

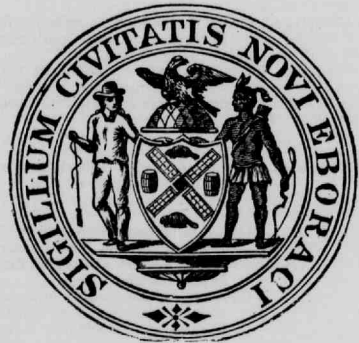

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's Office, in the New Court-house, on Tuesday, May 24, 1881, at 1:15 o'clock P. M.

Present—Hon. Allan Campbell, Comptroller; Hon. William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation; Hon. Frederick Smyth, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held April 28, 1881, were read and approved.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, guttering, and flagging Eleventh avenue, from Fifty-ninth to Seventy-second street, with objections of J. and S. Bernheimer, Cornelius Callahan, and others, laid over at the last meeting, with directions to the Chief Clerk to notify the contractor and surveyor of the work to be present at the next meeting of this Board to explain the facts in said matter, on motion, was taken up for action.

The representative of C. H. Haswell, the surveyor in charge of the work, appeared.

The contractor, Michael Gavin, was not present.

After hearing H. A. Shipman, attorney for Messrs. Bernheimer and Callahan, and Mr. George A. Jeremiah, Superintendent of Street Improvements, on motion, the said assessment list was ordered to be returned to the Board of Assessors for reconsideration of the objections and facts relative to the said assessment.

The assessment list for constructing sewer in Madison avenue, between One Hundred and Tenth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, with objections of Arthur D. Weekes, laid over for further consideration at the last meeting of the Board, on motion, was taken up.

Mr. Weekes again stated his objections to the assessment on his property.

The assessment list for constructing a sewer in Avenue A, between Tenth and Eleventh streets, and objections of Messrs. Toch Brothers and P. C. Schwartz, laid over at the last meeting of the Board, for further consideration, was, on motion, taken up for action.

Mr. Moses Toch was heard as to his objections, and the Secretary of the Board of Assessors and Mr. Meyer, of the Bureau of Sewers, in explanation of the assessment.

The Recorder moved that the said assessment list be returned to the Board of Assessors, requesting them to modify the amount charged against the property of Messrs. Toch Brothers, viz., \$110.07, and reapportion the same in accordance with such reduction, which motion was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Negative—The Comptroller and Counsel to the Corporation—2.

The Counsel to the Corporation moved that the objections in said matter be overruled and that the assessment list be confirmed, which motion was carried by the following vote, viz.:

At 2 o'clock P. M. the Recorder left the meeting to attend his court.

The following assessment lists returned by this Board to the Board of Assessors under a resolution of November 27, 1880, for the certificate required by section 5 of chapter 556, Laws of 1880, were received from said Board with a communication dated May 19, 1881, viz.:

5. Sewers in the Boulevard between One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Fifty-third streets.

Accompanying the lists of assessments were objections of the property owners, and the testimony taken by the Board of Assessors, as to rates and current prices prevailing at the time of the performance of the works; also copy of a report to the Board of Revision, dated March 27, 1880, of the proceedings had regarding these assessments, as follows:

March 27, 1880.

To the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments:

GENTLEMEN—The Board of Assessors herewith submit for your consideration and action the several assessment lists for sewers on the Boulevard from Fifty-ninth to One Hundred and Fifty-third streets.

The total cost of the work, as appears from the statement of the various items, amounts to \$1,456,560.88, of which, according to the certificate of the Commissioner of Public Works, one-half is chargeable against the City, the remaining half being assessable against the property along the line of the improvement. This Board having duly apportioned the amount fixed by the certificate, advertised the various lists in the CITY RECORD, November 17, 1879, as required by law, within the thirty days specified in the notice; over 200 objections were received from the owners of property and placed on file in this office. After frequent consultations with the Corporation Counsel, to whom the objections were submitted, the parties interested were notified to appear, either in person or by counsel, at the office of this Board; ample time was afforded and full opportunity given for the presentation of evidence in relation to the cost of the work. Several meetings were held at which the Corporation Counsel or one of his assistants was present, and a number of contractors and engineers were examined and cross-examined with reference to the character of the work and the different items of expenditure enumerated in the lists.

The verbatim reports of the testimony taken are both voluminous and minute and show that a close and searching inquiry was made into the details of the work. When all the testimony had been presented it was subjected to a careful scrutiny, and after a comparison of the separate statements and estimates of the witnesses the Board finally decided upon the amount which it considered an equitable assessment and a fair and just charge against the property benefited.

Accompanying the lists are the objections of the property-owners and the testimony taken before this Board as to the ruling rates and contract prices prevailing at the time of the performance of the work.

(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same department."
