About Second-Chance Toys

Second Chance Toys is a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization founded in 2006 to rescue and recycle plastic toys for children in need by distributing them to community-based organizations. By keeping non-biodegradable plastic toys out of landfills, Second Chance Toys works to help the environment by diverting waste at the same time. The toys are meant to enhance a child's development by helping promote socialization, creativity, emotional security, motor skills, and learning.

About the New York City Department of Sanitation

The Department of Sanitation (DSNY) promotes a healthy environment through the efficient management of solid waste and the development of environmentally sound long-range planning for handling refuse, including recyclables. The Department operates 59 district garages and

manages a fleet of more than 2,000 rear-loading collection trucks, 450 mechanical brooms and 689 salt/sand spreaders. The Department clears litter, snow and ice from approximately 6,500 miles of City streets and removes debris from vacant lots as well as abandoned vehicles from City streets.
