### PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

No. 759.

New York, May 10, 1908.

At the regular meeting of the Central Federated Union, held on the above date, the following preamble and resolution was indorsed:

Whereas, The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company are erecting many highway bridges over their right of way in the Borough of The Bronx with non-union and non-resident workmen, who work for less than the recognized prevailing rate, which tends to lower the American standard of living, though the approaches of the bridges are paid for by The City of New York; and

Whereas, The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company have acquired the franchise of the New York and Port Chester Railroad, which was supposed at the time the franchise was granted to be a competing line; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we hereby request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take the necessary action to forfeit or cause to be forfeited all the rights of the said New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, and a copy of these resolutions be sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, City Hall, Manhattan:

Sirs—The Public Service Commission for the First District is in receipt of a copy of the following resolution adopted by your Honorable Body on April 28, 1908:

"Whereas, The condition of the streets between and surrounding the tracks on Water street, from Fulton street to Washington street, Borough of Brooklyn, and also Front street, from Fulton street to Adams street, Borough of Brooklyn, and which are dangerous for vehicles to travel through;

"Whereas, The railroad companies have long neglected making repairs on these streets, as required by law; be it

"Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen do hereby request the Public Service Commission to notify the railroad companies operating on above named streets that said railroad companies be instructed to make the necessary repairs immediately between the tracks, as required by law."

The Commission is advised by Counsel that upon the facts stated in the resolution and under section 98 of the Railroad Law and sections 45 and 383 of the Greater New York Charter, the duty of requiring these street railroad corporations to repair that portion of the streets used by them between their tracks, the rails of their tracks and two feet in width outside of their tracks, rests with the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and that it would be better to withhold any order of the Commission until the President of the Borough of Brooklyn has exercised his authority by requiring the repairs to be made in such manner as he may prescribe. If the companies fail to comply, the Commission may then take necessary action.

Section 98 of the Railroad Law referred to above provides as follows:

"Every street surface railroad corporation so long as it shall continue to use any of its tracks in any street \* \* \* shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of such street \* \* \* between its tracks, the rails of its tracks, and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe."

Section 383 of the Greater New York Charter provides that the Borough President is the proper local authority referred to in said section 98 of the Railroad Law.

Sir—In the matter of the communication addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity on February 13, 1908, requesting the establishment in that Department of the position of Supervising Electrical Engineer, at a salary of \$5,000 per annum, for one incumbent, which communication was, on March 6, 1908, referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, and by you assigned to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to submit the following report:

The Budget for 1908 makes the following provisions for the high-pressure fire service:

For the purpose of properly administering this important branch of the City service the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity deems it necessary to appoint a Supervising Electrical Engineer, at a salary of \$5,000 per annum. Your Examiner learns from the Chief Engineer of that Department that there is no Electrical Engineer on his staff who can be relieved of his present duties and assigned to the high-pressure fire service; nor can the duties of the proposed new position be merged with those of any of the present staff.

In view of the important character of the work which the high-pressure fire service entails, and for which nearly a quarter of a million dollars has been appropriated for the year 1908, and for the reasons set forth so forcibly by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity in his communication addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of February 13, 1908, supplemented by his letter of the 6th inst. to the Comptroller, your Examiner is of the opinion that the request for the establishment in that Department of the position of Supervising Electrical Engineer, at \$5,000 per annum, for one incumbent, should be granted.

Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Referring to my letter of April 23, 1908, recommending that the Board of Aldermen authorize additional Revenue Bonds of \$5,000 for emergent sewer repairs on the sewer in Whitlock avenue and Bancroft street, and of the sewer in Tiffany street, in which request was made for additional special Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$5,000. It appears that since the request was made, as per my letter above referred to, there has been still further damage done to the sewers, and every large storm adds to the injury, the last storm causing a considerable amount of brick work to fall in, which we had expected would not have to be removed. From the report made by the Assistant Engineer in Charge of Sewers on this subject, it appears that the amount heretofore provided and asked for will be insufficient. I, therefore, suggest that in the resolution providing for these emergent repairs the amount authorized be stated at \$15,000 additional, instead of the \$5,000 as above requested.

Attached hereto is the report of Engineer in charge of this work.

Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

Sir—In the matter of repairing the sewer in Tiffany street, near Randall avenue, and sewer in Whitlock avenue south of Bancroft street, I would suggest that an appropriation (beyond the \$30,000 originally granted, and the request for \$5,000 additional, now pending before the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment) be made in the amount of \$10,000, making a total of \$45,000.

My reason for making this suggestion is that since these sewers were damaged in 1906, there have been a number of severe storms which have caused additional damage, and necessarily increase the amount of money required for the repair of the sewers.

On May 7, 1908, during the heavy storm of that day there was a collapse of quite a considerable stretch of the side wall of the Whitlock avenue sewer that was originally deemed in condition to be left standing.

I would further request that the contract for repairing sewer in Whitlock avenue be registered as soon as possible, in order that the work of construction could be ordered on before further damage by storms may occur.

Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Sir—Section 722 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides, in part, as follows:

"The paid fire department system shall, as soon as practicable, be extended over the boroughs of Queens and Richmond, by the fire commissioner, and thereupon the present volunteer fire department not maintained therein shall be disbanded."

In the year 1905, in pursuance of the above quoted provision of the Charter, the paid system of fire protection was extended into a considerable portion of the Borough of Richmond and also into Rockaway Beach, Arverne and Far Rockaway, Borough of Queens, and, in 1906, into Jamaica and Richmond Hill, in the latter Borough.

Under date of March 19, 1908, there was received here through the Mayor's office a communication dated the 5th of that month, from the Flushing Association, Flushing, Borough of Queens, concerning the inadequacy of the means and facilities for fire protection in that town, and on March 31, 1908, the matter was referred to the Deputy Fire Commissioner, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, for proper attention and report.

On March 4, 1908, the Deputy Fire Commissioner, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, transmitted to this office reports on this subject as regards Flushing, and College Point as well, by the Deputy Chief of Department in Charge, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, together with estimates of the expense of extending the paid system of fire protection into those towns, said reports reading as follows:

I.

"I have the honor to report that I visited Flushing on the 13th ult. to examine into the subject of extending the paid system into such territory, and I am convinced that to give proper fire protection to the Town of Flushing three companies should be organized therein (to take the place of the present six volunteer companies), one of which paid companies should be an engine company with extra hose wagon. From my experience in this Department hydrant streams are not effective for fires that obtain any headway. Said companies, to give the best protection, ought to be located as follows:

"1. An engine company, with additional hose wagon, on Lincoln street, south side, 150 feet east of Garden street, on the site now occupied by Empire Hose Company 1, as storehouse and bell tower. This company would cover the lower and business part of the Town of Flushing.

"2. Hook and ladder company on Union street, west side, 170 feet south of Amity street, on the site now occupied by Mutual Engine or Hose Company 1. This is the most central point in the Town of Flushing, and as there is to be but one hook and ladder company in said town, in my opinion, it should be located at this point and equipped with a 60-foot aerial hook and ladder truck, having side ladders, as there are some tall structures in Flushing, where such an apparatus would be necessary in the event of fire.

"3. A hose company in the building now occupied by Murray Hill Hose Company 4, southeast corner of Madison avenue and Boerum avenue.

II.

"While in Flushing on the 13th ult. I made a tour of College Point, and I am strongly of the opinion that the paid system should be extended to the Town of College Point at the same time it is extended to Flushing, so that in the event of a fire of any magnitude assistance could be rendered to Flushing from College Point or vice versa. In the Town of College Point there are many large manufacturing establishments, such as rubber factories, silk factories, sash and blind factories and many others. Therefore, while there, I looked the situation over, and, in my opinion, to give this town proper protection there ought to be one engine company, one hose company and one hook and ladder company organized therein, the engine company and hook and ladder company to be located on the site now occupied by Eagle Hook and Ladder Company and Union Hose Company 1, located at Nos. 225 and 227 Sixteenth street, and the hose company on the site now occupied by Enterprise Hose Company 2, located at No. 518 Fifth street, or in the vicinity thereof. The latter site is not owned by the City."

The companies proposed to be disbanded in Flushing are the following:

Empire Hose Company 1.  
Mutual Engine Company 1.  
Murray Hill Hose Company 4.  
Rescue Hook and Ladder Company 1.  
Young America Hose Company 2.  
Flushing Hose Company 3.

The first three of these companies are to be superseded, respectively, by an engine company (with additional hose wagon), a hook and ladder company and a hose com-

pany of the paid system, as indicated in the report of the Deputy Chief of Department in charge of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

The companies proposed to be disbanded in College Point are the following:

Union Hose Company 1.  
Eagle Hook and Ladder Company 1.  
Enterprise Hose Company 2.

These are to be replaced, respectively, by an engine company, a hook and ladder company and a hose company of the paid system, as set forth in the report of Deputy Chief of Department Lally.

For the purchase of hose, supplies, furniture and equipment, horses and harness, additional to the equipment in these respects, owned by the City, and in possession of the companies proposed to be disbanded, which may be utilized for the new companies, and to provide means for the payment of the salaries of the uniformed force for a period of six months (from July 1 until December 31, 1908), the following sums will be required:

I have therefore the honor to make application to the Board of Aldermen to adopt a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to an amount not exceeding sixty-two thousand two hundred and eighty-five dollars (\$62,285) for use by the Fire Commissioner of The City of New York in extending the paid Fire Department into the towns of Flushing and College Point, Borough of Queens; to inclose draft of resolution designed to accomplish the object in view, and to urge that the matter receive the prompt and favorable action of your Honorable Board.

I desire to add that, in connection with this proposed extension of the paid system of fire protection into Flushing and College Point, application has been made by me to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve of an issue of Corporate Stock to an amount not exceeding eighty-seven thousand dollars (\$87,000) for the purchase of engines and hook and ladder trucks, for the acquisition of sites, the erection of buildings thereon, and for additions and alterations to buildings already erected.

Dear Sir—On May 6, 1908, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution requesting and authorizing the Corporation Counsel to prepare a lease to the City from the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York of the suite of rooms known as No. 551 on the Liberty street front of the Mutual Life Building, No. 32 Nassau street, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the New York Charter Commission, for a period of one year from the date of occupancy, at the annual rental of \$1,350, payable quarterly.

Under the provisions of chapter 114 of the Laws of 1908, which authorized the Governor to appoint the Commission, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is directed to raise the sum of \$30,000, out of which the expenses of the Commission are to be paid.

The strictest economy is being exercised in the organization of the office force and in other directions, yet it is not at all improbable that the appropriation will be found to be too small to enable the Commission to properly perform its work, which is of such great importance to The City of New York.

For the Commission appointed by the Governor in 1907 the City provided a room in the suite of the Corporation Counsel in the Hall of Records. That room is now occupied by the Commissioner of Records, and there is no space available for the use of the Commission in any of the premises owned or leased by the City in any way suitable for the use of the Commission.

The suite of offices referred to in the resolution of the Sinking Fund Commission is barely large enough to house the indispensable working force of the Commission. By courtesy of the Bar Association, the members of the Commission are enabled to meet at the house of the Association without expense to the City. The office of the Counsel is also at the disposal of the Commission without cost.

The Commission has instructed me to ascertain whether, in view of the foregoing facts, especially the small appropriation when the magnitude of the work is taken into account and the inability of the City to house the Commission in suitable quarters leased or owned by it at present, the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will not provide the suite in question for the use of the Commission without expense to the latter, so that the appropriation of \$30,000 can be used in the employment of a suitable office staff, the cost of printing and other absolutely indispensable and unavoidable expenses.

I respectfully suggest that section 44 of the Greater New York Charter confers the necessary power upon the Board of Aldermen, especially that part of the section which provides that the Board of Aldermen may pass all such ordinances, rules, etc., "as to the said Board of Aldermen may seem meet for the good rule and government of the City, and to carry out the purposes and provisions of this act, or of other laws relating to the said City."

The power of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to act in the matter seems to be conferred by section 243 of the Charter.

AN ORDINANCE to establish rules and regulations for the use of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, in the Borough of The Bronx.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1.—In pursuance of the provisions of section 9 of chapter 130 of the Laws of 1895, and on the designation thereof by the President of the Borough, the following rules and regulations are hereby established for the use of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, in the Borough of The Bronx:

#### Rule 1.

No areas, steps, courtyards or other projections shall be built, erected or made upon the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, between East One Hundred and Sixty-first street and Mosholu parkway or upon any extension of the same, or upon the transverse roads of said Grand Boulevard and Concourse in the Borough of The Bronx, at

East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, between Grant avenue and Gerard avenue.

East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, between Sherman avenue and Gerard avenue.

East One Hundred and Seventieth street, between Grant avenue and Walton avenue.

Tremont avenue, between Anthony avenue and Morris avenue.  
 Burnside avenue, between Ryer avenue and Morris avenue.  
 Kingsbridge road, between Valentine avenue and Morris avenue.  
 Bedford Park boulevard, between Briggs avenue and Jerome avenue.  
 East Two Hundred and Fourth street, between Mosholu parkway and Jerome avenue, or upon the transverse road and parkway at Belmont street, between Weeks avenue and Townsend avenue.

## Rule 2.

Any person, or persons, who shall hereafter make, build or erect any areas, steps, stoops, courtyard or other projection, in contravention of these rules and regulations, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, in addition thereto, be liable for a penalty of ten dollars for such offense, and ten dollars for each and every day that such offense shall continue.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Pursuant to section 9 of chapter 130 of the Laws of 1895, entitled "An Act to lay out and establish a Grand Boulevard and Concourse, together with not more than fifteen (15) roads running transversely underneath said boulevard, in The City of New York," I, Louis F.  Kingsbridge road, between Valentine avenue and Morris avenue.  
 Bedford Park boulevard, between Briggs avenue and Jerome avenue.

East Two Hundred and Fourth street, between Mosholu parkway and Jerome avenue.

—or upon the transverse road and parkway at

Belmont street, between Weeks avenue and Townsend avenue.

Rule 2. Any person, or persons, who shall hereafter make, build or erect any areas, steps, stoops, courtyard or other projection, in contravention of these rules and regulations, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, in addition thereto, be liable for a penalty of ten dollars (\$10) for such offense and ten dollars (\$10) for each and every day that such offense shall continue.

Resolved, That section 53 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 53. No milk which is watered, adulterated, reduced or changed in any respect by the addition of water or other substance, or by the removal of cream, shall be brought into the City of New York, or held, kept, sold or offered for sale at any place in said City; nor shall any one keep, have, sell or offer for sale in the said City any such milk.

The term "adulterated milk," when so used in this code, means:

First—Milk containing more than 88 per centum of water or fluids.

Second—Milk containing less than 12 per centum of milk solids.

Third—Milk containing less than 3 per centum of fats.

Fourth—Milk drawn from animals within fifteen days before or five days after parturition.

Fifth—Milk drawn from animals fed on distilled waste, or any substance in a state of fermentation or putrefaction, or on any unwholesome food.

Sixth—Milk drawn from cows kept in a crowded or unhealthy condition.

Seventh—Milk from which any part of the cream has been removed.

Eighth—Milk which has been diluted with water or any other fluid, or to which has been added, or into which has been introduced, any foreign substance whatever.

Ninth—Milk the temperature of which is higher than 50 degrees Fahrenheit, or which contains an excessive number of bacteria.

The provisions of this section shall not be applicable, however, to modified milk or skimmed milk held or offered for sale under permits therefrom, from the Board of Health, pursuant to the rules and regulations of said Board.
