Discharging the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation from further consideration of the resolution adopted by the Board of Superintendents on November 30, 1903, in regard to amending subdivision 2 of section 44 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education.

Amending subdivision 6 of section 44 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education so as to read as follows:

6. In admitting a new pupil, the Principal shall ascertain and record the birth date of such pupil. The Principal shall require the person in parental relation to the child to produce a certificate from the Department of Health, a passport, a baptismal certificate, or other satisfactory evidence of the date of birth. When such evidence is not immediately available, the child, if apparently over eight years of age, shall be admitted on condition that the necessary record of birth be produced. When such evidence of birth is not produced, and the child afterward applies for a

certificate of school attendance in order to obtain a permit to go to work, such certificate may be withheld until evidence is produced that he is of the requisite age. A child who, in the opinion of the Principal, is not six years of age shall not be admitted to the grades of the elementary school until the requisite evidence of school age shall have been produced.

A child shall not be admitted to a kindergarten until the requisite evidence of age shall have been produced.

Amending subdivision 1 of section 64 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education by inserting the words "above the kindergarten" between the word "class" and the word "composed" in the fourth line from the end of said subdivision.

Amending subdivision 4 of section 51 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education so as to read as follows:

4. The session of the high schools shall be five hours in length, beginning at 9 a. m., except as hereinafter provided. There shall be an intermission of not less than thirty minutes, which, with the approval of the Board of Superintendents, may be extended to not more than sixty minutes. When, because of increase in registration, it becomes necessary to extend the session, such session may begin at 8.30 a. m. and continue not later than 5 p. m. The organization of classes in such extended session shall provide for each pupil the number of recitation periods per day and per week required by the courses of study in high schools.

Amending subdivision 13 of section 64 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education, by striking out the first sentence thereof, and substituting therefor the following:

13. Male substitutes shall receive \$3 and female substitutes \$2.50 per day of actual service, except as provided in subdivision 3 of section 52 and except normal school students licensed under subdivision (i) of section 68, who shall be paid at the rate of \$1.50 per day of actual service.

Amending subdivision 2 of section 73 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education by adding thereto the following: (c) Graduation from a satisfactory high school or institution of equal or higher rank, or an equivalent academic training, or the passing of an academic examination, and the completion of a satisfactory course of professional training of at least one year, followed by two years' successful experience in teaching cooking.

Stating that, in the opinion of this Board, the term of office of Mr. John H. Walsh, Associate Superintendent, expires on September 30, 1907.

The following report was presented by the Committee on Elementary Schools: To the Board of Education:

Your Committee, to whom were referred the annexed charges preferred against Elmer E. Henderson, a Teacher in Public School 31, in the Borough of Brooklyn, respectfully report:

That they notified the said Elmer E. Henderson to appear and answer said charges; that he duly appeared by counsel and demanded the specifications of the said charges, which were duly furnished, and which specifications are hereto annexed and made part of this report.

Your Committee has carefully investigated said charges, and has examined several witnesses under oath, and taken voluminous testimony. From such testimony your Committee find as follows:

First—That Elmer E. Henderson is a Teacher of the graduation class in Public School 31, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and has taught in said school in said class since November, 1902. He formerly taught for five years in Public School 86, in the Borough of Manhattan. That no charges were heretofore preferred against him, and his record heretofore was good.

Second—That said Henderson's method of teaching in his present position is defective; that he lacks knowledge of the subjects to be taught.

Third—That he conducts his work without any definite plan, aim or purpose.

Fourth—That about June 19, 1903, he recommended thirty-five out of thirty-eight pupils, constituting his class, for graduation; upon an examination of these pupils by the Principal and District Superintendent only eight were found fit for graduation.

Fifth—That his discipline is lax; he does not exercise sufficient control over his pupils, resulting in his pupils not having proper respect for him, and being inattentive during recitation. He permits said pupils to litter the floor and desks with papers, and does not keep his classroom in proper and clean condition.

Sixth—That he wastes too much time in teaching.

Seventh—While believing that his dismissal would be justified, yet in view of the previous record of the said Henderson, we recommend that he be transferred to teach a class in the next lower grade, in the Borough of Brooklyn, with the salary provided for by Schedule VI.; and we further find that his previous suspension was justified, and that his pay should commence from the time of assignment to such lower position.

All of which, together with the testimony, is respectfully submitted.

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

February 15, 1904.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 12 o'clock m., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Printed copies of the minutes of the meeting held January 21, 1904, were presented and adopted.

A communication of date January 21, 1904, was received from the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted by that body at a meeting held January 21, 1904, namely:

(1) Concurring in the resolution of the Armory Board relative to the bid of James D. Murphy Company for the construction of the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory.

(2) Amending resolution assigning property in the Borough of Brooklyn as a site for an armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia.

—and at a meeting held February 5, 1904, as follows:

(1) Approving of the payment to Werner & Windolph of the sum of \$435.44, being 5 per cent. of the cost of the work in full for payment for services rendered in preparing plans and specifications and the necessary supervision in the alterations of doors of various armories.

Ordered filed.

Communications were received from the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted February 5, transferring \$1,075.86 as requested by the Armory Board.

Ordered filed.

And of date February 1, 1904, transmitting certified copy of resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted January 29, in regard to the application for the acquisition of land for public purposes.

Ordered filed.

Communications from the Deputy Comptroller advising the Armory Board that \$15,000 and \$100,077 were deposited in the City Treasury to its credit.

Ordered filed.

The Bureau of Buildings filed a violation, of date January 19, 1904, on the Seventy-first Regiment Armory building, namely: "Omitting to file plans and specifications for brick foundations now being built; also not filing plans for bases," which the Secretary reported had been referred to the architects of the building, and which violations have since been removed by filing the necessary plans.

The Secretary reported that a lien had been filed with the Armory Board on January 29, 1904, by Eugene J. May, for work and materials in the Twelfth Regiment Armory. The Secretary reported that this was a lien against the City for experimental work in the Twelfth Regiment Armory, at the direction and under the supervision of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

A notice of claim and intention to sue was filed by the Pennsylvania Rubber Company with the Armory Board on February 9, 1904, for supplies furnished Squadron "A," Ninth Regiment and First Battery armories.

Which was also referred to the Comptroller.

The Secretary presented the application of Kelly & Kelley, contractors, for a payment on account for their contract for grading the plot for the proposed armory building for Troop "C," N. G. N. Y., in the Borough of Brooklyn. The architect's certificate accompanied the same.

The President of the Board of Aldermen offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Messrs. Kelly & Kelley, contractors, the sum of four thousand and thirty-seven dollars and fifty cents (\$4,037.50), on account for their contract for materials and work required in grading the plot for Troop "C" Armory, on the easterly side of Bedford avenue, extending from President to Union streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented the bill of Hunt & Hunt, architects, for professional services on their contract for the preparation of plans and specifications for the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory, amounting to \$12,656.65.

The President of the Board of Aldermen offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Messrs. Hunt & Hunt, architects, the sum of twelve thousand six hundred and fifty-six dollars and sixty-five cents (\$12,656.65), as per accompanying voucher, on account of their contract for professional services required in the preparation of plans and specifications and the supervision of the construction of an armory building for the Sixty-ninth Regiment, N. G. N. Y., in the Borough of Manhattan.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented the application and affidavit of William B. King, contractor, for the balance retained on his contract for alterations and improvement to the roof of the Twelfth Regiment Armory, amounting to \$347.50, which was duly certified by the Inspector.

The President of the Board of Aldermen offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to William B. King, contractor, the sum of three hundred and forty-seven dollars and fifty cents (\$347.50), in full for his contract for an alteration and improvement to the roof of the Twelfth Regiment Armory building, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication was received from the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting a petition from the residents occupying the properties composing the site of the proposed Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory building.

On motion of the President of the Board of Aldermen the petition was denied, on the ground that the Board had no power to grant the same.

A communication was received from the Acting Secretary in relation to the cost of grading the plot adjoining the armory site for Troop "C," N. G. N. Y.

On motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments it was laid over.

Communications were received from the Colonel of the Thirteenth Regiment Heavy Artillery, asking for an extension and alterations to the armory of his organization, giving estimates of cost.

On motion of the Mayor it was laid over, to give Colonel Austen an opportunity to appear before the Board.

A communication of date February 3 was received from Thomas E. Rush, Esq., asking permission to use the Eighth Regiment Armory for preparation for an athletic tournament to be held by the Craigie School.

The Secretary reported that he had replied to the communication that the Armory Board had no power to grant the use of an armory for such a purpose.

Ordered filed.

A violation was filed by the Bureau of Buildings, of date February 6, on the Twenty-second Regiment Armory, and directing the Armory Board to place upon said building "iron balconies 5 feet wide on Columbus avenue side, taking in the first and second windows from north side; also the first and second windows from south side, at balcony level, connect each of these balconies with iron stairs, placed at each end of balcony, to the ground and cut down each of the four windows and provide doors in openings at least 3 feet wide, said doors to open outward and fastened with movable bolts, no locks requiring keys to be used. Also cut an opening in each wall at about centre of drill room and at its level, and provide a pair of doors in said opening, doors to be at least 6 feet wide and to open outward and fastened with movable bolts. Also provide a similar opening and door in south wall, near the easterly end. Also erect an iron balcony 3 feet wide on south wall, near its westerly end, at a point midway between ground and flat portion of roof, which is accessible from Armorer's quarters. Connect the balcony with the roof by means of a goose-neck ladder and to ground by a drop ladder."

The Acting Secretary reported that there were unexpected items of expense necessary, not contemplated in the original specifications for removing previous violations on nine armories in the city, and gave an estimate of the expense of this work, as well as providing for a similar doorway on the Eighth Regiment Armory as an outlet in case of fire, and fire escapes on Squadron "A" Armory, amounting to \$12,000.

General Smith offered the following:

Resolved, That the report of the Acting Secretary be adopted, and that the Secretary be directed to have plans and specifications made for the work necessary to remove the violations placed on the armories, together with the additional gates, lanterns and storm doors required in placing fire escapes and completing the work now in progress

on the armories of Squadron "A," Eighth, Twelfth, Fourteenth, Twenty-second and Twenty-third regiments, and for the Seventeenth Separate Company, and that the sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) be appropriated therefor; that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur therein and the Comptroller authorized to issue bonds to provide for the payment thereof.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary reported the execution of the following contracts:

January 19—Peter J. Ryan, for repairs and alterations to the Twenty-second Regiment Armory.

January 22—Neptune B. Smyth, repairs and alterations to Third Battery Armory.

January 26—James D. Murphy Company, for the erection and completion of the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory.

The Secretary presented the bill of Clinton & Russell, architects, for professional services in connection with the alterations and repairs to the steam-heating plant of the Seventh Regiment Armory—5 per cent. on the contract price, \$10,500—\$525.

The Acting Secretary reported that this work was done under the contract of the James Curran Manufacturing Company, the lowest bidders, for the sum of \$10,500; that \$4,000 of this sum was provided by the sale of bonds, concurred in by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and the balance of the amount was taken from the annual appropriation for repairs and supplies to the armory. The bill for the architects' services, in this connection, was mislaid, and was now presented for payment; that the bond issue was entirely exhausted in the payment of the work, and the general appropriation for repairs and supplies for 1902 was also exhausted and the accounts closed for that year.

General Smith offered the following:

Resolved, That the sum of five hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$525) be and hereby is appropriated for the purpose of paying Messrs. Clinton & Russell, architects, for professional services in connection with the contract for alterations and repairs to the steam-heating plant of the Seventh Regiment Armory, completed under the contract of the James Curran Manufacturing Company, and that the Comptroller be authorized to issue bonds for the payment of the same, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Captain Debevoise, commanding Troop "C," appeared before the Board relative to the proposed lease and grading of the plot adjoining the armory site for an armory for his organization.

General McLeer, on behalf of the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens, reported progress in the matter of placing fire-alarm boxes in the armories.

Major Kerby, representing the Eighth Regiment, N. G. N. Y., appeared before the Board advocating the selection of a site for a new armory for that organization, to be located in the Borough of The Bronx.

General McLeer, in behalf of the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens, reported progress in the matter of street improvements adjoining the proposed new armory of the Second Battalion Naval Militia, and read a communication from the Brooklyn Board of Trade.

A motion to adjourn was adopted.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.
