

The 731 deaths represent a death-rate of 19.86 against 20.63 for the previous week, and 19.54 for the corresponding week of 1892.

Contagious and infectious diseases continue to increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 167, 223, 86, 10 and 12 against 176, 212, 80, 17 and 5 for the previous week, a total of 498 against 492. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eighth and Twenty-second Wards, and the decrease in the Ninth and Twenty-third Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Seventh, Twelfth, Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Twenty-second Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Twelfth and Twenty-first Wards, and the decrease in the Eighth, Tenth and Eighteenth Wards. Seven of the 10 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and the remaining 3 were between Fourteenth and Fortieth streets, on the east side. Six of the 12 cases of small-pox were below Fourteenth street, and five of the remaining 6 were above Fortieth street.
