern front drive tractor which has proven equal to our requirements.

Under date of May 23, 1912, the Comptroller was informed by me that this concern was ready to substitute a good serviceable tractor for the tractor which failed subject to such adjustments as would seem proper to him. I have as yet received no

Mr. Wilkinson, representing the Nott concern, however, has been in touch with the Finance Department on several occasions in connection with this matter, and while he was given to understand that there would be no objection to the change, guarantee of payment, if it was carried out, would not be assured, however.

To the end that the matter be cleared up and the services of this engine be made available, the Department being in urgent need of more apparatus, it is requested that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment permitting this change by modifying the contracts and specifications under which the present converted engine was delivered, to the extent that any part of said specifications or contracts which would be in conflict with the converted steamer when redelivered with approved tractor be not considered as binding; no liquidating damages to be assessed. In his communication the Fire Commissioner states in part as follows: "The converted steamer delivered under these contracts did not meet the requirements. Every effort was made by the contractors to keep this piece of apparatus in service, without, however, any lasting success. This class of apparatus was at that time largely, in fact, wholly, in an experimental stage, and for that reason the original specifications were changed and modified from time to time in the hope that a serviceable piece of apparatus might be procured.

"The steamer, aside from the motive power, will meet the requirements of this Department in every particular, there being no fault whatever to be found with the boiler or pumps.

'Since the delivery of this converted steamer, a new two-wheel front drive tractor has been perfected which is a proven success. Plans have been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for fifty-four pieces of fire apparatus permitting this type of tractor.

"The Nott Fire Engine Company have offered to remove the present tractor from the converted steamer and attach a modern front drive tractor which has

proven equal to our requirements. * * *

To the end that the matter be cleared up and the services of this engine be made available, the Department being in urgent need of more apparatus, it is requested that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment permitting this change by modifying the contracts and specifications under which the present converted engine was delivered, to the extent that any part of said specifications or contracts which would be in conflict with the converted steamer when redelivered with approved tractor, be not considered as binding; no liquidating damages to be assessed."

In order to restore the openings which now exist in the pavements, and for which it will be necessary to employ vehicles to the end of the year, it will require the additional expenditure of \$5,000, and I would therefore request that this non-budgetary line be increased from \$22,250 to \$27,250.

I would thank you to have your Bureau of Statistics prepare for adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a resolution modifying this schedule in accordance with the proposed statement. This does not increase the Budget fund and allows us to use more money out of the restoring and repaving fund, which is deposited by plumbers, corporations and others to replace pavements after being opened by them. Gentlemen-On November 12, 1913, the Board of Education requested the establishment of rates of compensation for Janitors of sundry public schools, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter. On November 25, 1913, your Board held in abeyance four items of a previous request relating to rates for the care of portable buildings in Public Schools 8, 14, 34 and 36, The Bronx pending corrections which are incorporated in the November 12 request. In connection with these matters, we report as follows:

No action is necessary on the rates requested for Public Schools 11. Manhattan,

and 62, Brooklyn, as they have already been established.

The rates requested for Public Schools 16, 73 and 61, Brooklyn, and 124 and the Julia Richman High School, Manhattan, represent existing rates with rent allowances deducted. They are for Janitors regularly employed in other schools and temporarily assigned to the care of these schools to fill vacancies.

Rates are also requested for the care of temporary buildings, Public Schools 8.

14, 26, 34 and 36, The Bronx, and 53, Queens. The request further provides for increasing the compensation of the Janitor of Public School 5, Queens, from \$1,080 to \$1,500 per annum. This is in error. The request should read Public School 1, instead of 5, and the record will be so corrected at the next meeting of the Board of Education. The School Inquiry Report. made by Professors Baskerville and Winslow, after an investigation of heating. ventilating and other conditions in thirty-two public schools of the City, states that Public School 1, Queens, has one of the most poorly operated plants in the entire

The Supervisor of Janitors who investigated the causes of such conditions, reports that Public School 1 has 801/2 M. square feet of floor surface and 141/2 M. square feet of paved surface. Its heating and ventilating equipment consists of four high pressure boilers, three steam engines and blowers and seven pumps. To care for these, there is one Janitor-Engineer at \$1,080 per annum, one Fireman, and four Cleaners. Each Cleaner has approximately 20 M. square feet of floor surface and 31/2 M. square feet of paved surface to care for. This is about three times the amount of space covered by Cleaners in the Bryant High School, and almost double that by Cleaners in No. 6, Queens, Morris High School, and the Manual Training High School. It is impossible for the Engineer and Fireman to get the assistance of a Cleaner in handling coal, ashes, etc.

The Janitor is overworked, underpaid, and consequently dissatisfied. It is, there-

fore, proposed to increase his compensation to \$1,500 per annum.

It is further proposed to increase the compensation of the Janitor of the De Witt Clinton Evening High School from \$4 to \$9.50 per session. The Budget estimate of the Board of Education for 1914 included a request for funds to provide for new schedules at increased rates for all evening service rendered by Janitors, but the request was denied.

We recommend that the request for an increase in compensation of the Janitor of the De Witt Clinton Evening High School be disapproved, and that the other requests, as corrected, be granted by the adoption of the attached resolution. Re-

There were submitted for analysis and examination during the month of November, 309 samples of supplies and materials of construction, the majority of which were obtained by the regular corps of Samplers attached to the Standard Testing

Of the samples submitted for examination under specifications or standards. 48.51 per cent, complied with the requirements, while 51.49 per cent, failed to comply.

The materials represented by the latter class were either rejected or an appropriate deduction was recommended to cover the deficiencies. The routine examinations during the month are comprehensively given in the

attached schedules. The research work was carried on as usual during the month, as time and limited staff would permit, and consisted of the following:

Board of City Record—Research work on book papers and rubber erasures. Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Examination and report on book papers for the Committee on Hospital Investigation.

Commission on Standardization-For the purpose of preparing suitable standard specifications, the following research work was conducted and tentative specifications prepared or revised:

Acetic acid, cloudy ammonia, disinfectants, textile fabrics, waterproof sheeting, wood turpentine, gum turpentine, spring steel, hand and drop forged steel for surgical instruments.

Department of Docks and Ferries-Research work was continued on lubricating oils and greases. Department of Finance-Comparative analysis as to the chemical composition of steel used in garden implements. Research work as to the cause of the cracking of

manganese bronze. Department of Health-Investigation as to the comparative and relative value of chloroforms and ethers for anaesthesia.

Pursuant to the provisions of this section, the Commanding Officer has fixed the compensation of the Engineer and Assistant Engineer at \$4 per day and the Laborers at \$3 per day. Request is now made by the Commanding Officer to provide for the compensation of the employees at the above rates for the balance of the year. As there is no provision for these employees it will be necessary to issue special revenue bonds as follows:

\$787 00 Section 189 of the Military Law provides that such compensation shall be a county charge upon the county in which such armory or arsenal is situated, and subdivision 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter authorizes the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to provide for the payment of charges by counties wholly included within the limits of the City of New York.

Provision has been made in the 1914 Budget for all of the above employees with the exception of the Laborer for the care of horses.

Special revenue bonds to the amount of \$787 will be issued to provide for the compensation of the employees for the remainder of the year.

I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution, modifying the schedule of the organization to permit of the proper audit.

Gentlemen-On November 18, 1913, the Board of Aldermen requested \$14,000 in special revenue bonds, the proceeds whereof to the extent of \$11,000 to be used by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the purchase of coal for pumping stations, and \$3,000 for the purchase of hypochlorite of lime; all obligations contracted for thereunder to be incurred on or before December 31, 1913. In connection therewith I report as follows:

Under date of November 3, 1913, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requested \$17,000 in special revenue bonds, of which \$14,000 was intended for the purchase of coal to operate the pumping stations in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond until December 31, 1913, and to allow a thirty days supply on hand at that date, and \$3,000 to provide for the purchase of hypochlorite of lime, required for the proper protection of the water supply during the remainder of 1913 and during the first two weeks in 1914.

The detailed estimate on which the Commissioner's request for additional coal for pumping stations was based was submitted with the request by the Engineering Bureau of that Department. This estimate shows the average daily consumption at each pumping station for the first nine months of 1913, the amount on hand at these stations on September 30, 1913, the date on which it is estimated this supply will be exhausted, and the number of additional tons required at each station for operation up to January 31, 1914, with the estimated cost of the same. The total estimated cost for Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond is \$15,650. The amount requested by the Board of Aldermen for this purpose is \$11,000.

Bids opened on November 19, 1913, on which the Commissioner proposes to award contracts, total \$4 048 for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and \$7,049 for the Borough of Richmond. a grand total of \$11.097. The unencumbered balance in the 1913 appropriation for fuel, on November 21, 1913, was \$267,08, a portion of which will be required for cartage on coal to stations not covered in the proposed contracts.

Private Secretary.

The Private Secretary shall perform all the duties generally performed by other persons holding similar positions in the Supreme and County Courts throughout the State of New York; to take proper care of the Court's correspondence, examine citations and cases, and to do and perform all work and services of a confidential

nature required by the Judge. The County Court of Bronx County is a new Court, and it is expected that the volume of business, in view of the large population, which is estimated at some six hundred thousand, and in view of the fact that there is but one Judge to handle all the business of the Court, will be greater in proportion to the business handled by any other County Court in the State, and it will be necessary to have a man of ability and experience to assist the Court in taking care of the said business.

County Detectives. The two Detectives which I request are provided for by the General County Law,
Laws of 1897, chapter 62, as amended by chapter 532, Laws of 1900.

The positions are mandatory, and the necessity for an appropriation to cover them is quite essential. One Detective is to be assigned as a parole or probation

mitted to me, showing the results of the parole system in use in this Court.

The other Detective is to investigate the records, environment and associations of From statements of the Commissioner's Engineers, it appears that approximately all persons convicted of a crime, awaiting sentence, in order that I make a proper 3,400 pounds of hypochlorite of lime are used daily at the Dunwoodie chlorinating plant disposition of all such criminal cases.

Court Stenographer.

Owing to the responsibilities of his position I believe that his salary should be fixed at not less than two thousand dollars (\$2,000).

Court Attendants.

I have asked for five Court Attendants, two at eighteen hundred dollars each per annum, three at fifteen hundred dollars each per annum. In order that the business of the Court may be properly transacted, it will be quite imperative that this number be allowed me, inasmuch as one will be assigned to the pen to guard prisoners, one at the door, two to take care of the jury, and one in and about the courtroom to carry messages and to perform such other duties as the position may demand.

Contingencies. I need make no comment regarding the items under the remaining code numbers,

only to call your attention to the items enumerated under No. 3339.

The necessity for the hiring of temporary Interpreters from time to time is quite apparent, and, estimating the number of days used in Kings and Queens Counties, I believe that one hundred (100) days at five dollars (\$5) per day, amounting to five hundred dollars (\$500) would no doubt cover the item.

It is expected that the volume of business of this Court will be so great, owing to the large population of The Bronx, that it will be quite necessary from time to time for me to call upon County Judges in other Counties to assist me in disposing of the business of the Court, and I believe that the amount requested, one thousand dollars (\$1,000), will cover the expense of paying their salaries, transportation, etc., for

Department of Finance-Approval of Award of Contract for Automobile Service (Cal. No. 91).

The Secretary presented the following:

Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, December 9, 1913. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Gentlemen-On Friday, December 5, 1913, bids were received for furnishing automobile service for the Department of Finance for the year 1914.

Four bids were received, as follows:

Flatbush Avenue Taxicab Company, Inc., No. 369 Flatbush avenue, twenty-one (21) cents per mile and sixty (60) cents per hour for stoppages. John H. Eckhoff, Jr., No. 835 Union street, Brooklyn, twenty-two (22) cents per mile and seventy-five (75) cents per hour for stoppages.

Orgood Motor Car Company, No. 525 St. Marks avenue, Brooklyn, twenty-three (23) cents per mile and seventy (70) cents per hour for stoppages.

Bryant Motor Service Company, No. 41 West 63d street, Manhattan, twenty-nine and seven-tenths (29 7-10) cents per mile and forty-nine and nine-tenths (49 9-10) cents per hour for stoppages.

The bid of the Flatbush Avenue Taxicab Company was the lowest. The next lowest bid was that of John H. Eckhoff, Jr. The difference between the lowest bid and the next lowest bidder on the mileage bidding was one cent per mile. The proposed contract for automobile service calls for furnishing about 41,000 miles of service for five-passenger cars. On this contract the difference between the low bidder and the next to the lowest bidder would be \$410. On the stoppage there is a difference of fifteen cents per hour. The contract calls for about 2,372 hours. Assuming that all of this stoppage should be used, the difference between the lowest bidder and the next lowest bid would be \$355.80 in a year. The total difference between the two bids in the whole year would be \$765.80.

Automobile service for the Finance Department is required chiefly for the City Paymaster in paying off employees of other departments in the outlying districts. The requirements vary considerable within the year. The contract proposed calls for furnishing from one to nine five-passenger cars, as may be required for any day except Sundays and holidays. It is important that the contractor be well equipped to carry out the terms of this contract. The cars to be furnished must be in good condition and not likely to break down. A delayed Paymaster is likely to cause a considerable loss of time on the part of the working forces that are to be paid. I have caused an investigation to be made into the condition of the equipment of the Flatbush Avenue Taxicab Company, the low hidder, and also have inquired into the other resources of the company. I find that the company has in the garage available for service two (2) Peerless limousines and one (1) Pope Hartford landaulet, each holding five passengers inside and one passenger in addition to the chauffeur in the front. There is a fourth car in the garage, but it does not appear to be ready for

service. In addition to these cars there are several taxicabs, but these are not available

Received from his Honor the Mayor December 2, 1913, without his approval I am convinced that it would be to the best interests of the City not to award the

contract to the low bidder.

I recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve the award of the contract to John H. Eckhoff, Jr., the next to the lowest bidder. There is no question concerning the ability of Mr. Eckhoff to carry out the terms of the contract. He is furnishing automobile service to the Finance Department at the present time, The service has been very satisfactory. The difference between the total annual cost of the lowest bid and Mr. Eckhoff's bid is so small that I do not believe it would justify the City in taking the chance it would have to take by awarding the contract to the lowest bidder.

I recommend the adoption of the resolution hereto attached.

In con-

nection therewith I report as follows:

follows:

The purpose is to cover a deficit in the appropriation (2444TC) for salaries and wages of the inspecting and drafting corps in the Bureau of Buildings. When the payrolls for this force for the month of November were prepared it was discovered that there was not sufficient balance in the tax levy portion of the account for which the 1913 allowance was \$134,933.33, to cover them, with the result that the payment of November salaries for over one hundred employees is withheld, awaiting sufficient funds in the account.

The Board of Education proposes that the deficit be covered by transfer of salary accruals, but this is contrary to the rules governing the Budget. It is not necessary, as funds are available in the special appropriation made in the 1913 Budget for Accounting Force, No. 3454. The sum of \$25,000 was appropriated for this purpose, of which sum the estimated available balance as of date aggregates \$4,224.23. I recommend that \$600 be transferred from No. 3454 to No. 3444TC, instead of from No. 3441, as requested. Resolutions to this effect are attached hereto.

Sir-Section 1095 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:
"The board of education shall, between the first day of August and the thirtieth day of November in each year, make and transmit to the Mayor of The City of New York a report in writing, for the year ending on the thirtyfirst day of July next preceding, stating the whole number of schools under its jurisdiction during the said year ending on the thirty-first day of July, the number of teachers, the total number of pupils on register, and the average attendance at each school; the number of high schools and training schools for teachers, with the number of teachers and attendance of pupils at each; the corporate schools or societies from which reports have been made, as elsewhere prescribed in this act, the length of time such schools have been kept open, and the number of teachers and of pupils taught in each such school. * * *."

The whole number of schools under the jurisdiction of the Board at the close of the school year ending July 31, 1913, was 492. The number of Teachers in all schools on July 31, 1913 (including Teachers of

special branches, Directors and Superintendents). was 19,496.

The number of pupils on average monthly register in elementary schools during the school year ending July 31, 1913, was 661,395; the average daily attendance for the school year ending July 31, 1913, was 592,721.

The number of high schools and training schools for Teachers under the jurisdiction of the Board on July 31, 1913, was twenty four; the number of Teachers, including Principles et al., in the service of the schools was 1922. including Principals, et al., in the service on that date in these schools was 1,922; the number of pupils on average monthly register in these schools during the school year ending July 31, 1913, was 46,991; the average daily attendance at these schools during the school year ending July 31, 1913, was 40,937.

There are two vocational schools, on the school of these schools during the school of the school

monthly register and the average daily attendance of these schools during the school

year ending July 31, 1913, were 985 and 857. respectively.

The number of corporate schools or societies in the City on July 31, 1913, was 44. The number of Teachers in corporate schools was 514; the average daily attendance for the school year ending July 31, 1913, was 16,116.
