

Sanitary Bureau.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 16, 1878. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,715, as follows, viz.:

3 public buildings, 825 tenement-houses, 130 private dwellings, 68 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 14 stores and warehouses, 32 stables, 41 slaughter-houses, 1 lard-rendering establishment, 1 bone house, 1 dyeing establishment, 4 fat-rendering establishments, 4 manure dumps, 1 public sewer, 3 garbage dumps, 17 sunken and vacant lots, 40 yards, courts, and areas, 85 cellars and basements, 223 waste-pipes and drains, 124 privies and water-closets, 4 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 5 cesspools, 1 piggery, 1 smoke-house, 11 other nuisances, together with 62 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 594.

During the past week III complaints were received from citizens and referred to the

Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 42 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from Health Officer of the Port.

38 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 43 premises where contagious diseases were found disinfected and fumigated 40 houses, 40 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

During the week ending February 16, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 533 burial permits for city deaths, 15 for bodies in transitu, and 54 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 533 deaths, 105 marriages, 467 births, 54 still-births, 15 applications for transit permits, and 57 returns from coroners. There were 30 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 6 transcripts of birth record, 4 of marriage, and 20 of death were issued from this Bureau.

W. De F. Day, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register.

Sir.—During the week ending Saturday, February 16, 1878, 533 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city. This is an increase of 62 as compared with the preceding week, and 123 more than were reported during the corresponding week of 1877.

The actual number of deaths for the week ending February 9 was 517, which is 18 below the average mortality for the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.76 per 1,000 of the population, which is estimated at 1,085,440.

The most prominent fatal diseases during the week were phthisis pulmonalis, 100; pneumonia, 64; diseases of the bearin and nervous system, 40; diphtheria, 32; scarlatina, 27; bronchitis, 25; diseases of the heart, 22; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 20; showing a total of 330 deaths, or 61.91 per cent. of the total mortality for the week from these eight diseases.

The diseases which showed an increase during the past compared with the preceding week are as follows: scarlatina, 11; diphtheria, 12; malarial fevers, 3; diarrhead diseases, 6; inanition, 2; alchoholism, 4; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 21; pneumonia, 3; diseases of the art, 2; aneurism, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 4; and premature and preternatural births, 1; and the following diseases decreased: measles, 1; croup, 1; whooping cough, 5; ervispelas, 3; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; bronchitis, 2; marasmus and scrofula, 2; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; and Bright's disease and nephritis, 2.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 81 were in institutions, 285 in tenement-houses, 152 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 2 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 117 on the first, 144 on the second, 113 on the tirid, 49 on the fourth, 14 on t

Park.

SIR—There were 533 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, February 16, 1878, which is an increase of 62, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 123 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending February 9, 1878, was 471, which is 64. below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.76 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,085,440.

#### HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT No. 301 MOTT STREET, NEW YORK, February 8, 1878. A T A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 8th day of February, 1878, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following sections of the Samitary Code be and are hereby annulled:

Section 33. That no person shall, in the built-up portion of the City of New York, or adjacent thereto, sell or have for sale any fish in or from any vehicle, or in any street or public place, from which all parts which are not usually cooked for food have not been removed.

Section 62. That no person shall become, or continue, or engage as, or in the business of a butcher, at or in any public or private market or stand in the City of New York, without a permit therefor from this Department.

Section 66. That no person engaged in the selling or keeping for sale of any fish, meat, birds, fowl, fruit, or vegetables, shall, without a permit from this Department, occupy or encroach upon any portion of any street or sidewalk, or public place in the City of New York.

And Section 168 amended so as to read as follows:

Section 168. That every car used for the transportation of passengers in the City of New York, shall be so constructed as at all times to provide and secure good vent lation.
