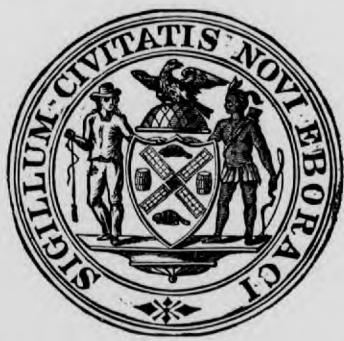

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 8, 1890—STATED MEETING, 11 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Gallup, President, Borden, Hutchins, Robb.

On motion, the reading of the minutes of previous meetings was dispensed with.

The following communications were received:

From the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, transmitting copies of the following ordinances:

1st. To re-regulate, regrade, etc., Morris avenue from One Hundred and Fifty-third to One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street.

2d. To regulate, grade, etc., One Hundred and Sixtieth street from Washington avenue to Railroad avenue, East.

3d. To regulate, grade, pave, etc., One Hundred and Fifty-first street from Courtland avenue to Railroad avenue, East.

4th. To pave One Hundred and Fifty-third street between Third and Courtland avenues with trap-block pavement.

5th. To pave One Hundred and Forty-ninth street from Robbins avenue to the Southern Boulevard with granite-block pavement. Referred to the Engineer of Construction in charge of streets and sewers in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

From the Secretary of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, relative to the proposed extension of East River Park, and requesting that a map or plan be furnished showing the area of the proposed extension.

On motion of Commissioner Robb, the Topographical Engineer was directed to prepare a map as requested, by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallup, Borden, Hutchins, Robb—4.

From the Secretary of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, advising the Department of the semi-annual closing of the Museum building for the purpose of cleaning and rearrangement of new collections. Filed.

From Lieutenant-Colonel G. L. Gillespie and Professors John S. Newberry and A. H. Gallatin, reporting upon the several communications received by the Department, suggesting methods for the preservation of the Obelisk. Filed.

A petition, asking that some ground other than the croquet ground in the Central Park be set apart as a site for the proposed children's playground, was received and referred to the Superintendent of Parks and the Landscape Architect.

From the Superintendent of Lamps and Gas, stating that an order had been given for the fitting up and lighting of a gas-lamp on the westerly side of Riverside Drive, south of One Hundred and Fourth street. Filed.

From Albert S. Roe, in relation to the pavement in West Seventy-second street. Filed.

From A. L. Tuckerman, Architect, recommending that an order be issued to Pottier, Stymus & Co. for the purchase of a desk and chair for the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Referred to the President.

For the salary of the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, of the City of New York, and his Deputy and all Clerks. . \$25,000 00

For the maintenance and government of streets, roads and avenues in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, including supplies, salaries and wages of all persons employed on such work, \$1,000,000.

Repairing and maintenance of bridges over the Bronx river, \$5,000.

Repairing and cleaning sewers and the construction of temporary drains as may be ordered by the Board of Health, \$250,000.

For sprinkling the main thoroughfares in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, \$10,000.

Construction, repair and maintenance of bridges over Cromwell's creek and other than those over Harlem and Bronx rivers, \$25,000.

For Disbursements to be made by the Engineer of Construction as follows:

For the ordinary expenses of the office in the matter of making preliminary surveys and plans of projected sewers, drains and other improvements, including rent of office for engineers, \$25,000.

For engineering, supervision, inspection and clerical work in connection with the work of depressing the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad and bridging the intersecting streets and avenues, etc. (main line and Port Morris Branch Railroad), \$10,000.

For the Office of the Topographical Engineer.

1st. For surveying in connection with the work of monumenting for the purpose of establishing monument points and determining their relative positions and the distances between them; surveying in connection with the work of preparing and completing the tax maps for which location surveys are required of all property and lot lines of existing roads, streets, etc., and of all lands-marks showing old farm lines and original subdivisions of land where this information is not shown on the contract and other maps in the possession of the Department; also for preparing maps and technical descriptions of streets, roads, avenues, public squares and places proposed to be laid out by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement or by special acts; for preparing seven copies of map for filing by the said Board; and under chapter 446 of the Laws of 1889, relative to East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, between Elton and Third avenues, and under chapter 495 of the Laws of 1890, relative to Gerard avenue, between Bergen avenue and East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street; also for making maps, plans and profiles showing changes of grades of streets, avenues, roads, etc., laid out prior to May 23, 1873; also making five copies of map showing changes of lines, grades, class, etc., of streets, etc., as provided by chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887; also for making five copies of maps, plans and profiles for establishing the grades and showing the location of monuments, angles and dimensions of streets, etc., heretofore laid out by the Department of Parks when directed thereto by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, as provided by chapter 577 of the Laws of 1887; also for devising and preparing seven copies of maps and plans for sewerage and drainage districts in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards; also for monumenting, to wit: defining lines of streets and their intersections as laid down on the maps, the foregoing work being included under the designation of surveying, laying out and monumenting in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, etc., \$50,000.

(The act creating the office of a special Commissioner for the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards provides that all maps, material and data relating to that district shall be turned over to him by the Department of Parks. Although it does not make any provision for the completion by him of the tax maps, yet an appropriation should be included in the tax levy of this year, anticipating the action of the Legislature in giving him that power.)

For making and completing the tax maps of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards for the use of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, as required by section 679 of the Consolidated Act, to wit: Making location surveys of all property and lot lines, existing streets, roads and avenues, and of all lands-marks showing old farm lines and original subdivisions of land, making searches in the Register's office at White Plains of conveyances recorded prior to 1874, and in the real estate records which have been tabulated and kept in this Department since 1874, making copies of all maps filed in the Register's office at White Plains and in New York; making examinations and comparisons of searches and surveys and property maps and the necessary calculations thereupon to establish the relation existing between streets in use and laid out on the property maps and the streets, avenues, roads, etc., laid out and monumented by this Department, and necessary calculations to determine the position and dimensions of property and lot lines, and the area of each separate plot, whether in possession and also whether included within the limits of streets, roads, public squares and places, shown and laid out upon any map or maps filed by this Department in accordance with the provisions of section 672 of the Consolidated Act, as amended by chapter 530 of the Laws of 1885.

For all the above, in order to complete the same speedily, \$25,000.

2d. For making surveys, maps and plans required in proceedings for acquiring title for the use of the public to lands required for streets, avenues, roads, public squares and places, and the right of way for drains, in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, as follows:

For making rule maps in triplicate for the use of the Counsel to the Corporation and furnishing him with a technical description of the lands to be taken by the City in proceedings to acquire title for the use of the public to streets, avenues and roads, and to acquire the right of way for drains to be constructed as directed by the Board of Health under chapter 360 of the Laws of 1880, as amended by chapter 430 of the Laws of 1883, in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards; also for making surveys and maps required by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the proceedings to acquire title to streets, avenues and roads, and the right of way for drains in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, \$50,000.

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction:

GENTLEMEN—It became necessary last week to turn the travel from the county road to Milltown, near Sodom, into the new road just finished by Contractor Clinton Stephens, and, owing to the abundant rains of last week, it has become necessary to use gravel on parts of the same which

are exceptionally low and wet. It being necessary to begin at once that work, which I consider outside of Mr. Stephens' contract, I have directed him to take coarse gravel from a distant pit, the nearest one at hand, and to haul it to places just mentioned. As, however, the whole work will require about 1,500 loads, I left the matter subject to your approval. Mr. Stephens offers to do this work at the rate of seventy cents per cubic yard, which is, in my opinion, a reasonable price under the circumstances, and I respectfully request that the Chief Engineer be authorized to proceed forthwith with the work.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number, of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
