Abstract of Proceedings of Park Board for Week Ending July 13, 1912:

Stated meeting, July 11, 3 p. m. Present: Commissioners Stover (President), Higgins, Kennedy.

Sealed bids were received for the fol-

Installing water supply system for park plots along centre of 7th ave., between 110th and 153d sts., Manhattan; setting curbstones and paving ends of park plots along 7th ave., between 110th and 153d sts., Manhattan; forage for parks in The Bronx; erecting shelter house and comfort station in City Park, Brooklyn; for furnishing one 12-ton steam road roller for parks in Queens.

Dr. Stephen Smith and Mr. Herman Ridder, representing the Tree Planting Association of New York City, and others appeared and urged the Department to include in its estimate for the coming year a sufficient sum for the establishment of a Bureau of Tree Culture on a basis to secure in each Borough the highest degree of skill in the planting and culture of street trees. The matter was taken under consideration in connection with the de-

partmental estimate. A communication was received from the Landscape Architect recommending the appointment of an Assistant Landscape Architect, and describing the work to be required of him. Laid over for consideration in connection with the departmental estimate for 1913.

All bids received this day for erecting a shelter and comfort station in City Park Brooklyn, were rejected.

The preparation and advertisement of a contract for planting trees on the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, in the Borough of The Bronx, were authorized.

The time for completing the following contracts was extended:

Contract dated November 24, 1911, with Merrick Fire-proofing Company, for erecting field house in the W. 59th st. Play-

ground, Manhattan, was extended thirty working days.

Contract dated May 3, 1911, with George F. Driscoll, for erecting shelter house in Bushwick Playground, Brooklyn, was extended twenty additional days from expiration of previous extension.



It shall be the duty of the Commissioners or managers or the principal, superintendent, or physician, of each and every hospital, public institution or dispensary, in this city, to report to the Department of Health, in writing, the full name, age and address of any person sufferin from a one of the infectious diseases included in the list appended, with the name of the disease, within twenty-four hours of the time when the case is first seen:

A—Communicable: Typhoid fever, influenza, lobar pneumonia, broncho-pneumonia, infectious diseases of the gastro-intestinal canal (dysentery, cholera morbus, cholera infantum, summer diarrhoeas of infants). B-Parasitic diseases of the skin: Scabies,

tinea tonsurans, impetigo (contagious), favus. Note—In this list of diseases reporting is required by the Department of Health in order that data may be obtained for general and spe-cial investigation of the modes and sources of infection and as to the prevalence and distribu-tion of these diseases. The Department of Health does not purpose to exercise a sanitary surveillance in these cases, but desires informa-tion with a view to the ultimate removal or improvement in the conditions which now foster provement in the conditions which how loster them. Notification is required in certain of these diseases because of the liability to their extension among the children in schools.
