

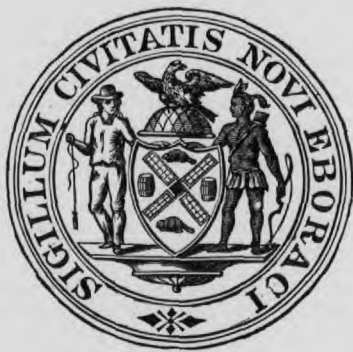

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS—OFFICE OF THE ENGINEER-IN-CHIEF,

To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of the work under my supervision for the quarter ending 31st July, 1886:

Chambers Street Section—Resolutions of the Board, November 24, 1877, and November 21, 1878.

A trench was dug north of office to drain surface water from newly-filled land.

Laight Street Section—Resolutions of the Board, July 30 and November 3, 1880.

A portion of the old platform and shed thereon was removed by the Pennsylvania R. R. Co., and the material from the shed, reverting to the city, was suitably piled by said Company for disposal by the Department.

New Made Land, Spring to West Eleventh Street, North River—Resolution of the Board, 2d June, 1886.

The silt basins have been kept clean.

West Twenty-third Street Section—South End—Resolution of the Board, 5th November, 1880.

PIER, NEW 55, NORTH RIVER.

The plank approach to the pier was repaired.

West Twenty-third Street Section—North End—Resolution of the Board, 28th June, 1882.

PIER, NEW 59, NORTH RIVER.

The plank approach to the pier was repaired.

West Thirty-first Street Section—Resolutions of the Board, 8th August and 19th September, 1883.

BULKHEAD WALL.

Stone filling—Messrs. Brown & Fleming delivered and deposited 75 cubic yards of rip-rap stone in front of the wall north of Pier, new 60, North river, completing the stone filling for this section.

Piling and woodwork—210 square feet of 4-inch deck plank were placed on the caps of the northerly 17.5 feet in length of the wall, completing the piling and woodwork of this section.

Masonry—73 pieces of granite were set and backed with 200 batches of concrete.

Earth filling—Received and placed 5 loads of filling by tickets in rear of the bulkhead wall. Total to date, 15,683 loads by tickets and 1,364 loads free.

West Thirty-second Street Section—Resolution of the Board, 22d October, 1885.

BULKHEAD WALL.

Stone filling—Messrs. Brown & Fleming delivered and deposited 599 cubic yards of small cobble stone and 1,631 cubic yards of rip-rap stone in the wall. Totals to date, 2,902 cubic yards of small cobbles and 4,530 cubic yards of rip-rap. A dry rubble wall was laid at the south end of the section to hold the cobbles in place until the earth filling is put in, and a bulkhead of 3-inch plank was put across the piling at the north end to hold the stone filling in place until the section is extended northerly.

Piling and woodwork—2,773 feet B. M. of 4-inch spruce plank deck was placed on the caps in rear of the wall. The outer ends of the caps were cut to make room for the granite as required and were chocked.

Masonry—59 pieces of granite were set and backed with 180½ batches of concrete.

West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

Blacksmith making and repairing ironwork for different sections and floating property. 400 barrels of Portland cement were received, tested and stored for Department use. Three samples of cement were tested for private parties by order of the Board.

East Seventeenth Street Yard.

The yard has been maintained, the property there taken care of, and various transfers of granite and iron were made to the sections as required.

The derrick "City of New York" has had various small repairs made to its engine and machinery as required to keep them in good working order; the deck of the scow has been repaired, and new wearing pieces have been put on where needed.

During the quarter Pile Driver No. 7 was lifted from the deck of the Pier at West Fifty-seventh street and placed in the water. Pile Drivers Nos. 2 and 5, and Divers' Scow "G," were docked on the pier for repairs and then put back in the water, and Coal Scow "F" was put on the deck of the pier.

The ten-ton derrick was painted and the machinery and engine cleaned. May 12 it was towed to West Thirty-second Street Section, and set during the quarter 132 pieces of granite in the bulkhead walls of West Thirty-first Street and West Thirty-second Street Sections. Towed back to Yard on the 29th July.

Dredge No. 3 remains in the possession of the Union Dredging Co., and Dredge No. 4 lies near the foot of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street and Second avenue.

Tug "Manhattan" commenced running on 10th May, and did all the towing required by the Department up to and including the 15th July, when it was laid up and put out of commission. The hired tugs of V. Vierow have done the towing required since the "Manhattan" has been laid up. Various small repairs have been made to the engine and machinery, and the woodwork has been repaired and painted where required. On 5th May the United States Inspectors inspected the donkey boiler.

The ten pile drivers have been kept in order, with the exceptions specified, as follows:

Pile Driver No. 1. Nothing required.

Pile Driver No. 2. New grate bars were put in, was docked on the West Fifty-seventh street Pier, and had sides and bottom scraped and caulked and painted, new wearing pieces were put on, and then put back in the water; boiler has been stripped and condemned, the house has been repaired, and the ways have been repaired and painted.

Pile Driver No. 3. The machinery and house were repaired and new grate bars were put in. The Police Department inspected the boiler on the 19th June.

Pile Driver No. 5 (Fitted up as a pile cutter). The engine and machinery were repaired, new grate bars were put in, a new smoke-stack was made, the water tank was ceiled and caulked, was docked 10th May on West Fifty-seventh street Pier, and new wearing pieces were put on, and its bottom, sides and ends were scraped and caulked and the scow was painted, and was placed in the water on 2d June. The Police Department inspected boiler on the 21st May.

Pile Driver No. 6. The engine and machinery were cleaned and repaired, new grate bars were put in, deck was repaired and caulked, water tank was ceiled and caulked, and the house was repaired. The Police Department inspected the boiler on the 16th June.

Pile Driver No. 7. Placed on the deck of West Fifty-seventh street Pier the previous quarter, had its bottom, ends and sides scraped, repaired, caulked and painted, new wearing pieces put on, and was put back in the water on 10th May. The engine and machinery were cleaned and new grate bars were put in, the water tank was caulked and the ways were repaired. The Police Department inspected the boiler on the 24th June.

Pile Driver No. 8. The engine and machinery were cleaned and repaired, new grate bars were put in, the water tank was cleaned, and the ways, house and cleats were repaired. The Police Department inspected the boiler on the 21st May.

Pile Driver No. 9. The engine and machinery were cleaned and repaired, new grate bars were put in and the ways were repaired. John W. Sullivan, under Treasurer's Order No. 11918, repaired the friction drum.

Pile Driver No. 10. The engine and machinery were cleaned and repaired, the water tank was caulked, new grate bars were put in and the ways and house were repaired. The Police Department inspected the boiler on the 21st May.

Pile Driver No. 11. The engine and machinery were cleaned and repaired, the water tank was caulked, new grate bars were put in, the house was repaired and painted, and the friction drum was repaired by John W. Sullivan, under Treasurer's Order No. 11918.

The deck scows, nine in number, are now laid up at West Fifty-seventh street Yard. All necessary transportation of material has been made on them during the quarter.

Scows B, C, D and E are in first-class order, special repairs having been made to scow E.

Scow F was placed on the West Fifty-seventh street Pier, and is now being thoroughly overhauled to put in first-class condition.

Scow "Jim" has had the top and sides caulked and the rails repaired.

Scows "Joe" and "May" are both in too bad order and condition to justify further repairs.

Scow "Willie" has had wearing pieces repaired.

Divers' scow "G" was put on the deck of West Fifty-seventh street Pier and thoroughly overhauled and put in first-class order and put back in the water.

Small divers' scow is in good order and condition.

Boring machine "Woodcock" has had its engine and machinery cleaned and its boiler tested.

One new 16-foot yawl boat has been built.

The small boats have been kept in repair and use, except yawl boat No. 1, which has been condemned as useless.

Various other small pieces of work have been done in connection with floating property, machinery of the Department, office fittings, automatic tide gauges, etc.

Surveying Party.

The surveying party has given all the lines and levels required for the various work of the Department.

Ten surveys have been made on the North river water-front, one on that of the East river and eight on the Harlem river, three of which on the North river, one on the East river, and five on the Harlem river, were in connection with the supervision of work being done by private parties under permit from the Board, and plots of the same have been made for the records of the Department and the necessary lines have been given for the work under permit.

In addition to the above, a new continuous survey of the North river water-front, from the Battery to Barclay street, has been begun.

22,358 disc soundings have been taken by the surveying and sounding parties in 128 slips and 69 rod soundings in 3 slips, of which 13,049 disc soundings in 64 slips, and 50 rod soundings in 1 slip, were on the North river, and 9,309 disc soundings in 64 slips, and 19 rod soundings in 2 slips, were on the East and Harlem rivers. These soundings have been recorded.

Work in connection with the searching of water grants has been done from time to time.

The automatic tide gauges have been attended to.
