

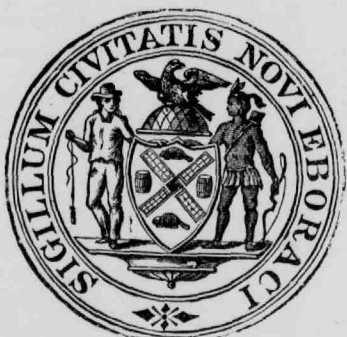

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BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
MONDAY, October 31, 1881—1 o'clock P.M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:

William R. Grace, the Mayor of the City of New York; Allan Campbell, the Comptroller of the City of New York; Patrick Keenan, the President of the Board of Aldermen; Thomas B. Astin, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held October 29, 1881, were read and approved.

The Chairman presented the following communication:

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,
NEW YORK, October 31, 1881.

W. M. IVINS, Esq., *Secretary of the Mayor*:

SIR—I duly received your letter of the 29th instant, stating that the Mayor, as a member of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, desires my opinion as to the exact amount of salary of the Commissioners of Police, under existing laws, and as to whether the salary of the President of said Board is different from or more than that of the other members of said Board.

The salaries of the President and of the Commissioners of the Board of Police are regulated at the present time by section 116 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, which, among other things, provides as follows:

"Section 116. The annual salaries to be paid to the persons herein named shall be as follows:
"To the President of the Board of Police, \$8,000.
"To the Commissioners of Police, other than the President, \$6,000 each."

I do not know the precise date when Mr. French was appointed a Commissioner of Police, but it was long before the passage of chapter 521 of the Laws of 1880, which was passed May 29, 1880, and he was elected President of the Board on February 12, 1880; so that the provisions of section 116, by the express terms of subdivisions 1 and 4 of that section, cannot possibly affect his salary as such President.

On motion, the Board proceeded to the consideration of the Departmental Estimates for the year 1882.

The Comptroller moved that the sum of \$25,000 be allowed for salaries of Police Commissioners. Which was agreed to.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND, CITY OF NEW YORK.

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held October 29, 1881, the following preamble and resolution were adopted, viz.:

"Whereas, The Comptroller has reported to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the revenues of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, in the year 1882, are estimated at \$4,500,000, and that no bonds or stocks of the City of New York, for which said fund was primarily pledged, fall due during said year; and

"Whereas, The total amount of bonds and stocks falling due in 1882, originally payable from taxation, is \$1,757,153.94; and

"Whereas, The amount of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt is in excess of the amount of bonds and stocks for which that fund is primarily pledged; therefore,

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the revenues of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, in the year 1882, are estimated at \$4,500,000, and that no bonds or stocks of the City of New York, of which said fund was primarily pledged, fall due during said year, and that the total amount of bonds and stocks, originally payable from taxation, falling due during said year, is \$1,757,153.94, and that the amount of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt is in excess of the amount of bonds and stocks for which said fund was pledged before the passage of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, the securities held by said Sinking Fund being more than thirty-six millions of dollars, while the amount of bonds and stocks, for which said fund is primarily pledged, amounts to less than seventeen millions of dollars."

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 22, 1881:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,703, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 639 tenement-houses, 126 private dwellings, 93 other dwellings, 16 manufactories and workshops, 11 stores and warehouses, 33 stables, 30 slaughter-houses, 3 lodging-houses, 1 mill, 1 soap works, 1 lime kiln, 1 railroad track, 33 sunken and vacant lots, 1 public park, 2 public sewers, 1 brewery, 78 yards, courts, and areas, 116 cellars and basements, 214 waste-pipes and drains, 259 privies and water-closets, 31 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 3 cesspools, together with 12 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 498.

During the past week 186 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to consignees of 80 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

126 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 146 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 127 houses, 127 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

10 cases of contagious disease were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 531 births, 55 still-births, 256 marriages, and 670 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 22, 1881. This shows a decrease of 79 births, and 11 deaths, and an increase of 17 still-births, and 10 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was a decrease of 27 births, and 4 still-births, and an increase of 56 marriages and 9 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 3; croup, 4; whooping cough, 1; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 9; malarial fevers, 7; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 6; inanition, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 12; bronchitis, 3; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and pre-natural births, 3; suicide, 1. While the deaths from diphtheria increased 8; measles 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; cancer, 4; pneumonia, 8; meningitis and encephalitis, 7; convulsions, 1; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 23; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 3; drowning, 4. The number of deaths from scarlatina and heat diseases was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 137 were in institutions, 359 in tenement-houses, 167 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 13 were on the basement floor, 119 on the first, 172 on the second, 128 on the third, 76 on the fourth, 26 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 675 were stated to be residents of New York City and 4 non-residents; 99 were stated to be single, 147 married, 65 widowed, and the condition of 368 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 679; still-births, 55; bodies in transit, 21. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 67 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 531 births, 256 marriages, 55 still-births, 679 deaths. 21 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 78 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage, and 36 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 22, 1881, was 58.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.060, the mean humidity was 79, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,100, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 650 deaths and still-births, or 88.56 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 12; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 289; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 94; Greenwood (undenominational), 41; Lutheran (undenominational), 87; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 16; Evergreen (undenominational), 44; Woodlawn (undenominational), 18; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 13; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 10; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 9.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending October 15, 1881, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 14; Second, 0; Third, 3; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 9; Sixth, 21; Seventh, 23; Eighth, 21; Ninth, 33; Tenth, 25; Eleventh, 30; Twelfth, 80; Thirteenth, 23; Fourteenth, 22; Fifteenth, 8; Sixteenth, 13; Seventeenth, 42; Eighteenth, 23; Nineteenth, 89; Twentieth, 35; Twenty-first, 50; Twenty-second, 45; Twenty-third, 14; Twenty-fourth, 11.

The actual mortality for the week ending October 15, 1881, was 645; this is 29 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1880, and 147.2 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.76 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,253,280.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 11th day of October, 1881, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following amendment of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That Section 201 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 201. That for all lodging-houses in which beds are let for lodgers containing four or more beds in any apartment therein for the use of lodgers, a permit in writing from this Department shall be required, and no person in the City of New York, shall have, lease, let or keep any such lodging-house or the lodgings therein, or assist in the keeping, hire, or assist in hiring, or conduct the business of any such lodging-house, or the lodgings therein, except pursuant to the terms and condition of a permit in writing previously obtained therefor from this Department, an application for which shall be made in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Board of Health by the person or persons who propose to use the same. The beds in all lodging-houses and in every room in which beds are let for lodgers shall be separated by a passageway of not less than two feet, horizontally, and all the beds shall be so arranged that under each of them the air shall freely circulate, and there be adequate ventilation. Six hundred cubic feet of air space shall be provided and allowed for each bed or lodger, and no more beds shall be permitted than those provided in this way, unless free and adequate means of ventilation exist, approved by the Board of Health, and a special permit in writing be granted therefor, specifying the number of beds or the cubic air space which shall under special circumstances be allowed.

RELATING TO THE PAYMENT OF UNPAID TAXES, ASSESSMENTS, AND CROTON WATER RENTS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of real and personal estate in this city, that all unpaid taxes, assessments, and Croton water rents may now be paid with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, as provided by chapter 33 of the Laws of 1881, which is as follows:

CHAPTER 33.

AN ACT relative to the collection of taxes and assessments, and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton water rents, in the City of New York.

(Passed March 16, 1881: three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice, by advertisement

for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings; and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notifying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.

Section 5. If any such assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty days after the date of entry thereof in the said record of titles of assessments, it shall be the duty of the officer authorized to collect and receive the amount of such assessment, to charge, collect, and receive legal interest thereon, at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment.

Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

Second—"The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "the Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
