Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 12, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 4,987.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 410.

During the past week 295 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 64 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 12 permits.

There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 14 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 134 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 177 visits were made, and 46 disinfections and 26 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 12.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,446, of which 327 were primary, and 1,119 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 5,340 pounds of meat.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 26, and the number of arrests made was 1.

The certificates of 600 births, 51 still-births, 321 marriages and 597 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June

12, 1886. This shows an increase of 110 births, 116 marriages and 20 deaths, and a decrease of 2 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was an increase of 83 births, 3 still-births, 38 marriages and 4 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; diphtheria, 5; whooping-cough, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; rheumatism and gout, 1; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 2; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 6; suicide, 2; and drowning, 3; while the deaths from measles increased 1; scarlatina, 4; croup, 1; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 8; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 3; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 4; heart diseases, 7; apoplexy, 1; premature and preterm births, 4. The number of deaths from erysipelas, typhoid fever, malarial fevers, all diseases of the brain and nervous system, cirrhosis and hepatitis, Bright's disease and nephritis, cyanosis and atelectasis, and surgical operations, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 129 were in institutions, 336 in tenement-houses, 118 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 98 on the first, 157 on the second, 110 on the third, 71 on the fourth, 16 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 586 were stated to be residents of New York City and 11 non-residents; 82 were stated to be single, 177 married, 68 widowed, and the condition of 270 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 597; still-births, 51; bodies in transitu, 12; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 62 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 600 births, 321 marriages, 51 still-births, 597 deaths; 12 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 141 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage and 91 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 12, 1886, was 68.8 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.905; the mean humidity was 79, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 560, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.31 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
