



The 840 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.56, against 21.10 for the previous week and 29.70 for the corresponding week of 1892.

for the corresponding week of 1892.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked increase for the week, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 125, 99, 123, 19, 92, and 2 against 118, 93, 103, 11, 12 and 4 for the previous week, a total of 460 against 341. The increase of diphtheria was most noticeable in the Eleventh, Seventeenth Nineteenth and Twentieth Wards, while there was a considerable decrease in the Tenth, Twelfth, Sixteenth and Twenty-first Wards. Measles increased markedly in the Seventh, Twelfth, Fourteenth, Sixteenth, Twentieth and Twenty-third Wards, and decreased in the Sixth, Eighteenth and Nineteenth Wards. Scarlet fever increased chiefly in the Eighteenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards, and decreased in the Twelfth, Seventeenth, Twentieth and Twenty-first Wards. 13 of the 19 cases of typhoid fever were below Fourteenth street (an unusual proportion), and 5 of the remaining 6 were above Fortieth street. 76 of the 92 cases of typhus fever were in the immediate vicinity of the place where the first cases were found, while the others were scattered.

And we, the said Commissioners, will be in attendance at our said office on the 5th day of February, 1893, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon of that day, to hear the said parties and persons in relation thereto. And at such time and place, and at such further or other time and place as we may appoint, we will hear such owners in relation thereto and examine the proofs of such claimant or claimants, or such additional proofs and allegations as may then be offered by such owner, or on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York.
