The Clerk proceeded to read the minutes of the stated meeting of May 19, 1914. On motion of Alderman Stevenson further reading was dispensed with and the minutes were approved as printed. MESSAGES FROM THE MAYOR.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following messages from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 536. City of New York, Office of the Mayor, May 26, 1914.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen-I return herewith disapproved proposed ordinance No. 536 entitled: "Ordinance providing for semi-monthly payment for services of officers and employees of The City of New York.'

This ordinance makes it mandatory to pay the salaries of all officers and employees of the City government twice a month. This matter has been agitated for some time, and I requested the heads of the different departments to take a vote of their employees so that we might ascertain the sentiment in favor of the new plan. As a result of this test vote, I find that such large departments as Health, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, Bridges, Corrections, Park Department (Manhattan, Richmond and Queens), Charities (administrative force), Street Cleaning (the nonuniform force), and Taxes and Assessments registered a large vote against this new scheme of payment. As bi-monthly payments will entail a large additional expense, I think that you will agree that the matter should be taken up carefully. I have consulted with the Borough Presidents and the Comptroller, and it has been agreed that where we find a clearly preponderating sentiment in favor of bi-monthly payments in any particular department such payments will be instituted forthwith by administrative orders. The Committee on Salaries and Offices, to which was referred on April 21,

1914 (Minutes, page 165), the annexed ordinance providing for semi-monthly pay for officers and employees of The City of New York, respectfully

REPORTS:

That there has been a great demand for the enactment of this measure on the part of all classes of employees, who feel that their condition will be much improved by receiving their salaries twice a month instead of once a month, thus enabling them to purchase more often for cash, and in many cases to do away with the hardship of borrowing at exorbitant rates. It is estimated that the additional cost will be but a small item.

The Committee recommends that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE providing for semi-monthly payment of compensation for services of officers and employees of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section I. The salaries of all officers and employees of the City of New York and Counties therein, regulated at an annual rate of compensation, shall be due and payable by the City of New York twice each month, on the fifteenth and last days thereof, except where such days fall upon Sunday or a legal holiday, when such payment shall be made on the preceding business day; provided, however, that no such payment shall be required contrary to any existing laws of the State of New York.

Section II. It shall be the duty of all officers of the City of New York and Counties therein responsible for the payment of City employees to carry out the provision of this ordinance.

Section III. This ordinance shall take effect immediately after its approval by the Mayor.

PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

No. 651.

At a meeting of the Executive Council of the Metropolitan Protective Association of the Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York, it was duly

Resolved, That a resolution of this Association be presented to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, requesting the honorable members of that Board to pass an ordinance granting an increase in wages to employees of the Street Cleaning Department to the amount of \$139 per year for the following employees: Drivers, Sweepers, Hostlers, Section Hands and Stablemen. That in order to provide for such increase the Board of Aldermen authorize The City of New York to issue its bonds in an amount sufficient to provide for such increase during the coming year; and it was further

Resolved, That the attention of the honorable Board of Aldermen be called to the

following facts:

First-That the employees of the Department of Street Cleaning at the present time receive the following wages: Drivers, \$800 per year; Sweepers, \$780 per year; Hostlers, \$800 per year: Section

Station Keepers, \$780 per year; Stablemen, \$760 per year.

Second—That these are the same wages that have been paid since the year 1909, when the last increase of wages was granted to these petitioners.

Third—That since that time the cost of living has increased over twenty-five per cent. The increase in wages that is requested is not quite eighteen per cent.

Fourth-That the expense of providing for an average family of four or five people in the most economical way, exceeds the amount of wages which the employees of this Department receive.

Fifth—That the only way by which an employee of this Department can support himself and family while working for the City, is have his family work also. Thus the City receives the benefit of the services of the employees family without paying for such services.

Sixth-That, therefore, the members of this Department request that in justice to them. The City of New York increase their wages to such an amount as will énable them to live decently and comfortably.

The Board of Aldermen is respectfully requested, in view of the foregoing facts, to present an ordinance with the resolution hereby adopted.

Gentlemen-Under chapter 777 of the Laws of 1911, being an act to provide for the regulation and improvement of the railroads, terminals and approaches thereto, and of the motive power to be used thereon of the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company, in The City of New York, etc., the Railroad Company is required to adequately provide at the Grand Central Terminal, in The City of New York, for continuous public exhibition, during business days and hours, of originals or copies of the plans and profiles referred to in said Act, so long as consideration thereof shall be pending between your Board and the Railroad Company

District Attorney of Queens County: No. 654.

District Attorney's Office, Queens County, N. Y., Long Island City, May 20, 1914.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk, New York:

Dear Sir-I hereby request the issuance of special revenue bonds to the amount \$800 for extradition purposes. The appropriation for extraditions in the budget for 1914 was \$350, which was altogether inadequate for our needs. We have now a balance of only \$170.38 in this fund (No. 3543, Expenses in Extradition of Fugitive Criminals) and we have outstanding against it a bill for \$390.72, incurred in the extradition of a fugitive from Los Angeles, California. There is no method of calculating what will hereafter be required for this purpose, but I believe that the sum of \$800 now requested is not excessive, inasmuch as during the past five months \$561.34 has been needed for extraditions, and we expect that we will within a week have to extradite another fugitive from the neighborhood of Chicago. The police officer who made the trip to Los Angeles has laid out his own money for the County and it would be only justice to him to repay him this sum of \$390.72 as soon as possible. I therefore ask that you kindly have this matter put on the calendar of the Board of Aldermen as soon as practicable. Yours very truly,

Gentlemen—The Police Commissioner is in receipt of a communication from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated May 12, 1914, containing resolutions adopted by said Board on May 8, 1914, which read as follows:

Dear Sir—Request is hereby respectfully made that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Aldermen requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of \$980, to provide funds for the employment of two (2) Elevatormen in the new Bronx Court House at 161st st. and 3d ave.

The amount requested is based on the following estimate, viz: 2 Elevatormen, at \$70 per month each (from June 1 to December 31, 1914), a period of seven (7) months each.

It appears, through an oversight which occurred when the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on March 27, last modified the original resolution of the Board of Aldermen adopted February 17, providing for funds to employ the necessary maintenance force for the new Court House, that the provision for "Elevatormen" which appeared in the original request of this office for funds to employ said force, was omitted, and the omission was not discovered until the certified copy of the modified resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on April 21, 1914, was received.

The following is a review of the action taken at the several meetings of the Board of Aldermen and Board of Estimate and Apportionment, respectively, relative to the

funds required for said maintenance force.

January 9, 1914-Request for issue of revenue bonds for the sum of \$27,072.50, to

provide for Court House force of maintenance employees.

January 13, 1914-Request received at meeting of Board of Aldermen (No. 75 Introductory). Referred to Finance Committee.

February 17, 1914-Special Orders No. 10. Report of Finance Committee recommending the issuance of \$14,295, which report stated "It believes that inasmuch as the Court House will not be taken over by the City authorities for at least two (2) months, engineers, firemen and elevatormen are not needed." Report adopted.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, March 27, 1914—Resolution of the Board

of Aldermen adopted February 17, 1914, modified and returned to said Board for concurrence. Said modification included the provision for Engineer and Firemen, but omitted to provide for "Elevatormen." The total allowance was modified from \$14,295 to \$11,370.

Board of Aldermen-April 21, 1914-Modified resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 27, 1914, providing for an issuance of \$11,370

As it appears to be necessary that a resolution supplementary to the one adopted by the Board of Aldermen on April 21 be passed, to provide the necessary funds for the employment of the Elevatormen, it is respectfully requested that the matter be taken up at the next meeting of your Board on Tuesday, May 26, without being referred to the Finance Committee (as said committee has previously acted favorably on the request and had simply deferred the issuance of the bonds until the services of Engineer, Firemen and Elevatormen were needed), in order that prompt action may be had from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, so that the money for the purpose will be available at the earliest possible date, as I expect to accept the Court House from the contractors, as completed, within a few days.

The City of New York, Department of Parks, Office of Commissioner for the Borough of The Bronx, Zbrowski Mansion, Claremont Park, May 25, 1914. Honorable GEORGE McANENY, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—I have the honor to respectfully request that the Board of Aldermen recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue revenue bonds in the sum of \$31,881.75, of which \$24,037.60 is to be used for the purchase of additional road repair material, in order that this Department may be enabled to put the roads, drives and parkways under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, in good condition; \$3,479.15 for the purpose of employing additional Painters, and purchasing additional painters' materials, for painting the buildings, fences and railings under the care of this Department; and \$4,365 for repairs to the Colonial Mansion in Van Cortlandt Park—all as shown on the several maps and schedules which accompany this application.

The funds available in the appropriation budget for the year 1914 are altogether inadequate for the purpose of purchasing material for repairing any considerable portion of the park roadways; and it is very important that these roadways be put in a proper state of repair at once.

Year by year the traffic upon Bronx and Pelham parkway has increased to such an extent that it has now become probably the most constantly used parkway in the City. So enormous has been this increase that a recent census taken on a Sunday afternoon showed that almost eighteen hundred automobiles passed a given point on Bronx and Pelham parkway within an hour. Thus it may be seen that the comfort and safety of thousands of citizens from all over the City require that such roadways shall be put and kept in the very best state of repair.

I intend, in the event of securing the funds hereby applied for, to have all our park roads put and kept in first class condition. Practically all of the park roadways were in very bad condition this spring. This was due in part to neglect and in part to the fact that for several years the appropriations made to this Department for that purpose were entirely insufficient.

Funds available for the purchase of highway material during the present year are so grossly inadequate to meet pressing demands, that I am compelled to urge this application for sufficient funds to supply the deficiency.

The roads that can be repaired out of funds available are described in schedule "a" and shown in red on the accompanying maps; those that we are unable to repair with present funds are described in schedule "b" and shown in blue on the

accompanying maps. This Department has an aggregate of eighty-eight (88) buildings, the greater number of which are cared for by the Department; and these require painting, there having been little if anything done in the matter af painting these buildings for several years past.

In addition, we have upwards of 50,000 linear feet of two and three-pipe iron railing, the greater portion of which requires painting, and 8,000 linear feet of

iron fence, all of which requires cleaning and painting.

The time allowed for painters, and the amount allowed for painters' materials, in the budget for 1914 are entirely inadequate to do this work; hence I ask for the sum of \$3,479.15, as shown on the schedule transmitted herewith. As paint not only adds to the appearance and neatness of these buildings and fences, but is an an actual preservative, preventing their deterioration and decay, this is not only an essential, but a very necessary item.

The Colonial Mansion in Van Cortlandt Park is in dire need of repair and should by all means be put in good condition at once. In 1911 there was appropriated the sum of \$28,000 for an addition to this building, and the installation of heating plant in the old portion. Less than \$18,000 will be used, and \$10,000 of the amount will be rescinded. As the repairs shown on the schedule are very necessary, and as they cannot be made from the corporate stock appropriation now available, in excess of that required for the addition and heating plant, I earnestly request that this item of the application receive favorable consideration.

Because of the evident importance of putting and maintaining our park roadways, buildings, fences and railings in a high state of repair, and that without delay, feel justified in most earnestly urging upon your Honorable Board favorable consideration of this request. Respectfully.

Gentlemen-Under date of February 4, 1914, the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity addressed a communication to the Comptroller, requesting the Corporate Stock Budget Committee to recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an authorization of \$34,000 in corporate stock to provide funds for the laying of water mains in Tremont ave. (now E. 177th st.), between Westchester ave. and Zerega ave., Borough of The Bronx. In connection therewith we report as follows:

E. 177th st., between the limits stated, is now occupied by a double line of street railway track in the centre of the street and outside of which the street is entirely unpaved. There is at present considerable traffic upon the street, and the adjacent territory, both north and south, is built up to some extent, the water for the building being secured from old and small distribution mains in the streets upon which the houses face. It is desirable from every point of view that E. 177th st. be paved, and, although no immediate return commensurate with the cost of the laying of the proposed mains is anticipated, it is probable that within a few years a considerable revenue will be derived therefrom. If the laying of the mains be deferred, it will be necessary to postpone the paving which is now needed or to tear up the pavements in order to lay the mains, thus materially increasing the expense.

The plan of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity provides for a 12-inch main on the north side of the street and a 20-inch main on the south side, the purpose of the two mains being to provide adequate facilities for extensions north and south of E. 177th st. and for adjacent territory to the eastward. The sizes of the mains

are proportionate to the territory which it is proposed to serve. We recommend, therefore, the adoption of the attached resolution granting the

Gentlemen-Under date of March 31, 1914, the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Queens, requested an authorization of \$18,300 corporate stock for the construction of five groynes or jetties to protect and build up the shore front on the ocean side of Seaside Park, Rockaway, and for engineering services in design, supervision and inspection on the work of construction. The amount requested for the construction of the jetties was \$15,000, and the remaining \$3,300 was for the engineering force as follows:

1 Assistant Engineer, 5 months at the rate of \$4,000...... \$1,666 67 Transitman, 5 months at the rate of \$1,650..... Engineer Inspector, 5 months at the rate of \$1,200..... Incidental expenses .....

The Commissioner stated that he made his request at the instance of Dr. J. W. Brannan, President of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, who is interested in the construction of a hospital for tuberculosis children at Seaside Park.

The hospital is being constructed by the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, which association has let contracts for the construction of two pavilions of the hospital. When the contractors started excavations for the building it was found necessary to change the site by moving it backward from the shore front eighty feet. This was because of the washing away of the beach at the southeasterly end of the park. The severe storms of the past winter have demonstrated that there is grave danger of losing a considerable portion of this park by erosion unless measures are taken to protect the beach front.

Even after the site of the hospital was moved backward eighty feet there was left a beach frontage at high tide of only twenty-five feet, whereas originally there was a frontage of one hundred and twenty-five feet.

In view of the fact that an important part of the treatment of the children is an open air treatment on the beach it is desirable to have a beach frontage of sufficient width to accommodate all the children.

Mr. Bailey B. Burritt, the Acting General Director of the Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, states that if the hospital buildings had been

issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding thirty- started where they had been originally planned they would now be standing in water for fifty feet of their width.

The proposed jetties are not only for the protection of the beach, but are intended to reclaim the beach area which is already washed away. Several acres of valuable land have already been lost by erosion, and it is believed that this land can be reclaimed by the erection of jetties.

The cost of the jetties proposed by the former Commissioner of Parks in Queens is entirely too high. The erection of serviceable jetties by the Neponsit Company on property adjoining the Seaside Park has proved that it is not necessary to spend such a large sum for groynes for the City's park.

The Bureau of Contract Supervision has submitted estimates based on actual prices for jetties in that locality. These estimates show that the five groynes can

be built for less than half the amount proposed by the Commissioner. The amount proposed for engineering supervision is entirely too large. It is almost fifty per cent. of the cost of construction. The time required for the construction work is estimated at one hundred days.

Plans have already been drawn for the work, and the expense for plans and specifications will be practically nothing. About the only engineering expense necessary will be supervision and inspection. It has been suggested that a more than adequate force would be as follows:

Assistant Engineer, at \$4,000 (1 month) ..... Engineering Inspector, at \$1,200 (5 months).... 500 00 The work of a Transitman will be necessary for a short time, but there is a

balance in account "C. D. P-405, Department of Parks, Borough of Queens, Salaries of Engineering Force," available for this purpose. It is estimated that \$8,000 will be sufficient for the engineering force and for the construction of the jetties. This will provide for jetties costing considerably

more per foot than the jetties built by the Neponsit Company. We recommend the adoption of the attached resolutions, which will authorize corporate stock to the amount \$8,000.

We recommend that the corporate stock be authorized to mature not later than

Hon. GEORGE McANENY, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York: Dear Sir—By resolution adopted May 6, 1913, the Board of Aldermen set apart for use as push-cart markets the four large spaces situated under the Manhattan Bridge approach between East Broadway and Cherry st. The money necessary to put these lots in condition for use by the push-carts has not yet been appropriated, and the lots are to-day vacant and unused.

You will no doubt recall, that prior to the action by the Board of Aldermen, the two lots lying between Madison and Cherry sts. had been assigned to the President of the Borough of Manhattan for use as a corporation yard—it being the intention to move to this location the wholly unsatisfactory Rivington St. Yard, the site of which would then become available for use by the Recreation Commission, to which it had accordingly been assigned. The use of one of these lots is very important to my Department, and we are being constantly urged by the Recreation Commission to abandon the Rivington St. Yard, in order that that site may be made available for a much needed playground.

A preliminary examination made in my capacity as Chairman of the Committee on Markets, of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, has satisfied me that the lot lying between Monroe and Cherry sts, will not be needed for push-cart purposes. The other three lots reserved by the Board of Aldermen, lying between East Broadway and Monroe st., will be ample to provide for the need of push-cart markets in that section of the Borough.

Sirs-This Department is prosecuting an original action in the Supreme Court of the United States entitled the State of New York vs. State of New Jersey and Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission. This suit is now No. 3 on the Docket of Original Actions for the present term of the Supreme Court of the United States.

The record in this case has been completed and consists in over one and onehalf million typewritten words, and in addition thereto there are two hundred and twenty exhibits, comprising maps, charts, diagrams, tabulations and voluminous data. This extensive record, together with the exhibits therein, is now in the custody of the Clerk of the Supreme Court of the United States, awaiting an order from this Department to be printed and prepared for submission and argument to the the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and

The records of cases before the Supreme Court of the United States are printed in Washington, D. C., under the supervision of the Clerk of that Court.

This Department is in receipt of a communication from Mr. James D. Maher, Clerk of the Supreme Court of the United States, in which is set forth the printer's estimate for the printing of this record and the reproduction of the various maps, charts, diagrams, etc.; as follows:

"I have had the printer make an estimate of the amount necessary to be advanced by the complainant to cover the Clerk's costs and cost of printing the record in the case of the State of New York vs. the State of New Jersey et al., No. 3 on the docket of original actions for the present term. The estimate is as follows: Clerk's costs, \$4,875, and for printing, \$13,300, making a total of \$18,175."

The amount, \$18,175, does not include the expenses incidental to the preparation and printing of a digest of this voluminous record for the use of the Court during the argument, nor does it include the expenses of the preparation and printing of a brief and a reply brief, all of which are printed under the supervision of the Clerk of the Supreme Court.

The approximate cost and expenditure necessary for all these items will be about \$26,000. The amount specified in the Clerk's letter must be deposited by check with the Clerk of the Supreme Court of the United States before the record in this suit can be printed and prepared for argument before that Court.

This suit was instituted by a bill of complaint praying for an injunction restraining the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission from constructing and operating a trunk sewer, about twenty-eight miles in length, designed to collect the sewage and trade wastes from thirty-seven municipalities and townships along the Passaic Water Shed. The volume of this septic filth would be over three hundred and sixty million gallons per day discharged south of the Battery at the lower end of Manhattan Island. The daily addition to the present highly polluted waters of New York's Upper Bay of so vast a quantity of putrescent refuse in its most objectionable and injurious condition would menace alike the health and comfort of the citizens of New York, and strike fatally at the commercial pre-eminence of our great port

There is no appropriation to this Department from which the amount of \$26,000 could be paid for the foregoing purpose and I therefore request that your Honorable Board recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue special revenue bonds to an amount sufficient to pay for this item. Dear Sir-Your communication dated April 25, 1914, has been received by me, asking if, during the war with Spain in 1898, any arrangement had at that time been entered into by The City of New York whereby City employees who volunteered and went to the war were paid by the City during the time they were engaged in the country's service.

In reference to the question asked by you the following resolutions were adopted at various dates herein referred to by the Board of Aldermen and Board of Estimate and Apportionment, respectively:

At a meeting of the Board of Aldermen April 19, 1898, the following resolution was

'Whereas, By the action of the National Legislature at Washington it is extremely likely that within a few days the United States will be involved in a conflict of arms with the Kingdom of Spain; and

"Whereas, In case a call on the part of the Executive, the President of the United States, it is the duty of every loyal citizen of the republic to volunteer his services for the defense of his country and the upholding of its honor; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the heads of the various departments of the City Government be requested in every case where any employee in any dpartment of the Municipal Government shall volunteer to bear arms in the coming conflict to grant leave of absence with full pay during the time of such service.

"Resolved, That the Clerk be instructed to transmit a copy of these resolutions to the head of every department of the City Government.'

At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, April 22, 1898, the

Mayor offered the following resolution: 'Resolved, That in the event of the President of the United States calling for volunteers or for the militia of the State for the service of the United States, the em-

ployee of the City who may enter the service of the United States, as such volunteers or militia shall receive their salaries under leave of absence during their continuance in such service." Which resolution was formally adopted. Subsequent to the passage of this resolution the opinion of the Corporation

Counsel was furnished to the Bridge Commissioner, in which he held that such employees should be paid their salaries.

Chapter 654 of the Laws of 1899 provides that: 1. All employees of the state or of a state department who enlisted as volunteers in the United States service during the war with Spain, who did not receive their pay as state employees during their absence from their places of employment, are hereby declared entitled to their pay as public employees, from the time of their enlistment

until their honorable discharge from the service of the United States. 2. \* \* \* The sum of \$20,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is

hereby appropriated. \* \* \* On October 1, 1900, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to issue revenue bonds of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding \$10,000, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 644 of the Laws of 1900, for the purpose of providing means for the payment to soldiers, sailors and marines of the United States Army and Navy during the war with Spain who were in the employ of the City at the time of enlistment, the salary or per diem compensation to which they would have been entitled if they had remained in the employ

Gentlemen-I am in receipt of a letter dated April 2, 1914, from Mr. Albert E. Hull, Committee Clerk, of which the following is a copy:

"By direction of the Committee on Salaries and Offices, I send you herewith a copy of a proposed ordinance now before said Committee for report. Will you be kind enough to inform the Committee whether, in your opinion, the Board of Aldermen has the power to enact legislation of this character?

A copy of the proposed ordinance enclosed with said letter is as follows: "AN ORDINANCE in relation to adding to the grades and ranks of officers and members of the uniformed force of the Fire Department of The City of New York, the rank of uniformed Marine Engineer.

"Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: "Section 1. The rank and salaries of the officers of the Fire Department shall be

'Chief of department, whose annual salary shall be not more than six thousand dollars; deputy chiefs of department, whose annual salary shall be not more than four thousand two hundred dollars; battalion chiefs, whose annual salary shall be not more than three thousand three hundred dollars; medical officers, whose rank and salary shall be the same as that of battalion chiefs, one of whom shall be appointed chief medical officer, whose annual salary shall be not more than six thousand dollars; veterinarians, whose rank and salary shall be the same as that of deputy chiefs; captains or foremen of companies, whose annual salary shall be not more than two thousand one hundred and sixty dollars; lieutenants or assistant foremen of companies, whose annual salary shall be not more than eighteen hundred dollars; pilots of fireboats, who shall continue to receive annual salaries as now provided for by law; engineers of steamers, whose annual salary shall be one thousand six hundred dollars; uniformed marine engineers, whose annual salary shall be one thousand six hundred

"Section 2. All engineers of steamers of the fire department of The City or New York holding licenses as marine engineers, now or hereafter assigned to the duties of engineers on fireboats of the fire department of the City of New York, shall have the title and rank of marine engineer, the grade for which shall be established as provided for by law.

Section 3. This ordinance shall not be construed to affect, modify or impair the effect and validity of any ordinance heretofore adopted relating to the salaries or grades of any member of the uniformed force of the Fire Department.

"Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately."

The proposed ordinance is in substance, if not in form, an amendment to a portion of section 740 of the Greater New York Charter. It adds to the list of officers and employees of the Fire Department mentioned in such section a new position, i. e. that of uniformed Marine Engineer, and regulates to a certain extent the manner in which such position shall be filled.

I think that the power of the Board to enact such a proposed ordinance is extremely doubtful. Prior to the passage of chapter 247 of the Laws of 1913, commonly known as the Home Rule Bill, I suppose there could be no questions about the Board's lack of power, and I do not believe that anything contained in that act supplied the omission. You are doubtless so thoroughly familiar with the provisions of that statute, that I will not encumber this opinion with a recital of any portion thereof, but will content myself with calling your attention to several recent decisions of the courts interpreting the act and ordinances of local legislative bodies seeking to enlarge Charter provisions in relation to the subjects discussed in such decisions.

In the course of the opinion of the Appellate Division, Fourth Department, in the

case of City of Geneva v. Fenwick, 159 App. Div. 621, it is said:

Each municipality can exercise such prerogatives as are delegated to it by the Legislature, and I do not believe that by the enactment of the 'Home Rule Bill' (socalled) the Legislature intended to confer upon municipalities the right to override plain Charter provisions ample and efficient to accomplish a given purpose. To hold otherwise would be to invest municipalities with the right to frame their own charters and to utterly disregard special powers conferred upon them by the Legislature.'

A more recent decision was made by Mr. Justice Weeks construing an ordinance of your Honorable Board enlarging the power of the Police and Fire Commissioners to reinstate removed members of the forces of their respective departments under section 1543A of the Greater New York Charter. I refer to the case of People ex rel. O'Connor v. McKay, Law Journal, April 30, 1914. The opinion is as follows:

Motion is denied (Anckner v. Moscowitz, Maddox, J., N. Y. Law Journal, March 30, 1914). In my opinion the Home Rule Bill was intended to give general powers to municipalities not in excess of the constitutional restrictions upon legislative action, but was not intended to give Boards of Aldermen power by ordinance to remove restrictions and limitations placed upon public officers by existing charter provisions.

I think the reasoning underlying the refusal of the courts to give their sanction to the ordinances considered would justify a similar refusal to approve of the proposed ordinance, a copy of which you have sent me, should it be enacted and be submitted for judicial approval.

There are other considerations which to my mind militate against the legality of the proposed ordinance, if adopted, and I am, therefore, constrained to advise you that, in my opinion, the ordinance would not be sustained by the courts. FRANK L. POLK, Corporation Counsel.

Sirs-Under date of April 22nd, 1913, your honorable Board passed an ordinance covering the matter of fees for sewer connections in the different boroughs of the City. Said ordinance went into effect on July 7th, 1913. This office was duly furnished with a certified copy of same, but due to some inexplainable oversight the ordinance was not called to the attention of our Permit Clerk until September 9th, 1913, being then called to his attention by a message from the Finance Department, asking whether the terms of the ordinance were being complied with as to the increased charge for sewer connections from \$3 to \$5 in the Borough of Richmond.

The matter was looked into at once, and since that date the \$5 charge has been made in each and every instance. Prior to that, however, 126 permits were granted at the old rate of \$3, aggregating a virtual deficiency in collection of \$252.

It is doubtful whether it will be possible for us to collect this money from the many permittees affected, and it would undoubtedly cost much more than the amount

of the deficiency to make the collection.

As this failure to collect the full amount was caused by the mislaying of the certified copy of the ordinance, and as the cost of collection would probably be more than the amount involved, we would ask that the Board pass such resolution as may be necessary to suspend the operation of the ordinance for the Borough of Richmond for the period of time between July 7th and September 8th, 1913, inclusive, thus validating the collections made.

Majority Report-No. 520-(G. O. No. 270)

The majority of the Committee on Health, to which was referred on April 14, 1914 (Minutes, page 108), the annexed ordinance in relation to the sale and use of wood alcohol in The City of New York respectfully REPORTS:

That it held a well attended public hearing at which full discussion was had on this subject. There was a strong protest from the manufacturers, refiners and agents for the wood alcohol product against any change in the name, which they claimed had been used commercially for many years. The ordinance was commended by several members of the medical profession, the Deputy Commissioner of Health, the Society for the Prevention of Blindness and the counsel for the Association of

The Committee has given careful consideration to the question and believes there is merit in the protests of the persons interested in the manufacture and sale of the product. In consequence thereof it has amended the proposed ordinance by providing that the name "wood alcohol" shall not be changed on packages over one gallon, but making the name "wood naphtha" on containers of one gallon or less. It is of the opinion that the public will be protected by this change of name on the smaller packages with the additional safeguard provided by the label prescribed herein.

It recommends that the ordinance, as amended, be adopted.

SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to the sale and use of "wood alcohol" in The City of

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Any substance known as wood alcohol, in its crude or deodorized form, having the chemical composition known professionally as CH3OH is hereby prohibited if sold in a receptacle of the capacity of one gallon or less from being sold under any other name than "wood naphtha," nor shall it be lawful to use said chemical composition in any medical or toilet preparation. Said chemical composition, when sold as such, shall be labeled with a regulation poison label with the following words added: "This fluid taken internally, inhaled or used externally, is likely to produce blindness and lead to death." Minority Report, No. 520 (G. O. No. 271).

The minority of the Committee on Health, to which was referred on April 14, 1914 (Minutes, page 100), an ordination of The City of New York, respectfully REPORTS: 1914 (Minutes, page 103), an ordinance in relation to the sale and use of wood alcohol

That the Committee held a public hearing on this subject at which strong protests were voiced by the representatives of the wood alcohol trade, and by Profesor Charles Baskerville, of the College of The City of New York. It seems to the undersigned that it is beyond the power of the Board of Aldermen to make such a radical change in the name of a commercial product, and this view is borne out by an opinion filed with the Committee by a well known law firm, copy of which is attached.

Professor Baskerville, a recognized authority on this question, submitted a proposed ordinance much more drastic and far reaching in its provisions, and containing far greater safeguards for the general public in connection with the sale and use of wood alcohol than the proposed ordinance submitted by the majority of the Committee.

With this belief, and with the purpose of presenting for the approval of the Board the very best regulation that can be offered, the undersigned submits the annexed ordinance, and recommends its adoption.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to the sale and use of wood alcohol in the City of New York.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. No person shall sell, offer for sale, deal in, supply or give away, or have in his possession with intent to sell, offer for sale, deal in, supply or give away any article of food or drink or any medicinal or toilet preparation intended for human use internally or externally which contains any wood alcohol, otherwise known as methyl alcohol, either crude or refined, under or by whatever name or trade mark the

same may be called or known. Section 2. No person shall sell, offer for sale, deal in, supply or give away. or have in his possession with intent to sell, offer for sale, deal in, supply or give away any wood alcohol, otherwise known as methyl alcohol, either crude or refined, under or by whatever name or trade mark the same may be called or known, unless the container in which the same is sold, offered for sale, dealt in, supplied or given away shall have affixed thereto, the regulation poison label containing the following words printed in type not less in size than eight point as known to the trade, in red letters on a white field, viz.:

"Poison.

"Wood Alcohol. It is unlawful to use this fluid in any article of food or drink, or medicinal or toilet preparation, for human use, internal or external.'

Section 3. Any person guilty of a violation of this ordinance, or any part thereof. shall upon conviction thereof before a City Magistrate, be punished by a fine of not less than twenty nor more than fifty dollars for the first offense, and not less than fifty dollars for any subsequent conviction, and in default of payment of any fine so imposed shall be committed to the City Prison for a term of ten days, each day of imprisonment to be taken as a liquidation of each dollar of such fine.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its approval by the Mayor.

Gray & Co., of 76 William st., Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, the largest distributors in the world of wood alcohol, I beg to submit this opinion of law in opposition to the adoption by your honorable body of "An ordinance in relation to the sale and use of 'wood alcohol' in The City of New York," familiarly known as the Weil Ordinance, No. 520. Stripped of verbiage the said ordinance provides that wood alcohol in its crude or deodorized form shall not be sold under any other name than "wood naphtha."

I.—(A) Methyl or Wood Alcohol Is the Correct Chemical and Commercial Designation of the Product Referred to in the Proposed Ordinance and It Cannot Lawfully Be Labeled, Marketed or Sold Under Any Other Name; (B) "Wood

Naphtha" Would Be a Misnomer.

The Encyclopaedia Britannica, 11th Edition, Volume 1, Page 527, in defining

"alcohols" says:

"Alcohols are classified on two distinct principles, one depending upon the number of hydroxyl groups present, the other on the nature of the remaining groups attached to the carbon atom, which carries the hydroxyl group. \* \* \* The second principle leads to alcohols of three distinct types, known as primary, secondary and tertiary. The genesis and formulation of these types may be readily understood by considering the relation which exists between the alcohols and the present hydrocarbon. In methane CH4 the hydrogen atoms are of equal value, and hence only one alcohol, viz.: CH3OH, can be derived from it. This compound, methyl alcohol, is the simplest primary alcohol and it is characterized by the grouping: CH2OH."

The same authority (Volume XVII, Page 298), says: "Methyl alcohol (CH3OH) the simplest alipathic alcohol. \* \* \* The name methyl, from Gr. Methu, wine, ulc, wood, explains its origin. Discovered by Boyle in 1661, it was first carefully studied by Dumas and Peligot in 1831; its synthesis from its elements (through methane and methyl chloride) was effected by Berthelot in 1858. It is manufactured by distilling wood in iron retorts, \* \* \*"

The Century Dictionary and Cyclopaedia (Vol. 1, Page 132), defines methyl

or wood alcohol as

alcohol "wood naphtha."

"Alcohol obtained by the destructive distillation of wood. When pure it is a colorless mobile liquid (CH3OH), with an odor and taste like ordinary alcohol (ethyl hydrate), \* \* \* though the commercial article has a strong pyroligneous smell.

The same authority (Vol. V. Page 3933), defines "naphtha" as follows: "An artificial volatile colorless liquid obtained from petroleum. It is a general term applied to the products of the distillation of crude petroleum between gasolene and refined oil.'

And the Standard Dictionary of the English Language in Vol. 11, Page 1176, defines "naphtha" as

A light, colorless, volatile, inflammable oil distilled from organic bodies, as bituminous shale, asphalt minerals, etc., but principally from petroleum \* \* It will thus be readily seen that wood alcohol is an established chemical sub-

stance derived from the destructive distillation of wood; that it has been known as wood alcohol for nearly a hundred years, and that in its chemical composition and properties and commercial utilization it is distinctively different from naphtha as scientifically and ordinarily understood.

From the standpoint of trade all authorities, price lists, exchanges, railroad tariffs, insurance rating boards, etc., designate "naphtha" as a petroleum or coal tar product, while wood alcohol is listed only by that term as a wood distillate.

II.—Weil Ordinance No. 520 Unconstitutional. I respectfully advance the opinion that an ordinance which will not allow a producer or manufacturer to market his product under the name by which it has been known to the public and compels him to label it by another and totally misleading designation, and one which has no value in the industry, would be clearly unconstitutional, because it would deprive him of his property without due process of law in violation of the Constitution of the United States and the State of New York. While the right of property is subject to the police powers of the State such power

Dear Sirs-You have shown us a proposed ordinance entitled "An Ordinance in relation to the sale and use of 'wood alcohol' in The City of New York," and have requested our opinion as to the constitutionality of a provision thereof prohibiting the sale of the substance known as wood alcohol under that name or any other name than "wood naphtha." The exact language of the proposed ordinance on the subject

'Section 1. Any substance known as wood alcohol in its crude or deodorized form, having the chemical composition known professionally as CH3OH, is hereby prohibited from being sold under any other name than 'Wood Naphtha'.'

We understand that the substance known as methyl or wood alcohol is a definite chemical compound derived from the destructive distillation of wood; that it is an important article of trade and commerce and extensively used in the arts; that it has been known as wood alcohol for many years and is so termed on boards of trade and in price lists, trade circulars, etc., as well as in dictionaries, encyclopedias and technical treatises; in brief, that the name "wood alcohol" is not only scientifically accurate but is the commonly accepted name by which the substance is known to the public at large, and as such has a trade value in the industry in which your corporation is engaged.

We understand further that commercially speaking "naphtha" is a term applied to a petroleum or coal tar product.

Upon these facts we think the proposed ordinance in so far as it seeks to prohibit the sale of wood alcohol under that name and to compel its sale under the name "wood naphtha" would be open to objection on constitutional grounds. The right of property which the law protects includes the right to deal with and dispose of such property in any lawful manner, subject of course to the police power of the State. In our opinion legislation which prevents a producer or manufacturer from selling his product (provided it is something which may lawfully be made and enter into commerce) under its true name, and compels him to sell it under a different name, is unconstitutional as depriving him of his property without due process of law in violation of the Fourteenth Amendment of the Constitution of the United States and of Article 1, Section 6, of the Constitution of the State of New York. Dear Sir-In regard to increasing the floor space at Washington Market, I would advise that it is entirely feasible to do this, both from a structural and economic point

First-From the Structural Point of View. Washington Market has but a single floor. This is at about the level of the surrounding streets. The existing building is, however, sufficiently high and the plans on file indicate sufficiently extensive foundations to permit of the building of a mezzanine floor, about thirty feet wide, between the exterior wall and the next row of column along three sides and part of the fourth side of the fourth side of the building. And to do this without any serious structural change or the adding of new foundations.

Such a mezzanine would have a clear height of, at least, ten feet, while on the floor below there would be a clear height of about twelve feet. No objection can be found on the ground of either lighting or ventilation, while the refrigeration problem would be simplified. The appearance of the exterior would remain unchanged and

the interior would, on the whole, be improved. Second-From the Economic Point of View. There are upwards of forty-two thousand square feet of floor space, of which about twenty-four thousand—i. e., that not occupied by aisles-brought in a rental in 1912 the sum of \$51,426.68. The mezzanine floor I have suggested above would add about fifteen thousand square feet or more than one-third to the former area. For many purposes for which floor space has been used, such as large refrigerators, some offices, etc., the added space would be as valuable as any. If instead of using this mezzanine for such purposes, thus making more space on the main floor available for selling, it was determined to use any part of the mezzanine floor for the latter purpose, it would be feasible to give easy access by means of a ramp.

I estimate that this mezzanine could be built, of substantial and pleasing form, for

twenty-five thousand (25,000) dollars.

In 1912, Washington Market, with a gross area of forty-two thousand square feet, paid a rental, on this gross area, of one dollar and twenty-two cents (\$1.22) per square foot, while operating expenses and maintenance amounted to twenty-five cents per square foot or a rental, less operating expenses and maintenance, of ninety-seven

cents per square foot. On a proportionate basis, the fifteen thousand square feet, which it is proposed to add, would pay a gross rental of \$18,300 and a rental, less operating expenses and maintenance, of \$14,550. Thus the mezzanine would pay interest on the investment and return the capital invested in two years, while the net income to the City. of

\$14,550 a year, would still continue. Viewing the situation as a whole, we now have a building assessed at seventy-five thousand dollars, on land assessed at nine hundred and fifty thousand dollars. In other words, the improvement is not in proportion to the land value. This fact accounts for the very high return from a small additional investment on the building as described above.

Sir-On April 22, 1914, the Board of Education requested the Board of Aldermen to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of \$500, for the purpose of paying to Miss Nathalia Boniface the difference between salary at the rate of \$1,200 and at the rate of \$1,800 per annum from March 1, 1914, to December 31, 1914. In connection therewith I report as follows:

Miss Boniface was originally appointed by the Board of Education to the position of Statistician at an annual salary of \$1,200. In 1912 she filed a claim in the Comptroller's office for \$3,000 arrears of salary, under a resolution of the Board of Aldermen fixing the position of Statistician for the Department of Education at \$1,800 per annum. The Corporation Counsel, to whom this claim was referred for an opinion, rendered an opinion on June 18, 1912, in which he advised the Comptroller to compromise the claim on the most favorable terms as there was a likelihood of the Board of Education being held liable. The Comptroller refused to assent to a compromise, and the case went to trial before Justice Newburger in June, 1913. His Honor dismissed the complaint for techincal reasons, and an appeal was taken by the plaintiff to the Appellate Division. Before the appeal came up for argument the plaintiff proposed a compromise on this basis: She offered to give a general release of all demands down to March 1, 1914, provided that thenceforth she be recognized as a Statistician and paid the salary of such, amounting to \$1,800 per annum, which was the rate for which she sued.

With regard to this proposed settlement Deputy Comptroller Brough, in a letter to the Corporation Counsel, dated February 16, 1914, stated that he would approve of the proposed settlement providing the Board of Education would adopt a resolution recognizing Miss Boniface as a Statistician entitled to an annual compensation of \$1,800 from March 1, 1914, in consideration of the execution of a release of all claims for arrears of salary down to that date. The Board of Education accordingly adopted the resolution asked for by the Deputy Comptroller on March 25, 1914, and transmitted a certified copy of same to the Civil Service Commission. The latter approved of the action taken by the Board of Education and directed that Miss Boniface's title be changed on the records to "Statistician at \$1,800 per annum," to date from March 1, 1914.

The rate of pay provided for Miss Boniface in the 1914 Budget was \$1,200. Hence, it will require the additional sum of \$500 to pay her for the period extending from March 1, 1914, to December 31, 1914, at the rate of \$1.800 per annum. There are no funds available in any of the salary accounts for 1914 to provide for Miss Boniface's salary increase. In view of the foregoing, the request of the Board of Education for special revenue bonds should be granted. Respectfully,

Pruners and Climbers in Detail-Trees in City streets, 21 men, entire force. Twenty additional men to care for nursery, which includes a stock of 40,000 trees that have to be transplanted, 2,000 of which will be ready to be placed in City streets within the coming year of 1915.

The appropriation of the \$4,500 asked for for the Forester will result in a profit of more than eight times its value, according to the estimates of the Forester. This sum applied to the labor necessary to care for the young trees and transplant them will yield the following result:

The lowest bid received was that of Conradson & Hill, who are now doing the work for the Finance Department, and who offered to lay the linoleum at the same price as they are receiving for that work, that is: To supply and lay 3/16-inch brown battleship linoleum laid on heavy felt paper and cemented to the floor for \$1.20 per square yard.

It is necessary to cover the floors of the rooms occupied by the Stenographers and the general Clerks' office, where it is not practicable to use rugs. These floors contain about 700 square yards and the cost will be approximately \$840.

It will be noted that only one firm submitted a bid for removing the steel furniture. That is explained by the fact that the cost of the work of taking apart the cases and reassembling them in the new building is so uncertain that no concern except the firm who originally erected the furniture is willing to submit a bid.

For a similar reason we were able to obtain only one bid for the electric work. No firm except the concern who are now doing the electric work in the building was willing to bid on work where it was so difficult to determine the cost.

In all existing buildings where the dumb-waiter shaft extends into the cellar or lowest story, it shall be inclosed in that story with walls of brick eight inches thick; all openings in said walls shall be provided with self-closing fireproof doors.

Ground Sign Structures—(1) No ground fence, billboard or sign structure within the fire limits of The City of New York as now or hereafter constituted, shall be at any point over twelve feet above the adjoining ground, except that when the face of any such structure, excepting the ornamental moulding thereof, shall be constructed entirely of metal or of wood covered on all sides with sheet metal, such structure shall not be at any point over twenty-four feet above the adjoining ground.

(2) Any person, firm or corporation that shall occupy any vacant lot or premises with a billboard or other advertising ground structure or device, shall be subject to the same duties and responsibilities as the owner of such lot or premises with respect to keeping the same clean, unsanitary, inoffensive and free and clear of all noxious substances in the vicinity of such billboard, structure or device; and with respect to the removal of snow from the sidewalk and curb in front thereof.

Section 3. Roof Sign Structures—(1) All roof sign structures shall be so constructed as to leave a clear space of at least seven feet between the roof level and the lowest part of such structure and at least five feet between the vertical supports thereof; such structures shall be set back at least six feet from the face of the front and rear walls and shall not interfere with any openings in the roof or with any tire escape. Such structures, excepting the ornamental surface moulding thereof, shall be constructed entirely of metal, including the uprights, supports and braces for same, and shall be required to bear a wind pressure of not less than thirty pounds to the square foot of area subject to wind pressure.

(2) No roof sign structure having a tight, closed or solid surface shall be at any point over thirty-one feet above the roof level. Roof sign structures not having a tight, closed or solid surface may be erected upon fireproof buildings to a height not exceeding seventy-five feet above the roof level, and upon non-fireproof buildings to a height not exceeding fifty feet above the roof level, but the portions of such structures covered and exposed to wind pressure shall not exceed thirty-five per cent. of the total area.

Section 4. Signs on Walls of Buildings—(1) No sign shall be so erected as to cover the doors or windows of any building or otherwise prevent free ingress or egress to or from any window, door or fire escape on any building in The City of New York.

(2) No sign shall be erected upon the front, rear or side wall of any building so as to project above either the roof cornice or parapet wall or above the roof level where there is no cornice or parapet wall; except that a sign erected at a right angle to the building wall, the horizontal width of which sign parallel to such wall does not exceed two feet may be erected to a height not exceeding two feet above the roof cornice or parapet wall or above the roof level where there is no cornice or parapet wall. A sign attached to a corner and parallel to the vertical line of such corner, shall be deemed erected at a right angle to the building wall.

(3) No electric sign as defined in the Electric Sign Ordinance approved July 24th, 1912, the horizontal width of which sign parallel to the building wall shall exceed two feet, and no part of or appendage to any such sign shall project more than three

feet beyond the building line.

Section 5. Unlawful Structures.—Upon the adoption of this ordinance the fire department of The City of New York shall notify by registered mail the owner or lessees of any sign structure attached at other than a right angle to the wall of the building and extending outside the building line and projecting above the roof cornice or parapet wall or above the roof level where there is no cornice or parapet wall, and of any sign structure which shall be so erected as to prevent free ingress and egress to and from any door, window or fire escape of any building, to remove or alter such structures so as to comply with this ordinance. If such order is not complied with within sixty days, The City of New York shall remove such structure at the expense of such owner or lessee.

Section 6. Permits.—(1) No ground-sign or roof-sign structure shall be erected unless plans and specifications, showing the dimensions, material and details of construction, accompanied by the written consent of the owner or owners, lessee or lessees of the property upon which it is to be erected, shall have been filed with the Superintendent of Buildings having jurisdiction, nor until all of the provisions of Section 4 of the Building Code of The City of New York relating to such structures shall have been complied with, nor until a permit for its erection shall have been obtained from such Superintendent of Buildings. In the case of a sign structure illuminated by electricity, a certificate must also be procured from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, certifying that the electric wiring and electric appliances of the proposed sign are in conformity with the rules and regulations of that department.

(2) Before any permit shall be issued under this ordinance, a permit fee shall be paid to the Bureau of Buildings as follows: For ground structures, \$2; for roof structures having a tight, closed or solid surface, \$5; for roof structures not having a tight, closed or solid surface, \$10. Every structure for which a permit is issued shall be inspected at least once in each calendar year by the Bureau of Buildings.

Section 7. Registration and Identification—Every ground-sign and roof-sign structure, existing or hereafter erected, shall be registered with the Bureau of Buildings of the Borough in which such structure is situated by the person, firm or corporation maintaining the same, and shall have displayed upon the front thereof the name and address of such person, firm or corporation, and the serial number of the permit issued for such structure. The Bureau of Buildings may issue permits in several series so as to distinguish between existing structures and new structures erected in conformity with this ordinance, or between various classes of structures, and may prescribe suitable regulations not inconsistent herewith concerning the form and contents of the applications for various classes of permits. Permits shall be issued for existing structures not conforming to the requirements of this ordinance, provided such structures were erected in conformity with the legal requirements in effect when they were erected, but no fees shall be charged for permits or registration for such existing structures.

Section 8. Unsafe Structures.—Should any fence, sign, bill board or roof-sign structure be or become insecure or in danger of falling or otherwise unsafe, in the opinion of the Bureau of Buildings, the owner thereof or the person maintaining the same shall upon notice from said bureau, immediately in case of immediate danger and in any case within ten days, secure the same under the supervision of and in the manner to be approved by said Bureau in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 9. Alteration of Existing Sign Structures—No existing fence, sign, bill-board or roof-sign structure shall be enlarged, rebuilt, structurally altered or relocated unless or until it shall comply with the provisions of this ordinance. This shall not apply to the relettering or rewiring of illuminated signs.

Section 10. Exceptions—(1) No part of this ordinance shall apply to walls constructed wholly or principally of stone, marble, brick, terra cotta, concrete or other like material composing a masonry or monolithic wall, back yard fences on the ground in the interior of a court, picket fence and ornamental metal fences.

(2) No part of this ordinance except section 4 shall apply to signs, showbills and other boards permitted by and erected in compliance with section 260 of the General Ordinances of The City of New York or to electric signs permitted by and erected in compliance with the provisions of the Electric Sign Ordinance approved July 24th, 1912.

Section 11. Penalty and Abatement—(1) No fence, sign, billboard or roof-sign structure shall be erected in The City of New York except as in this ordinance provided under a penalty of \$100 for each offense. No such structure shall be maintained in The City of New York contrary to the provisions of this ordinance under a penalty of \$10 for each day or part of a day the same shall be so maintained.

(2) In addition, any fence, sign, billboard or roof-sign structure erected or maintained in violation of this ordinance shall be subject, upon notice, to abatement by the Bureau of Buildings having jurisdiction.

Section 12. Except as expressly hereinbefore provided in section 5 hereof, this ordinance shall have no retroactive effect.

Section 13. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 14. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

ORIGINAL.

AN ORDINANCE regulating fences, signs, billboards, roof signs, advertisements and other structures in the City of New York.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. All fence, billboard and sign structures erected upon the ground and all roof sign structures shall be erected entirely within the building line and be properly secured, supported and braced and shall be so constructed as not to be or become dangerous.

Section 2. Ground Sign Structures—(1) No ground fence, bill board or sign structure within the fire limits of The City of New York as now or hereafter constituted, shall be at any point over twelve feet above the adjoining ground, except that when the face of any such structure, excepting the ornamental moulding thereof, shall be constructed entirely of metal or of wood covered on all sides with sheet metal, such structures shall not be at any point over twenty-four feet above the

adjoining ground.

(2) Any person, firm or corporation that shall occupy any vacant lot or premises with a billboard or other advertising ground structure or device, shall be subject to the same duties and responsibility as the owner of such lot or premises with respect to keeping the same clean, sanitary, inoffensive and free and clear of all noxious substances in the vicinity of such billboard, structure or device; and with respect to

the removal of snow from the sidewalk and curb in front thereof.

Section 3. Roof Sign Structures—(1) All roof sign structures shall be so constructed as to leave a clear space of at least seven feet between the roof level and the lowest part of such structure and at least five feet between the vertical supports thereof; such structures shall be set back at least six feet from the face of the front and rear walls and shall not interfere with any openings in the roof or with any fire escape. Such structures, excepting the ornamental surface moulding thereof, shall be constructed entirely of metal, including the uprights, supports and braces for same, and shall be required to bear a wind pressure of not less than thirty pounds to the square foot of covered surface area.

(2) No roof sign structure having a tight, closed or solid surface shall be at any point over thirty-one feet above the roof level. Roof sign structures not having a tight, closed or solid surface may be erected upon fireproof buildings to a height not exceeding seventy-five feet above the roof level, and upon non-fireproof buildings to a height not exceeding fifty feet above the roof level, but the portions of such structures covered and exposed to wind pressure shall not exceed thirty-five per cent. of the total surface area.

Section 4. Signs on Walls of Buildings—(1) No sign shall be so erected as to cover the doors or windows of any building or otherwise prevent free ingress or egress to or from any window, door or fire escape on any building in The City of New York.

(2) No sign shall be erected upon the front, rear or side wall of any building so as to project above either the roof cornice or parapet wall or above the roof level where there is no cornice or parapet wall; except that a sign erected at a right angle to the building wall, the horizontal width of which sign parallel to such wall does not exceed two feet, may be erected to a height not exceeding two feet above the roof cornice or parapet wall or above the roof level where there is no cornice or parapet wall. A sign attached to a corner and parallel to the vertical line of such corner, shall be deemed erected at a right angle to the building wall.

(3) No electric sign as defined in the Electric Sign Ordinance approved July 24th, 1912, the horizontal width of which sign parallel to the building wall shall exceed two feet, and no part of or appendage to any such sign shall project more

than three feet beyond the building line.

Section 5. Unlawful Structures.—Upon the adoption of this ordinance the fire department of the city of New York shall notify by registered mail the owner or lessees of any sign structure attached at other than a right angle to the wall of the building and extending outside the building line and projecting above the roof cornice or parapet wall or above the roof level where there is no cornice or parapet wall, and of any sign structure which shall be so erected as to prevent free ingress and egress to and from any door, window or fire escape of any building, to remove or alter such structures so as to comply with this ordinance. If such order is not complied with within sixty days, the city of New York shall remove such structure at the expense of such owner or lessee.

Section 6. AN ORDINANCE in relation to the stoppage of street surface railway cars in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Safety Stops for Street Surface Railway Cars-In the interest of public safety, street surface railway cars shall come to a full stop:

(a) At all points where a "Fire Stop" sign is exhibited. (b) At all points where a "School Stop" sign is exhibited, between the hours of 8 a. m. and 9 a. m., 12 noon and 1 p. m., and 3 p. m. and 5 p. m., except on Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays and between the period of July 1st and September 1st.

Sec. 2. Street Surface Railway Cars Taking on or Discharging Passengers-To take on or discharge passengers, when signaled so to do, street surface railway cars shall come to a full stop, in such a position as not to obstruct the crosswalk, before crossing any intersecting or connecting street; except that with the written consent of the Police Commissioner, and if "Trolley Stop" signs are installed by the railway company, cars may stop:

(a) At other points on unpaved streets, (b) In the centers of blocks over four hundred feet long;

(c) On the far side of any street containing an intersecting street railway; except further, that street surface railway cars may cross an intersecting or connecting street without stopping provided that, in each such case, the Police Commissioner shall give his consent, and the railway company shall install a "No Stop" sign, and there shall be regular stopping place with a "Trolley Stop" sign within 200 feet of the "No Stop'

Sec. 3. Punishment for Violations—Any street surface railway company violating any provision of this ordinance, shall upon conviction be punished by a fine of ten

(10) dollars for each offense. Sec. 4. Ordinances Repealed-Section 448 of Article I, Chapter 12, Part 1, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York; Section 49, Chapter 5, Part III, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York; and all other ordinances inconsistent with or contrary to the provisions of this article are hereby repealed.

AN ORDINANCE to amend the "Public Hack Ordinance." Be It Ordained, By the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as fol

Section 1. Section 2 of article 1 of the "Public Hack Ordinance," adopted May 27, 1913, and approved June 2, 1913, is hereby amended to read as follows

2. Definitions-[A public hack is a vehicle plying for hire and which solicits public patronage upon the streets and highways of this City. A public hack is a vehicle which uses the streets, highways and public places of the City for the transportation of passengers, with or without baggage, for hire, pay or compensation of any kind. It makes no difference whether such a hack is hired on the public streets or in a garage or livery stable or over the telephone.

A cab is a public hack so designed and constructed as to comfortable seat, in the opinion of the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, not more than two persons as passengers inside thereof.

A coach is a public hack so designed and constructed as to comfortably seat, in the opinion of the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, four or more persons as passengers inside thereof.

A sightseeing car is a motor-driven vehicle designed to carry seven or more persons from a fixed locality to points of interest about the City.

A taximeter is a mechanical instrument or device by which the charge for hire of a public hack is mechanically calculated, either for distance traveled or for waiting time, or for both, and upon which such charge shall be indicated by means of figures.

A cab driven by mechanical power on which a taximeter is affixed shall be known "a little taxicab." as

A taxicab is a coach driven by mechanical power on which a taximeter is affixed. This ordinace shall not apply to or govern any vehicle hired or obtained from a livery stable or garage and which does not solicit patronage upon the streets; nor to any omnibus running by authority of any ordinance, law, charter or permit upon a fixed route thorugh the city

Nothing herein contained is designed to prevent a person from making an agreement-with the owner of a public hack to furnish him with transportation at a rate to be agreed upon between them, for the day, week or month. But the person with whom the owner of the public hack makes such an agreement is not at liberty to

hire the public hack out to some other person. Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately. Note—New matter in *italics*; old matter, in brackets [], to be omitted.
