for past services.

Sir—The Commissioner of Public Works, in communication of December 6, 1897, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmits plans and specifications for the extension of the Riverside Drive by means of a viaduct, commencing at the northern termination of the existing Drive and terminating at One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, as provided by chapter 665 of the Laws of 1897, which subject, he states, was referred to him at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November , for the preparation of the papers submitted.

He asks that the Board appropriate the sum of \$900,000, so that the work may be legally commenced, if the plans and specifications be approved by the Board.

I have examined the plans with care and find them very complete.

The specifications are full, and satisfactorily describe the work to be done.

The steel, or bridge, portion of the viaduct will consist of 25 spans of 65 feet each from centre to centre of posts, or columns, Transversely the two lines of posts, or columns, will be 65 feet apart between centres. These posts, or columns, are 5 feet by 2 feet—the greater dimension on the line of the viaduct. They are to rest on masonry built on a pile foundation.

The 25 spans will present a series of arches resting on the above-mentioned columns, the top of the arches extending to the main longitudinal girder of the bridge, and supporting it at its crown. These arches are of tubular construction, and will carry the smaller columns which extend from it to the main girders, and support them between the crown and spring of the arch. The appearance of each span will be somewhat similar to the great spans of the Washington Bridge. The construction is different, the arches of these small spans being tubular, and those of Washington Bridge being single web.

ton Bridge being single web.

I think the construction will be strong and the appearance pleasing.

The columns, or posts, will be braced transversely by an open beam from column to column, and diagonal braces above.

The roadway is to be 60 feet in width, with a sidewalk—each side—10 feet wide.

DEAR SIR—Referring to the request of the Committee on Plans of the Board of Managers, New York Botanical Garden, made November 8, 1897, to the Commissioners of Public Parks, that the Commissioners include in their estimates for 1898 the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for water-pipes and sewer-pipes to be laid in the grounds appropriated for the use of the New York Botanical Garden in Bronx Park, which request was approved by the Commissioners of Parks and forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, I would submit the following statements:

1. Plans for the water-pipes and sewer-pipes have been approved by the Managers of the Botanical Garden and by the Commissioners of Public Parks as a part of the general plan, and the plan for the water-pipes has also been approved by the Chief Engineer of the Department of Public Works.

2. It is very desirable that these pipes be laid next year during the erection of the buildings, and that water be supplied to the tracts under cultivation. Proposals for the erection of the buildings have been received by the Commissioners of Public Parks, and a large amount of planting has already been done.

3. Sewer-pipes —There are required four thousand four hundred (4,400) feet of 6-inch, 8-inch and 10-inch sewer-pipes, costing, completely laid, an average of \$0.50 per foot, or two thousand two hundred dollars.....\$2,200 00

I appear here this morning under peculiar circumstances. The resolution passed unanimously at the last meeting of the Medical Society of the County of New York (Resolved, that the Medical Society of the County of New York instructs its Committee on Legislation to be present at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to be held in December to protest against the appropriation of public moneys to private-medical charities in this city). This, it will be seen, directs an appearance before your Honorable Board by the Committee on Legislation, and, as will be seen by the letter to Dr. Sturgis, through a misunderstanding of dates, the Committee on Legislation referred the consideration of this matter back to the society. When later, however, it became known that the meeting of your Honorable Board for the consideration of this subject would take place to-day, the chairman of the Committee on Legislation requested me to be here and present the facts regarding the position in which this committee is placed. From the resolution as passed at the last meeting, I believe the County Medical Society would indorse a policy by your Honorable Board that looked to the changing of the present plan of appropriating public moneys to private charities as rapidly as can be done without doing violence to the interests of any person or corporation.

The plan that at present obtains seems wrong in that the public officers appointed for a special purpose are not allowed fully to do so, and in the further fact that the City pays for care and treatment in the private institutions, in some cases at least, more than twice as much as when like cases are treated in the public institutions under the care of the Commissioners of Charity (see Report of Commissioners of Charity; also, page 30, Charter Greater New York).

The estimate is for iron racks. The architect recommends these, but states that wooden ones would cost about \$3,000 less.

For such valuable papers, I think the metal would be undoubtedly best, and they can be used anywhere the Court may hereafter be located.

The designs contemplate only what is absolutely necessary for the purpose, and I think they can be properly approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Before this approval is given the plans cannot be presented to the Building Department for its approval. In an old building like this there may be a doubt whether such approval will be given. If it is not so given some other place will have to be found for the Court. As stated by the Commissioner, "the building is not in full accordance in the construction to the requirements of the Building Department, as required for use as Halls of Assembly." DEAR SIR—On July 9, 1897, a contract was made with the Warren-Scharf Asphalt Paving Company, in pursuance of the resolution of your Board, for paving with asphalt and stone-block pavement the carriageway of Park avenue, from Fifty-sixth to Ninety-sixth streets. Among other items, this contract provided for 18,060 lineal feet of abutting stone, adjoining and surrounding the coping walls of the parks in the centre of the avenue, of a quality and workmanship required for new curbstone of North river blue-stone and to be set in concrete.

In providing for such abutting stone, it was intended to reset the coping stone which had been

In providing for such abutting stone, it was intended to reset the coping stone which had been placed by the Department of Public Parks around the small parks, but that Department refused permission to have the coping stone reset so as to place the abutting stone under it. The consequence was that the proposed blue-stone abutting stones could not be fitted to the coping and the rubble masonry underneath it. An immediate change of the plans and specifications in regard to this abutting stone became necessary, and it was concluded to substitute artificial stone of Portland cement of the same dimensions and facing as had been prescribed for blue-stone.

At the time this change became necessary, your Board had adjourned its meetings for the summer season, and it was against public policy and interest to suspend the entire work, awaiting your authorization of the change.

The artificial stone has now been put in place and answers fully all the purpose of the original specification for blue-stone. It has been placed at the price fixed in the contract for blue-stone, viz., Fifty cents per lineal foot.

The list includes almost everything necessary to perfect the condition of affairs at Riker's Island, viz., iron, oil, canvass, paint, beeswax, horses, wagons, harness, etc., 700 trees (elm and maple), a boat (Whitehall), bell, fire-extinguishers, clocks, steam-pumps, and 240,000 bushels fine shook-out horse manure, and many other things which certainly cannot be brought within the closely defined limits of the law.

Gentlemen—The General Society of Mechanics and Tradesmen directs me to express its highest appreciation of the action of your Honorable Body in the granting of additional time wherein to take suitable action with reference to the certificate of registry, as a pre-requisite to your making the usual appropriation toward the maintenance of its free library, and to respectfully say that at a duly called special meeting, after a careful and exhaustive consideration of the question involved, in all its phases, it decided to refrain from applying to the University of the State of New York for such registry and certificate.

The Society is still of the opinion that the appropriation could be lawfully granted without the required certificate, for the reasons already expressed in its memorial to the Hon. Ashbel P. Fitch, as Comptroller, and one of your Honorable Body (a copy is herewith attached).

The library has existed for over three-quarters of a century, under an act of the Legislature, as one of the beneficiary features of the General Society and has always, it is believed, maintained a proper standard, while its recording system has received the highest commendation, and invites the most rigid and ful'est investigation by such representatives of the City as may be designated through the Comptroller.

The loss of this appropriation will, of course, be a serious blow to the venerable institution, because it will have the effect of curtailing the great service rendered to the general public; but in view of the grave Charter question raised, the Society is unwilling to assume any risk of its inherited rights, and must therefore endeavor to carry its burden alone, to the extent of its own private income as it did prior to 1886, provided your Honorable Body still adheres to the opinion that it cannot render the aid respectfully applied for.

Hon. ASHBEL P. FITCH, Comptroller of the City of New York:

Hon. Ashbel P. Fitch, Comptroller of the City of New York;

Dear Sir.—The General Society of Mechanics and Tradesmen of the City of New York have, as you are aware, applied to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an appropriation such as has been granted in the past few years for library purposes, and the Society desires to place before you, as one of the members of that Board, a short statement of the reasons why they think such an appropriation should be made, with the hope and request that you will lay the same before the Board of Estimate at the proper time.

This Society was instituted in 1785, and has been active during all the years which have elapsed since that time. In 1820 the Society started a library, which, at that time, was intended for apprentices. This library was increased from year to year. The books circulated freely among apprentices and were furnished to them without any expense whatever to them.

In 1886 the library was opened to the general public as a free library, and during all the intervening years it has been very extensively used. It now numbers over one hundred thousand volumes, which volumes circulate freely. Since, and including 1887, annual appropriations have been made by the City of New York, which appropriations have been each year supplemented by an expense on the part of the Society of at least as much more as was received from the City of New York. The books circulate largely, and perhaps mainly, among the working classes, and it is believed by the Society that by such circulation a great work is being and has been accomplished.

The maintenance of this library is but a single department of the Society's work, as it furnishes educational facilities of various kinds to the working classes, gratis, such as mechanical and architectural drawing, designing and modeling in clay, stenography and typewriting, besides maintaining free scholarships in the New York Trades School. The Society has never applied for, or received, one dollar of State aid for the support or mainten

We respectfully urge that section 36 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1892 as amended by chapter 859 of the Laws of 1895 gives to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment full and ample powers to make the appropriation asked for. That section says that such Board "may establish and maintain a free public library either by itself or in connection with any other body authorized

and maintain a free public library either by itself of in connection and maintain such library."

Ours is a free public library. Our Society is by its charter authorized to establish and maintain such a library. (See chapter 283, section 3 of the Laws of 1888, amending previous laws.) The appropriation asked for is, therefore, that the City may maintain a free public library in connection with a body duly authorized to maintain the same, and is clearly within both the language and spirit of said section. That section is a full recognition of what may be called the inherent

and spirit of said section. That section is a full recognition of what may be called the inherent right of a great municipality to determine for itself, within reasonable limits, how far its moneys may be applied toward the maintenance of educational facilities of this character.

The Society most respectfully requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to make such appropriation to be used solely for library purposes, as may, upon the closest investigation, be found to be reasonable, and, in the judgment of said Board, beneficial to the masses reached by each library.

We respectfully request you to place this memorial before the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and include the hope that you will lend your powerful influence in favor of the appropriation desired.

This new building is to be erected on the west side side of Audubon avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-seventh and One Hundred and Sixty-eighth streets, occupying a site which, a year or so ago, was thought to be far in advance of the population.
