

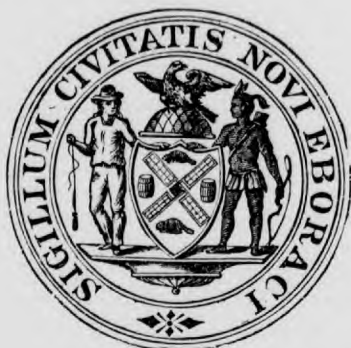

SIR—We herewith transmit the following statements showing results of an examination of the Chamberlain's office, covering the period from the date of our last quarterly report, March 30, 1889, to and including April 9, 1889, the date on which the term of W. M. Ivins as Chamberlain of the City of New York expired.

The balance in the City Treasury, Sinking Funds and Miscellaneous Accounts amount as shown by the statements to \$8,009,261.18, and this amount was on deposit in the various banks and trust companies in this city on and including the 9th day of April, 1889, as certified to by the officers of the banks aforesaid.

GENTLEMEN—Herewith is transmitted to you a resolution adopted by the Aqueduct Commission at its meeting on Wednesday, May 15, agreeing (subject to the approval of your Board) to purchase certain additional lands needed for the construction of the Sodom Reservoir, by private purchase under agreements authorizing the immediate occupation of the land, and payment therefor at the same price per acre as may be awarded to the owners of adjacent lands by the Commissioners of Appraisal. This resolution was presented to your Board for its approval on Thursday last, and as I supposed was then approved. I now understand from Mr. Adey that only the resolution approving of an agreement of similar nature with Stephen C. Barnum was approved at that meeting.

As I personally explained to the Board at that meeting, the acquisition of the property in this way will save several thousand dollars in expenses which would have to be incurred if we acquired the property by condemnation proceedings, and there is no reason to believe that the awards in such proceedings would vary from the amount we propose to agree to pay.

The land covered by the resolution herewith transmitted consists of about 31 3-10 acres, divided into fourteen parcels, of which the largest contains 7 216-1000 acres, and the smallest 0 027-1000 acres.

Extract from Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, May 15, 1889.

"The Construction or Executive Committee report :

"That, in order to provide for the completion and maintenance of Double Reservoir I, in Putnam County, New York, it has become necessary to acquire title to certain additional parcels of land in that locality, and that arrangements have been made with the owners thereof to take immediate possession of the lands so required, providing the City will agree to pay to the owners of the lands so to be acquired, within sixty days from the filing of the report of the Commissioners of Appraisal appointed to appraise the value of lands taken for said reservoir, the same price per acre as may be awarded to them respectively by such Commissioners for the lands shown on the original map filed herein in the Clerk's Office of Putnam County, on the 17th of May, 1887; and it appearing to your Committee that in this case the above method will be cheaper and more expeditious than to acquire the lands in question by condemnation, under chapter 490, Laws of 1883, thus avoiding the expense of publication, preparing and printing of petitions, making motions, having Commissioners appointed, conducting trials, etc., the expense of which would exceed the value of the lands to be acquired. We recommend the adoption of the following resolution :

"Resolved, That, in view of the urgent necessity of acquiring title to certain additional parcels of land required for the completion and maintenance of Double Reservoir I, in Putnam County, New

York, we accept of the proposition of the owners thereof to take immediate possession of said parcels and we hereby agree that payment shall be made for the lands so taken within sixty days after the filing of the report of the Commissioners appointed to appraise the value of lands taken for said reservoir, and at the same price per acre as may be awarded to said owners by said Commissioners for the lands shown on the original map filed in the Clerk's Office, in Putnam County, on the 17th of May, 1887; and the Secretary is hereby directed to transmit this report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for their approval.

SIR—By section 2, chapter 576, Laws of 1887, which act provides for the improvement of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, from St. Nicholas place to McComb's Dam Bridge, by the construction of an iron viaduct, it is made the duty of the Commissioner of Public Works "to prepare or cause to be prepared, plans and specifications for the construction of said improvement, and before the letting or doing of said work the said plans and specifications shall be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said city."

In pursuance of this provision of law, my predecessor, Gen. John Newton, caused plans for the improvement to be prepared, which he submitted for the action and approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 29, 1887. In view of the fact that according to such information as I have on the subject, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has taken no action to this date on the plan submitted, I presented to the Counsel to the Corporation, for his opinion and advice, the question whether it is now the duty of the Commissioner of Public Works to prepare and present new plans, as I am requested and urged to do by the property-owners in the vicinity of, and interested in, the proposed improvement. I am now in receipt of advice from the Counsel to the Corporation, under date of 26th instant, that, in the absence of any action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, I should assume that the plans heretofore presented are still under consideration, and that new plans should not be prepared until I am informed of the rejection, by vote of the Board, of those first presented. He further advises me that, under the circumstances, it will be well for me, or any interested party, to call the attention of your Board to the plans, and ask action thereon.

I, therefore, respectfully ask that your Board take final and decisive action on the plan presented by General Newton, and beg to say, at the same time, that, while the approximate estimate of cost of the improvement, according to that plan, is \$825,000, this Department will be prepared, at an early day, to submit another plan.

Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only, under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, if unpaid, will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
