## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,  
CITY OF NEW YORK,  
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,  
Thursday, Jan. 21, 1875, 12 o'clock, M.

The Board met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:

William H. Wickham, the Mayor of the City of New York; Andrew H. Green, the Comptroller of the City of New York; Samuel A. Lewis, the President of the Board of Aldermen; John Wheeler, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held January 19, 1875, were read and approved.

The Comptroller moved to amend the resolution adopted at meeting of January 18, 1875, authorizing the transfer of five thousand five hundred dollars from the unexpended balance of 1874, of the Department of Health, to an account for the payment of additional vaccinators for temporary services, and for experts for the investigation of diphtheria, by inserting after the word "diphtheria," the words "for the year 1875."

Which was agreed to.

The Comptroller presented his report on communications from "County Clerk," and "Court of Common Pleas," referred to him at meeting of January 19, 1875, as follows:

Resolved, That the sum of three thousand five hundred and ninety-one dollars and sixty-five cents (\$3,591.65) be and the same is hereby transferred from the following appropriations for 1874: "Contingencies—Mayor's Office," \$250; "Salaries—Mayor's Office," \$1,049.98; "Salaries—Bureau of Permits," \$1,891.67; "Contingencies—Bureau of Permits," \$400, the same being in excess of the amounts required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation for "Salaries—Judiciary," for 1864:

the amount of said appropriation being insufficient.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller moved to suspend the rule adopted by the Board at meeting June 23, 1874, relating to the calls of meetings, in order to act upon the resolutions now to be proposed by the Comptroller, for the issue of "New York City Bonds for Liquidation of Claims and Judgments," and "Assessment Bonds of the City of New York."

Which was agreed to.

The Comptroller presented claims upon which judgments have been obtained, as follows:

George W. Fuller, balance due on contract, made by Wm. M. Tweed, for paving Elizabeth street..... \$8,668 00

Manhattan Gas-light Co..... 12,415 10

Whereupon the Chairman offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue bonds of the City of New York, as provided in chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873, for the purpose of providing moneys for the payment of judgments which have been or may be obtained against the said City, the amount of said bonds not to exceed the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), said bonds to be designated "New York City Bonds for Liquidation of Claims and Judgments," and bear interest not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, and payable at such time within three years from the date thereof, as the Comptroller may determine.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the authority conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the provisions of section 112, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent.



per annum, "Assessment Bonds of the City of New York," as authorized by chapter 397, Laws of 1852, and chapter 580, Laws of 1872—one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000).

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

DAILY MEETINGS, JANUARY 11 TO 16, 1875.  
Meeting of the Board, January 11, 1875.

Present—Commissioners Bailey, Cox, and Brennan.

From Alms-house—Statement of amount of labor performed by mechanics (inmates) for week ending January 9, 1875. Ordered on file.

From Penitentiary—List of Prisoners received during week ending January 9, 1875. Ordered on file.

From Penitentiary—List of prisoners to be discharged from January 17 to 23, 1875. Transmitted to Prison Association.

From Penitentiary—Reporting officers absent. More specific reports to be made in such cases.

From Penitentiary—On Keeper John H. Woodward being suspended on November 3, 1874. Dismissed.

From Penitentiary—Guard Rafferty not on duty since November 3, 1874. The case to be inquired into.

From Charity Hospital—Breaking of valve stem of steam launch. Referred to Supervising Engineer.

From Charity Hospital—Furnishing Small-Pox Hospital with beds and bedding. To appoint an Orderly and Nurse. Referred to Commissioner Brennan, and attended to.

From Lunatic Asylum—Contractor on pavilions objecting to sand from Ward's Island. Same sand to be used.

From Lunatic Asylum—History of patients admitted. Referred to Examining Clerk.

From Store-house—Requiring ten bales of dark blankets for Penitentiary and Work-house. Referred to Commissioner Brennan, who reports requisition to be made for all articles needed, at once.

From Reception Hospital, Park—To be furnished with a supply of coal. Referred to Commissioner Brennan.

From Reception Hospital, Park—Leaky condition of roof. Referred to Supervising Engineer.

From New York City Asylum for Insane—History of patients admitted. Referred to Examining Clerk.

From New York City Asylum for Insane—Requiring coal by Tuesday, at twelve o'clock. Ten tons ordered from Bellevue Hospital.

Resolved, That the Board of Health, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 3 of section 1 of chapter 636 of the Laws of 1874, do hereby designate as proper places to which to remove and care for persons afflicted with the contagious disease known as small-pox, and as the places for the reception and treatment of persons so sick or removed, the Small-pox Hospital heretofore in use, being the following-named premises, viz., that portion of Bellevue Hospital, in the City of New York, now used for the temporary reception and detention of such persons, together with the stone building and the pavilions (quarantine and convalescent) on Blackwell's Island, used and known as the Small-pox Hospital.

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolution be forwarded to the Commissioners of Charities and Correction, and that they be respectfully requested to transfer all of said premises, with the furniture and fixtures therein, to this Board, on the 20th day of January, 1875.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD HEALTH of the Health Department, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, on the 19th day of January, 1875, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 56 of the Sanitary Code be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 56. That the keeping and slaughtering of all cattle, and the preparation and keeping of all meat and fish, birds and fowl, shall be in that manner which is, or is generally reputed or known to be, best adapted to secure and continue their safety and wholesomeness as food. Neither the slaughtering nor the driving of cattle shall be permitted or conducted at any place in the City of New York south of Fortieth street; nor shall the slaughtering of cattle be conducted at any place in the City of New York north of said street, without a special written permit from this Department; unless the same shall be done in buildings located directly upon the water front, each having a capacity sufficient for the yarding and slaughtering daily of one-half of the entire number of cattle, or hogs, or small stock (all or separately, according to the particular object of each abattoir) slaughtered in this City, at the time the application for the permit for such abattoir shall be made; and so constructed as to receive all stock deliverable thereat, directly from the cars or transports; and to discharge therefrom all liquid refuse below low-water mark, and to secure the proper care and disposition of all parts of the slaughtered animals upon the premises, or the immediate removal thereof by means of boats.
