

January 25, 2023 — The New York City Emergency Management Department welcomes 21 community networks across the city into the Strengthening Communities program. These networks represent a wide range of community groups that offer important services in areas most deeply affected by such emergencies as the COVID-19 pandemic and coastal storms. These local leaders will be provided resources and training to build emergency preparedness plans to better support their communities before and after an emergency. The 21 participating networks will begin a rigorous five-month educational experience to develop a local community emergency plan.

This brings the total number of networks participating in the program to 37, with seven networks completing the inaugural program in 2020 and nine networks completing the program in 2021. Orientation for the new members was held on January 19. The training program focuses on five key areas to build an emergency plan specific to their communities:

- Create a needs assessment.
- Design community maps of the area where they provide services.
- Build a directory of resources for after an emergency.

- Prepare a communications strategy to message their community and staff before, during, and after emergencies.
- Design plans on how to manage donations and accept volunteers.

"NYC Emergency Management's mission is to prepare New Yorkers for emergencies, but we cannot do that without the assistance of our community partners," said **NYC Emergency Management Commissioner Zach Iscol** "Our Strengthening Communities program helps us do that by providing communities with the training and resources they need to prepare all New Yorkers with extensive emergency planning and preparation."

All applicants must attend a virtual orientation session to be eligible for basic training. Upcoming orientation sessions are as follows:

- Thurs, Jan. 26, 2023 at 6:30PM

There are two sessions – one is a Mon/Wed session and the other meets on a Tues/Thursday schedule. Each class meets in the evening from 6:30PM to about 9/9:30PM. Almost half of the classes are virtual, with the other classes meeting in-person at our headquarters – 165 Cadman Plaza East, Brooklyn.

The next NYC CERT Basic training cycle is due to begin in early February, 2023, so **APPLY NOW!**




- When purchasing devices, be sure that the equipment has the Underwriters Laboratories Mark. The UL mark shows that the product has been safety tested.
- Keep batteries/devices at room temperature. Do not place in direct sunlight or charge a device under your pillow, bed or a couch.
- Always use the manufacturer's cord and power adapter made specifically for the device.
- If a battery overheats or you notice an odor, change in shape/color, leaking, or odd noises from a device discontinue use immediately. If safe to do so, move the device away from anything that can catch fire and call 9-1-1.

Report Flooding in New York City



As **sea level rises** around NYC, tidal flooding in coastal neighborhoods is getting more frequent and widespread.

What can we do?

The "Community Flood Watch Project" is a growing network of residents and organizations who report local flooding, share experiences and access resources related to flooding in NYC coastal communities.

Researchers use these reports to visualize how "normal" high tides could look in the future due to sea level rise, and to improve forecasts of flooding and coastal hazards.

Communities can use this shared database of images, reports and maps to communicate their neighborhood's needs and visions to city leaders.
