Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

At about 2.55 on the morning of January 28 there was a fire in the laundry building of Bellevue Hospital. The fire brigade at once went to the laundry and found the fire in the drying room. An alarm was sent to the City Fire Department and the fire was extinguished in a short time. The Fire Department recommends that a modern drying room be installed in the building. This can be done for about \$920, and it is recommended that such expenditure be authorized. It is also recommended that plans and specifications be prepared for a modern mangle, similar to that in use at Mount Sinai, St. Luke's and other large hospitals.

The entrance hall of Bellevue Hospital is in a bad condition. The floor is uneven and should be reset. Authority is asked to have this work done at a cost not to exceed two hundred and fifty dollars.

It is recommended that estimates be prepared and the lowest bid accepted on erecting a wooden fence, about ten feet high, about the excavation for the work of the new Bellevue Hospital.

It is recommended that an expenditure, not to exceed six dollars a month, be authorized, to have the New York Milk Commission make a monthly inspection of the dairies from which the milk comes for this Department.

It is recommended that the Board of Aldermen be requested to fix the salary of Enginemen in this Department at four dollars a day. We have recently lost two Enginemen, who have been transferred to other Department in which four dollars a day is paid, and we are having difficulty in filling the present vacancy on account of the low salary.

Resolved, That the matter of a new mangle for the laundry and the resetting of the floor in the entrance hall of Bellevue Hospital be referred to the Committee on Buildings for investigation and report.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
